Alfalfa will produce as much feed per acre as corn planted on the same land. Alfalfa is a more profitable crop than cotton or corn for any farmer who is not growing an abundance of high quality hay for all the livestock on his farm. Alfalfa can be successfully grown on any land in this county except that which has wet subsoil. Land for alfalfa should have lime applied at the rate of two or three tons per acre, unless it has been limed within the last five years. It should have 500 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate or 200 pounds of 45 per cent superphosphate and 25 pounds of Borax worked into the topsoil before the seed is planted, Alfalfa seed should be inoculated and 20 lbs. of seed per acre of the Kansas or Oklahoma variety should be plant

The cost of planting alfalfa seems-high, but the first cutting of hay will pay all the cost up to that time and there will still be 15 cuttings to go. Every farm needs a few acres of alfalfa to provide pasture for hogs and chickens and hay for all the livestock on the


the nutritional state. Thus the science of medicine makes use of the science of nutrition in the promotion of health, the prevention of disease, and in the treatment and recovery of the sick.

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

Precautions for Dipping Sheep Are Suggested

Among rules to be followed when dipping sheep are: Fast the sheep several hours before dipping. Don't dip sheep immediately on arrival at the bath if they have become heated. Don't dip sheep in an arsenical bath if they have open wounds. Don't put the sheep in the bath head first. Prepare the bath strictly in accordance with instructions on the package and mix thoroughly.

Young Cockleburs Are **Poisonous** for Swine Young cocklebur seedlings will poison pigs, according to veterinarians at Iowa State college. The danger of cocklebur poisoning is greater this year because of short pastures. With grass short, pigs will be tempted to eat young cockleburs in search of green feed. Best remedy is to keep hogs out of fields containing cocklebur seedlings until they are

eliminated.

Dear Driver: -


