PASTURE CUT FEEDING COSTS, INCREASE MEAT

Requests for an increase in the fall pig crop emphasize the need of increasing the Nation's meat supply in the quickest manner; and use of good winter pasture is one of the cheapest and fastest ways of producing pork, say livestock specialists of the U. T. Agricultural Extension Service.

More pounds of meat at less cost is what swine producers can expect from good pastures, specialists point out. A half acre of pasture, for example, saved 712 pounds of protein feed in a test conducted last year by the U. T. Agricultural Experiment Station.

Six pigs on a half-acre of crimson clover gained 390 pounds more than six pigs of similar weight on dry lot. For each 100 pounds' gain, the two lots ate about the same amount of corn; but those on pasture consumed less than half as much cottonseed meal and tankage as the dry lot pigs.

The six pigs on a half-acre dry lot gained only 744 pounds, while those on a half-acre winter pasture gained 1,154 pounds. This test extended from December 16, 1946, through April 14 the

following spring. Farmers interested in producing pork profitably are urged to make best use of winter pasture. They should get help on the pasture program from county agents, who are leaders in the drive to "keep Tennessee green in winter".

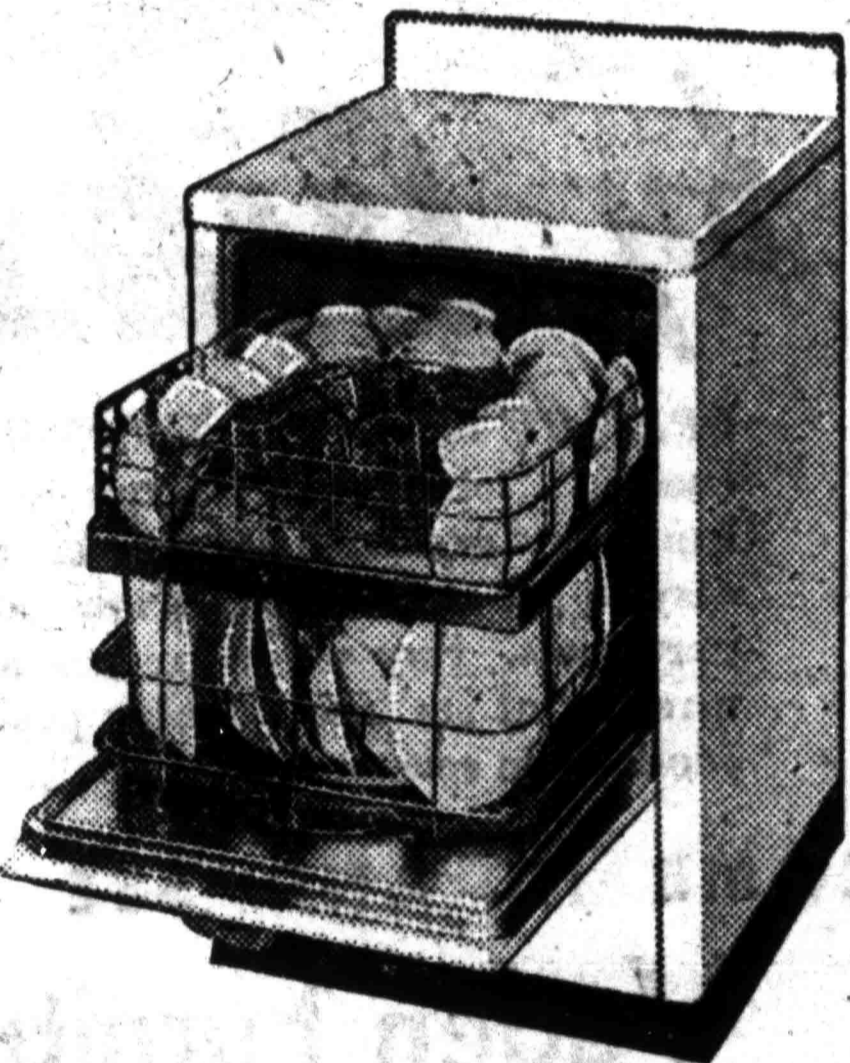

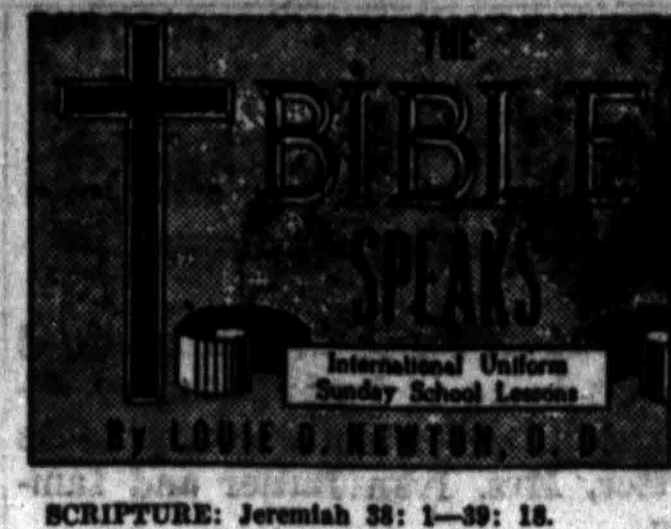

Ebed-Melech, The Ethiopian Lesson for August 8, 1948

ARE you ready for a real story? Then turn to Jeremiah 38, and read on to verse 18 in the 39th chapter. This interesting story reveals a hero, Ebed-melech, by name, which means "the king's slave." This may have been his official title rather than his personal name. Anyway, he is the hero of our story, and a very admirable hero, indeed.

He was a Negro, and Ethiopian eunuch, in charge of the king's chambers. Zebekiah, as the story reveals, held Ebed-melech in high esteem. He was, obviously, a most honorable man. How he had come to know Jeremiah, and to esteem him so highly, is a subject for profitable contemplation. The devotional reading, Matthew 23:31-46, offers final opinion on the value of Ebed-melech's ministry to Jeremiah. The golden text, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men," Galatians 6:10.

JEREMIAH'S FRIEND

E-BED-MELECH was Jeremiah's friend. When he saw that the princes had done to Jeremiah, he went to the king and begged him to allow him to draw Jeremiah out of the mire in the dark dungeon. He knew that Jeremiah would soon die in this awful place, and Ebed-melech risked his life in making the request to rescue Jeremiah. The wonder is that the princes had not ordered Ebed-melech slain. Evidently, they recognized the hand of God.

Like as this Negro servant in the long ago served God by rendering kindness to a man of another race, so may we today serve God and civilization by good will and kindly service to all races.

FREEDOM THROUGH A SLAVE

THE story of Ebed-melech's kindness to Jeremiah lifts to an nobling example the act of a slave on behalf of freedom. The world's benefactors are those who understand freedom, and cast themselves in utter self-forgetfulness into the struggle for right against wrong.

A FRIEND INDEED

GRANTED permission from the king to rescue Jeremiah, Ebed-melech devised prompt methods of letting down old pieces of rope and rags, telling Jeremiah how to fasten them under his arms, and with the aid of thirty men drew him up from the mire, and brought him into the court of the prison.

WHO SIDES WITH GOD

E-BED-MELECH'S noble ministry to Jeremiah lifts up a banner for every true follower of the Lord. Who sides with God must always win. That is the lesson of the lesson. We should never have known about this Negro, had he not cast his all on the side of God.

FOOD POISONING

Going picnic - picnic-ing in the park? Don't let food poisoning spoil such a happy occasion. Picnic-ers often set good judgment aside when it comes to the picnic lunch. Foods are often prepared carelessly, protected poorly from contamination, and served in vio-

lation of every rule of food safety. Food poisoning means there has been a slip-up somewhere between the kitchen and the picnic table. Good sanitation has gone by the board either in the preparation, handling, packaging or serving the food.

Various kinds of food poisoning are erroneously referred to as "ptomaine" poisoning. Ptomaines are harmless chemicals found in decaying meats. They are seldom the cause of poisoning. "Picnic-itis" would be a better general term to use.

Food poisoning is usually due to one of three things: Poisonous metals such as zinc, antimony or arsenic may be dissolved in the

lemonade made and stored in a galvanized container. Foods may be contaminated with bacteria which produce a specific disease when ingested with food or drink. Or foods may have been standing long enough at high temperatures for decay-producing organisms to make the food toxic when eaten.

Food poisoning can be avoided as easily at the picnic as at home. This means scrupulous cleanliness in the preparation, handling, packaging and serving foods in the park. It means protecting the picnic lunch from flies, roaches, and unclean hands. It means clean eating utensils.

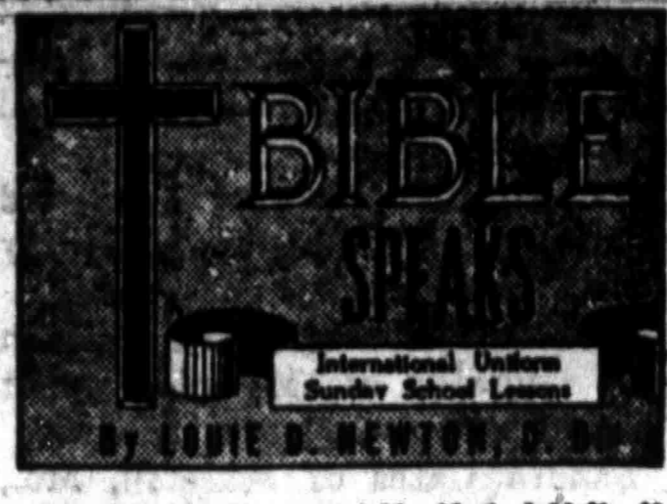
Picnic with caution, especially about food. Few occasions are more enjoyable than a family or community picnic - and few occasions see caution thrown to the winds more often about the protection of foods from contamination.

Andrew, The Man Who Brought Others

Lesson for August 15, 1948

MEET Andrew, brother of Simon Peter, fisherman of Galilee. Follow his career and you will account him one of the truly great men of the ages, chiefly because he was ever alert to help men on to God.

WHAT ANDREW TOLD HIS FRIENDS

WHEN Andrew met Jesus, and discovered in him the Saviour of men, he went and found his brother, Simon, and said unto him, "We have found the Messiah, which is, being interpreted, the Christ," John 1:41.

What do we tell our friends? Do we not delight to tell our friends what we have found to be good? This was the mission of Andrew—telling his friends about Jesus, for he had found in Jesus that which was good. John the Baptist had told Andrew about Jesus, and he was determined that he would tell everyone who would listen this good news.

HOW ANDREW KNEW ABOUT JESUS

ANDREW got his impressions of Jesus firsthand. When he heard John the Baptist say, "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world," he went on to inquire about Jesus, and Jesus bade him and John spend the day with Him. They did, from 10 o'clock in the morning until late afternoon. That was enough. Andrew knew from that day about Jesus. He was now ready to tell others what he knew about Jesus.

Do we know Jesus well enough to tell others about Him? If a fisherman could tell the story effectively, cannot everyone? But let us remember this, no man can introduce his friend to Jesus until he himself knows Jesus.

THE MAN WHO BROUGHT OTHERS

LET'S look for a moment at some of the people Andrew brought to Jesus. We begin, of course, with Simon, his brother. Here, I think, is the highest test of his ability to tell others about Jesus—bringing his own brother. It is often easier to tell strangers about Jesus than those of our own family.

And now we see Andrew yonder in the multitude, finding the lad with the loaves and fishes, and bringing him to Jesus. That is the test of seeing the right person at the right time. And again this is the acid test of introducing people to Jesus.

Again, we see Andrew sensing the fact that some young Greeks had come a long way to see Jesus. He knew how to help them. In this incident we see the final example of winning people to Jesus—cultured Greeks, who were familiar, we may assume, with the current thought of the world. But this simple fisherman of Galilee knew how to approach them, how to gain their attention, how to bring them to Jesus.

THEY WAIT FOR THE ANDREWS TODAY

THE world waits for some Andrew today. I fully believe that most people could be won to Christ if only there were enough Andrews. Rarely have I had a person to repel me when I faithfully followed the leading of the Holy Spirit to speak to such person about Jesus.

Andrew did not rely upon his own resources. He went in the might of the Lord. He knew what Jesus had done for him. He yearned to see all men enjoy their blessing. He was a simple messenger—a voice.

And God gave him words—words that fell like good seed into fertile soil. So may we today introduce our friends to Jesus. Only let us remember this—we must first know him!

These Foods Make a Picnic (See recipes below)

### Picnic Foods

WE ALL AGREE that picnics are fun, but how's the food holding out, now that you've already had some picnics during the summer? Is the variety still there to tempt jaded appetites or are you ready for some quick and easy ideas full of inspiration?

You'll want to keep anything edible simple and easy to prepare as well as easy to carry because it's no fun to get worn out in the process of packing, and there is also nothing worse than arriving with soggy sandwiches as well as bruised fruit or muddled cake.

Everyone will feel better at picnics if you plan well balanced meals, so have your share of starches, vitamins and minerals.

Sandwiches are a standby, but they can have infinite variety. Add some crisp vegetables to the filling when you can, thus making the texture interesting and more delicious.

Plan to use fruit in season, carefully washed and wrapped, of course, so you can enjoy eating it. Cakes should be simple, and are best made in square or oblong pans, tucked in a box and cut when served. No chance for messing when it's done this way!

HERE ARE SOME delightful fillings for sandwiches which I know will be a hit with the folks. Chill the fillings, and they won't soak through the bread.

- \*Savory Ham-Vegetable Filling (Makes 8 sandwiches)
  - 16 slices bread
  - 1/2 cup softened butter
  - 1 cup deviled ham
  - 1 cup grated raw carrot
  - 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 cup mayonnaise

Spread sliced bread and butter. On eight slices spread deviled ham. Combine green pepper, carrot, salt and mayonnaise. Spread carrot mixture on ham and place buttered slices of bread on top. Cut as desired and wrap well.

- \*Egg Salad Sandwiches (Makes 8)
  - 4 chopped hard-cooked eggs
  - 1 cup minced celery
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup minced stuffed olives
  - 1/2 cup mayonnaise

Mix all ingredients together in order given. Spread filling on cracked wheat bread which has been buttered.

- \*Shrimp Sandwiches (Makes 8)
  - 1/2 cup canned and cleaned shrimp, crabmeat or lobster
  - 4 tablespoons butter or substitute
  - 1/2 teaspoon minced onion
  - 1 teaspoon lemon juice
  - 1/2 teaspoon mustard
  - 2 tablespoons minced stuffed olives

White or whole wheat bread. Mince the shrimp and mix with the remaining ingredients. Chill thoroughly before spreading on bread.

- \*Chicken-Ham Sandwiches (Makes 6)
  - 1/2 cup ground, cooked chicken
  - 1/2 cup ground, cooked ham
  - 3 chopped, stuffed olives
  - 1/2 tablespoon mayonnaise
  - 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice

### LYNN SAYS: Do Something Special With Your Salads.

Scop out fresh and nicely firm cucumbers. Flake a can of salmon, season it with lemon juice and mayonnaise and fill the hollowed cucumbers. With this pass some crackers and cheese and luncheon is served.

Chicken salad takes on an elegant air when it's served in canned peach halves. Sprinkle with toasted, sliced almonds.

### DEVILED EGGS are handy to have on a picnic

to eat either with the sandwiches, by themselves or with tomatoes or other relishes. Here's a tasty way in which you may prepare them without too much work.

- \*Deviled Eggs.
  - 4 hard-cooked eggs
  - 4 tablespoons softened butter
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
  - Dash of pepper
  - 1/2 teaspoon vinegar
  - Mayonnaise

Cut eggs in half lengthwise and remove yolks. Mash yolks and combine with butter, salt, mustard, pepper and vinegar. Add mayonnaise to make a creamy consistency.

Refill egg white and sprinkle with paprika. Chill.

HERE ARE SEASONAL fruits suitable to take on a picnic: Apricots, plums, nectarines, peaches, berries, cantaloupes and watermelon. Oranges, apples and bananas are also good standbys. Grapes and cherries are delightful. Berries and peaches may be washed, sugared and placed in mason jars with tight covers. If you are taking melon, it's best to chill it thoroughly, wrap in waxed paper, and cut and scoop out the seeds just before you serve it.

IF YOU LIKE easy-to-carry cookies to take along with you, serve them with the fruit or as snacks between meals if you are making the picnic a whole day affair.

- \*Mincedmeat Goodies (Makes 4 dozen)
  - 1 cup shortening
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 2 eggs, beaten
  - 2 cups sifted flour
  - 1 cup mincedmeat
  - 1 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon ginger
  - 1 teaspoon cloves
  - 1 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup chopped nuts

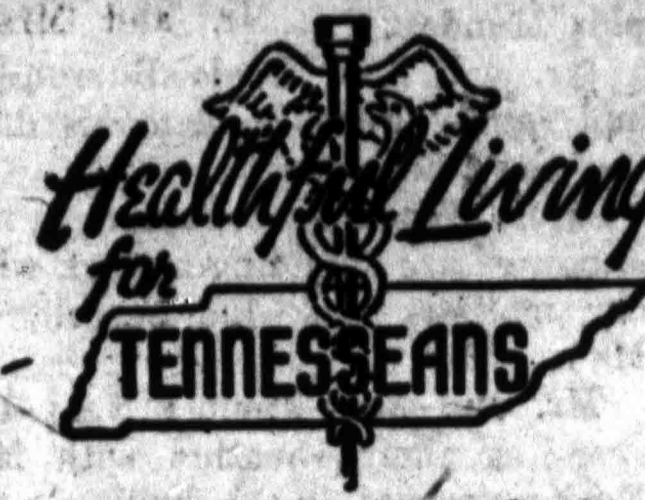
Cream shortening and sugar together until fluffy. Add eggs and flour enough to prevent mixture from curdling. Add mincedmeat and dry ingredients, sifted together, and the nuts. The amount of flour varies with the amount of liquid in the mincedmeat. The mixture should be stiff enough to drop from spoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate (375 degree) oven about 10 minutes.

### BABIES NEED SUNNING, TOO

Babies love the sun. They should. Sunbaths are health-giving and baby should have his regular sunbaths started when about one month old.

Sunbaths make baby's skin less susceptible to rashes and other irritating conditions. They help prevent colds, improve the appetite and help prevent rickets.

Baby's sunbath should be given outdoors or in an open window from early spring until late fall. Sunlight coming through window glass is less beneficial because some of the health-promoting rays of the sun are filtered out by the glass.

In winter, baby can have a short sunning in an open window if draughts are avoided and the room kept warm.

The usual precautions about sunbathing are doubly important for the baby. His tender skin must be protected from over exposure.

On very hot days give him his sunbath in the early morning or late afternoon. Start the bath with only a few minutes exposure at first, increasing the time gradually each day.

Older children can romp in sunsuits for several hours each day without danger. They, too, must start out gradually, however.

Like many of the essentials of life and good health, sunshine is free to all. Let baby start early enjoying it's friendly warmth and it's health-promoting ultraviolet rays.

ily requirements and food left-overs should be made before going too far with preserving work, say U-T Extension Foods specialists.

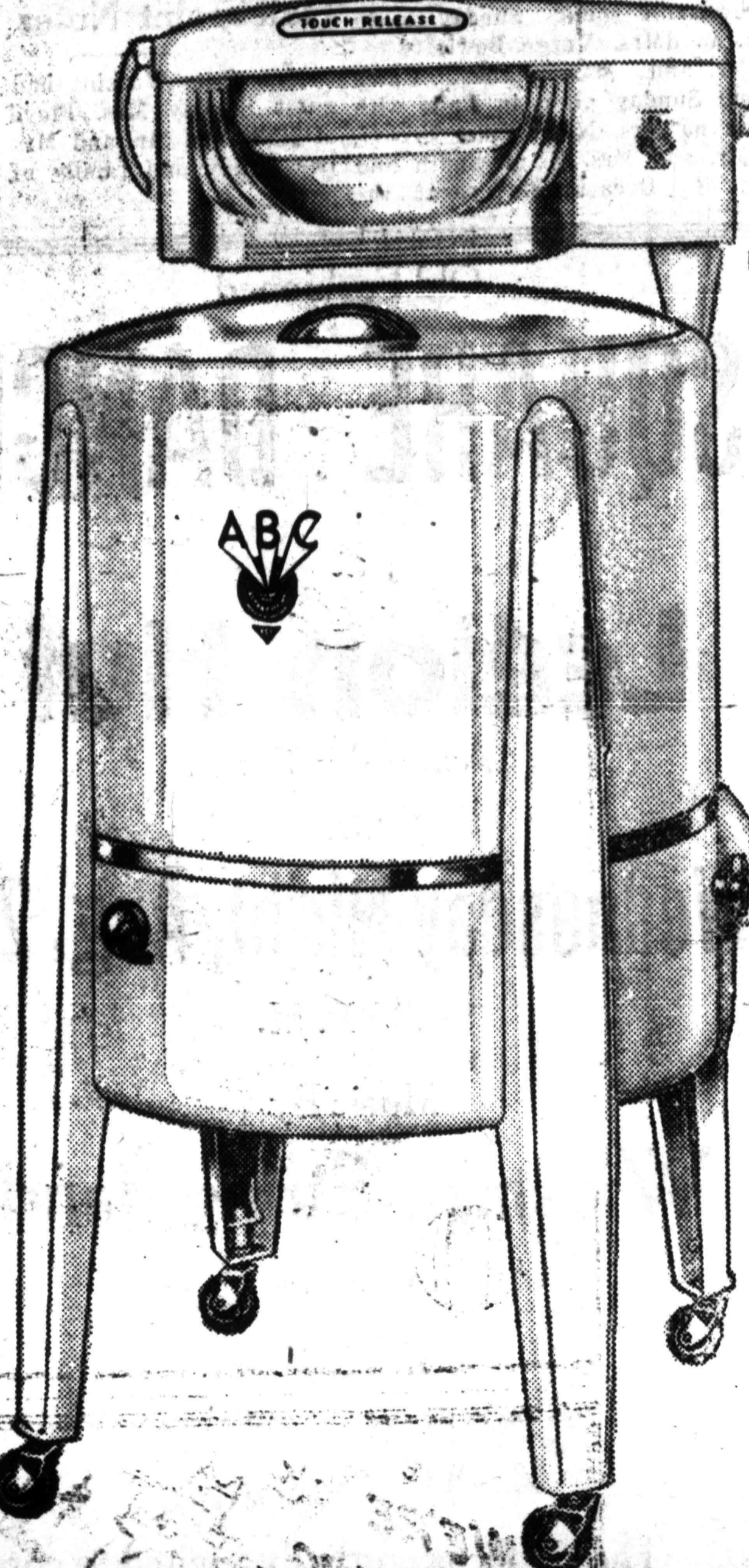

1 lb. uncooked ground beef  
1/2 cup dry rice  
1/2 cup onion  
1/2 cup Fat Milk  
1 tablespoon finely cut onion  
1 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup pepper  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup condensed tomato soup  
1/4 cup onion  
1/2 cup salt

Mix together thoroughly the meat, rice, milk, onion, 1 teaspoon salt and the pepper. Shape into 8 small balls. Brown slowly in hot shortening. Mix soup, water and few grains salt. Pour over meat patties. Cover closely and cook very slowly 45 min., or until rice is tender. Serve with sauce remaining in pan. Makes 4 servings.

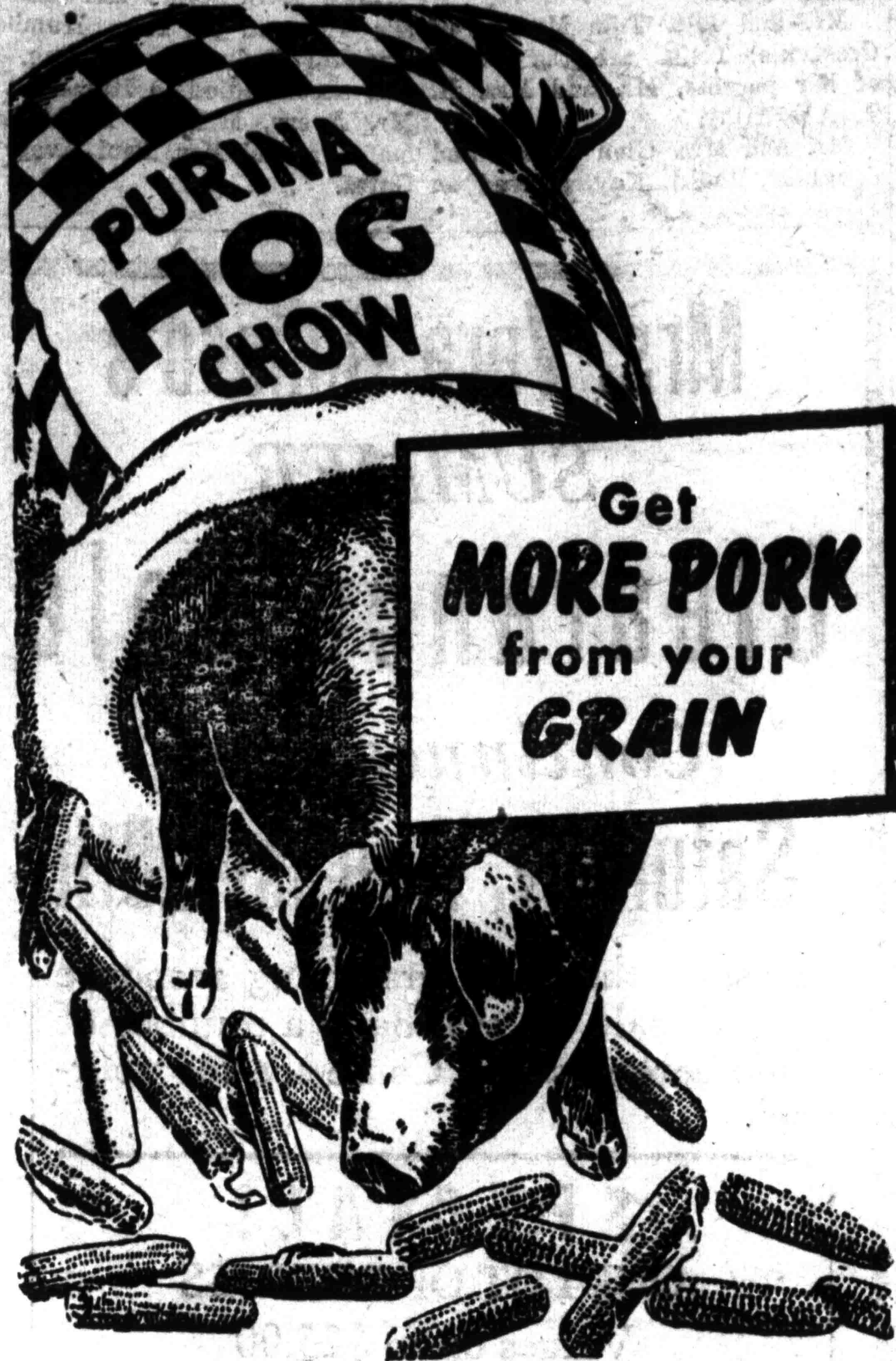

Soil 'Bank Account' Determines Returns

Check Up on Solvency To Assure Prosperity

Check up on your soil fertility "bank account." It's more important to you than the number of dollars you have in your commercial account. Your present and future prosperity depends on your soil's crop producing ability. Crop producing ability, in turn, depends on the size of your soil fertility bank account—how you match deposits and withdrawals. Every crop you sell carries with it nitrogen, phosphate, potash and



other plant nutrients. Unless you balance these withdrawals with good management "deposits" that replace nutrients, rebuild organic matter and repair damaged soil structure, your soil bank account will be overdrawn.

Among steps recommended for keeping your soil bank solvent are: Use deep-rooted legumes regularly in the rotation. Apply lime on the basis of soil tests. Use commercial fertilizer containing phosphate and potash as needed. Return manure, corn stalks, straw and other crop aftermath to the soil. Use contour cultivation and other conservation methods where necessary.

Just as you will get a notice if your checking account is overdrawn, lower per acre yield and higher per bushel costs will notify you if your soil bank account is being overdrawn.

Farm Bulldozer Blade

This bulldozer blade can be attached or removed from a tractor in three minutes. The blade was salvaged from an old road scraper and the pushers are old 1 1/8 inch galvanized irrigation pipe. The U-clips which attach the pushers to the tractor are 1 1/4 or 1 1/2 inch flat iron which was bent into shape and welded to the pusher pipes. Braces for the frame are 1 1/4 inch pipe.

Hampshire Sow Sets New Production Mark

Ringold Lady Dora, 763,056, with the litter with which she established a new production record for the Hampshire breed. This sow is the first to have made a "Six Star" record in the Hampshire registry. She is five years old and has raised 75 pigs in eight litters. In her six star litters she has raised 83 pigs, an



average of 10.3. These pigs weighed a total of 418 pounds, 88 days after farrowing. She is owned by William C. Goodheart Jr., Eaton, Ohio. She was fed corn, oats, alfalfa and pelleted milk by-products prior to farrowing. Her pigs were raised on a ration of seven parts corn and three parts oats with 8 per cent milk by-products added.

Tests Disclose Silage Increases Hay Tonnage

Tests of haymaking methods show that considerably more tonnage of feed will be obtained from a meadow crop when it is put in a silo than can be procured by any other method of storing. Analysis of field cured and mow cured hay and of grass silage show a larger percentage of protein in grass than in similar forage cured either in the field or in the mow.

THE UPSET STOMACH

Indigestion is a frequent complaint. The various pains and discomforts in the region of the stomach have vexed some people all the time, and may vex all people some of the time.

This complaint, especially if recurring, does not call for taking nostrums and advice from well-meaning friends who have "cured themselves of the very same thing."

Indigestion may be of little consequence if caused by over-eating, insufficiently chewed foods, or by eating highly spiced and highly seasoned foods. Time will take care of such situations — if the insult to the stomach is discontinued.

Recurring indigestion without apparent cause, is serious. It may be of nervous origin. Persons suffering with anxiety, worry or frustration may complain of nausea, vomiting and pain in the region of the stomach.

Indigestion that persists should have the careful study of a physician. An "upset" stomach may indicate a far more serious condition and may be due to ulcers, cancer of the stomach and adjacent organs and tissues. Gastritis and other diseases of the stomach send out painful warnings frequently called "gas," "heartburn," and "nervous indigestion" by the patient.

Too many people suffer stomach pain for years without finding the cause. They should heed the danger signal, and not consider the pain as a passing discomfort.

Don't say "it's just indigestion." See your physician instead.

(Continued from front page) activity in any organization. "Each such registrant shall receive equal justice," Mr. Truman decreed.

For the most part the president's order re-created regulations that applied to the draft in World War II. Classifications generally will follow the World War II pattern.

Registration for the draft starts Aug. 30. The first army call for men is expected in September and the first draftees probably will be inducted in November.

All men 18 through 25 must register for the peace time draft. Those 19 through 25 are subject to call for 21 months service unless deferred. The 18-year-olds may volunteer for a year's training and thus escape being drafted later.

### At the Word of Command

Lesson for August 29, 1948

DO PEOPLE always do what they know is right? You would think so; but they don't. It is strange how many excuses people can think up to get out of doing what they know in their hearts they ought to do.

But not this man Ananias. He was a shining exception. There are three Ananiases in the New Testament, and this one makes up for the other two. One of the others was a rascally priest and one was a famous liar; but this Ananias, another of the "unheralded" characters from the Bible, is famed for going when God said, "Go." We know nothing much else about him, but this is enough.

#### No Wonder He Hesitated

IT WAS just after the conversion of Saul. At the time of our story, nobody had ever heard of Paul, only of Saul as he was then called; and nobody heard anything good. He was a bitter, ruthless man. He had no use for Christians. Extermination was his only answer to the Christian challenge. The name of Saul brought terror.

On this day of our story Saul had been only three days a Christian. He had had nothing to eat all that time, and he was said to be blind. You may be sure that Christians stayed away from him. His Jerusalem cronies had no doubt given him up as crazy; but no Christian would go near him either. At this point our Ananias had a vision: The Lord told him to go to Saul and lay his hands on him—in help and blessing. Naturally Ananias held back. This was a dangerous man, said he. But again the Lord in the vision said, "Go," and Ananias went.

Suppose Ananias had said "No"? That might have changed the whole course of Christian history. How? He could have thought of many an excuse. "Aren't there other men who can baptize Saul as well as I can? . . . This whole vision may be only a mistake . . ." And so forth. But not when it became clear to him that this was God's will, Ananias went, though he still did not like it.

How is it with you? When you know what you ought to do, what is the first thing you think of? How to do it, or how to get out of doing it?

#### Yaking Orders From God

HOW CAN we tell when it is really God who commands us? Most Christians today are suspicious of visions, and well we may be. Too many crazy things have been done by people who saw "visions" for us to trust such experiences very far.

One way in which God's orders come to us is in the Word of God, particularly in the words of Christ. For example, take one of the hardest things Jesus ever said: "LOVE YOUR ENEMIES AND PRAY FOR THOSE WHO PERSECUTE YOU." That sounds tough. It is tough. But it is a command. Yet don't most of us leave that command in the closed Bible and act as if the words had never been said?

That brings up another question. Is it likely that Ananias became fond of Saul all at once? Hardly. Ananias could not have liked the man; there was then nothing about him to like. We know from Paul's own words that people generally were not attracted by his looks. Yet Ananias, who could not have liked Saul, much less been fond of him, went and called him "Brother" and gave him his start in the Christian life.

#### Do You Know a Saul?

NOT FAR from where you are sitting at this moment there may be someone like Saul. He is a Christian, but a new and (so far) poor one, maybe. Someone nobody believes in, someone you scarcely know. It may be a child out of some low-grade home; it may be an ex-drunkard (not so long over it) or an ex-convict even; perhaps someone who has actually done you wrong.

But this person may be just where Saul was, needing a friend. God may already have touched his heart, all he needs now is the human touch of a Christian friend. Maybe you can't love him, can't even like him; but if he is a human soul God loves him. If you can help him, then you are his Ananias. You know what you ought to do. Will you do it?

(Continued from front page) age of 19 per cent of their income as compared to 23 per cent of their income paid for food in 1937.

There are now only 18 per cent of the people engaged in agriculture in an active way. Some of these do not grow food. For that reason, 85 per cent of our people want cheap food. They wanted it so much during the war that the government was prevailed upon to pay subsidies on all dairy products and many other foods including some meat products which had the effect of the government paying part of the grocery bills of the workers who were getting the highest wages they had ever received in their lives.

In one column of the Commercial Appeal of August 23, 1948 the statement was made that the average housewife can just barely pay her food bill. In the adjoining column the statement was made that the individual income of the average American for 1947 was the highest in history, an average of \$1323 for every man, woman, and child in the U. S. Farm people and the other people living in agricultural areas should keep themselves informed and work together to keep the prices of agricultural products from being beaten down while the wages of organized labor and the profits from other types of business are kept up to bring another major depression.

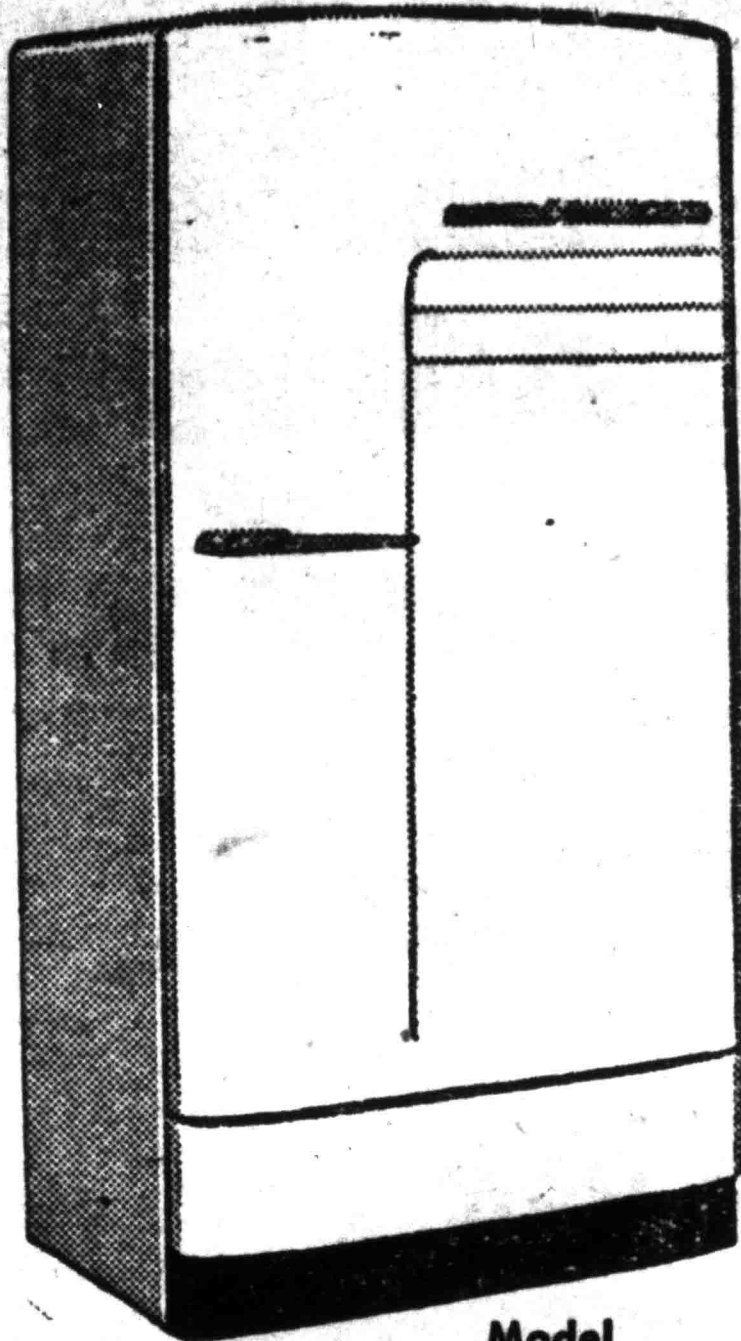

**JUNIOR HAS REASONS IF HE PLAYS HOOKY SAYS U-T PROFESSOR**

If Junior plays hooky from school this fall, don't paddle him and forget it. Determine why he'd rather be in the old swimming hole than school.

This is the suggestion of Dr. T. Earnest Newland, director of the University of Tennessee Psychological Clinic. He points out that punishing a child for being truant may furnish an emotional outlet for Mama, but it does nothing toward solving Junior's problem.

Why does a child play hooky? Dr. Newland lists four common reasons:

1. The school program lacks meaning for the child because he has not been guided to see the significance of the material he studies.

2. The child does not have sufficient learning aptitude for the material which he is expected to study.

3. He lacks adequate study skill because he hasn't had the kind of instruction needed to establish them.

4. There is an emotional inadequacy in either his home or the school.

"The child who plays hooky usually has experienced several years of educational mutilation and is unsuccessful," Dr. Newland says. "People do things in which they can be successful. Truancy is a way to compensate for the inadequacies of the school program and to be successful in some other activity."

The psychologist warns that there is a difference between being mollycoddled and understood. A parent who mollycoddles a youngster assumes that the little angel can do no wrong. The parent who understands a child knows better and seeks to find the reason for Junior's unauthorized leaves for school routine.

And a little understanding, Dr. Newland contends, is worth more than a lot of lickings.

To the physician, alcoholism is a disease. It is often a symptom of emotional illness. It may be a major psychiatric reaction. It is often a chronic habit of attempting to escape reality.

Many factors encourage alcoholism. Among them are worry, emotional conflicts, and the drinking habits of associates and friends.

Many alcoholics have turned to drinking for a feeling of self-im-

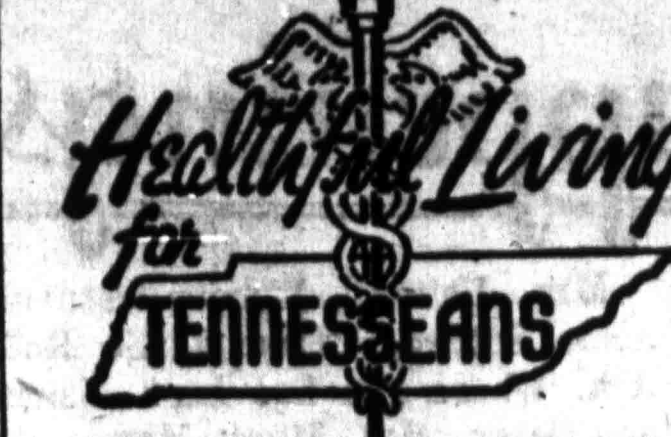
portance, especially when their self esteem has received a telling blow.

Many alcoholics are weak characters emotionally. They may be victims of self-pampering, self-pity and self-induced frustration. These people tend to avoid responsibility and seek to escape the problems which responsibility always presents.

The alcoholic is a sick person. His treatment and rehabilitation require patience, tact, and time. Frequently the services of a psychiatrist are necessary to ferret out the emotional disturbances which form the psychological basis for alcoholism.

Many persons cannot handle alcohol because alcohol handles them. Weak characters easily succumb to its fraudulent promises only to realize later that it has become their master and not their slave.

More than any other profession, physicians are required to use scientific knowledge from many fields. Modern medical practice requires the use of physics, chemistry, pharmacy, nutrition, psychology and sociology. These and other sciences make possible the prevention of disease, the promotion of health, and the diagnosis and treatment of illness.

How the physician calls upon specific sciences is illustrated by the use he makes of the science of nutrition.

The nutritionist has established the nutritional values of most of our common foods. This knowledge is used by the physician in the conservation of health and in the treatment and recovery of the ill.

More and more attention is given to the nutritional state of both the well and the sick. The physician knows that dietary deficiencies, bad eating habits resulting in malnutrition, undernutrition and hypoproteinosis affect the general health and cause many specific diseases.

Patients needing major surgery are often so undernourished that several days are required to build up the patient nutritionally in order that he may undergo the needed surgery. After-care of surgical patients requires close attention to the nutritional state.

Thus the science of medicine makes use of the science of nutrition in the promotion of health, the prevention of disease, and in the treatment and recovery of the sick.

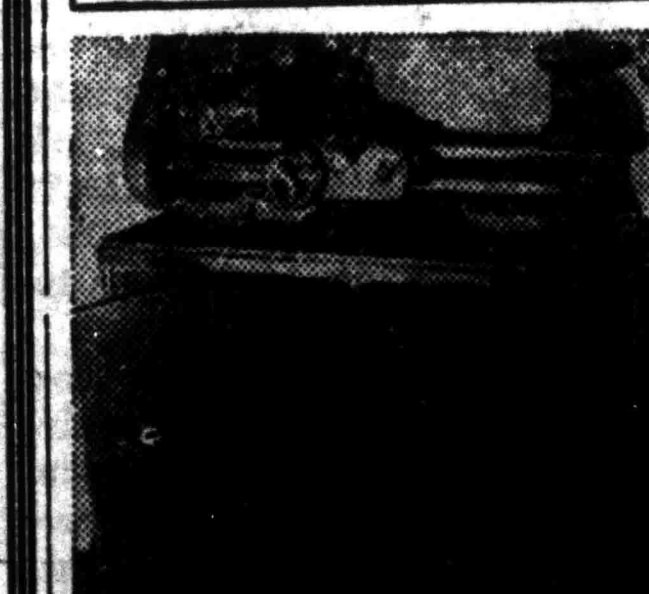

**Precautions for Dipping Sheep Are Suggested**

Among rules to be followed when dipping sheep are: Fast the sheep several hours before dipping. Don't dip sheep immediately on arrival at the bath if they have become heated. Don't dip sheep in an arsenical bath if they have open wounds. Don't put the sheep in the bath head first. Prepare the bath strictly in accordance with instructions on the package and mix thoroughly.

**Young Cockleburbs Are Poisonous for Swine**

Young cocklebur seedlings will poison pigs, according to veterinarians at Iowa State college. The danger of cocklebur poisoning is greater this year because of short pastures. With grass short, pigs will be tempted to eat young cockleburbs in search of green feed. Best remedy is to keep hogs out of fields containing cocklebur seedlings until they are eliminated.
