





Was Job Real?

DON'T ask: Was Job a real char-D acter, or a made-up one like Hamlet and Macbeth? It is very likely there was once upon a time some man by that name who suffered in that way, and that he had friends, not too sympathetic, who talked it over with him.

As Hamlet and Macbeth were historical characters, whom Shakespeare used with high art to express profound ideas, so the author of Job may well have used the trials of some man he knew, or knew of. to express truths about a problem as profound and widespread as the human race.

For Job most surely is real: his local name may be Smith or Jones, and he may be living just around the corner from you. Indeed, sooner or later every man's name is Job. Sooner or later, every thoughtful person has to face the tragedy of human suffering: Why must such things be?

Suffering Is Test

THERE is, however, one solution which comes out in the course of the drama. It is not a theoretical solution; that is, it does not altogether answer the question, WHY must men suffer? It does tell us WHAT we can do about it.



> MORE THAN HALF TENN. FARMS NOW ELECTRIFIED

Tennessee farm families are making use of electric service for better living as rapidly as facilities become available, say rural electrification specialists of the U-T Agriculture Extension Service. Recent figures of the REA show that more than 51 percent of farms in the State now have central electric service.

Farm electrification United States is now 68.6 percent. Progress in this field is indicated by the record of recent years. A year ago 61 percent of the farms were electrified; 54.3 percent in 1946; 45.7 percent in 1945; and 10.9 percent in 1935 at the start of the Federal rural electrification program.





FLIES, UNLIKE OTHER INSECTS, RESISTING DDT

While numerous complaints have been heard this year that DDT is not effective in controllhouse flies, its effect upon other insects is still unquestionable, say U-T Extension entomologists.

Tennessee is one of more than 25 States reporting areas in which DDT was not satisfactorily controlling flies, There is now definite evidence, specialists say, that house flies are developing resistance to DDT. Flies, however, are the only insect showing such a tendency.

Meanwhile, Extension specialists recommend continued use of DDT against bedbugs, lice, silverfish, moths, stored grain pests, Halls and other insects as set out in Extension Publication 293 on use DDT. And, it may be wise to give flies a stronger "dose" next spring | partment. and summer.



are easier to clean and can be kept free from parasites more easily than the ordinary little cubicles. Original construction cost also is considerably less than that of an equal amount of nesting space of the old type inasmuch as less labor

and material are required. The community nest recommended by the Ohio station is 8 feet long, 2 feet wide, 14 inches high in front and 30 inches high in back. The space is divided in the center so there are 2 4-foot compartments in the nest, providing facilities for 80 to 100 laying hens. The front half of the nest cover is hinged so it can be lifted for gathering eggs. The bottom of the nest can be hinged so it will swing down to dump the nest litter. Hens enter the front of the nest through openings 8 inches square in the center of each com-

Materials required for construction include; 9 pieces of 1-inch by 8-inch by 8-inch for lid, front bottom ends and partition; 5 pieces of 1-inch by 10-inch by 8-inch for lid and back: 1 piece of 1-inch by 6inch by 8-inch for lower front board; 4 pieces of 1-inch by 4-inch by 8inch for cleats, nest perch and entrance lids; 1 piece of 1-inch by 2inch by 8-inch for cleats for the ends and partition; 1 piece of 1inch by 4-inch by 10-inch for bottom supports, with the piece bevs hinged.

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

Life on the farm is far more hazardous for the farmer and his sons than it is for his wife and his daughters.

In fact, a survey covering 15,000 farms the country over, made by the department of agriculture, reveals that about four times as many accidents happened to men and boys between the ages of 14 and 65 as were suffered by farm women and girls. Of the youngsters under 14 injured, nearly 65 per cent were boys.

More farm people were injured by falls than any other type of accident, with the majority of mishaps. involving falling on steps and stairs and from vehicles. Men and boys were victims of twice as many injuries from falls as were women and girls.

Of the total number of farm accidents, 56 per cent were connected with farm work and 8 per cent with housework. The age period from 25 to 45 was disclosed as the most dangerous.



Brittle hoofs, spongy hoofs, thrush and foot canker are the four diseases commonly caused by bad stable conditions. Clean, dry floors are recommended as a precaution. 





It has materially helped to raise the standards of living of tarm people. Since 1935 the percentage of farms having electricity in the United States has increased from 11 percent to 69 percent. In Tennessee the percentage has increased from less than 8 percent to more than 51 percent. In Lauderdale County the the program of price support which prevents the farmers and those who make their living by rendering service to farmers from being ruined by abrupt changes of cotton, corn, wheat, livestock, and other basic farm commodities. of spendable income. If the price of corn is reduced to \$1.25 per bushel, he has only 25 cents or half as much spendable income. If corn goes down to \$1.00 per bushel, he has no spendable income at all, even though corn may not seem so terribly low in price. This price support program keeps the prices of farm products to a reasonable level in proportion to the prices which farmers pay for machinery and other manufactured products, fertilizer, automobiles, clothing, and other commodities which he must buy from others.



As another step in culling the poultry flock, old roosters also should be eliminated. They serve no useful purpose and eat lots of feed. Some pullets also may have to be culled if the flock is to be maintained at the desired size for profitable operation throughout the winter. In this case, only the best po-

feeding for sows and their litters, introduced on his farms in the fall of 1947, already has paid dividends, O'Bryan reports. With 100 litters last spring, he raised as much pork as he formerly raised from 150. Early in the gestation period sows were given a special ration of 80 per cent oats, 5 per cent meat scrap, 4 per cent pelletized milk product and the balance either corn or wheat. Sows were sprayed and washed thoroughly prior to farrowing. Clean pens and a brooder for the little pigs also were provided. The sow's ration was changed when the pigs were about two weeks old, cutting down oats to about 40 per cent and increasing portions of wheat or corn.

At less than two weeks of age little pigs were started creep feeding in a low pan or trough. Their ration consisted of 80 per cent oats, per cent meat scrap, 8 per cent pelletized milk product and the balance coarse wheat. Pans and troughs were washed and disinfected regularly. As the little pigs grow, oats in the ration is reduced while corn or wheat is increased to about 70

to 80 per cent. Summarizing the program, O'Bryan maintains that he had much stronger pigs at birth, with earlier, faster




