CHEAPER LIVESTOCK GAIN

The value of good winter pasture as a protein supplement and as a means of reducing the feed bill should not be overlooked in a good livestock feeding and managment program, say specialists of the U. T. Agricultural Extension Servicce.

The important role of pastures has been shown by many experiments in Tennessee and elsewhere. A test last year, conducted by the J. T. Agricultural Experiment Station in Jackson, showed that pastured steers made by far the cheaper rate of gains. One group of yearling steers was fed a fattening ration of corn silage, alfalfa hay, and cottonseed meal. Feed cost per hundred pounds' of gain was \$20.78. Another lot was fed a wintering ration of corn silage and alfalfa hay without cottonseed meal. The cost per hundred pounds' gain on this lot was \$26. A third group in the test was fed a wintering ration of corn ilage and alfalfa hay, with access o crimson clover-rye grass pasture. This group showed a feed cost of only \$11.36 per 100 pound

gain. In other words, it is pointed out, steers on winter pasture required \$11.41 less corn silage, and \$3.23 less alflafa hay, or a total of \$14.64 less feed per 100 pounds' gain than a similar group without access to pasture.

Further information on pasturse and hay crops in livestock production is given in Extension Publication 300, "Keys to the Protein Feed Problem." Copies may be obtained from county agents.
