Funds supplied by people who have invested in the Bell System, like the Dentons, have made it possible for Southern Bell to spend \$85,000,000 for additional facilities in Tennessee between January 1, 1945 and March 31, 1951, Mr. Ganier said.

Telephone service demands in Tennessee are on the increase, Mr. Ganier said, calling for large amounts of additional facilities yet to be installed.

The installation of approximately 60 new telephones in the Nankipoo area last Fall made necessary a large investment in telephone to serve these subscribers from the Halls exchange. Approximately 100 new subscribers will be furnished with telephone service in and around Gates during this year. Also some 100 new telephones will be installed in Flippin, Curve, and Woodville Communities to be served through the Ripley exchange.


Funds for new facilities of this kind do not come from consumer's monthly payment of their bills but must be raised in the form of new capital. have ever received in one month before," Thomas said. "The number of people planning to spend their vacations in Tennessee this year is far greater than in any previous year, judging by the number of inquiries received during the first four months of the year. Naturally, more tourists will spend more money in the state. "I am confident our guests will spend \$450,000,000 in Tennessee this year as against the \$386,000,-000, the all-time high, they spent

in 1950."

Thomas pointed out that more people benefit from the tourist dollar than from any other money entering the state. "The tourist money is divided as follows: Retail Sales 25%; Food 22%; Transportation 19%; Lodging 15%; Récreation 11%; Miscellaneous 8%, and from there it spreads out to employees of these different establishments, declared Thomas, and much of it seeps back into the rural sections for chickens, eggs and vegetables that tourists eat. Everybody benefits from the tourist dollar."
