LE BONHEUR HORSE SHOW
Outstanding Mid-South Sports Event,
SHOWS AT MID-SOUTH FAIR
SEPTEMBER 27TH-29TH

Coming as a climax to ten days of outstanding entertainment and sports events, the Le Bonheur Horse Show will entertain the fair crowd in the new livestock arena on Thursday, Friday and Saturday night, with a matinee Saturday afternoon on the final days of the Mid-South Fair.

Mrs. Clark W. Rabb, President of Le Bonheur, announced the appointment of Mrs. Joe Dalstrom as Chairman of the show and Mrs. E. W. Hale, Jr. as Vice-Chairman.

The annual Le Bonheur Horse Show achieved a national rating with its tenth show in 1948. It was then discontinued because of inadequate facilities. The new livestock arena, which is used for cattle judging during the daytime, is ideally suited for horse show purposes and is available at night. The only cattle to be seen in the livestock arena at night will be the parade of the day's champions of the various cattle breeds. This will be a nightly feature of the horse show.

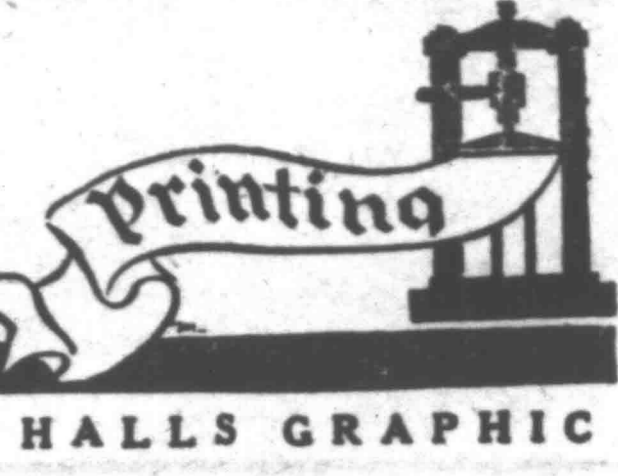

Sunday School Lesson

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

(II Samuel 5:1-5; 8:15; Chron. 22:17-19)

"A GREAT KING AND A GREAT KINGDOM"

David is one of the most challenging characters in all history. He was a musician, a friend, a warrior, a statesman, a poet, and above all he was a man of God. He was endowed with almost every virtue which makes a man beloved, yet he had defects which will forever stain his memory.

No other man in history presents such wide contradictions. He loved and hated with intensity. He was tender yet fierce, brave yet weak, generous yet unrelenting, exultant yet sad, committing sins yet rising triumphantly after disgraceful falls.

He was not tall and commanding like Saul, but was of a ruddy complexion, auburn hair and beautiful eyes, gallant and remarkable for strength and agility.

The Kingdom of Israel was not united for long. Following the long period of the Judges, Saul was first chosen King. Then came David and Solomon, three administrations of the united kingdom.

David was generous toward Saul and his house. For years he was hunted as a refugee, retreating to the solitudes and caves of the earth. Yet when he had the chance to slay he spared Saul's life.

Hebron was the capital city of the tribe of Judah. After Saul's death David came here to await developments. He was crowned king of Judah and reigned in Hebron seven years. Northern and central Palestine had fallen to the Philistines. Ten of the tribes still adhered to the house of Saul under the leadership of Abner who proclaimed Ishbosheth king. Gradually David gained strength and when Ishbosheth was slain by the treachery of two of his bodyguards, David was furious and punished the men who had thought to win his favor.

The kingdom under David expanded and became one of the great kingdoms of that time. He was a wise and generous ruler and by internal improvements greatly benefited his people.

The Jewish people ever looked back to the kingdom of David as their golden age. To them he was the Great King.

The united kingdom came into being at a crucial and changing period of history. The old order was giving way to the new. Small kingdoms and judgeships were being merged into great empires like Syria. If Solomon had ruled with the generosity of David and the kingdom had remained united it could have become one of the great empires of that time.

So runs the life of all nations. In the early days of youth and growth a nation has virtue and patriotism. Inner weaknesses and moral decay invite disaster. By the corruption of its own soul a nation ceases to be strong and falls into the place of a tribute-paying people.

Above all else America needs

unity, virtue, integrity, and just rulers. To lose these is to invite national ruin.

HOT WATER, OVER-BLEACHING HARM CLOTH

The busy housewife who speeds up a bleaching reaction by adding twice as much bleach solution to her laundry water will find that it doesn't pay in the long run.

And if she really wants to save her white linens while bleaching, she won't use hot water.

That's what Carolyn Werman concluded after she conducted tests to find the deterioration of fabric resulting from bleaching as work for her master's degree in textiles at the University of Tennessee.

Miss Werman subjected cotton material to different concentrations of bleaches at various temperatures and then tested the fabric and yarn for breaking strength. Material tested in one quart of water at the boiling point and containing two tablespoons of bleach was weakened so that it shredded after two bleachings.

All bleaches cause some deterioration in fabric, she said, and in general, the damage increases with the number of bleachings. Housewives know that boiling as well as bleaching, will get clothes white, she said. When they combine the two methods, thinking to get the job done more quickly, a very noticeable decrease in the strength of the fabric occurs.

Although strong solutions at high temperatures prove harmful, the housewife can bleach her clothes with comparative ease if she follows directions on the bottle, and does not use hot water, Miss Werman said.

PREPARE STORAGE FOR CANNED FOOD

Be sure there is good storage space for the food you plan to can this season, homemakers are advised by food specialists of the U-T Agricultural Extension Service.

Shelves should be provided for cans not kept in cases, specialists point out. Cases should be on racks to keep them off the floor. Arrange for a cool, dark, dry storage space, since dampness causes metal to rust. Also remember, specialists advise, that heat and light cause foods to lose flavor, color, and vitamins. The cooler the storage space, the better, as long as foods do not freeze.

Freezing may crack a jar or break a seal, causing spoilage. If freezing does not damage the jar or seal, however, the food will be safe to eat, but it may not taste as good.

OUTLOOK SHOWS NEED FOR HOME PRODUCED FEED

Tennessee farmers are strongly advised to plan now for production of much of the feed they will need during the coming feeding season, say farm management specialists of the U-T Agricultural Extension Service.

Early indications point to a short-wheat crop, particularly in some Southwestern States where heavy winter damage and drought are reported. Other factors pointing up the importance of home-produced feed are the indicated reduction of nearly 10% in corn acreage for 1951, and near record numbers of livestock and poultry on farms. The number of cattle on farms increased 5% in 1950; hogs increased 7%; and sheep, with the first increase since 1943, increased 4%.

Farmers in Tennessee are in a favored position, in that they can provide feed from pasture for at least 10 months of the year, sometimes for the full year.

It is important, however, that plans be made early to provide the needed pasture, specialists say. Planning for good pasture production should include consideration of these points:

Having soil tested to insure proper fertilization, preparing seedbed properly; using best kinds and right amounts of seed; seeding at the right time for best results.

Specific recommendations on pasture production may be obtained from county agricultural agent.

EARLY CONTROL ACTION NEEDED ON ARMY WORMS

Killing army worms while they are young is the best method of controlling these pests, say specialists of the U-T Agricultural Extension Service. This means keeping close check on small grain and seed-grass fields from now until the first week in June.

Frequent inspection should be made of the ground and bottoms of crop stems, specialists emphasize, to determine whether worms are present. Once they are found no waiting or observation period should be allowed.

Toxaphene applied either as a dust or spray gives the most effective and rapid control known. Apply 20% toxaphene dust at the rate of 15 pounds per acre; or use the 46% toxaphene emulsion at the rate of two quarts per acre. Avoid drift to ponds and lakes, as toxaphene will kill fish. Residues on crop will disappear after several days. Cattle should be kept out of sprayed fields for 10 to 14 days. Further information on control of army worms may be obtained from county agents.

If you were auctioning off a homemade cake for your favorite charity, you'd get many a raised hand if you iced it with rich coffee frosting.

Cream butter; add salt and part of the sugar gradually, blending after each addition. Then add egg, instant caffeine-free coffee, and vanilla; mix well.

Rich Coffee Frosting
1/2 cup butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1 egg or 2 egg yolks, unbeaten
1 tablespoon instant caffeine-free coffee
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons top milk (about)

STRAWBERRY TIME HERE AGAIN - HOW ABOUT SHORTCAKE?

Strawberries, one of spring's most popular fruits, are here again, and with them comes the ever-popular shortcake, remind foods and nutrition specialists of the U-T Agricultural Extension Service.

The "cake" you may use may vary from a "cake" to a "pastry," depending on the likes of the family.

A favorite pastry rolled thin, baked, covered with butter, and sprinkled with sugar makes a good combination when sweetened sliced strawberries are placed between layers of this pastry and topped with whipped cream.

Still another favorite is a sponge cake. Bake according to directions and serve with alternate layers of berries.

The specialists suggest in preparing the berries—always wash before capping. If sliced berries are wanted—simply cut in halves or quarters, sweeten to taste, and keep in refrigerator. The berries are then ready to use.

If a recipe is needed, here is a good one, given by foods specialists.

- 2 cups flour
4 tablespoons fat
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 cup milk

Sift the dry ingredients. Cut in the fat and milk as for biscuits. Divide the dough into two equal parts. Turn out on a slightly floured board and roll each piece to 1-3 inch thickness. Place one on top of the other with butter spread between. Bake in a hot oven for 20 minutes; then split open ready for fruit. Mash and sweeten to taste 1 quart strawberries. Spread between the two layers and on top of the shortcake. Keep out a few whole berries to put on top for garnish.

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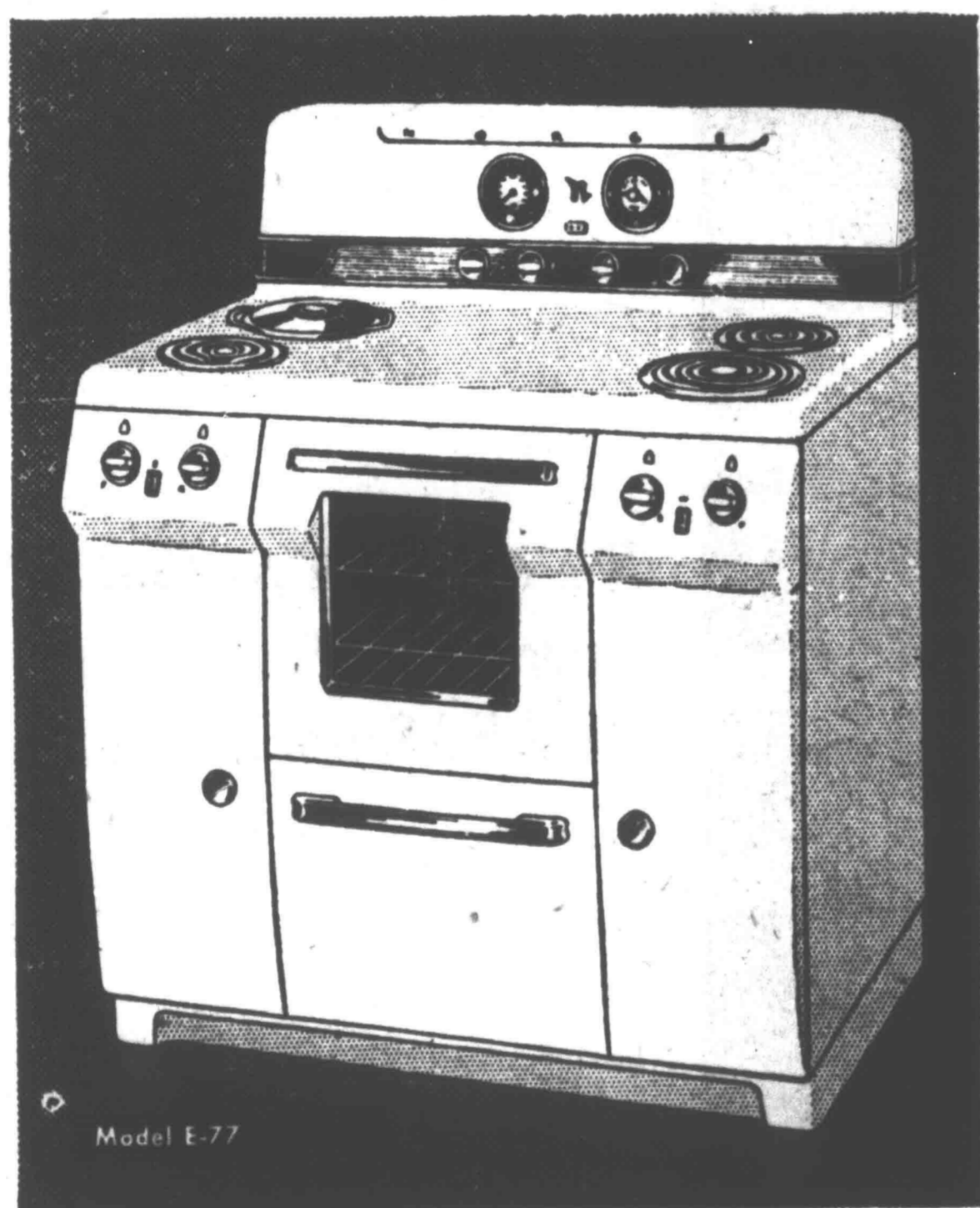

be a life-saving investment," Mr. Puckett said. "Yet, on a purely financial basis, the cost of traffic accidents in 1949 alone is estimated at more than three billion dollars, and in about 8% of these accidents, unsafe car conditions were reported, according to the National Safety Council."

"According to statistics compiled by the Accident Record Bureau of the Tennessee Department of Safety, there was a much higher rate of defective cars being involved in accidents in Tennessee than the National average. Of 20,228 vehicles in accidents in this State in 1950, nearly 4,000 were defective," the Council Director reported.

"This means that about 250 million dollars of this cost might have been avoided if all cars had been kept in safe mechanical condition."

"The millions of dollars involved are only a small part of the loss. The 35,000 lives lost in traffic in 1950 can never be replaced from savings, but safety can save lives that need never be spent."

"Correcting unsafe conditions in cars may return a dividend of as much as 10 percent in this life-saving program. That's certainly a good investment for a few dol-

lars spent in automobile repairs." Stressing that periodic safety inspections are purely an individual responsibility, the Tennessee Council joins with the National Safety Council this month in reminding all drivers that "Drivers with bad brakes can expect bad breaks in their accident records."

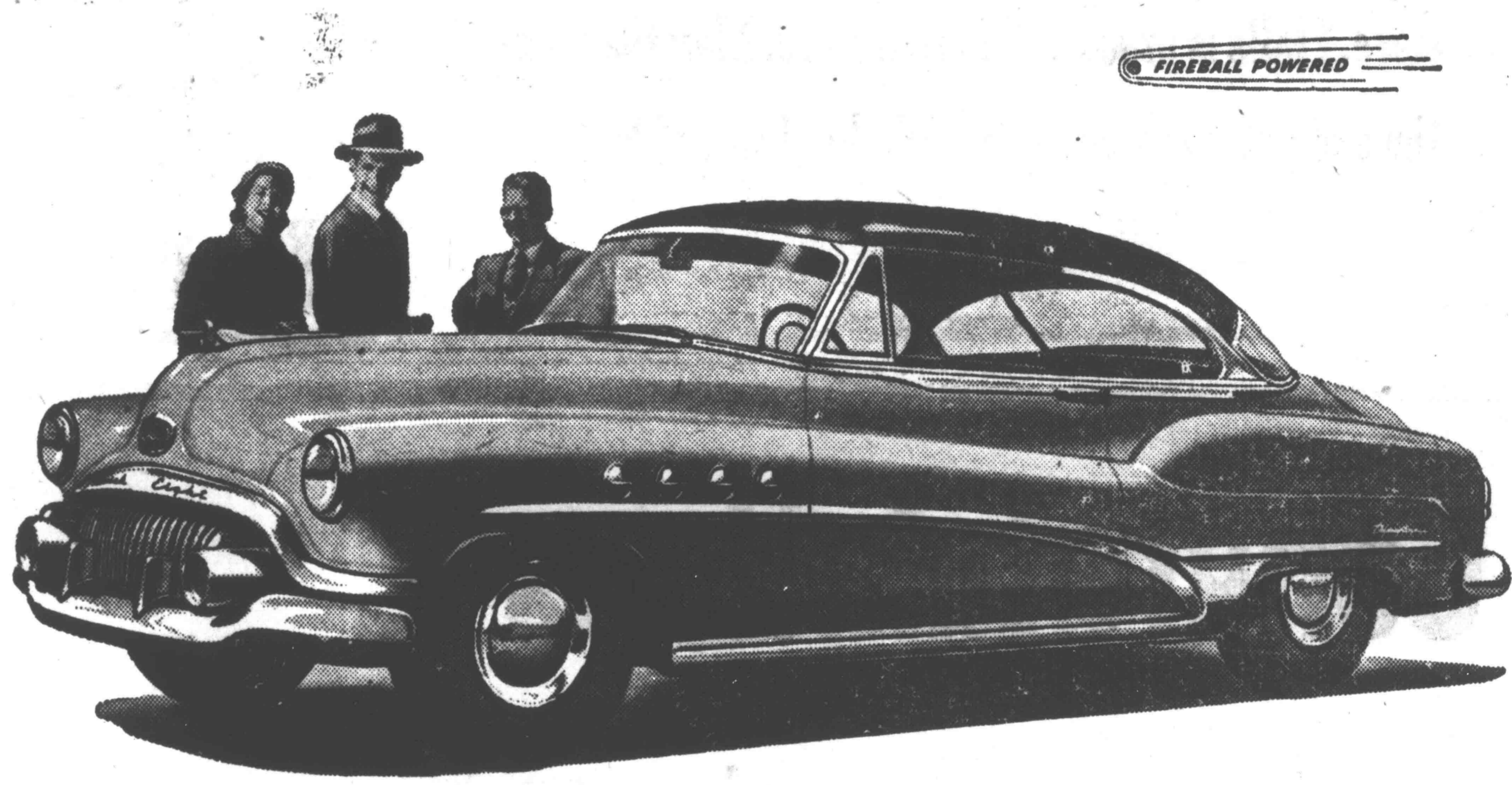

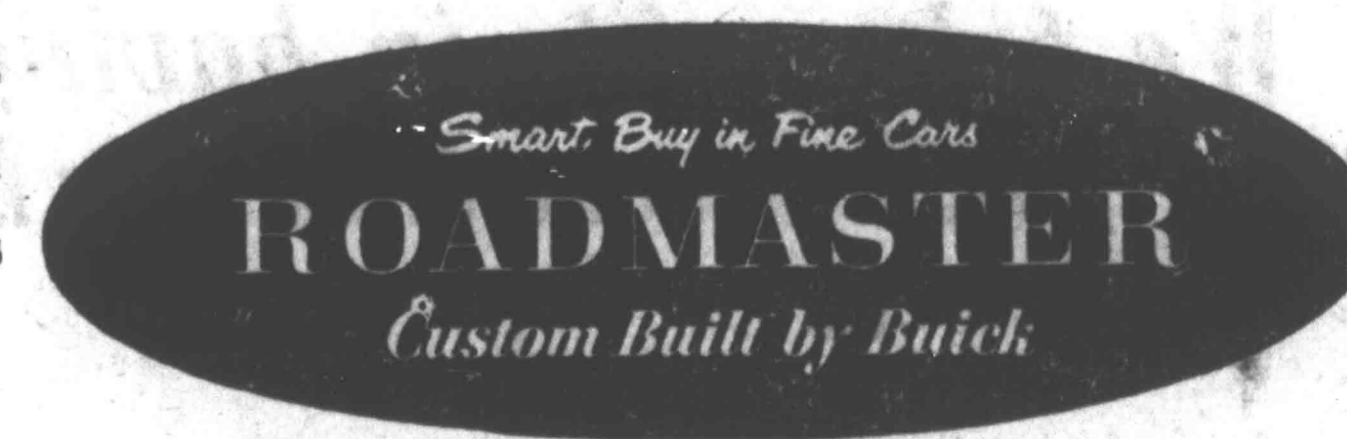

Poultry Project Pays Dividends

Ability, determination, and a profit were demonstrated by L. B. Marshall, Jr., Lauderdale County 4-H'er, as he completed his poultry project and submitted his 4-H re-

cord to the Extension Office. The way in which L. B. marketed his fryers showed his skill, ability, and determination.

L. B. bought 150 chicks February 13 and the last ones were sold April 20. Receipts totaled \$118.89; and total expenses which included feed, a heating unit, wire, sockets, lights, wood, and nails were \$81.80.

This type of project work and record keeping is what we are trying to accomplish with all 4-H Club members.

There are 1116 boys and girls enrolled in 22 4-H Clubs in Lauderdale County. Working with this group of young people are 56 Volunteer Adult Leaders, 15 Junior Leaders and three Extension Agents.

Sewing is the most popular project among the girls with 256 members enrolled. Home Service is the choice of 213 girls, and 170 have gardens.

Swine and cotton represent the greatest interests of the boys with 116 caring for pigs and 104 having a cotton project.

The above represents 5 projects. Club members in this county are engaged in 20 other 4-H projects. At the present time, Tennessee has the largest enrollment of any state in the Nation.

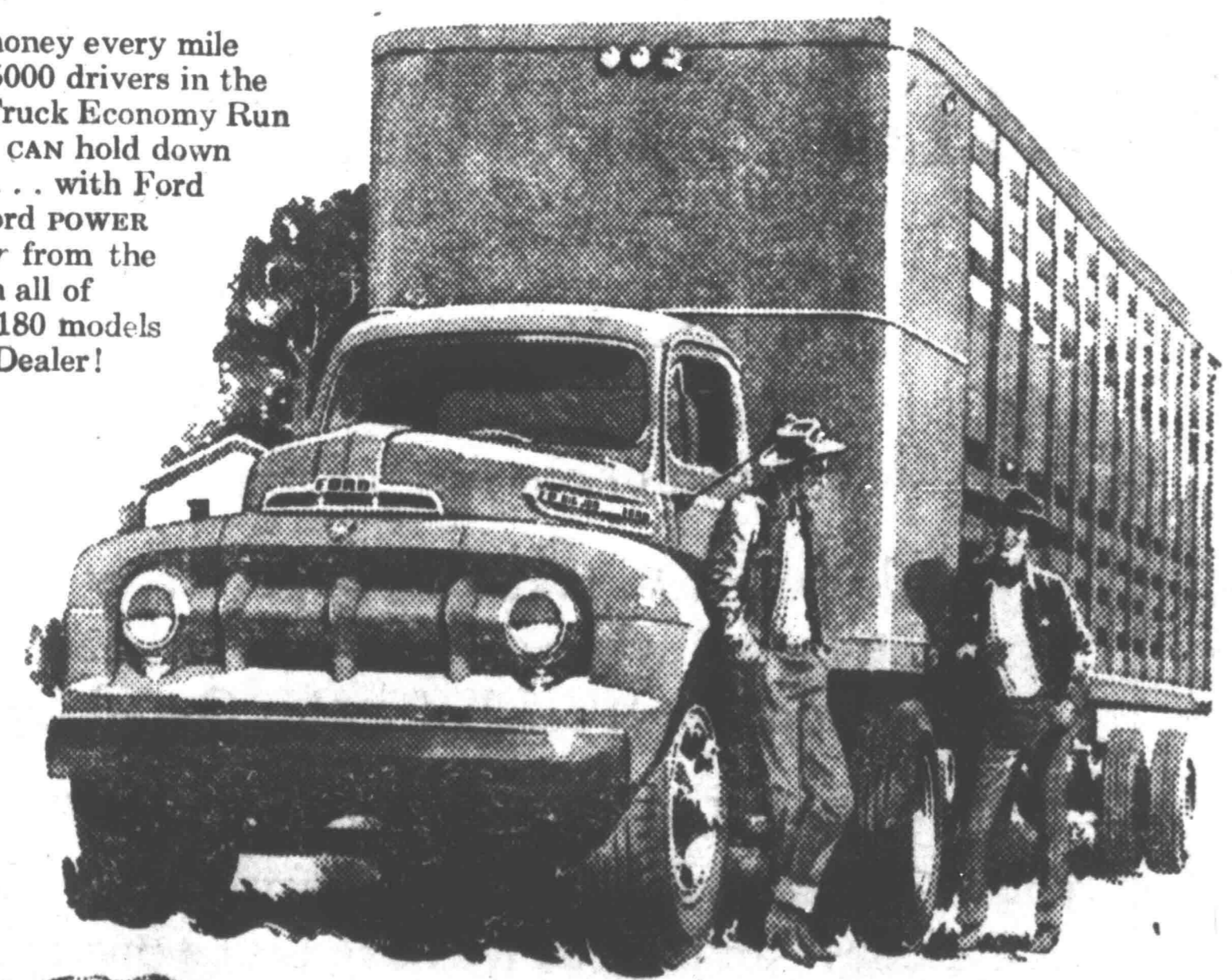

The installation of approximately 60 new telephones in the Nankipoo area last Fall made necessary a large investment in telephone to serve these subscribers from the Halls exchange. Approximately 100 new subscribers will be furnished with telephone service in and around Gates during this year. Also some 100 new telephones will be installed in Flippin, Curve, and Woodville Communities to be served through the Ripley exchange.

Funds for new facilities of this kind do not come from consumer's monthly payment of their bills but must be raised in the form of new capital. Telephone earnings must be such as will attract the funds of people who have funds to invest, Mr. Ganier declared. "That is why it is essential that the Telephone Company in Tennessee be financially strong, with adequate earnings to do the job that the people of the state want done."

Do not be discouraged because no dead rats are seen, because most of the rats will die in their underground dens and will not be seen, but as long as any bait is being eaten, some rats are still around and should be killed by keeping the bait before them for a longer period.

Warfarin bait will absolutely kill the last rat on the place if the bait is kept fresh and kept before the rats as long as any is being taken. On the other hand, rats can recover from the effects of the bait if it is not kept before them until they are killed.

Keep Listing New Machines

Tractors will operate at lower cost and will last 50% longer burning gasoline, provided operators make themselves eligible for the 6 cents per gallon refund on gas. One of the main requirements for this refund is to keep all tractors and other agricultural machinery with the Department of Finance and Taxation in Nashville. If an inspector comes to a farm and finds that machines are using colored gas which are not listed in Nashville, a proportionate part of

the gas used for refund will be refused payment.

A post card request addressed to the Dept. of Finance and Taxation, Nashville, Tenn. will bring an application blank on which all the tractors on a farm should be listed, the form notarized and returned.

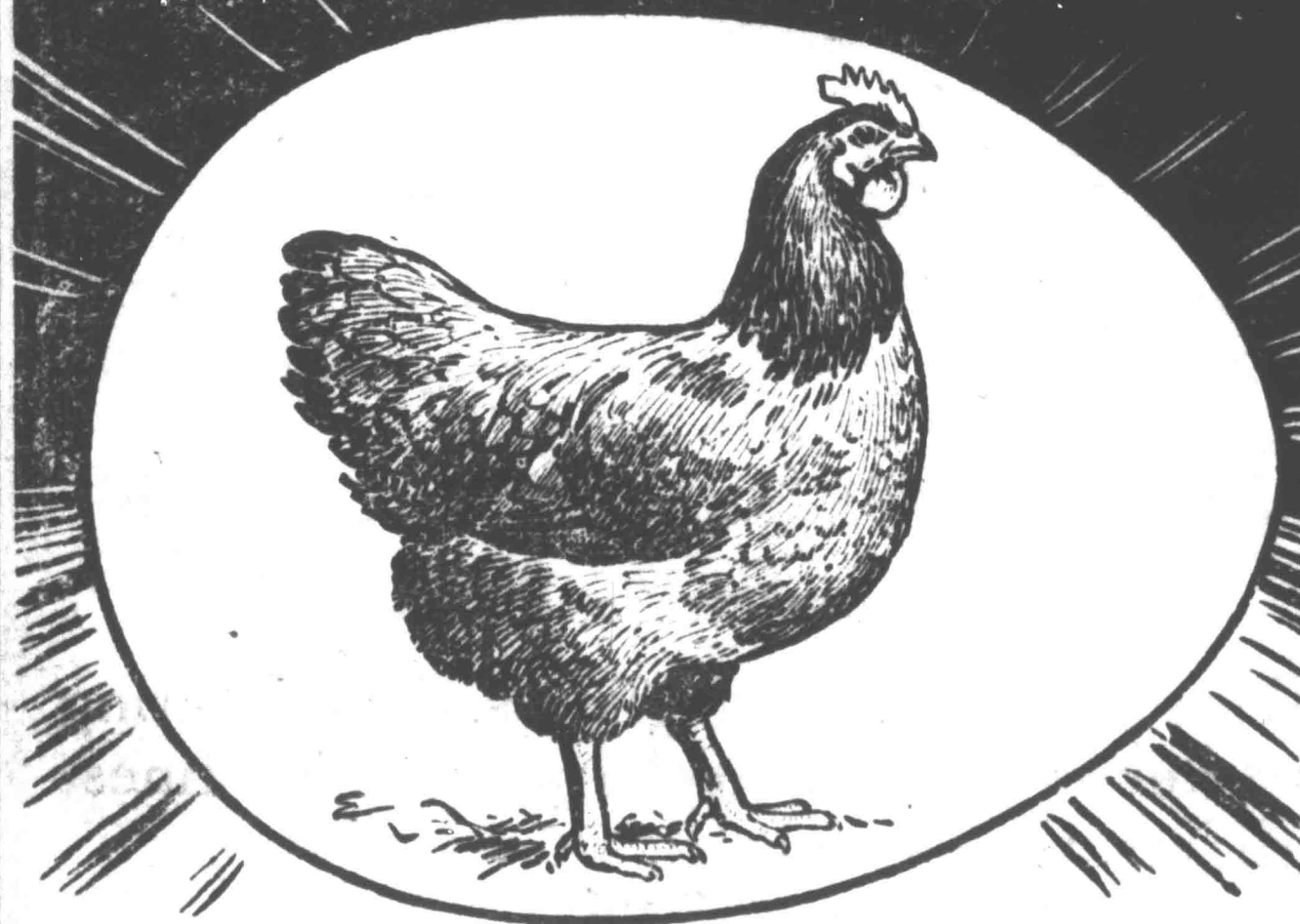

Add sugar, salt and margarine to mashed sweet potatoes. Blend thoroughly. Add 1 cup flour and mix well. Dissolve yeast in milk. Add to sweet potato mixture. Beat until smooth. Cover and let rise in warm place for 1 hour.

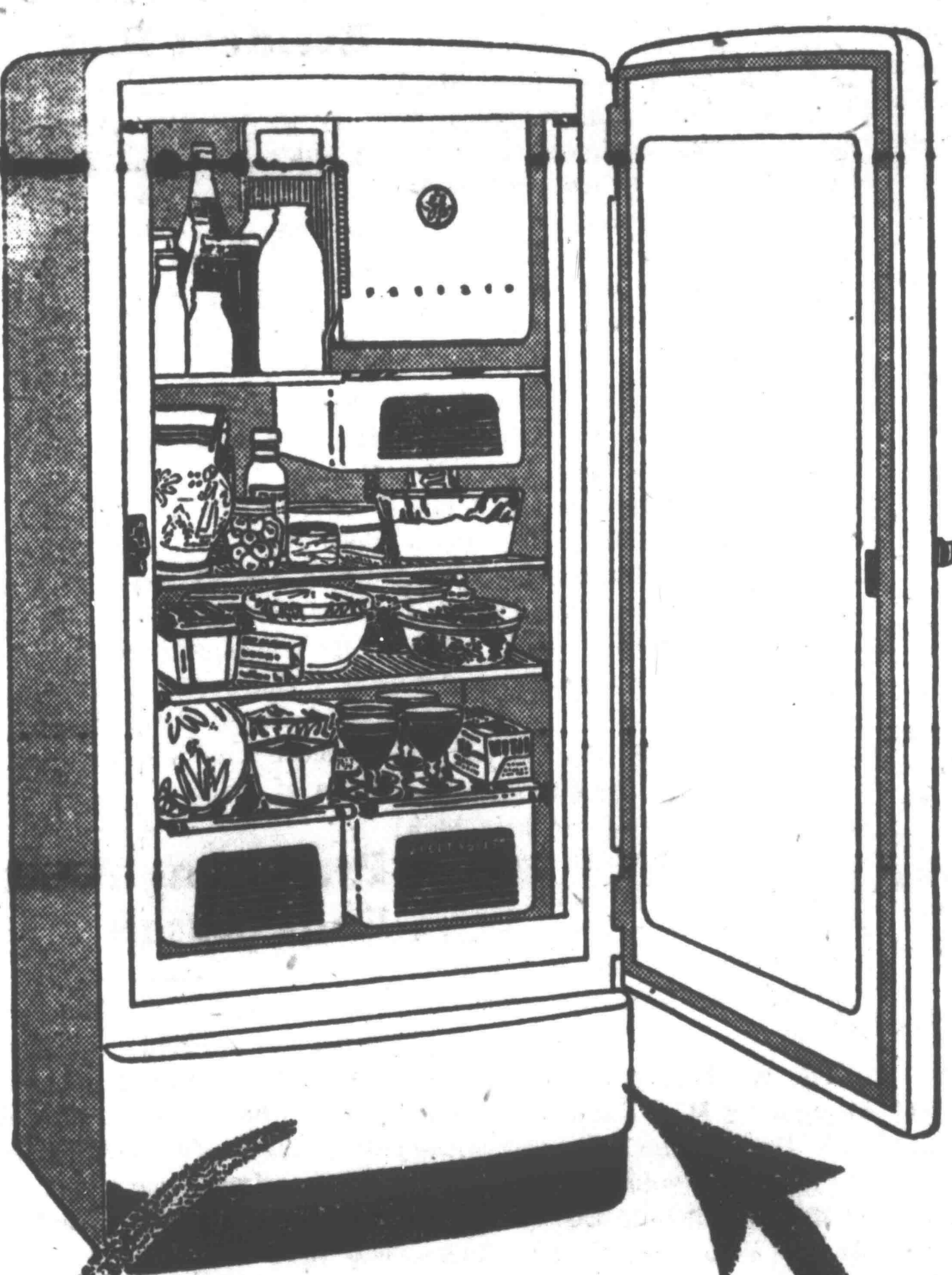

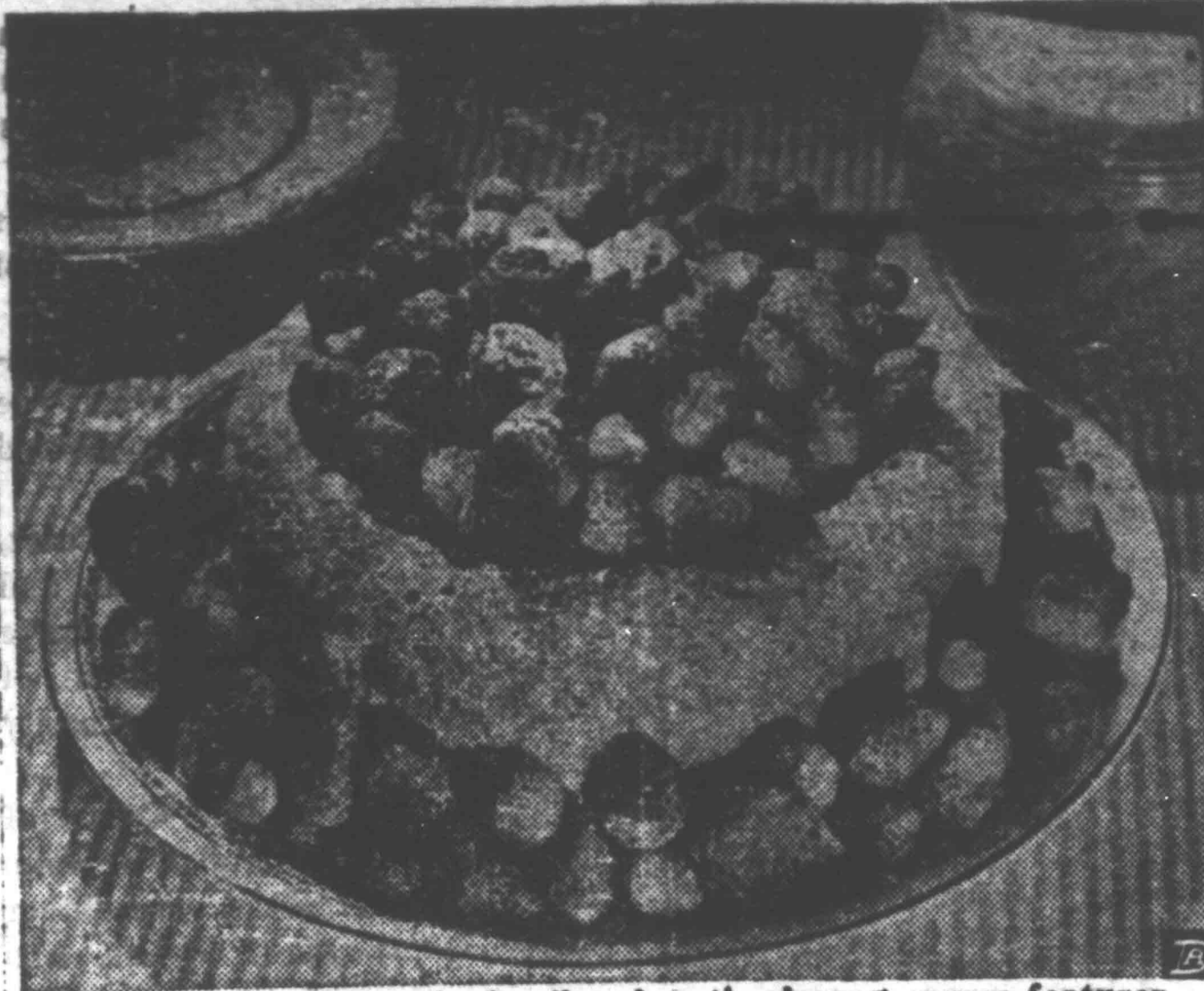

sensible program in developing it. We boast that our military power is unmatched and our standard of living three times as high as in Europe and 10 times as high as in Asia. Yet we have not reached perfection by any means. We are sorely in need of those old reliable virtues of industry and frugality, humility and integrity.

This policy of improving one's own circumstances and the welfare of his country was exactly what Jeremiah was recommending to the exiles in Babylon. He said to them, build houses and live in them, plant vineyards, cultivate your gardens; marry, and give your daughters in marriage; seek the peace of your city, for in its peace you shall have peace. You could sum up that advice by saying that the practice of home virtues, of industry and good citizenship were the things essential to human welfare.

Jeremiah did not go with the captives to Babylon. He escaped and remained to preach to the scattered remnants. This lesson is taken from a letter he wrote to his slaves at Babylon. The people had dropped into a mood of futility and were on the verge of taking a last daring revolt. Jehovah their God had forsaken them, would pursue them until utterly destroyed. Strangers and slaves, life was

2 eggs
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 quart strawberries

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut or rub in shortening. Beat eggs. Add milk to beaten eggs and add all to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Pour batter into greased 9-inch ring mold. Bake

in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. When baked, unmold and fill center with sugared crushed strawberries. Garnish top and sides with whole berries. Makes 1 9-inch ring.

meaningless, and not worth living. In this connection read Psalm 37. Spurgeon called it one of the greatest poems of all time. Yet nothing could be more plaintive or sad. For the amusement of their oppressors, it was demanded of them that they sing one of the songs of Zion. They wept; they hanged their harps on the willows. "How can we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?"

But they did sing a song which was heard of God, a song of undying loyalty to Zion. This advice of Jeremiah's was based on faith. God had not utterly forsaken His own, and His promise to Abraham had not just run out. The sun was behind a cloud, but it was still shining. Some day it would break through and God's people would again be happy. The best thing was to settle, make the most of their life, and abide God's own good time of deliverance. To be unswerving in adversity is the greatest testimony of a living faith.

Tennessee Outdoors

Louis S. Clapper State Game and Fish Commission

Every hunter in Tennessee should go afield at this time of the year—but without a gun—for now is when the success of trips next fall and winter is being determined.

Waterfowl are pairing off in the northern breeding grounds to produce a new generation that will come whistling down the flyways next fall and winter. The ear-ringing challenge of the Bobwhite echoes across fields that hide new nests. The muffled drumming of the ruffed grouse and the chattering of squirrels proclaims the spring breeding seasons. The hunter will find a completely different terrain than during the winter and he would see the game pursuing completely different habits.

A trip afield also reveals what parts of his land the farmer uses for crop production and the sportsman might well be able to point out unused portions that could be planted to vegetation of value to the wildlife.

Next winter's game crop will be determined largely by the weather and other factors such as

Conservation Officers of the State Game and Fish Commission, grouped into a flying squadron, revisited the Watt's Bar-Hale's Bar-Chickamauga Lake area Saturday and Sunday and made 84 cases. The same group made 115 cases on the same area two weeks prior to the latest trip. Most of the offenses were for exceeding the creel

limit of fish, selling game fish and fishing without licenses.

A Giles County grand jury in session at Palaski, Tenn. recently found three men guilty of dynamiting a stream but the trial was noteworthy for another fact—it probably was the first time in Tennessee that women sat in judgment of a game and fish violation. Two women were on the jury for the first time. Each man tried was assessed a fine of \$50 and costs amounting to \$89.66.

Nashville—The State Game & Fish Commission will meet here

on June 5-6 in what probably will be its most important meeting of the year. Major items of business include the budget for the 1951-52 fiscal year, regulations for the 1951-52 Fall and Winter hunting season and hunting and fishing regulations not specifically covered by the new Game and Fish bill, the Wildlife Protection Act, which goes into effect June 1.

More than 332,000 acres of permanent pasture were seeded in Tennessee last year, which was an increase of more than 100,000 acres over permanent pasture seeding in 1949.

Delay Means Loss In SS Payments

"It is now much easier to qualify for retirement benefits under Social Security," Joe P. Tipton, Manager of the Dyersburg office pointed out today. Under the new rules, anyone now 65 years old, or who will be 65 before July 1, 1954, needs to have worked only about

one and one-half years in jobs covered by the law to be eligible. "During the last six months, we've been engaged in a real man-hunt," Mr. Tipton explained, "trying to locate as many as possible of the hundreds of people in this area who are eligible under the new rules. We don't have exact figures, but we know that the majority of them have already applied for payments and many are receiving regular monthly checks. Unfortunately, many others have not filed claims, and much more delay will mean a loss of payments."

"We can make back payments for 6 months to take care of delayed applications, so that a claim filed before the end of May covered months back to last November. However a claim filed in June can only go back to December, so that one month's payment will be lost and so on. Because of this, we urge anyone who believes he may qualify under the new rules to get in touch with us right away."

culated during the meeting on
swine feeding. It was found that,
with a good pasture of clovers and
grasses, it will take approximately
six bushels of corn and 18 pounds
of protein supplement to produce
100 pounds of pork. This was the
cheapest of the three rations which
were used. Corn alone and a com-
bination of corn and protein sup-
plement were used for the other
two rations.
The points to be considered in
selecting swine were pointed out
during the May 4-H Club meetings
which ended May 18. Each club
boy was given a bulletin explain-
ing the judging of swine, sheep,
beef cattle, and dairy cattle.
The next series of club meetings
will begin in July or August. This
will be an organizational meeting
and officers will be elected.
We appreciated the fine coop-
eration of teachers and other school
officials, parents, club leaders, and
the 4-Hers themselves in helping
us to carry out this program of
youth work.

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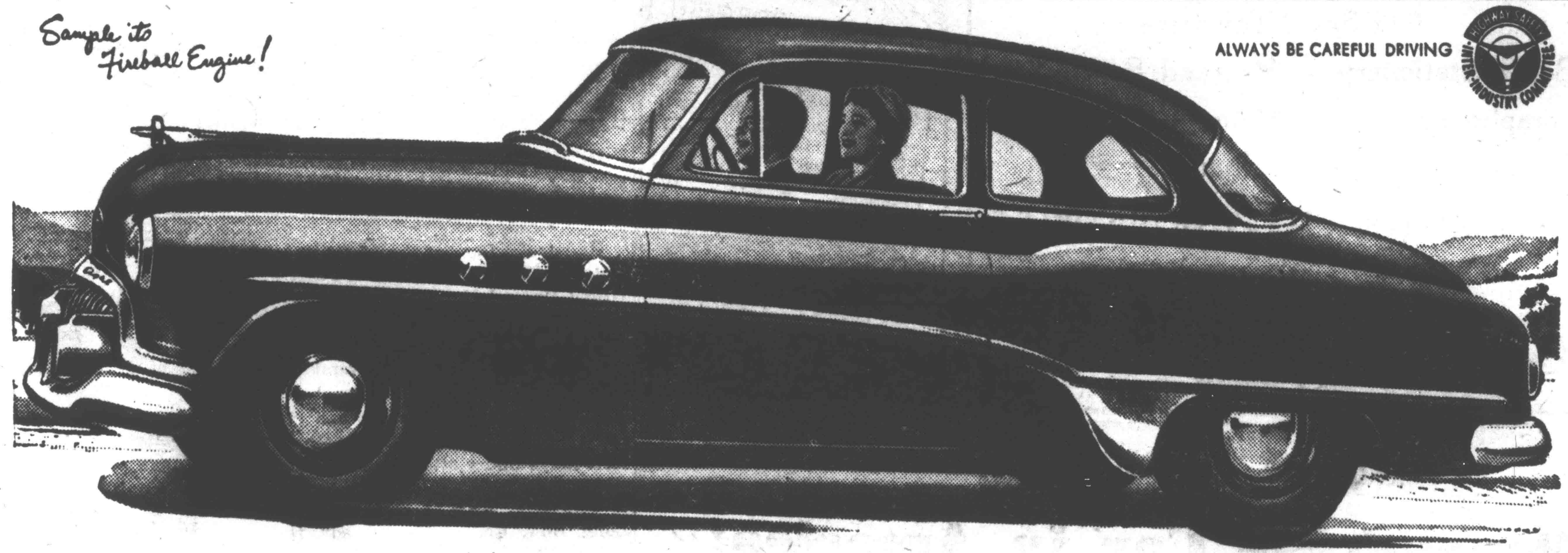

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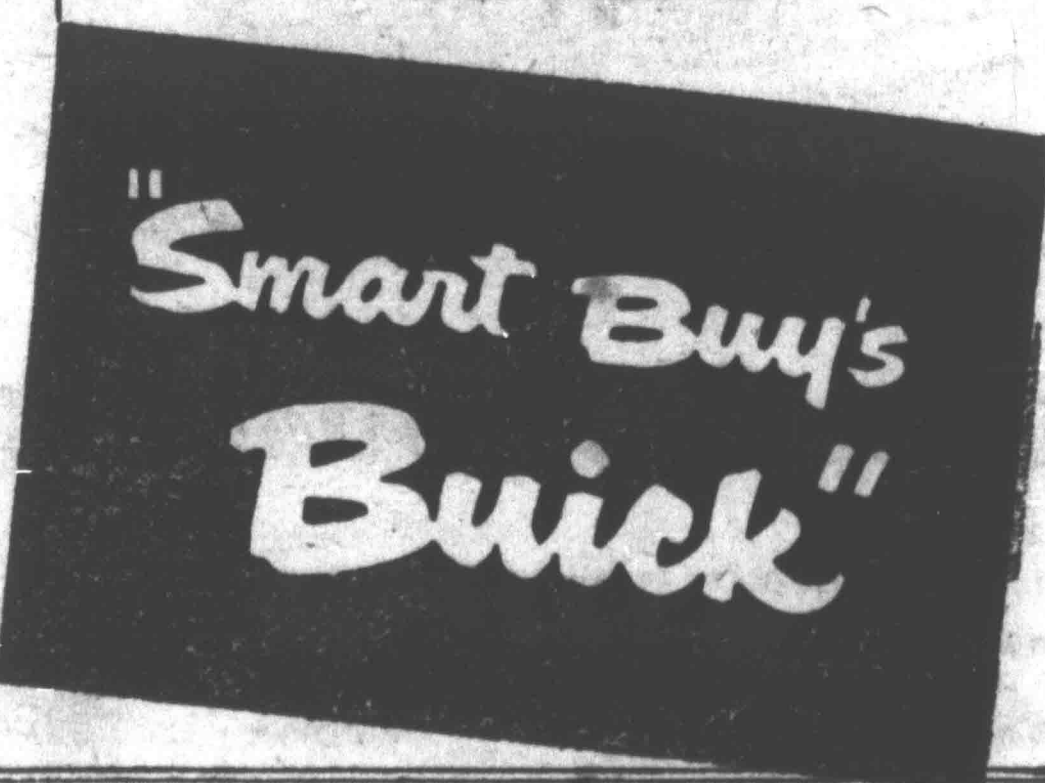
