We shall make a careful study of the results that farmers get with this new material in order that we can decide whether to use more of it in the future or less of it. We are always more likely to make mistakes as we try new things, but that is the price of progress, and we cannot afford to be satisfied with what we have already accomplished.

Farmers are normally progressive and present day farmers are quick to try new things. Practicalby every variety of cotton, corn, strawberries, soybeans, and pasture plants being produced in Lauderdale County generally were unknown 25 years ago. Practically every type of fertilizer and insecticide has been discovered or changed in recent years. Our farming equipment has changed great'y even in the last ten years. We have more than three times as many tractors as we had in 1945.

In spite of all this progress and change, we evidently still have not learned how to maintain stands of cotton in cold weather nor when to plant for best results under all

High Yielding Corns

Full seasoned corns will make higher yields than medium or short season corns when planted during the next two weeks. In a two year test of 25 varieties of corn at six locations over Tennessee the four highest yielding white warieties were Dixie 33 with an average yield over the two years and at the six locations of 101 bushels per acre; Dixie 17 with 95 bushels; Tennessee 10 with 94 bushels; and Jellicorse with 84 bushels.

The four highest yielding yellow varieties were Dixie 22 which made 91 bushels per acre; N. C. 27 with 90 bushels; Funk G711 with 88 bushels; and Tennessee 602 which made 85 bushe's. All four of these yellow varieties are full season corns. 



These services include improving general health of livestock and plants; rigid commercial field seed inspection; laboratory analyses of commercial feeds, and an all-round program to benefit the farmer, industry and the consumer.



Because of the length of time required to grade and put wool into merchantable condition to the appraisal, an advance loan will be available. This advance loan may not exceed 70 percent of the estimated loan value of the wool after it has been graded and apraised.

It appears that the support price will justify farmers waiting a few days until handlers are set up before they decide to place their wool under loan or sell it on the open market.

Fertilizers, Pesticides

The Office of Materials and Facilities estimated that the overall supply of fertilizers is expected to be better than estimated 2 or 3 months ago. Seven percent increase in nitrogen is still expected. Phosphate may be closer to suplies of last year than the earlier estimates of a six percent deFund Awards




Biology-teacher Buckhalter **Linked Science and Religion**

Alfalfa May Need Fertilizer Recent experiments on maintaining stands of alfalfa indicate that annual applications of fertilizers might prove to be a good investment toward increasing yields of hay and maintaining thick stands over a longer period of years.

Where no soil tests have been made, a yearly application of 150 ibs. of 20% phosphate, 100 lbs. of 60% potash, and 20 lbs. of borax per acre applied in early spring could prove to be a good practice for our soils here. As a rule, lime is not needed oftener than every four or five years although it is advisable to make soil tests every three years to determine the amount needed. It is always profitable to maintain stands of alfalfa at least four to five years because of the cost of seeding and land preparation and because alfalfa must be seeded in August or early September. 


