door, the diamond shaped window in the entrance way, and the heavy hewn timbers on the porches carry out the English tradition.

Next door to the Nunn's home is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wymond Hurt. It is semi-colonial of red brick with white columns. In this house the den and breakfast rooms are paneled in mahogany. The center of interest in the living room is the grey marble fireplace while in the hallway the colonial stairs, especially designed for the house by Mr. Floyd Hurt,

the owner's brother, draw glances of admiration. The built-in tile dressing table in the bathroom brings pleasure to the lady of the house.

Fairview Farm, country home of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Hurt, will be the last stop. A long drive bordered by walnut trees leads to this huge ten-room house, which has been a showplace in Halls since it was built in 1890. CUTWORM DAMAGE CONTROL METHODS

One of the biggest nuisances to gardeners and vegetable growers at this time of year is the cutworm - that night prowler who cuts off seedling plants at the ground level and often sets back the crop by many days because replanting is necessary.

Cutworms can be controlled effectively by heavy applications of 5 or 10 percent DDT dust to the

plant stems and to the ground around the stems, say U-T Extension entomologists. Poison bait mixture, made up of 25 pounds wheat bran, 1-2 pound Paris green, 3 gallons water, and a quart of molasses (or smaller amounts of the same proportion) broadcast by hand late in the afternoon, also works as a control. Paper banding of plants is another measure that

prevents attack.

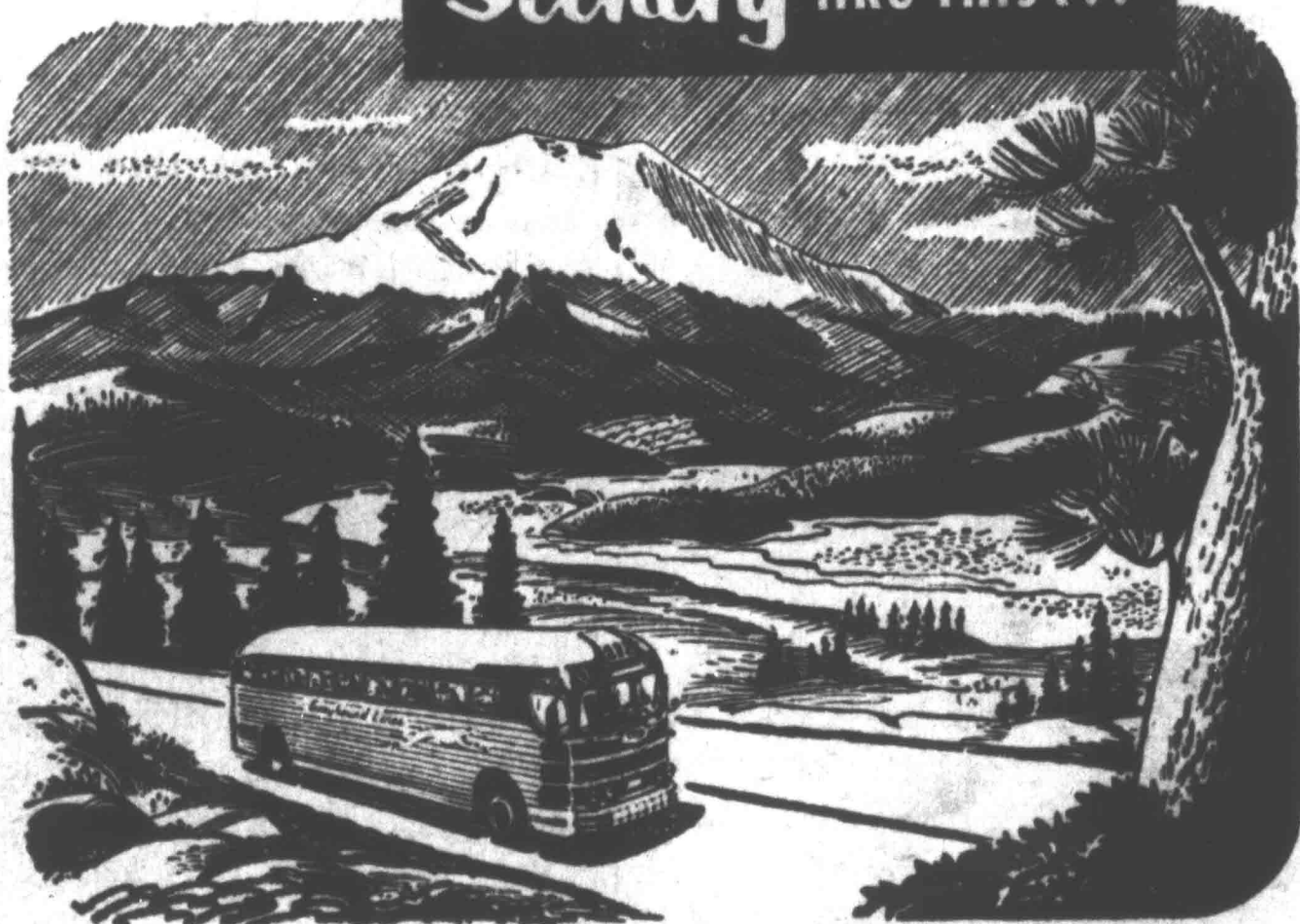

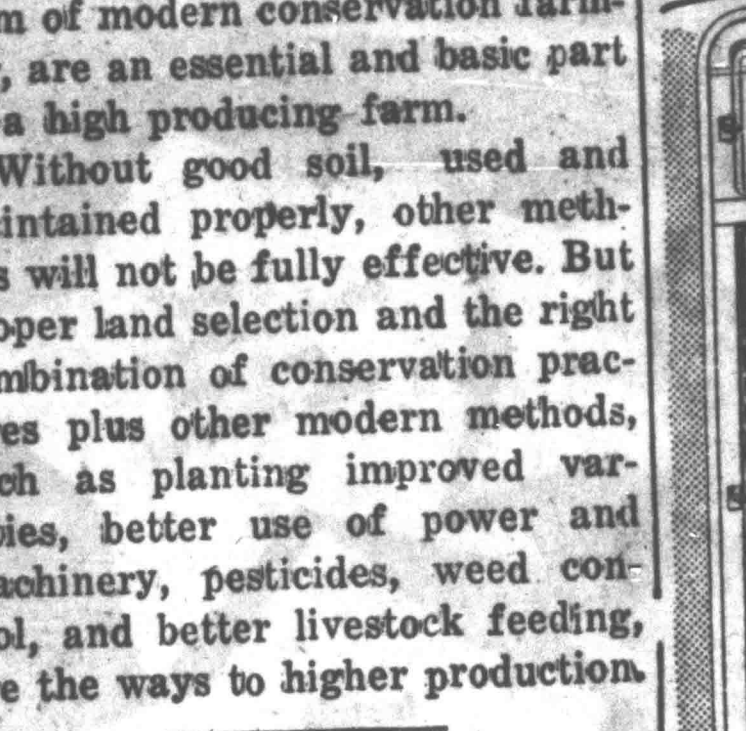

Sunday School Lesson
 By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee
 Ex. 20:7; Matt. 5:33-37; 23:16-22
"Profanity (And Profane Living)"
 The first commandment teaches us reverence for God. The second teaches reverence for His name. In a world of lies we crave some circumstances under which we can be certain that men are speaking the truth and will abide by their

pledges. The name of God would be a potent force in the Korean peace talks, and in other relations between nations.
 This old commandment deals with one of the most common modern sins. Henry Sloan Coffin says profanity is now out of fashion. I wish that were true. It certainly is a mark of ill-breeding. Nothing is more grating on refined ears than cursing. And nothing degrades a person more than this habit of cursing. It is but a symptom of the inner pollution of the whole life.
 Sometimes it is excused because it is a habit. But that is no excuse. The habit of swearing only proves the guilty one has allowed himself

to be confirmed in a low state of morals.
 Cursing is the most useless sin in the whole category. No benefit can be derived from it. It does not "beautify" language, nor does it strengthen it. It has the opposite effect of proving one's words true. You would believe the man who talks clean rather than the one who swears.
 Lord Byron once remarked of a man, "He knew not what to say, so he swore." Profanity proves poverty of thought. It also reveals a man's distrust of his own integrity.
 Profanity is sin. It particularly marks a woman as "vulgar." A man unwittingly swore in the presence of a clergyman and apologized. The answer was shot back, "You don't need to apologize to me. You had better apologize to God. He heard you."
Sanctity Of Oath
 When the Anglo-Saxon people set up trial by jury it was one of mankind's greatest advancements. It did away with the old tests of guilt by fire and magic. Justice in court, however, depends on sanctity of oaths. The oath of the judge when sworn in, the oath the jurymen takes, and that of the witnesses—all combine to make justice supreme. If there is a breakdown anywhere along the line, justice fails.
 Some older people remember when a man's word was as good as his bond. And that is the way it ought to be. Jesus said, "Let your speech be yea, yea; and nay, nay." It never should be said that a Christian's word is any better when under oath.
Sincere Reverent Living
 Jesus made it clear there can be no loose thinking on what is right and wrong. Teachers of His day allowed swearing by the altar but not by the gift upon it. Jesus ask-

ed, "Which is greater, the gift, or the altar that sanctifieth the gift?"
 Waldo Emerson wrote, "Use what language you will, you can never say anything but what you are. What I am and what I think is conveyed to you, in spite of my efforts to hold it back. You have heard from me when I never spoke." Dr. Elton Trueblood says that the increased use of profanity in our country today is a certain sign of our moral decline.

ton and corn before it is planted or it should be applied as a side-dressing as soon as possible after

planting. It does not leach out of the soil readily and there is no great loss if it is applied ahead of the time when plants can take it up, but if it applied too late, it can have the effect of causing plants to stay green too late in the fall.

Experiment station tests indicate that we ought to apply a total of about 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre on cotton in this area, but that we can profitably apply at least 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre on corn, sudan grass, and small grains.

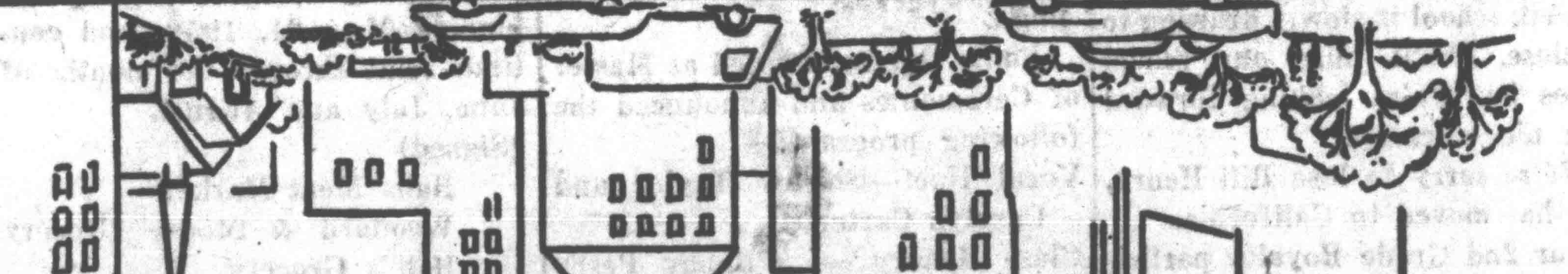

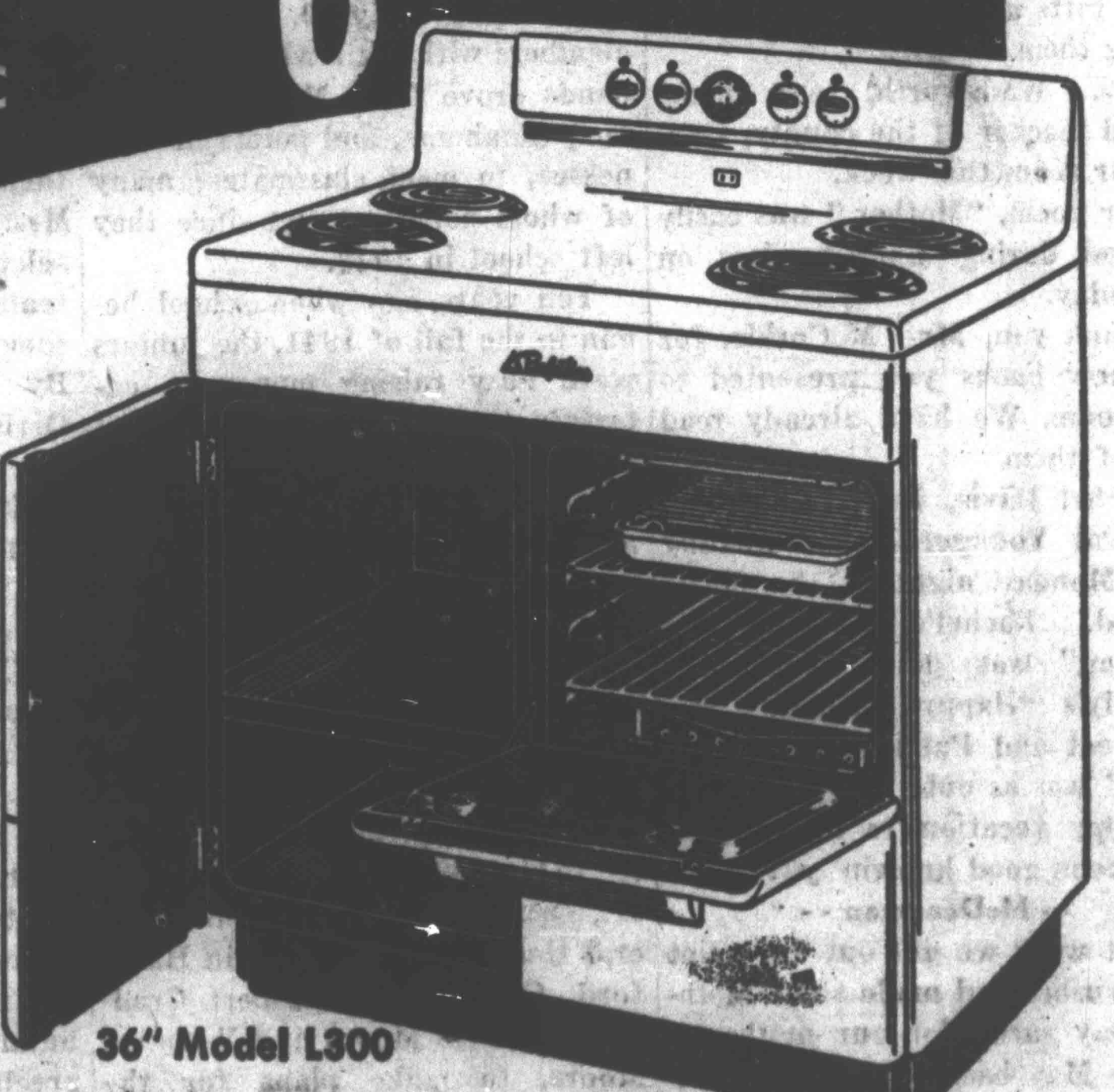

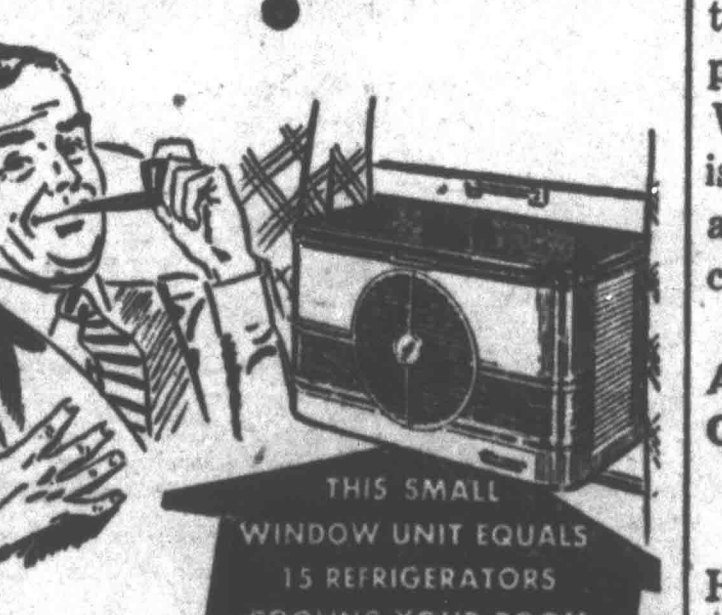

(Continued from Page 1) Potatoes were taken off the list of foods for which the government would guarantee minimum prices several months ago and it has been interesting to hear in the last few weeks that potatoes were getting scarce and could not be bought for the ceiling prices allowed under OPS.

Today they are selling largely on the Black Market or purchasers are being forced to buy other unwanted vegetables and other produce in order to get potatoes. This is a sample of what can happen when those who know nothing about agricultural conditions are

allowed to dictate policies which affect all our people.

About 85% of the people in the United States today want cheap food, but when labor is guaranteed a minimum of 75c per hour and business operates under fair trade practice laws, farmers must be given some similar protection if the people are to have enough food much less be able to buy it cheap.

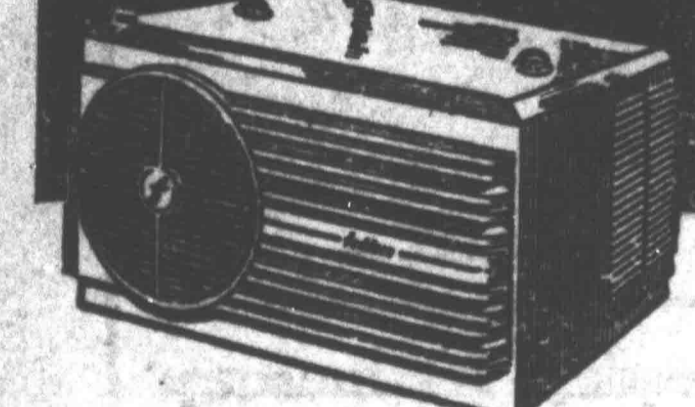

Because of the length of time required to grade and put wool into merchantable condition to the appraisal, an advance loan will be available. This advance loan may not exceed 70 percent of the estimated loan value of the wool after it has been graded and appraised.

It appears that the support price will justify farmers waiting a few days until handlers are set up before they decide to place their wool under loan or sell it on the open market.

Fertilizers, Pesticides The Office of Materials and Facilities estimated that the overall supply of fertilizers is expected to be better than estimated 2 or 3 months ago. Seven percent increase in nitrogen is still expected. Phosphate may be closer to supplies of last year than the earlier estimates of a six percent decrease, because sulfur shortage apparently has eased off somewhat. About five percent more potash will be available than last year's record supply. Current outlook for pesticides is very good. Lag in ordering for

seasonal needs may result in spot shortages during period of use. Pesticides containing sulfur will be relatively short. Those containing copper will likely be scarce. Weed killers should be readily available. ACA Practices Payment will be made this year for the following practices - ponds, ditches, terraces, sod waterways, contour Strip Covering, and Clearing suitable land for Permanent Pasture or Perennial Legumes. However, before payment can be made on these practices the farmer must do the following:

- 1. Come to the County PMA office and file an application for prior approval to carry out these practices.
2. Contact the Soil Conservation Service and arrange with them to visit your farm to determine whether the practice is needed and the county...

Books are nice things to receive but not when thrown at you. That, at least, must be the opinion of J. C. Collins, of Lancing, Tenn., because he has appealed fines and costs totaling \$1044 levied upon alleged violations of the Wildlife

Protection Act. Collins and his 14-year old son, David, were apprehended April 13 while allegedly fishing the Obed River in Morgan County with an illegal net. When approached by Conservation Officers, Collins broke and ran.

Collins and his son were taken before Judge A. L. Buxton, of Wartburg, on April 25. The father was fined \$50 and \$8 court costs on each of the following charges: refusing inspection, blocking two-thirds of a stream with a net, possession of illegal fishing gear, using illegal fishing gear and 14 separate counts of possessing fish taken illegally. In all, Collins was found guilty of 18 separate charges and the fines and costs aggregated \$1044. Collins entered pleas of not guilty and has appealed the cases to the Circuit Court. Two charges against the youngster were dismissed.

Sportsmen are pleasantly surprised over the quality of crappie now being taken on Tennessee-Kentucky Lake. Not only are the fish showing up in quantities, but the sizes often run from two to three pounds - a big fish for this species. And, these big "slabs" often put up a fight comparable to that of bass!

A belief in the curative powers of squirrel meat apparently is passing away. It wasn't many years ago when some people, caught with illegally-taken squirrels, pleaded sickness and stated that only the broth of squirrel meat could cure them. At one time many doctors actually prescribed the squirrel potion although most largely were restricted to those of a psychological nature. Such appeals today are rare even during the mulberry season when the

tasty little animals are most easily taken.

As warmer weather approaches, more catfish should be taken by the thousands of sportsmen who prefer "Old Whiskers" above all other denizens of the deep. Catfishing requires skill and there are almost as many special baits as there are devotees of the sport. Tom Greene, of Huntingdon, known best locally as the Sage of Sycamore Stump, has a bait he

vows will have the catfish begging for the hook. The bait formula follows:

Cut one ripe banana in small pieces. Add one teaspoon powdered asafetida and one cup cornmeal. Cut pound liver in hook-size strips. Mix ingredients well and place in quart jar. Secure top and bury until sour.

Needless to say, the result is so aromatic no self-respecting catfish can resist it!

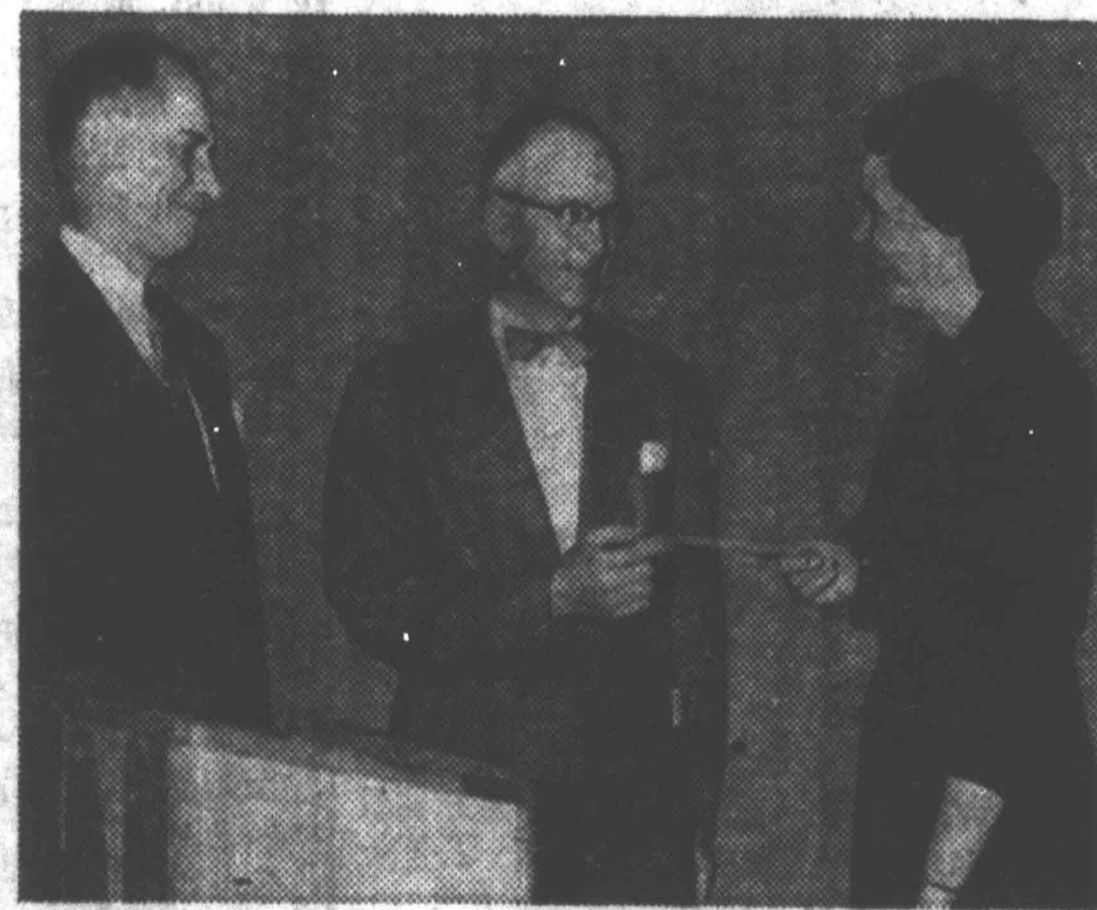

SOCIAL SECURITY

Lauderdale County housewives were reminded again this week about the new Social Security Law for domestic servants. "We still receive many inquiries about this subject," says Joe P. Tipton, Manager of the Dyersburg social security office.

Under this law which started in 1951, servants in private homes are now covered by social security. "This is true if they work long enough for the same household," Mr. Tipton pointed out. "They must work for the same household on some part of 24 days in a 3-month calendar quarter. They must also make at least \$50 cash wages during that period. Unless they

meet these two requirements, that household makes no social security report on the servant," he said.

"A servant's work for different households cannot be combined to meet social security requirements. The servant's work in each household must meet the two requirements as to days worked and wages earned." Mr. Tipton explained. "A few Lauderdale County housewives should have reported on their domestic workers last year but failed to do so. Since they are several months behind with these reports they should get in touch with our office immediately," Mr. Tipton said. They may also contact the Collector of Internal Revenue to have their reports brought up to date.

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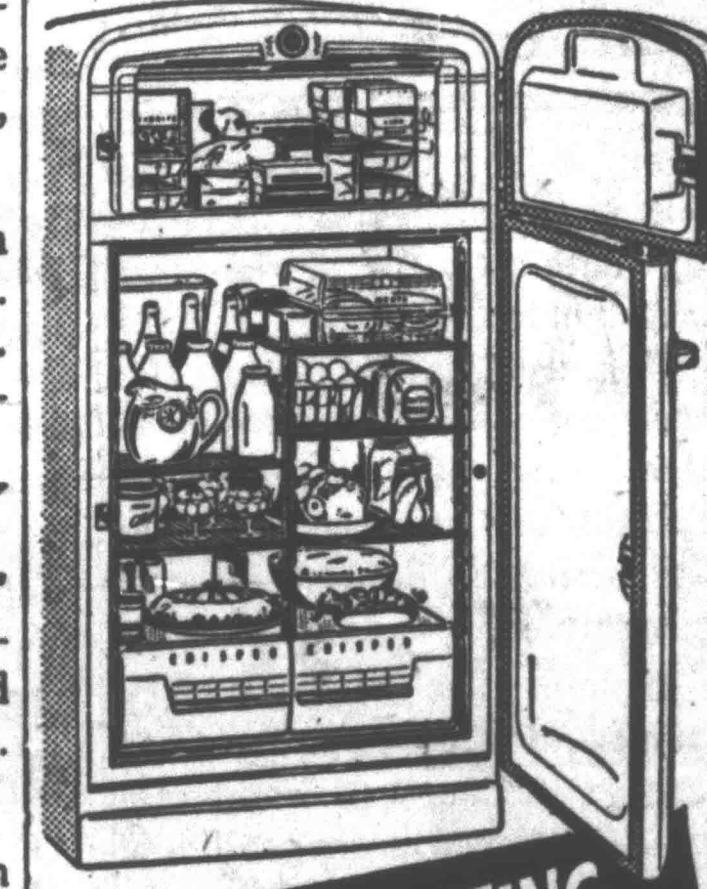

ELECTION
By virtue of the authority conferred upon me by Chapter 130 of the Public Acts of Tennessee of 1951, and in compliance and accordance with provisions of said Act, I, James H. Cummings, Secretary of State, hereby make due publication of the fact that there shall be submitted to the people of Tennessee at the (Regular) Election to be held in the several Counties and Fictorial Districts of the State on August 7, 1952, the question of whether or not the present Constitution of Tennessee should be altered, reformed or abolished with respect to certain sections and parts only, in order to ascertain the will of the people with respect thereto, which question shall be printed in full on each ballot and voting machine, in the following words and figures:
CONSTITUTIONAL REFERENDUM
Shall a convention be held to alter, reform or abolish the following provisions and subject matter of the Constitution of Tennessee, to-wit: Article XI, Section 3 (relating to amendments and conventions); Article II, Section 23 (relating to the compensation and expenses of members of the Legislature); Article III, Section 4 (relating to the Governor's term of office); Article III, Section 18 (relating to the Governor's veto power); Article IV, Section 1 (relating to the right of suffrage); Article XI, Section 9 (relating to private and local affairs), by altering, reforming or abolishing said section or by adding a new section to said Article XI so as to provide (a) for home rule for municipalities and counties, (b) for uniform systems of city charters to be prescribed by the General Assembly, (c) for the consolidation in whole or in part of governmental and corporate functions of municipalities and counties as prescribed and authorized by the General Assembly; which convention shall be limited to consideration of and action upon those sections and the subject matter hereinabove set forth, the action of such convention to become effective as to each amendment adopted by the convention only after being separately submitted to and ratified and approved by the voters of the State?
