**Reminds of Acreage Reserve Rules** 

by W. B. Hall Agreements under the 1958 Acreage Reserve Program remain in effect until December 31, Chairman A. O. Chambers of the Lauderdale County Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded farmers today.

The Chairman expressed concern that some farmers who already have been paid for land placed in the 1958 Acreage Reserve may believe that they have already complied with the program fully. The provisions of the agreements remain in effect even though the payment may be made before the end of the year.

Under the Acreage Reserve, the land specifically designated by the farmer for the program may not be cropped and livestock may not be permitted to graze on it. The only exception is that winter crops for harvest in 1959 or later may be planted on the Reserve this fall.

Continued from Page 1) by producing vigorous cross-bred pigs.

Mr. Harlan plans to check the gaining ability of pigs from each sow and male and for that reason has adopted a numbering system based on notching the ears of sows and pigs.

This system now being used for all breeds of hogs except Hampshires is based on each notch in the lower right ear counting one, and each notch in the upper right ear, counting 10, with each notch in the lower left ear counting 3, and each notch in the upper left ear counting 30; so that any number can be shown from one to 100. The usual practice is to give the pigs the same number of the mother sow. Then if a gilt is kept as a breeding animal, she is assigned a new number and notched accordingly.
