## Blueberry-Coconut Bonanza!



Tender thin flakes of coconut add wonderful flavor to fruit shortcakes. As the fresh fruits come into the market, make the most of this excellent recipe and serve coconut shortcake often. For a special change, melt about 2 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine and saute the flakes until golden, then use as a garnish for the whipped cream topping. Yummy!

### Blueberry Coconut Shortcakes

- 3 cups sifted flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup Baker's Angel Flake Coconut, toasted
- 1 cup milk
- 3 cups (about) sweetened cultivated blueberries
- Additional coconut for garnish

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, sugar, and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening until mixture is the consistency of coarse corn meal. Stir in coconut. Add milk all at once and stir until soft dough is formed.

Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 20 times. Pat or roll dough 1/4 inch thick and cut with floured 3-inch biscuit cutter. Place half of circles on ungreased baking sheet and brush with melted butter. Top with remaining circles. Bake in hot oven (450°F.) 15 to 20 minutes.

To serve, separate halves of shortcakes and spread with softened butter. Put together with sweetened blueberries between halves and on top. Garnish with whipped cream and flaked coconut, plain or toasted. Makes 9 shortcakes.

reigned supreme as no two people had the same time. The sunrise was simply superb. About 8 o'clock the green fields of Ireland appeared below us and I remembered how Mr. Lindbergh had been so glad to see them. We put down at Shannon and at long last I was in Europe. Shannon is the loveliest place I've yet seen. I never saw anything like the flowers. They were the same varieties that we have at home but larger, more brilliant in coloring and more crisp looking. If course, it rains every day in Shannon as it seems to in all north Europe. That's why things grow so well. Flying time was about 16 hours.

By noon we had crossed the Rhine and were in Frankfurt. I stayed in Frankfurt for two days waiting for orders and train reservations. In Frankfurt I had my first sausage and sauerkraut and also my first German beer. Water is almost an unknown quantity in Europe. Already I'm thirsty for American water and hungry for fresh fruits and vegetables.

On Wednesday night Persis Goodnow a teacher whose home is in Keen, New Hampshire and I went down to the Main Bahnhof (Bahnhof is the German word for depot and the only word I've learned) and rode all night to Bremerhaven. We had a sleeper but the moon was bright and I sat up all night

Most farmers are late this year in getting fall crops sown. There has been more than usual to be done on many farms and at the same time farm labor has not been plentiful. Larger than usual yields have been experienced with harvesting silage and other crops. Then, too, more livestock require more fall jobs in order to have abundant hay and other feedstuff for winter.

The rains last week were somewhat unexpected and until then many fields were too dry to plow and work satisfactorily. Now, that there is sufficient moisture, much work will start as soon as it is sufficiently dry.

No one need get the idea that it is too late to sow the usual fall crops. Crimson clover, small grain, alfalfa and pasture mixture would have done no good in most cases, had they been sown earlier. Then, too, there is not as much danger due to insects as there would have been a few weeks ago.

In order, however, to get fast growth, proper amounts of seed and fertilizer need to be applied. Be sure that the soil is tested and don't fail to use maximum recommendations. Where need for soil nutrients are not known, be sure to use at least 300 pounds or more of 6-12-12 per acre. Also the maximum seed requirements for alfalfa and pasture mixtures should be sown. Fertilizer applications always furnish good insurance for fall seeded crops such as small grain, alfalfa and other pasture plants. The best guide to the use of fertilization is always through soil testing.

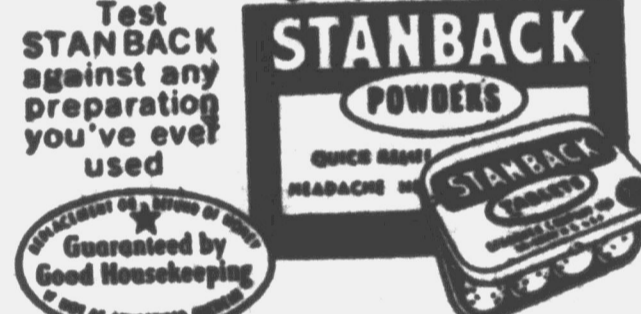

# Top Teams Maintain Winning Ways

Probably the three biggest victories recorded in prep play last week were racked up by Brownsville, Jackson and Ripley. Other wins were equally as important but not so unexpectedly one-sided.

Brownsville routed Newbern, 39-13, with Larry Banks scoring four times for the powerful Tomcats. Newbern hadn't lost since 1956 and Brownsville has now won 13 straight.

Jackson blasted Dyersburg into orbit with a 38-0 lashing of the Trojans. The scoring was spread among six Golden Bear players and further established the Bruins as one of the top units of the Big Ten.

Ripley thoroughly trounced Covington 45-6 in a savage display of power. The Tigers stand a great chance of finishing at or near the top of the Big Ten again this year.

In the Volunteer Conference the big leaders came up with big wins. Henderson downed Jackson South Side 27-13. Huntington crushed Parsons 32-0 and Lexington flipped Jackson South Side 40-6 on Monday and Trezevant 25-0 on Friday.

Henderson and Lexington are tied for the VC lead with 5-0 league records. Henderson has also won five without a loss, but one victory was over a non-conference foe.

Martin gained sole position of the Reelfoot Lake Conference lead with an expected drubbing of Tiptonville. The score went Martin's way by a 28-7 count. Oscar Phillips led the winners with a pair of TD's.

Decaturville's Rams, enjoying its best season in years, downed Alamo 32-6 with a second half barrage of points. Roy McPeake had two touchdowns to pace the Ram attack.

Humboldt climbed to the top of the Big Ten Conference, downing Milan 31-7. The game was extremely close until the last half when the Rams wore down the Bulldog resistance to run up the big count.

Paris came up with its third win of the year, also having to rally with a big final half to beat Camden 33-13. Billy Moseley scored four times for Paris.

Halls ran up against a determined Somerville Panther group and came off second best as Eugene Webb geared the winner to a 26-0 victory.

In other games Jackson North Side beat Selmer 6-0 on Friday after downing Bolivar 12-0 on Monday. Bruceton bumped Bolivar 21-6; Greenfield got its first win of the year by beating Dresden 38-6; Gleason bested Martin 7-0; Sharon outlasted South Fulton 13-6; Trenton lost in a shocker to Union City 21-14; and Ridgely dropped a 43-13 decision to Fulton.

Leading scorers in West Tennessee include: Billy Moseley, Paris (61); Scottie Portis and Marshall Smith (Huntingdon) 54; Oscar Phillips, Martin (51); Jimmy Anderson, Lexington (48); and Roy McPeake, Decaturville (42).

less of the manner in which it is done.

It does seem advisable that we pick cotton as rapidly as possible, but we can get considerably more dollars for the cotton we have already grown if we can carry out these practical measures: (1) Pick cotton as soon as possible but pick only mature, fully open bolls; (2) Pick cotton as clean as possible. Keep grass, leaf particles, and boll trash out of cotton; (3) Pick cotton when it dry. Get a better sample, a higher turnout, and preserve brightness. (4) Separate wet cotton from dry cotton and separate clean cotton from trashy cotton. This makes it possible for you to get the highest total value.

A bale of middling 1-1-16 cotton will bring \$24 more than a bale of strict low middling 1-1-32. A bale of middling 1-1-16 cotton will bring \$21.50 more than a bale of strict low middling 1-1-16.

We have some wonderful cotton gins in Lauderdale County but every ginner will testify that dry, clean cotton will bring the most total money to the producer. This year as our cotton goes toward the loan and as each bale is valued separately, we can make extra profits by trying harder to get the best possible price for the precious cotton we have already produced.

## SOCIAL SECURITY

The disability freeze is an important feature of the social security program and should be understood by every social security card holder and his family, N. Farris Vaden, manager of the Dyersburg social security office, said today.

People tend to overlook the "freeze" because there is no immediate cash benefit, Mr. Vaden added. However, the freeze protects future cash benefit rights of those who have had to stop working because of a disability and deserves the same public understanding that the other cash benefit provisions enjoy.

The need for the freeze program is based on the general rule that when one is not working under social security prior to age 65 (62 for women), his potential benefit is being reduced. If one has a regular and substantial amount of work under social security and has had to give up painful work because of a disability that is expected to be of long continued and indefinite duration, he may freeze his social security account. The freeze maintains his potential benefit at the amount established during his working days. Only those persons unable to work because of a disability may freeze their social security earnings record.

Detailed information on the social security freeze can be obtained by writing or visiting your local social security office located at Dyersburg, Tennessee.

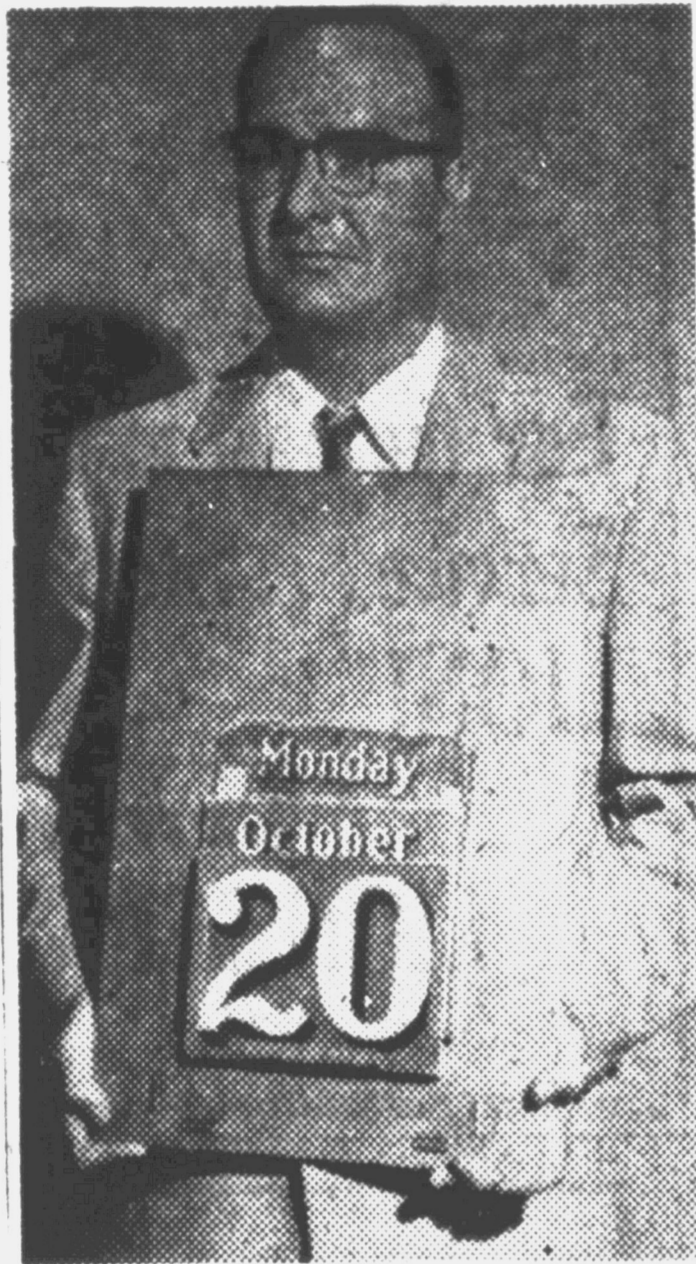
## Lawson Spence Died At Age Of 88

The 52nd annual campaign to raise funds to fight tuberculosis will be carried on by the 3,000 tuberculosis associations throughout the United States from November 14 through December.

Emphasizing the fine cooperation from people of Lauderdale County in past Christmas Seal Sale Campaigns, Mr. Paschal said, "Great progress against tuberculosis has been made in the first half century of the Christmas Seal Sale, but there is a big job ahead to bring this disease under control. Tuberculosis strikes 90,000 Americans every year," Mr. Paschal said. "We must all share in the fight to protect our homes from tuberculosis."

Contributions to the Lauderdale County Tuberculosis Association pay for assistance to persons who, when they are found to have tuberculosis, must have help in getting ready to go to the hospital.

The Tuberculosis Association helps distressed families of tuberculosis patients during emergencies, helps in the enormous job of finding the cases of TB in the county, carries on an educational program among adults and children, and buys the expensive drugs which patients must take when they are released from the TB hospital.

## Strawberry Care Important Now

F. H. Paschal

A. P. Burks of Poplar Grove has this week applied Captan spray to his strawberries to stop the spread of leaf spot which has killed a few berry plants in the last two months and seems to be spreading. He is applying four pounds of 50 percent wettable Captan per acre in enough water to get good coverage on the plants.

Leaf spot has attacked more strawberries in this area this year than we have ever seen before. Richard Lazure dusted with Captan for this disease and for leaf scorch before he picked berries last spring. Producers should examine their fields now and apply Captan within the next 2 months to control it.

### Fertilizer Needed Now

Strawberries are producing fruit buds now which will make strawberries next spring. Experienced growers apply fertilizer in early September so that it will take effect by October, but it would be better to apply it now than to wait till later. Some time can be gained by using compounded fertilizers such as 15-15-15 with quick acting nitrogen. Apply 300 lbs. per acre on top of the rows in the afternoon and then brush the fertilizer off the plants.

### To Stop Winter Weeds

Mr. Burks recently applied Crag Herbicide at the rate of two lbs. per acre in about 25 gallons of water per acre in a band about 18 inches wide to prevent the germination of evening primrose and other winter weeds which can give us fits at harvest time but can be controlled now with this chemical at small expense. Any amount of water from 15 to 40 (Please Turn To Page 6)

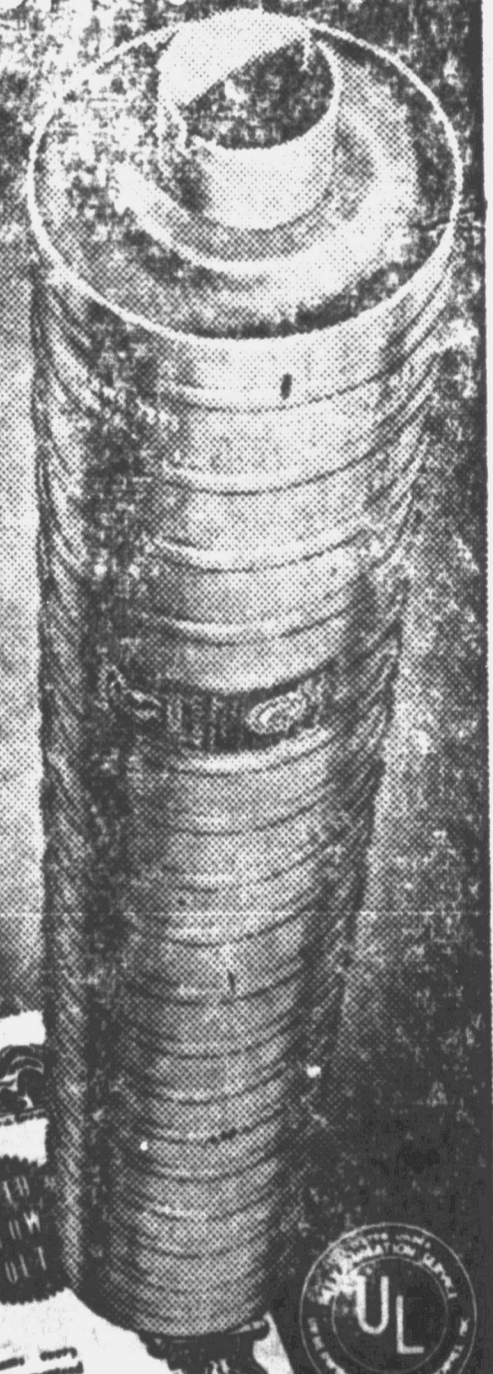

### Sunday School Lesson

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, October 12

Luke 2:25-35

#### "The Promise Fulfilled"

It is a fact of history that men who greatly influence their times are controversial figures. All men who affect the destinies of many are spoken against. They are misunderstood. They often fight lonely battles. Abraham Lincoln was also called a man of sorrow. Simeon, knowing the child Jesus was the promised Messiah and that His epoch-making career would have evil consequences to Himself, told Mary a sword would pierce her own soul.

We do not know who Simeon was but we do know what he was. He was an aged man who belonged to that faithful band of people looking for the fulfillment of the

promise of the Messiah. At some time in his career God had given him the promise that he would not die till he had seen the Messiah. Like a lightning flash he knew this child was He, and, taking Him up in his arms, praised God.

It was a most unlikely group, the poorest among the poor. Mary could not offer the usual sacrifice, could only afford two turtledoves, the offering of the poor. Simeon saw the glory of God in this child and prayed a prayer of thanksgiving which we still use in our worship.

Edersheim has observed that in every humiliation of His life, the glory of His divinity was made to shine through. If he was born of an humble maiden, the angels announced His birth. Cradled in a manger, the shining hosts of heaven sang His praise. If He hungered in the wilderness, angels ministered unto Him. Submitting to baptism, the voice and vision from heaven attested His Sonship. Nailed to the cross, nature mourned in darkness. So now, when the mother of Jesus could only bring the offering of the poor, there was a witness to the greatness of Him whom she had borne.

How quietly it was all done, and the world went on its way unimpressed. Roland Bainton gives as a part of Martin Luther's Christmas sermon: "When Mary and Joseph brought Jesus into the temple only two persons were there. Is it not shocking that from more than twenty thousand men only Simeon was present? The priests pocketed the five groschen and paid no more attention. Is it not shameful? But because there was no pomp, no one gave heed and Mary and Joseph brought Him in alone. None but Simeon and Anna were there."

No minister can preach long and shepherd a flock without realizing that every group has a few members of the spirit of Simeon and Anna. They are people of prayer, but may not talk about it. They have the spiritual eye to perceive the truth which so many others pass by. They trust and wait when all others lose heart.

The fact is that this old world, in spite of its pomp and show, could not get along without its Simeons and Annas. We would miss so much of the things of God.

gallons per acre can be used to deposit the material, but it is necessary to know how much the sprayer will put down per acre.

2,4-D can be safely used on strawberries in midwinter at the rate of 1 1-2 pints per acre to control some weeds, but there are some tough weeds which infest strawberry fields and a combination of measures may be needed to keep them under control in this crop which can bring a high return per acre.

**Order Trees Now**

Householders and landowners continue to inquire about the prospects of getting tree seedlings for setting this winter. We can still get seedlings of loblolly pine, black locust, short leaf pine, and catalpa at \$3.00 per thousand, white pine at \$5.00 per thousand, and yellow poplar seedlings at 1c each by ordering 500 or more and sending cash or check with order. Trees ordered for Lauderdale County will be delivered to Ripley without any transportation charge. Orders may be placed with the County Agent or SCS. Make checks payable to Tenn. Division of Forestry.

In previous years a supply of these trees have given out by the first of November; so it seems advisable to place orders now for whatever seedlings are wanted.

**New Ideas Aid Farmers' Problems**  
Several years ago we could not envision some of the ideas that today are common with farmers. These new ideas, although costly, have greatly reduced labor costs and have stepped up the efficiency around the farm place. Now,

we are told that farmers who cannot adapt his jobs to new machinery and new ideas that soon he will be out of farming and doing something else. We can well imagine that this might become a reality.

Farms are growing more mechanized each year and if we did not have the assistance of some of our fine machinery, farming would be a real hard business. But with the aid that we now have, such as we are familiar with, life on the farm is real pleasure. Some time ago, the farm flock

of poultry disappeared and gave way to layer units, where automatic feeding and watering devices took the place of so much hand labor. The one horse hay baler long ago left the farm and now we have completely automatic balers that do a wonderful job. Many farmers never touch their hay until it is fed to the livestock as custom baling is very popular.

Livestock are providing more and more of our farm income and many changes are in the making. We have had feed supplements for a long time and then along

came the anti-biotics to increase rate of gain and efficiency in the feed lot. Today, there is much talk of on the farm feed service and farmers really need it. Their busy days could be assisted by such services. We are also hearing lots about new methods of harvesting our hay crops. Who would have a few years ago ever thought that a machine would drive into a hay field and press a crop of hay into wafers or pellets?

This has become a reality and is being practiced in some livestock areas today. We can well expect many of these new ideas to come to our communities in the near future.

## Close Games Top Feature Of Prep Tilts

Big Ten and Reelfoot Lake leaders hit the dust this past week in grid tilts, but the Volunteer Conference headlines kept up the pace.

Humboldt knocked Jackson from the top Big Ten perch by a 13-12 score and South Fulton trimmed Martin's sails 14-13. The Martin loss still left them in first place in the Reelfoot Lake race, but Jackson's defeat left unbeaten Brownsville high above the other Big Ten teams.

In the Volunteer Conference league leading Henderson spotted Selmer a 13-0 first quarter lead and came back to win 35-26 in wild scoring affair. Roy Lynch got four touchdowns for the winners as they posted victory number seven without a setback.

VC's other unbeaten powerhouse Huntingdon (7-0) had trouble with Bruceton, but managed a 14-0 victory. Scotty Portis and Marshall Smith got the big scoring nods.

Brownsville went on its merry way clubbing Milan 47-0, using three scoring thrusts by Danny Sellari. The Tomcats are undefeated in four games this season and appear well on the road to another unbeaten campaign. Ripley and Jackson offer possible stumbling blocks in the path of the Brownsville eleven.

## Beef Calves Bring Top Prices at Sale

Beef calf sales at Brownsville last week participated in by Col. Tom Scott, Mrs. John McBride, W. L. Partain, Russell Evans, Roy L. Garrington, Pat Parker, Jr., Lewis Walker, J. N. Roberts, and John Turner were considered highly successful in every way.

The Hereford sale was topped at 34.75 by a group of 90 calves which graded good and which weighed in the 400 group.

The Angus sale was topped by a group of 23 calves which sold at 36.75 with about the same weight range. These demonstration feeder calf sales are sponsored jointly by the state and county livestock associations and the Extension Service to attract cattle feeders who want to buy large lots of cattle of uniform size and type.

Each year more feeders come to the sales and producers believe they have been of definite help in holding up prices of feeder cattle in this section.

## Cotton Grading Good

Reports from the Cotton Classing Office in Memphis show that the vast majority of cotton being ginned in Lauderdale County is Middling 1-16 or better which is valued at 37.05 to 38.70 in the government loan.

It was reported last week that a group of influential cotton buyers called on the management of the cotton classing office claiming that the cotton was being over-graded and demanding that grades be lowered for government loans. Cotton buyers claimed that much of the cotton was spotted which was being called white.

We do not know how the cotton looks from other areas but the vast majority of our cotton is certainly white and popping out all over the place. Producers should be encouraged to continue picking cotton as clean as possible and as dry as possible. If some cotton is wet, keep it separate from dry cotton. If some is trashy or grassy, keep it separate from cotton that is cleaner.

## Reminds of Acreage Reserve Rules

by W. B. Hall

Agreements under the 1958 Acreage Reserve Program remain in effect until December 31, Chairman A. O. Chambers of the Lauderdale County Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded farmers today.

The Chairman expressed concern that some farmers who already have been paid for land placed in the 1958 Acreage Reserve may believe that they have already complied with the program fully. The provisions of the agreements remain in effect even though the payment may be made before the end of the year.

Under the Acreage Reserve, the land specifically designated by the farmer for the program may not be cropped and livestock may not be permitted to graze on it. The only exception is that winter crops for harvest in 1959 or later may be planted on the Reserve this fall.

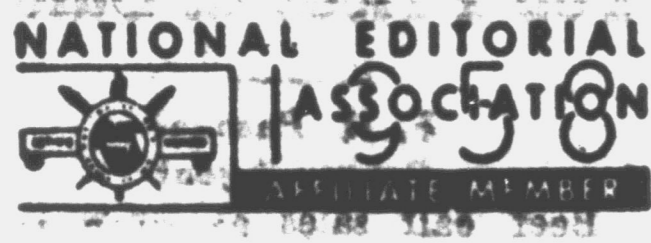

(Continued from Page 1) and Vigo are the recommended varieties of wheat to be planted for grain between October 10 and 20 to avoid infestation of the Hessian fly in this area. Sow one to 1 1-2 bushels per acre.

Soil tests really help in the fertilization of wheat. Yields vary greatly on the basis of need for phosphate and potash and lime. We can apply nitrogen as a top dressing in February but all needed phosphate, potash and lime and some nitrogen should be applied when the wheat is planted.

Practical Fire Prevention  
It is so easy for small fires to grow to big fires and so easy for us to start big fires at this time of year that we just need to work against destructive fires. We evidently do not have any safe oil now for starting fires by pouring.

## Walker Explains Convention Goals

To The Citizens of Lauderdale County:

You, as voters, will elect your delegate to the Limited Constitutional Convention at our General Election which will be held on Tuesday, November 4, 1958.

It is my privilege and pleasure to seek this office to represent Lauderdale County. As a candidate for this office, I have often been asked, what will be considered at this Limited Constitutional Convention, which will assemble in Nashville in July, 1959.

The purpose of this Convention is to alter, reform or abolish three provisions of the Constitution of Tennessee, namely:

1. Change Article IV, Section 1, so as to permit all persons eighteen years of age or over the right to vote.

2. Change Article VII, Section 1, so as to fix the term of Office of Sheriff for a period of four (4) years, with no limitation as to the number of terms that he may serve as such.

3. Change Article VIII, Section 1, so as to fix the term of Office of Trustee for a period of four (4) years.

This Convention will be limited to consideration of, and action upon only the sections and proposals as set forth.

It is the duty of the Convention to study these three proposals and to alter, reform, abolish or amend any of these three proposals after consideration and debate by the delegates.

Then each amendment to the constitution, as adopted by the Convention, shall be separately submitted to the voters of Tennessee for ratification or rejection of each amendment at an election to be called for that purpose. The official ballot to be used in this election shall be so arranged that the voters can vote separately for the ratification or rejection of each amendment.

It will be up to the people of Tennessee as to whether any change shall be made on the Constitution, for you will have the final vote on any amendment to our Constitution.

## McCord Promises to Build Hwy. 51

Former Governor Jim McCord, currently seeking the office again as the opponent of Buford Longson, has furnished the Highway Council's publicity committee with his views on improving the highway.

McCord's unsolicited statement was mailed to William A. Klutts, of Ripley, the publicity committee's chairman, who released the text without comment except to note that the Council, founded at a September meeting in Ripley to include representatives of every major community on the highway, welcomes any discussion about the road but will not choose sides politically.

McCord said he wrote because of "widespread interest in the completion of Highway 51 as a four lane highway from Memphis to the Kentucky line."

"If I am elected governor on Nov. 4," McCord's statement said, "I will see that the present plans are carried out. In addition I will instruct my Highway Commissioner to complete the gaps between Covington and Henning, Dversburg and Newbern, and Union City and Fulton. I also assure you my Highway Commissioner will be required to fulfill this commitment."

"A governor and his cabinet should never forget their responsibilities to the citizens of the state," the candidate said. "Too, they should be available to meet with mayors or civic leaders any time a conference is requested to discuss anything of public interest. If I am elected, this will be a rule."

He said he favored "an equitable expenditure of highway funds and road program without political domination."

## Today Deadline On Filing Soil Bank Applications

Chairman A. O. Chambers of the Lauderdale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers who have received farm payment rates for the 1957 Conservation Reserve that Friday, October 24, is the deadline for filing applications for contracts with the county offices.

Under the Soil Bank for 1957, the Chairman explains the first step a farmer had to take toward participating in the Conservation Reserve was to ask the County ASC Committee to establish maximum annual payment rates for his farm. The deadline for making such a request is already past.

The farmer then decides how much cropland he wants to put in the program, how long he wants his contract to run, and the rate of annual payment at which he will offer his land. This rate may be less than the maximum but not more. The farmer must contact the County ASC Office and enter this information on the application form. The completion of the application form at the County ASC Office is a step that must be taken by October 24.

Mr. Chambers points out that priority in accepting applications will be given to farmers who make the best offers. Thus, the farmer who offers land at less than the maximum rate set for his farm will have a better chance of having his application accepted if there are not enough funds available to cover all applications.

After the applications are returned to the County ASC Committee, contracts that can be accepted under the regulations will be offered to farmers for signature.

### SOD SEEDING TIME

by Earl R. West

The sod seeding machine is becoming more the usual than the unusual on many farms in Lauderdale County. Farmers are finding that the machine is economical and easy to operate. Con our sod-seeding on sloping land helps prevent erosion and supplies a fall and early spring grazing.

Mr. Taylor B. Rice has sod-seeded oats in a lespedeza and ricea stubble. He used 200 pounds 6-12-12 fertilizer and 3 bushels of oats per acre. He says he uses sod-seeding because the old sod will hold up his cows in wet weather thus giving more late fall and early spring grazing. It takes less time to sod-seed than it does to prepare a complete seedbed.

Mr. Charles O. Viar of Knob Creek Farm is sod-seeding 260 acre of lespedeza stubble to oats. He is using 42 pounds of anhydrous ammonia per acre. Mr. Viar used anhydrous ammonia under oats in 1956 and had excellent results. According to Mr. Viar sod-seeding is a cheaper operation than the usual method of seeding. He says he gets more late fall and early spring grazing from sod-seeded fields than he does from other fields.

Mr. C. S. Carney of Ribley is in the process of sod-seeding 20 acres of oats and ryegrass in a Bermuda sod. He is using 100 pounds of ammonia nitrate per

acre under the oats. Quote Mr. Carney: "My main purpose for sod-seeding is to get fall and spring grazing from a field that usually produces only summer grazing and I believe running the sod-seeder helps it."

Another outstanding farmer of Lauderdale County, Mr. W. E. Harlan, has this to say about sod-seeding. "I am sod-seeding 50 acres of small grain on lespedeza and Bermuda sod. I am using 200-300 lbs. of a complete fertilizer per acre. I start sod-seeding oats and barley around the first of October and try to finish by the 1st of November. I sod-seed wheat in November. In 1957 I sod-seeded soybeans in a Bermuda sod and combed 20-25 bushels per acre.

I have sod-seeded clover and grass to pasture where the stand had thinned. I believe any person using a sod-seeder should know and where to use the machine."

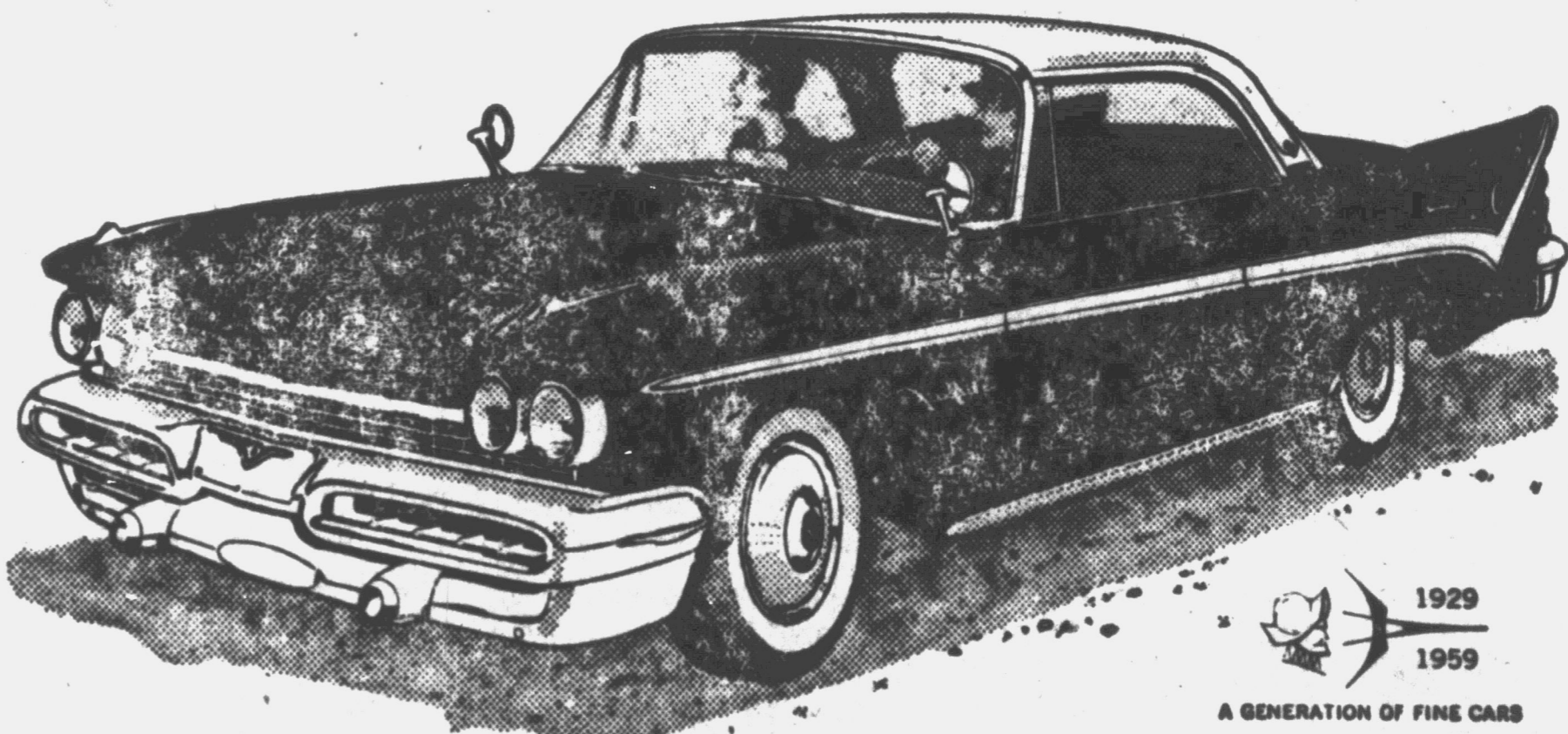

**Sunday School Lesson**

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, October 26  
Matthew 4:1-11

**"Victory in Temptation"**

The New Testament writers found much in the temptation of Jesus to give courage in life's struggles. "We have not an high priest which cannot be touched by our feelings of weakness, but

One who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin."

With our limited capacities, we find it difficult to enter into the mind of Christ. In studying the temptation of Jesus, human psychology does not help toward understanding. This was one place where the Master had to tread the winepress alone. It was a part of his preparation for his ministry, connected closely with his baptism.

We could not have known what transpired there on the lonely mountain if Jesus Himself had not told His disciples. He gave a vivid description of what happened, step by step. He stressed the fact

that the tempter's purpose was to divert Him from the course which He knew He had to follow. Our temptations are along the same line and we may learn something here that will help us.

First, bread. Bread is to satisfy His own hunger and to make His ministry a seeming benefaction to His countrymen. People in that part of the world were often hungry. They still are. The Romans brought in shiploads of wheat from Egypt to feed the hungry and keep them contented. Under His feet were the little flat stones, almost exactly like the little loaves of bread in Hebrew homes. If these were turned into bread, what a humanitarian ministry would be His!

Jesus turned it down. We hear too much about that kind of religion in our day. This "new religion," this new faith we hear so much about is a sinister perversion of the truth. It teaches "techniques of prayer" which of course means the methods of prayer that get what you want, that make you a good salesman, gives you success as a business executive, make you able to make and hold friends. Jesus said, "Man does not live by bread alone," and gave us a more exalted view of human life.

Second temptation: "Cast thyself down . . . He will give his angels charge over thee." We are tempted in like manner when we are told to take the "dare" of sin because God is merciful and will forgive. "Just this on e," the

tempter says, "try new ways, gain experience and later you may be forgiven and restored to the straight and narrow way." Jesus taught that God is merciful but that we must not tempt, or test, Him.

The third temptation was on the basis of compromise. "All these will I give you if you will fall down and worship me. This would have made strong appeal for the people who thought their Messiah would restore the kingdom of Israel. Jesus never fell into the trap of using evil ways that good might come. The end never justifies the means.

Our resource in time of temptation is the word of God.

by producing vigorous cross-bred pigs.  
Mr. Harlan plans to check the gaining ability of pigs from each sow and male and for that reason has adopted a numbering system based on notching the ears of sows and pigs.  
This system now being used for all breeds of hogs except Hampshires is based on each notch in the lower right ear counting one, and each notch in the upper right ear, counting 10, with each notch in the lower left ear counting 3, and each notch in the upper left ear counting 30; so that any number can be shown from one to 100. The usual practice is to give the pigs the same number of the mother sow. Then if a gilt is kept as a breeding animal, she is assigned a new number and notched accordingly.

**Cotton Looks Beautiful**  
Roy Carrington thinks he will make three bales of cotton per acre on the Pope cotton grown this year with two rows planted and four rows skipped. He is now picking this cotton the second time and it really was beautiful

down the rows just before he started picking.

Mr. Carrington says the Pope cotton picks easy, that it is early, and he certainly likes its yielding ability. This cotton grown on hill land which had been in cultivation for more than a hundred years was fertilized with 500 lbs. of 12-12-12 and 200 lbs. of ammonium nitrate per acre under the rows before planting and then side dressed with 100 lbs. of nitrate of soda. We'll report the final yields on this project when all the cotton is out.

Mr. Carrington tried a fertilizer test on some corn on hillland

this year. He fertilized it with 480 lbs. of 33 1-2 percent ammonium nitrate per acre and this week harvested 1300 bushels from 14 acres, which is more than twice the yield he had been getting from this land.

## Ripley Youth Killed In Crash Friday

## Cane Creek Election Next Monday

All members of the temporary board of directors of Cane Creek Watershed District were nominated to be elected a permanent directors in the election to be held at the Courthouse in Ripley next Monday afternoon November 3, from 1:00 to 4:00 P. M.

All landowners in Cane Creek Watershed from Eylau to Cherry and who are more than 21 years of age are urged to take a little time and assist in this final step toward getting this watershed district far enough along to begin actually getting money allotted, surveys made, and construction work planned.

### Weeds in Beans

Farmers and householders have a dramatic and cheap killer of broad leaf weeds in 2,4-D which works into the sap of the plant and kills susceptible plants by making them grow themselves to death.

It is now being used against cockleburrs and many other weeds in corn, since it has practically no effect on corn or other members of the grass family.

As we look over fields of soybeans now ready for harvest and see great patches of cockleburrs and other weeds standing two feet taller than the beans, we realize the need for a chemical that will kill these weeds at some stage without killing soybeans. The experiment station at Beltsville, Maryland, has tried 2,4-D on these weeds, putting it down in such a way that it does not hit the tops of the soybeans but hits the tops of the cockleburrs and other weeds and have had success in killing these weeds without injuring the soybeans.

Results have been best when the material was applied to soybeans which were about six inches tall with weeds about two inches tall. The sprayer applied the material with two nozzles with a pattern which did not allow any chemical to hit the tops of soybeans. As much as four ounces of 2,4-D per acre was used without injury, but as little as one ounce per acre in many cases will control many of these weeds. We ought to try this method on small plots until we make it work.

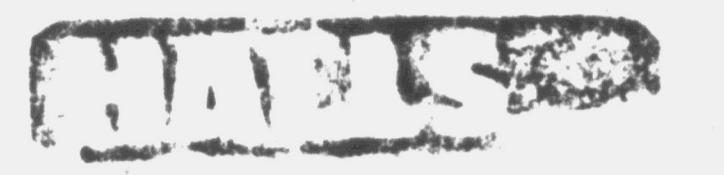

**Sunday School Lesson**

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, November 2

Mark 1: 14-22

**"The Galilean Ministry Begins"**  
Twenty years ago, just prior to the outbreak of World War, Adolph Keller wrote a little book, "Five Minutes to Tewfve." In it is found the urgency of action. Sensing that the world was in peril of change he said, "Words have come to the end of their usefulness." For Christianity "it is now or never." The world must accept the Christian way of life or perish.

Those of us who have lived through these 20 years are somewhat hardened and calloused by the changes which have come about. The spread of communism, the birth of a new nuclear age, the racial tensions everywhere in the world, swift changes in every phase of life emphasize the urgency of the hour.

We find this same urgency as we read Mark's account of the Galilean ministry. It is a gospel of action! Crisp sentences like these, "Follow me. And immediately they left their nets and followed him." Journeys, healings, teaching and the quick reaction of men: "He taught as one who had authority." Jesus did not set up an office or go into solitude to write books. His call was a call to action.

His public ministry immediately took on three characteristics. First, it was a ministry of preaching. He was bringing heaven's message and calling on men everywhere to repent. Second, it was a ministry of mercy, healing the sick, comforting the sorrowing, feeding the hungry. Third, it was a ministry of teaching, meant for the whole world but particularly for His own followers.

The church find here the pattern for her ministry. The church is His living body in which He carries on His ministry today. He has no hands but our hands, no feet but our feet, no heart of compassion but our hearts. If we fail Him in consecration and activity, His cause suffers.

First, preaching. We can never have a moratorium on preaching as was suggested a few years ago. It is the church' first business to proclaim the Lordship of Christ to a confused world. "Ye are His witnesses." As he revealed the Father so we must reveal His eternal purpose.

In the ministry of mercy, the modern church fails most of all. We are too content to comfort ourselves in the luxury of our faith. There are needy people all about us. We render a merciful service thru homes for orphans, hospitals and other institutions. But what is needed is more congregational activity in ministering to the sick, the poor, the unfortunate, the discouraged. The church can render its best service in helping those driven mad by the stresses and anxieties of modern living.

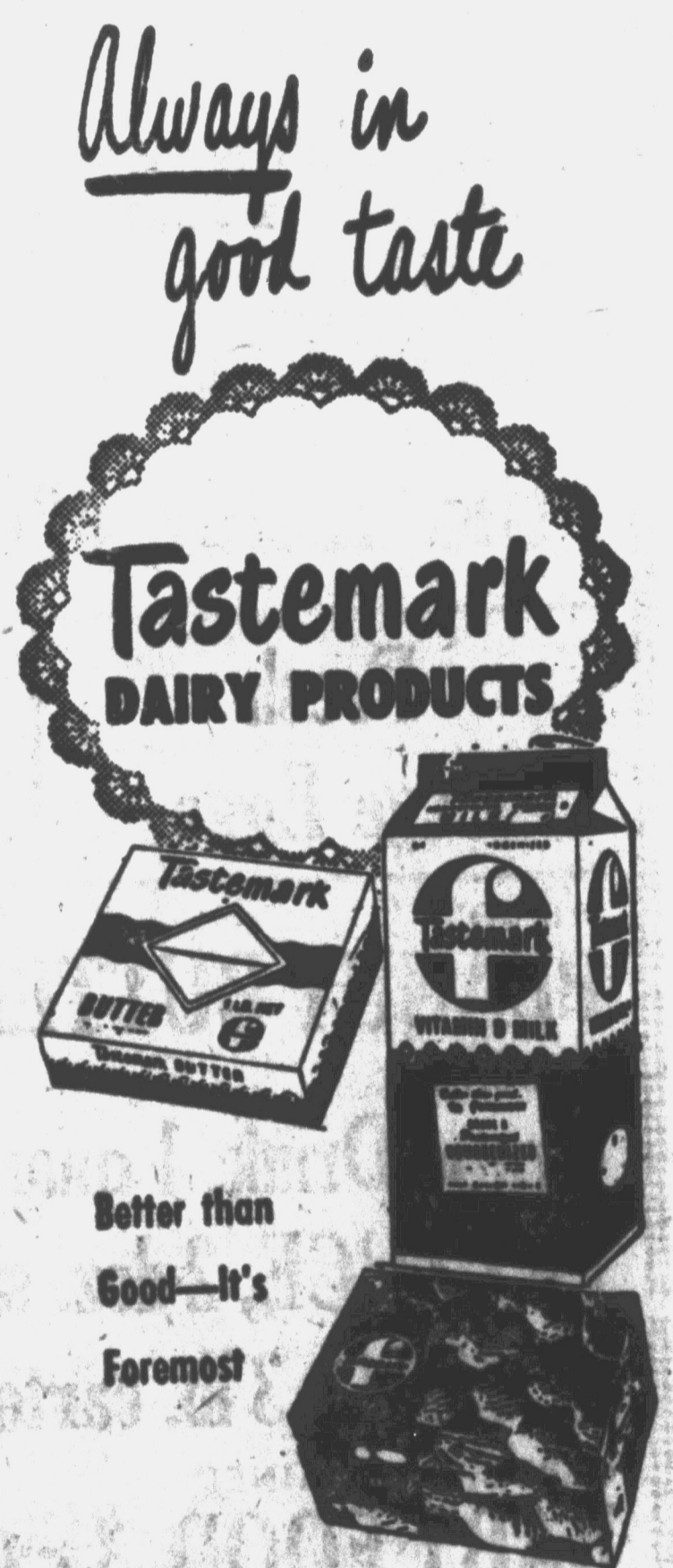

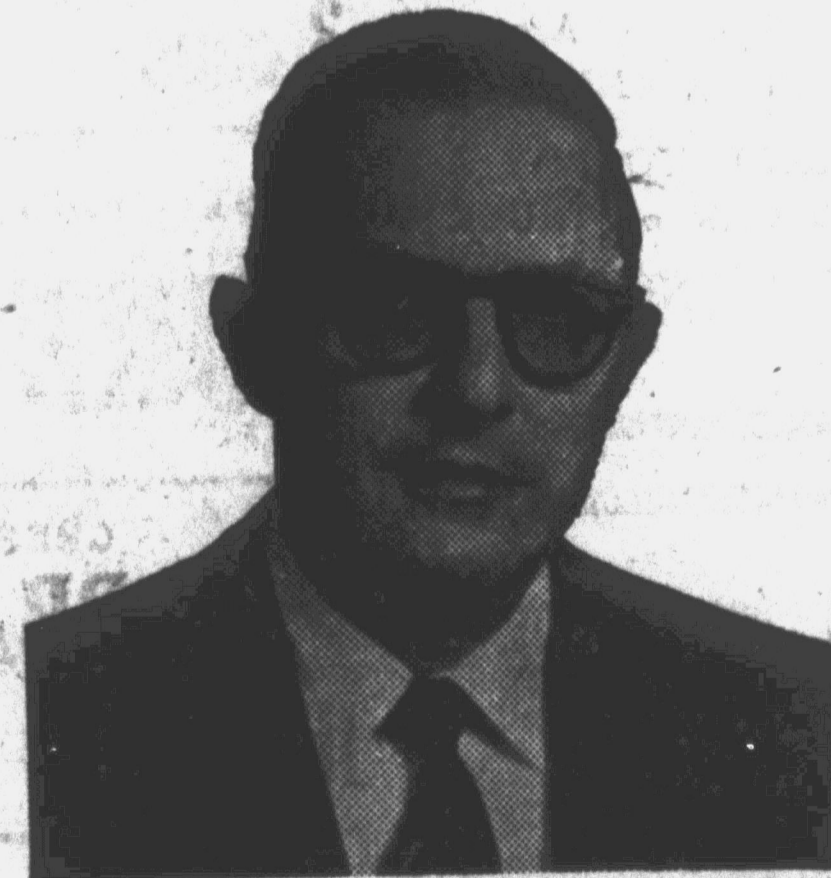

 Many soybeans fields which do not have these weeds have been hoed at great expense and effort. The chemical method would be much cheaper, if we can make it work without injuring the beans.

**Meet Rats Halfway**

As nights get cooler rats begin moving in toward buildings to be near food supplies and shelter for the winter.

We need to accommodate them with some of the wonderful new baits available which can really eliminate them if we keep it available to them for an extended period of time.

These new baits are sold under about 300 different brand names. There are about four different chemicals, but they all kill in about the same way and are very effective, because a rat which is consuming enough bait to be killed does not give any nervousness to many nervousness or other unusual actions. The rats like the bait and will keep eating it until the last one on the place is destroyed, provided it is supplied with enough bait.

It is better to kill rats now before they have done so much damage and before they get their houses so well in order inside buildings.

Rats peddle disease, destroy food and feed, cut insulation from wires to cause destructive fires, and otherwise cost us real money.

Four-H boys with swine programs should prepare your hogs for the coming winter by applying principles which will promote rapid growth and the improving of the sanitation around the hog lots.

One of the most urgent things needing to be done right away is to worm any pigs as well as sows. Getting rid of worms costs very little and compared to the amount of feed it saves, you come out way ahead. Feeding the pigs in troughs instead of on the ground will cut down on the number of worm eggs eaten. There are many safe and practical commercial preparations on the market containing piperazine and hydromycin
