





Mr. James also reported on a 3year test at Sikeston, Mo., on sandy soil to determine the value of bedding land for cotton as compared to planting it flat. The cotton planted on beds as we plant most of ours made 238 lbs. of seed cotton per acre more than the land planted flat. A low bed is desirable in all types of mechanized operations.

We cannot tell exactly how much these experiments mean for our soils and our conditions, but they do provide definite indications that each operation in cotton production can materially affect the final yields and profits. Best yields are achieved by a combination of good practices from fertilization to harvesting.




