**Sunday School Lesson**

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, April 5, 1959

I Samuel 7:5-16

"Someone has said that without history men would be forever children. We learn from the past and it is folly to close our eyes to history. Santayana, the philosopher, said, 'A nation that does not know history is fated to repeat it.' Hebrew history has an unusual purpose in that it seeks to record the way of God with men.

For nearly 200 years, Joshua to Samuel, the people of Israel had been struggling to maintain their footing in Canaan. About 1030 B. C. their very existence was threatened. They were in danger of losing all the fruits of conquest and colonization. During this period of the Judges, they had fought with numerous enemies and now the Philistines were about to become their complete masters. The need of the hour was a leader who could awaken new forces among the people, unite them, and lift the national life to a higher level.

Samuel was raised up for this purpose. He was a "gift" baby in answer to Hannah's prayer. Trained in the temple, he was God's man from the beginning. His work was to restore the religious life of the people. "He was both a political and moral reformer — an organizer of new forces, a man of great executive ability, a judge and a prophet." His was not a military role, but he was a real founder of a nation, strengthened moral fiber and loyalties, and preparing

the way for the empire. "We have sinned against God." This was his interpretation of the situation. The kind of leadership a nation has plays a great part in its life. The low estate of Israel is shown in the life of Eli and his two wicked sons (I Samuel, 2:22-36). Samuel knew that the nation's survival rested upon its religious life. Idolatry, acquired from the surrounding people, had to be uprooted. The cycle of Jewish history revealed in the Old Testament unspools like this: disloyalty to God, oppression, repentance, deliverance. When the people "cried unto the Lord," He came to their rescue. Threatened now by the invading Philistines, they fasted, prayed, poured water upon the ground as a symbol of their weakness, their undoing. Even as Samuel prayed, "the Lord thundered with a mighty voice" and the Philistines were confused and beaten. It was a custom among this religious people that wherever they met God or His power was manifest on their behalf, they built an altar in commemoration of His love. Crossing the Jordan, stones were carried ashore and an altar built (Joshua 4:1-7). Here Samuel set up a stone and called it Ebenezer. What Samuel said probably was this: "This is a witness that the Lord helped us." We cannot get away from the truth as revealed in Israel's history. When men forsake God and His truth, defeat and enslavement is their lot. The principle is made clear in Jeremiah 18. The Lord is the Potter; the nations are clay in His hands. If He says of any nation, "I will break down and destroy," and if that nation turns from its evil ways, "I will repent of the evil which I intended to do to it." Likewise, if His purpose

is to plant and build up a nation, and if it turns to evil He withdraws His saving plans. The old Greeks were law-abiding. And loving liberty, they were tough and heroic in its defense. When they became "soft" and wanted security more than they wanted freedom, they lost both freedom and security.

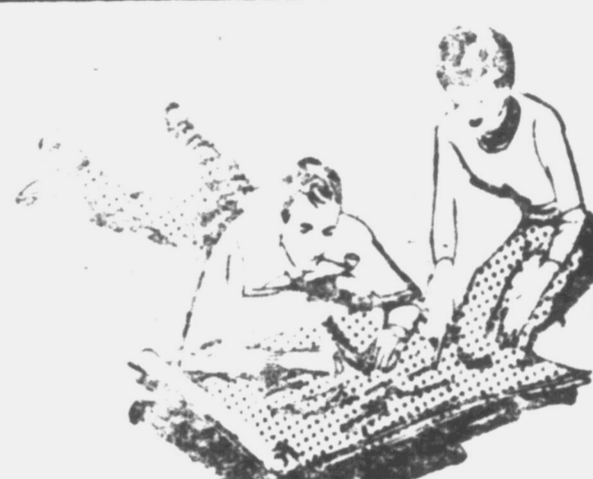

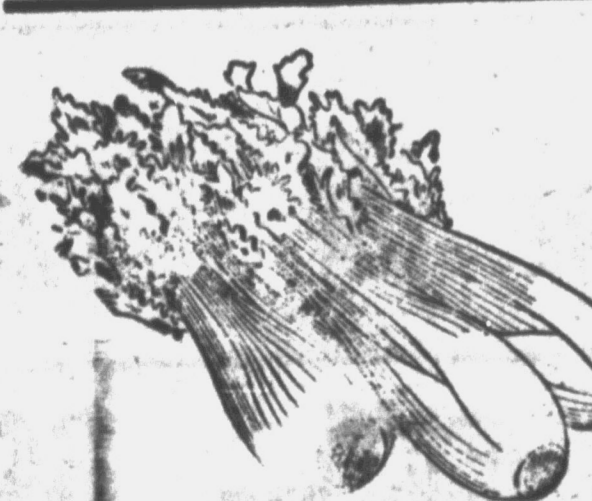

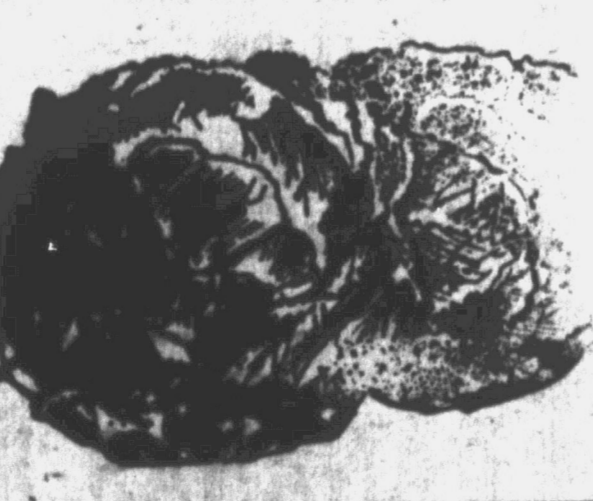

**PAINT POINTERS**

Paint over wallpaper? Certainly, if you wish, just so long as the paper is well bonded to the wall. Ideal for the purpose is rubber base paint. It goes on fast and easy with brush or roller, covers plaster, wallboard or wallpaper solidly. In half an hour it dries to a lovely, low-luster finish. Any "holidays"—that is, small areas you have missed—can be touched in later without showing.

After rubber base paint has cured for a couple of weeks, finger marks and smudges can be wiped off in a wink.

Several tips: Some wallpapers become very porous upon aging and may need two coats. Beware of metallic inks or water-soluble dyes that stain through the film. Insure your success by first trying a test area in an inconspicuous place. If, after an hour, staining results, apply coat of primer-sealer and then proceed with rubber wall paint.

Warning: Rubber base paint spreads so easily some people tend to put on too thin a coat which may not cover adequately. It's an economical material but don't try to get more mileage from it than the manufacturer recommends on the label.

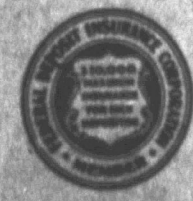

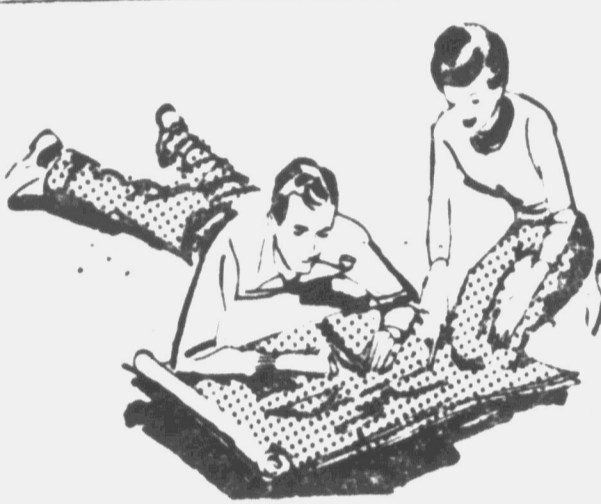

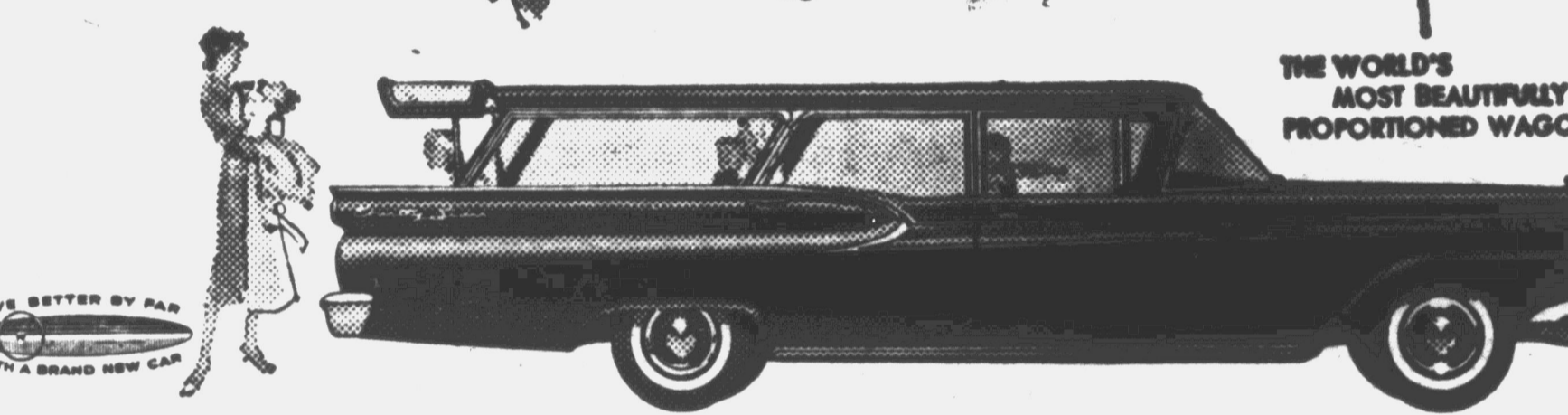

Sunday School Lesson

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, April 19, 1959

(I Samuel 15:17-26)

"Saul's Tragic Failure"

Israel's first king was one of the strangest characters in history. Saul had many qualities worthy of admiration. He had "the genius to be loved." People were bound to him in great loyalty throughout his lifetime. Even after his death, the bravest among his men who survived the battle rescued his body from shame.

In many respects he was a great king. During his reign the secret of iron smelting was wrested from the Philistines. An early iron plowshare was discovered in his fortress at Gibeon. Both agriculture and modes of warfare took great strides during his reign.

In spite of all this Saul became a broken man. His trouble was in his personal relationship with the Lord. He was disobedient and so was rejected. He tried to make amends. Conscious that the Lord had withdrawn His favor, he became morose, subject to fits of

anger and melancholy. There is something terrifying in the inex-

orableness of the divine judgement upon him. He found no place for repentance and restoration. He refused to accept the divine decree, and that produced in him a disordered mind and a contradictory character.

Saul failed because he did not keep his eyes on the main goal. As head of the tribes of Israel, he was responsible for creating a nation - a nation of honor. The trouble was that seeing the "spoils" of war Israel seized upon them as the rewards of their campaign.

It is here that men and nations fail. The purpose of government is not economic prosperity and ease. It is the development of a people into greatness. Our freedoms are too great a price to pay for national prosperity. The vital contrast between Karl Marx and any Christian statesman is that Marx centers all in economics, while for us the vital thing is freedom, justice, truth, integrity, the right of every individual to make the most of his life.

Saul whipped the devil around the stump in saying that the people took the spoils of war for sacrifice (20-21). He was blaming the transgression on the people, and justifying it in the name of religion. That, of course, was a perversion of religion. His thinking was like that of today when they try to justify shady business tactics by giving liberally to charity.

Correcting that perversion, Samuel laid down a principle which was echoed by Amos, Isaiah, Jer-

miah and other prophets: "To obey is better than sacrifice." Samuel made a keen analysis of human sin in saying, "Stubbornness is as idolatry." Stubbornness puts a

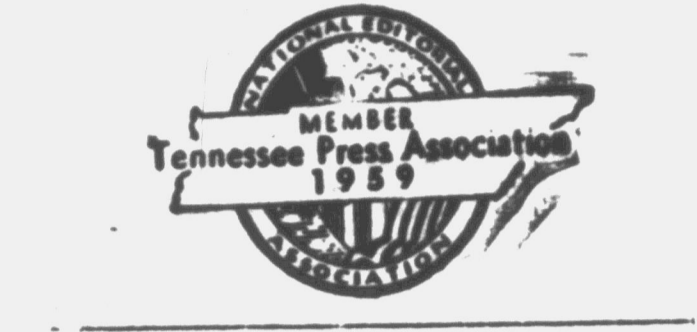

of such historic characters as Cyrus, Alexander, Julius Caesar. But we do know David — his loves, his hates, his weakness, his prayers, his home-life and much of his personal appearance. He was endowed with varied talents, and his success in many fields is still the wonder of men. In the music of his day he was master in three lines — instrumental, voice, composition. In literature, no one surpasses him as a poet. Far more people read David than Shakespeare. In warfare, he combined courage with fine military strategy. In statesmanship, he took a loose confederation of tribes and welded them into a mighty kingdom. Memory of him is so vivid after all the centuries, that people "like" or "dislike" David as if he were a contemporary character.

David's rise began early. A shepherd lad of unusual ambition and ability, he cultivated qualities of character that make him a fine example for youth today. The description given in Samuel 16:12 presents him as handsome, with reddish-brown hair and flashing eyes. He was the most loved character in Jewish history.

Music has ever had its charms. It was this talent that brought David within the royal family. His music helped calm the king's troubled spirit. The slaying of the giant with the slingshot made him a hero. His praise was on all lips. Saul was jealous. When David returned from a successful campaign, the women of the kingdom, as was the custom of the time, welcomed him with singing and dancing. They probably didn't mean it so, but they made their song too full of praise. With jealous anger Saul said, "What more can he have but the kingdom?"

The case of Saul makes an interesting study. Modern psychiatrists might explain his mental storms as due to a feeling of insecurity. The Bible says they were due to a guilt feeling and the withdrawal of God's Spirit. There can be no doubt that man's spiritual attitude has much to do with success, with mental and physical health. Saul was a defeated man because his spiritual life had soured. He thought that popular acclaim was his right. Was he not king? He was self-centered and could allow no honor to go to another. It produced murder in his heart.

By contrast, David's abilities, personality and reputation "flowered in the sunshine of God's favor." As he went in and out before the people, he grew in stature. He was generous and forgiving and when the occasion presented itself he refused to lift a hand against the life of Saul. "Popularity

is potential power for good or evil." Of course providence played its part in his life, but he allowed himself to be used of God. Man's wisest course is to give God a chance to make the most of his life.
