Farm Records Help

Eugene Gambill and Clinton Shelby did an excellent job teaching a Farm Account School at the Armory last week.

In answer to the question, why keep records, Mr. Shelby explained that they are good for tax purposes, for credit purposes, to improve the farm business, and to provide a record of important events and transatcions.

He said the essentials of e record are (1) farm expenses, (2) farm receipts, (3) farm inventories, (4) summary, (5) production records, and (6) labor records.

Mr. Gambill suggested that in order to do a good job of keeping records we (1) have a place to work, (2) have a place to keep papers, (3) make entries when they occur, (4) give the details, and (5) make entries in the right places. More than 3100 record books have been mailed to farm families in Lauderdale County this year. They can help us have running water and bathrooms in more farm homes. Billy, the oldest of the boys when they were stricken, died at the age of 11 in 1951. Benny, the youngest, died in 1957, also at the age of 11.


