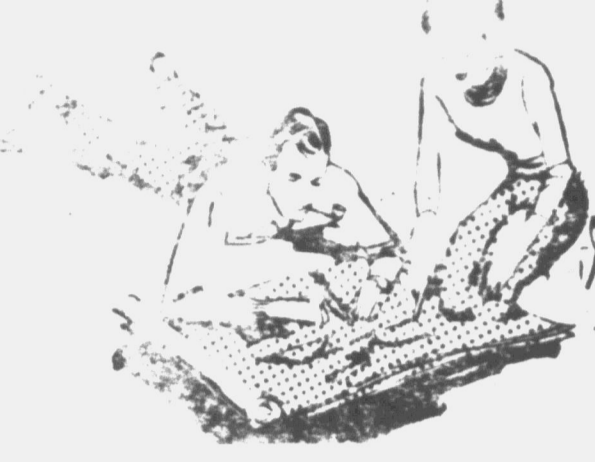

certified so that plants could be dug from them the following year. The regulations now require that the strawberry producer request inspection in early spring. If the plants are inspected again in the fall, if all requirements are met up to that time the grower is allowed to sell plants the following spring, provided he leaves a designated square of plants untouched for further inspection the following spring.

Growers should appreciate the effort that is being made to pro-

vide disease-free plants. At the same time, the growing of plants for certification is much more troublesome than heretofore. Growers who want to produce certified plants should notify the County Agent's Office or write John Hammett, 4407 Ferndale Drive at Memphis and request inspection now.



Down on the Farm

With ED JONES

An analysis of the results obtained through plantings and a tabulation of results certainly have high praise for some of our new hybrid sorghums, milo and grasses such as sudan and millet. It will be worth your while as well as your pocket book to make in-

quiry regarding these new varieties. Most of our Experiment Stations in the south have made planting comparisons of many of these varieties. There have also been many tests made by breeders to determine their ability when compared with older open pollinated.

It is near the time to figure your needs and make every effort to secure the seeds which will give you best results. A few cents per pound difference in the cost of seed need not be considered when a particular variety will out produce or be more disease resistant. A study should also be made to see what additional results may be obtained through use of more fertilizer. In these days of higher labor costs and increased cost of operation all corners need be out — thereby making net income greater.

The Department of Agriculture has said that net farm income will be lower this year due to increased costs and the lowering of some of the support prices and with such a prediction staring the farmers in the face, these things need more consideration than usual. It is not too late to change some plans provided you feel that

your original plans were not as good as they should have been. The wise man is willing to make changes, whereas others like to cling to their own ideas and never actually get far in life.

A Good Idea
The next 45 to 60 days is a good time to consider selling brood sows. Profits will be lower on pigs this fall but the authorities say that prices on sows will be good throughout the summer months. Cull those who are not prolific and good mothers.

Lack of Rain Hurts Cotton Stands

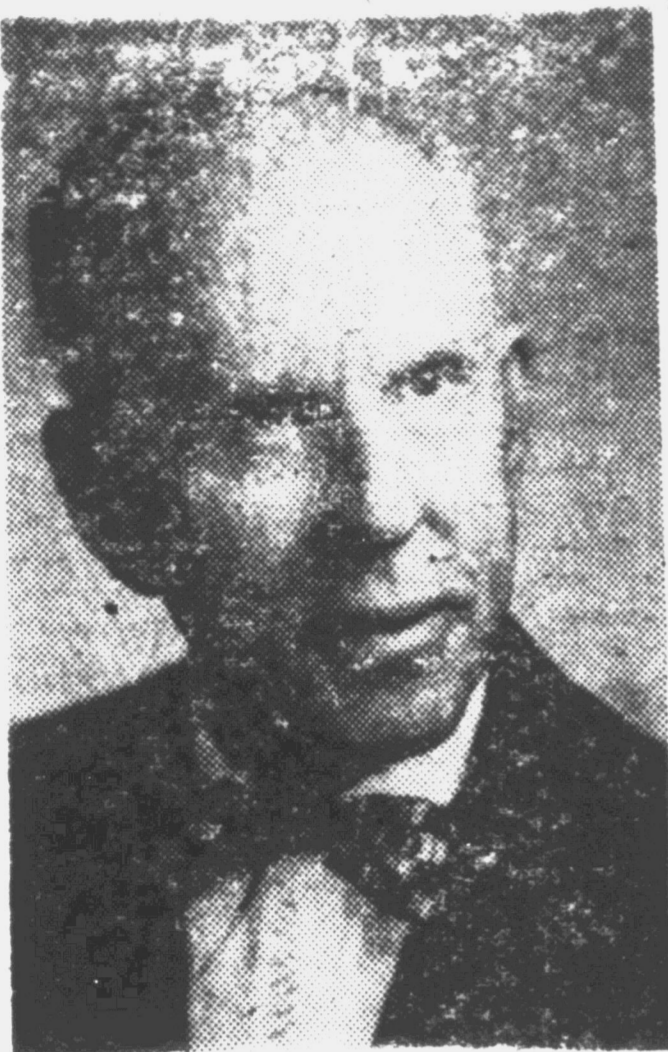

The question of cotton stands still has farmers "sitting on the edge of their chairs" as the saying goes. Even where stands appear to be satisfactory, moisture and warmth are needed for life and growth of the cotton.

The record of soil temperatures kept over the past few days indicates that when the soil is dry on top, the heat of the sun during the day is not stored to lift the soil temperature for the next day. Even when day-time temperatures got above 80 degrees, soil temperatures remained at 60. In fact the soil temperatures at 7:00 a. m. did not get up to 60 degrees until May 3, 4 and 5.

It appears that soil temperatures at a depth of six inches actually measure soil moisture as well as temperature, in the final analysis, and that it may prove to be a sound method of determining just when to plant cotton. At the same time, other conditions must be taken into account, because we cannot plant all our cotton on the same day or even in a period of four or five days; so we still have to use judgement and good methods to get good stands of cotton at first planting or even on second trial.

Farmers who have been most successful in getting stands have been careful to prepare seedbeds while conserving moisture as much as possible and then firming the land before planting and packing it more after planting.

Urges Farmers to Check Corn Prices

Farmers with corn, soybeans, or both under 1958 price support loans should watch market prices closely in the next few weeks for opportunities to redeem their crops above the loan level.

Prospects for redemption are particularly good in the case of corn which is under non-commercial or non-commercial area loans. Loans on soybeans mature May 31. Farm stored corn under loan and purchase agreement in Tennessee matures May 1 and corn under warehouse-stored loan matures July 31.

To compare the loan value with the market price in his particular area, the farmer needs to make allowance for various settlement factors such as interest, shrinkage, delivery charges, and, in the case of corn, cost of shelling. If a farmer is in any doubt about how to figure these factors, questions can be addressed to his ASC community committeeman or county office.

A farmer who redeems his price support loan when the local market will return him a profit is using the price support program as it was intended. The support rate puts a floor under prices to protect farmers from low harvest prices and enable them to hold for the higher prices that usually exist in the later marketing year.

County Court Veto On Bond Issue

LAUDERDALE COUNTY'S Quarterly Court Monday voted 14-13 against submitting to popular referendum a proposed \$425,000 bond issue for school construction.

The vote came during a special session called to consider the Board of Education's bond proposal. Under the terms of the call, no other business was brought up. The bond issue, killed for the present, would have benefited schools:

Included in it were: One hundred and forty-five thousand dollars to construct a consolidated Negro school at Three Points, near Henning, with eight classrooms, cafeteria and gymnasium, which would have absorbed five present schools — Rosewald, Cherry, Fort Pillow, El Canaan and Lynn.

One hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars to construct a gymnasium-sport building serving the Lauderdale County High School for Negroes.

Sixty-five thousand dollars for additions to the Halls Negro Consolidated School needed to enable the consolidation with this school of the 4-teacher school at Gates and a two-teacher school at Knob Creek.

Twenty-five thousand dollars to convert the old Halls High School gymnasium for auditorium use.

Twenty-five thousand dollars for acquisition of the site at Three Points and for equipment for all of the projects.

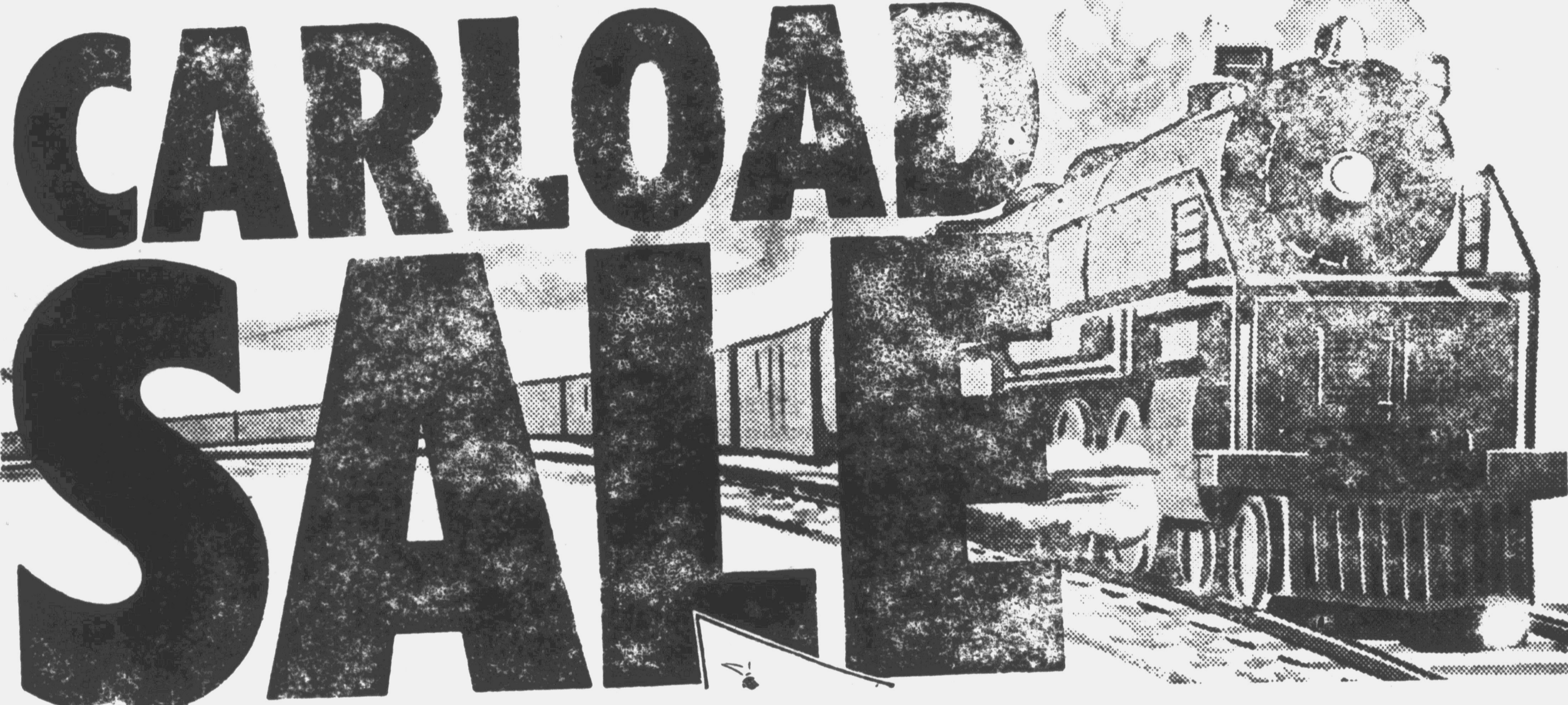

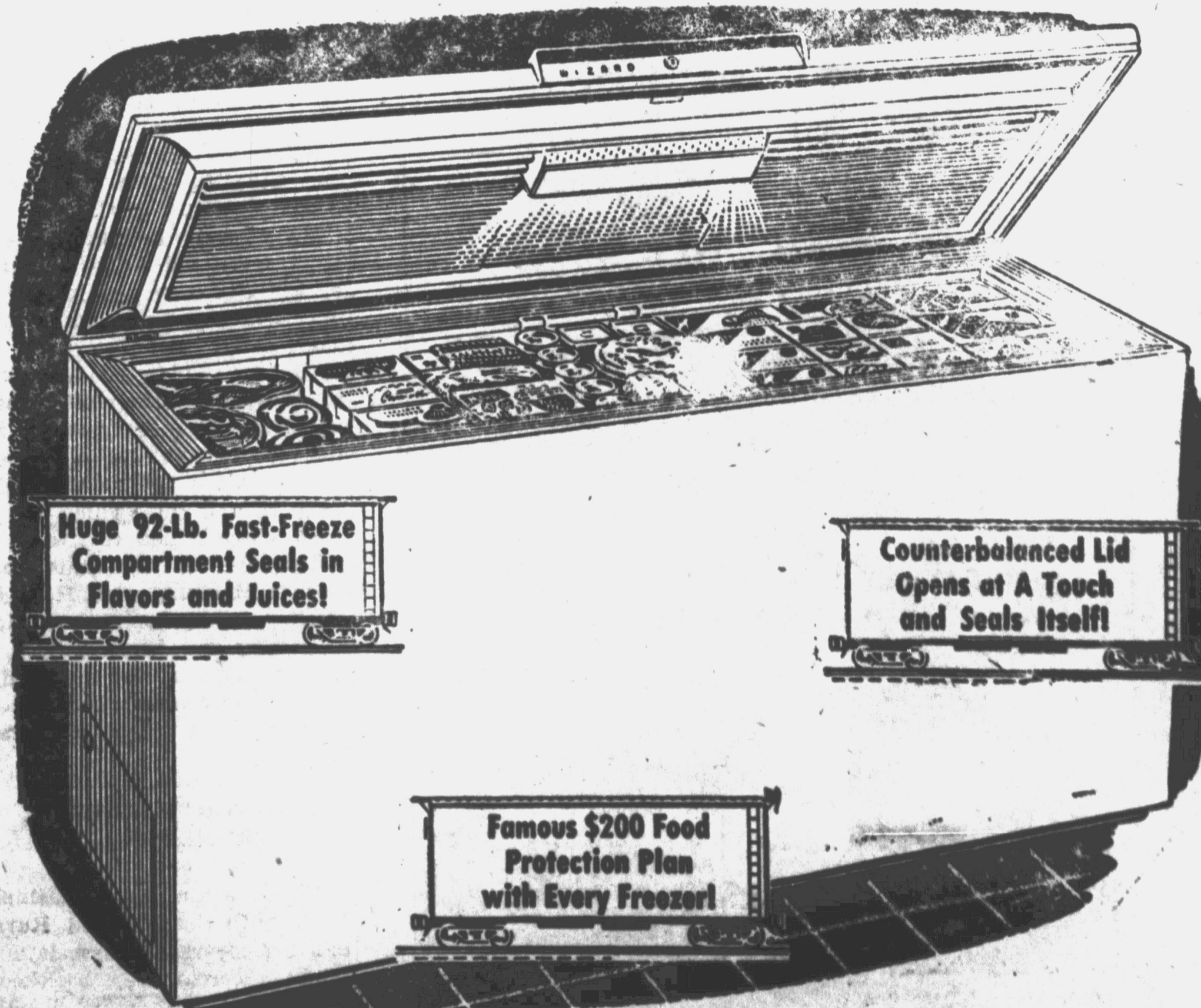

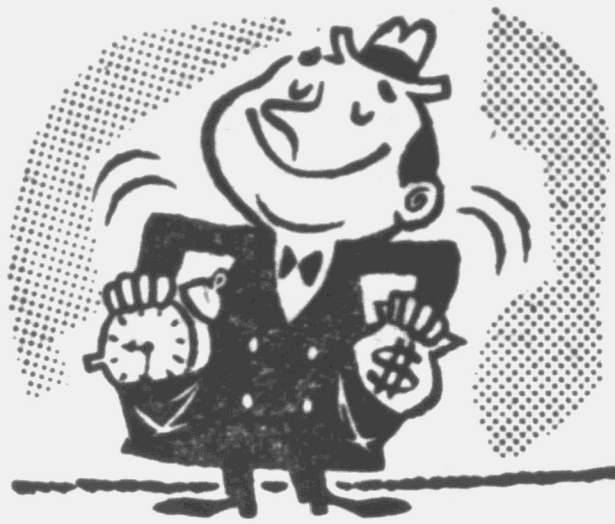

for a king, moved by a covetous fancy, to take the wife of any subject. The lesson Nathan taught was that Israel's king ought to have higher standards than those of surrounding monarchs. Duty is often difficult, Nathan's task was both unpleasant and dangerous. The Prophet and the King were friends (read 2 Samuel 7:1-7; 12:1-25). Nathan might well have forfeited his life by upbraiding the King. He could have reasoned, "the deed is done, Nothing I could do would change things." He did wait nearly a year before venturing his task. Too often we put off doing the things we ought to do. The word courage comes from a Latin word meaning "heart." We must be stout-hearted in doing our duty. Nathan was firm, but kind-hearted. When we must rebuke wrong we accomplish more by being respectful. He began in a field of thought well known to the King. He knew his man, knew that deep in the King's heart was love of justice. He had studied out a beautiful parable, that of the

poor man's lamb, his only one, pet of the entire household. A rich man, preparing meat for a guest, passed by his own flock and seized this precious lamb of the poor. The King's anger rose within him, as Nathan knew it would. Then with prophetic urgency Nathan said, "Thou art the man." Oh King, we are sorry you have done this awful thing. David was touched, saw his sin, confessed and asked forgiveness. But here we meet one of life's hardest problems. When sin is forgiven it doesn't always mean that the penalty is set aside. "The Lord has put away your sin; you shall not die. Nevertheless, the child will not die. Nevertheless the child does sometimes affect the inno-

cent. A drunken driver may inflict death upon others. Sin is never a mere personal affair. Others are involved. It is never correct to say that any man's sins are only against himself. The heading of Psalm 51 says it is a psalm of David, written in this very hour of his humiliation. His sin became as real as physical substance. It is like blood that stains the hands or dirt that soils clothing. That is why he used such words as wash, cover, blot out, cleanse, remove. There are times when we ourselves use his prayer, "My sin is ever before me ... blot out all my iniquities ... create within me a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within me."

Going on your vacation soon? Take a tip from leading safety authorities—have your tires checked.

Tire failure on the highway, which at worst can spell disaster and at best is an irritating and costly delay in vacation travel, may well have been started by hitting a hole in the road last winter. Virtually invisible bruises in the reinforcing fabric of your tires are potential blowouts and may have been aggravated by this spring's long wet spell.

Mix these seemingly unrelated factors with flexing and heat during that fast trip down the turnpike, and all the conditions needed for tire failure are present and working in concert.

Here are some tips which will help increase your chances for a safe trip.

1. Check your tread — "bald" tires are dangerous.
2. Use correct air pressure. Under-inflation causes excessive flexing which generates heat, one of the major enemies of a tire.
3. Have your wheel bal-

ance and alignment checked. Unbalanced tires wear unevenly.

If your tires have run for any distance, it's a good idea to have a competent service-man dismount them and check inside the casing for cuts, breaks, or other damage. This may lay your car up for a day and cost several dollars, but the added safety measure can be well worth the expense. The place to discover "hidden damage" is the service station—not the turnpike.

If any deficiencies show up, obviously you don't want to try to make an old tire do for your trip. Equipping your car with nylon cord tires is your best protection against hidden damage because nylon has proven more resistant to impact, flexing, heat, and moisture than any other tire cord.

One final word: Whether your tires are new or old, don't abuse them. Avoid "drag" starts, screeching stops, and high-speed turns. Don't ride on pavement edges or speed on rough roads. Take care in parking not to pinch tires against curbs.

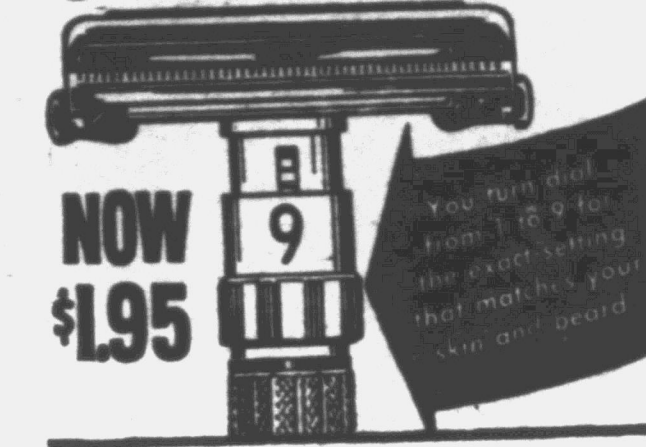

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Walter C. Davis, D. D., Tennessee School of Religion, University of Tennessee

Lesson for Sunday, May 31, 1959

(I King 19:9-18)
"Elijah, God's Warrior"

The pastor was harassed over the division in his flock. The issue was not important but the personalities were. Mr. Biggs, well-to-do and inclined to boss his little church, feeling his own importance gave his final answer: "Unless the thing is done this way, I and my family will leave the church."

Of course when a man is swayed by self-importance, the church is better off without him. Elijah was not that sort of man, but he was wrong when he said all others had forsaken God and "I, even I only, am left." Read the dramatic story in I Kings 17, 18, 19. It is not dull reading.

A half century had elapsed since the division of the kingdom on the death of Solomon. One wicked king had followed another. Ahab had married to a Phoenician princess, Jezebel. This seemed a stroke of good fortune that would tie the nation in with its northern neighbor. But Jezebel had a mind of her own and brought her alien religion and 400 prophets of Baal with her, determined to supplant the worship of God in Israel. She forced her husband to build a shrine to this god.

Suddenly Elijah the Tishbite appeared, coming from Gilead east of Jordan. Rugged in stature, wearing a rough garment of hair-cloth, his facial expression fierce and stern, he no doubt appeared to be the haughty queen as a mad-man of the desert — shaggy, unwashed, rude, repulsive. He made no speech, offered no apology, and in a few burning words announced the punishment for the nation's apostasy — "no dew nor rain" but by my word.

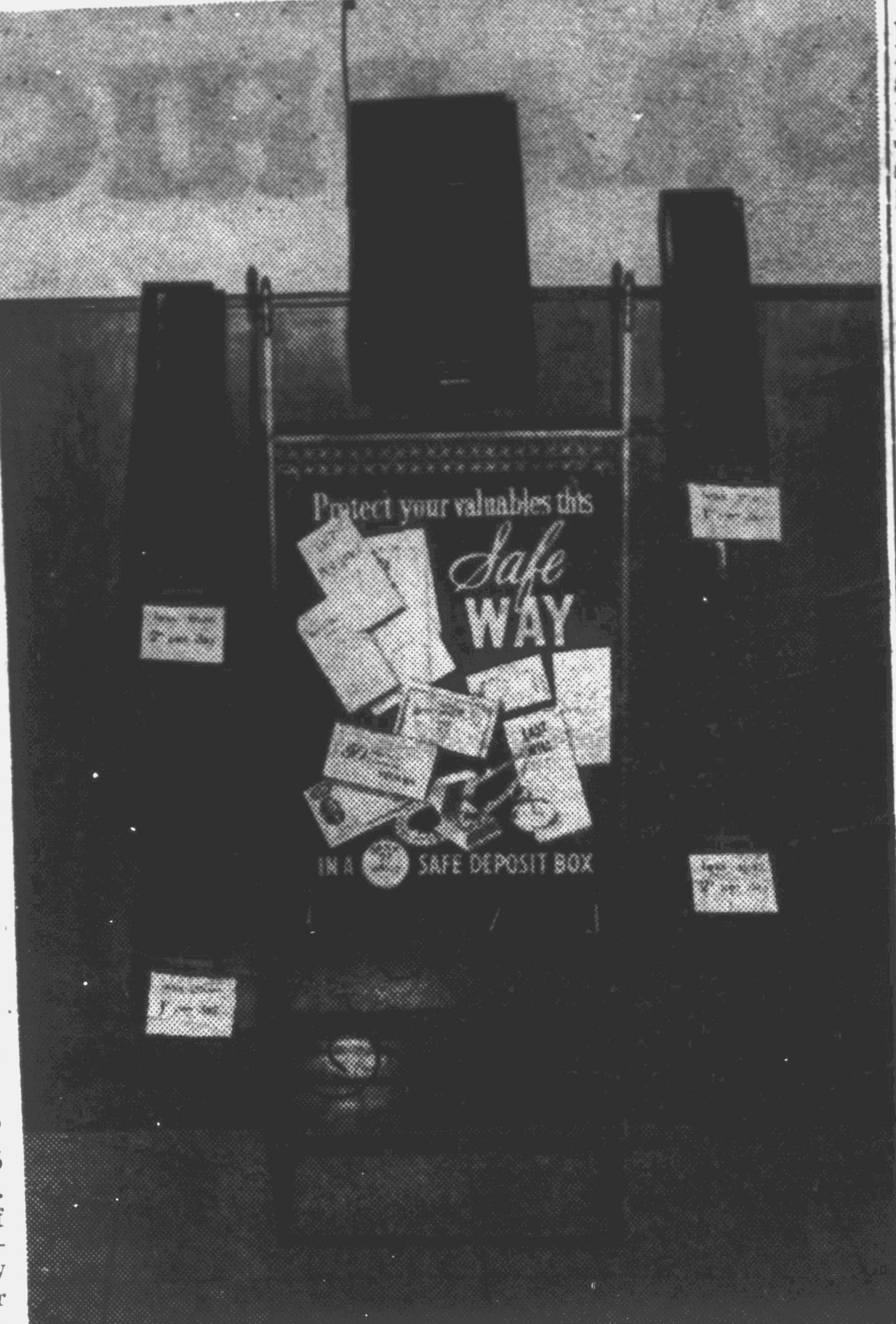

The die was cast. Henceforth it was a struggle between God and Elijah on one side and the king and queen and 400 prophets of Baal on the other. It reached a climax in Carmel but did not end there. Fittingly our lesson calls him "God's Warrior."

Bold as he was he trembled before the furious Jezebel. He fled for his life from the heights of Carmel to the lonely fastnesses of the wilderness. We can understand, for we ourselves often pass from moments of elation to discouragement and despair. Many a preacher, after an impassioned appeal, feels that he has failed in the crucial hour.

Elijah had to learn that God's kingdom does not come in picturesque display of power. So in the wilderness vision, the Lord was not in the wind that rent the mountain, not in the earthquake, not in the fire, but in the still small voice. In relating this the Prophet makes plain that the Lord corrected him, deflated his feeling of self-importance, sent him on his mission. There were 7,000 others in Israel who had not bowed the knee nor kissed the image of Baal.

The kingdom of God does not require seeming great victories, but faithful performance of humble Christians everywhere. One greater than Elijah said, "The kingdom of God cometh not by outward show, neither do men say, lo here or lo there. The kingdom of God is within you."

Thank God for the victories of Billy Graham. But he himself would tell you that it means far more when in 10,000 churches people like you and me practice pure and undefiled religion, caring for others in their afflictions and keeping ourselves unstained from the world.

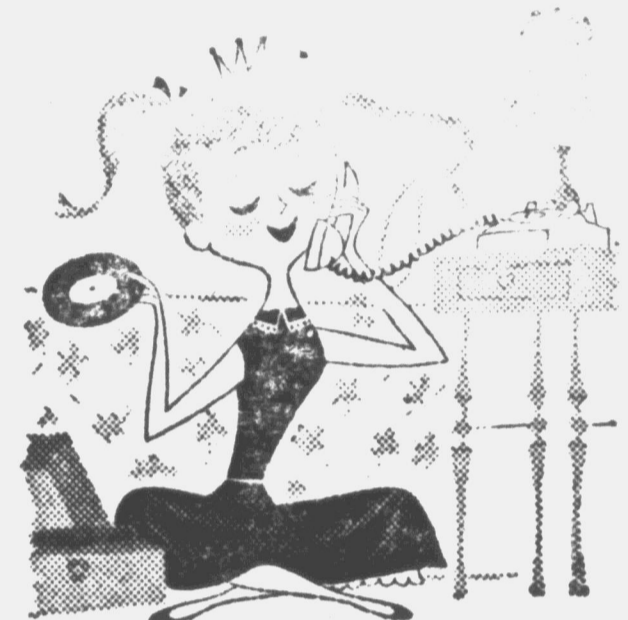

Many farmers believe that nitrate of soda is a much better fertilizer for cotton than is ammonium nitrate or anhydrous ammonia, but they do not believe it will pay them to use 500 lbs. of soda per acre. We suggest that they try one acre at that rate and keep account of the yield next fall.

Other farmers believe in soda and ammonium nitrate and ammonia, but they do not think it profitable to use 80 to 100 lbs. of actual nitrogen per acre on corn and cotton. Trying one acre at those rates can be an interesting experience which can be profitable.

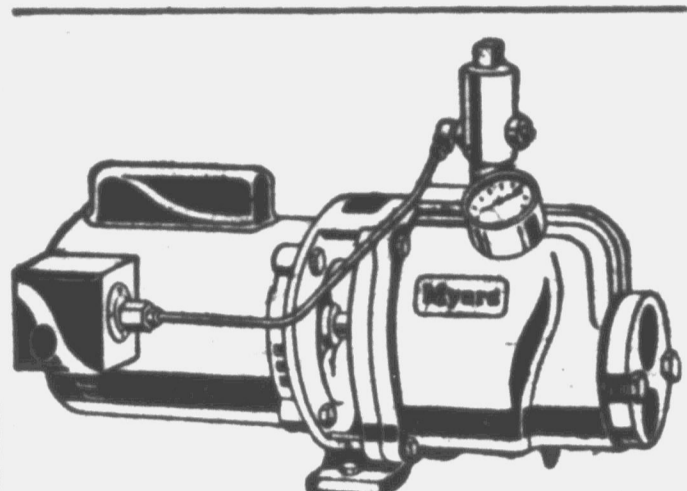

Where blossom-end rot of tomatoes has occurred before, the trouble can be corrected by spreading around each plant cup of hydrated lime and digging it into the soil.

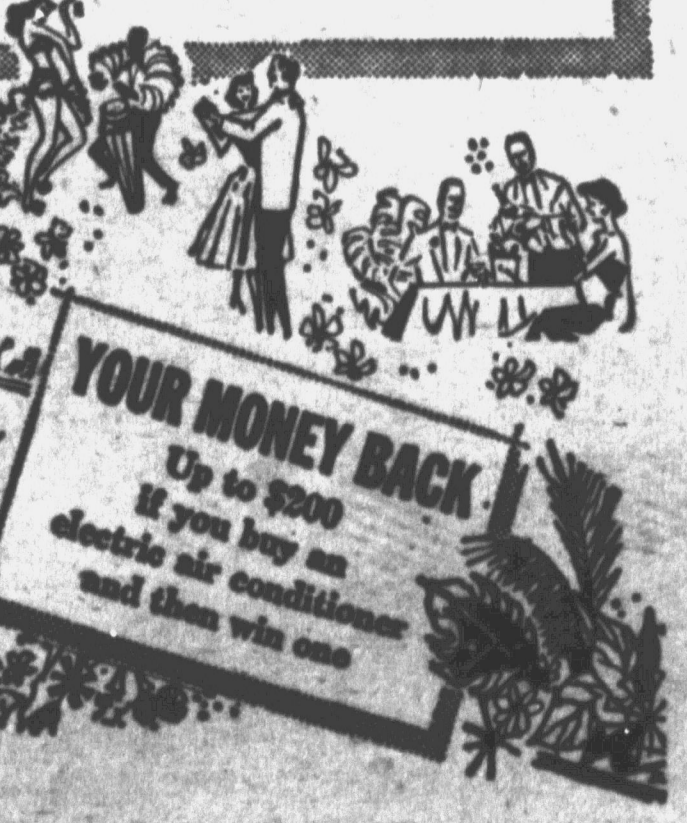
