## Area Development Association Takes Shape For County

**James Fitzhugh Is Elected As President For Group; Richard Lazure's 'Veep'**

James Fitzhugh, mayor of Ripley and cashier of the Bank of Ripley, was made president, Richard Lazure, farm leader and member of the agricultural committee of the County Court, vice-president, and F. H. Paschal secretary of the Lauderdale Area Development Association, organized at a meeting at the Farm Bureau building in Ripley last Thursday night.

A total of 31 county leaders, representing industrial commissions, civic clubs, the school board, city governments, banks, the welfare service, the Farm Bureau, and other county-wide organizations heard Joe Winsett, of the University of Tennessee, explain the methods by which area development has helped in other localities. The group voted to complete the organization, and elected permanent officers, and authorized the president to appoint additional committee heads.

The people of Lauderdale County are fortunate in having fertile soils and many excellent educational and service institutions, but they need more jobs and more income for a higher standard of living. It is hoped that this area development approach can help achieve some of these worthy objectives.

**Cocklebur Control Tried**  
Several chemical companies are selling a chemical which is a variation of first cousin to 2,4-D. These chemicals are being recommended for killing cockleburs in soy beans without reducing the yields of soy beans.

**Strawberry Practices**  
Billy Lankford and Floyd Akin, of Woodville, have recently applied seosone to 16-inch bands on top of the rows of clean strawberry plants to prevent the germination of weeds for a four-week period while runners are being formed.

## County Budget Requires Same Tax

Lauderdale County Quarterly Court Monday adopted a 1962-63 budget which carries a \$5.66 tax rate, unchanged from 1961-62.

The court made a single change in budget proposals a committee submitted. This increased the annual salary of a rabies officer, Charles Gooch, from \$2,400 to \$3,000.

The general fund budget jumped \$18,970 from last year. The coming year's biennial election expenses accounted for \$4,700, and the expense of acquiring right-of-way for the new Highway 51 between Ripley and Halls came to \$4,500. There were \$1,000 jumps for Circuit Court jury and officers' costs and for radio maintenance, a new item in the section on law enforcement; various smaller increases; and bond premium increases for payment for office terms, instead of annually, thereby effecting savings over annual payments.

## Democrats Calling Public Convention About House Seat

**Session Saturday Considers Rotation With Crockett; August Ballots Crowded**

Herman L. Reviere, Lauderdale County Democratic party secretary, announced Thursday a convention of all Democrats in the county, in the courtroom of the courthouse, at 2 p. m. Saturday, to consider an agreement to rotate the 28th District House seat with Crockett County "and such other business as may be properly presented."

Lauderdale County has two House candidates qualified—L. E. Criffield, Jr., of Halls, and J. H. (Jack) Rochelle, of Ripley. Crockett has one—Rollie A. Byrd.

Crockett County Democrats have not yet considered a rotation. Qualified for the state senate from the 28th District are Mr. Reviere and William Neal (Rube) McKinney, from Lauderdale County, and Covington's George Gracy, from Tipton County. Haywood and Crockett Counties, also in the same district, offered no candidates.

Political circles understand an effort is afoot to rotate both the House and Senate seats, with Lauderdale providing the first senator and Crockett electing the first representative, if the candidates of other counties agree to drop their names from August's primary ballots. Whether they will do so is not yet clear.

Tuesday midnight's qualifying deadline found fourteen candidates for sheriff—Larry Archibald, W. M. Chipman, James Doyle, Raymond Hatcock, Joe W. Johnston, Julius Kimble, Mrs. Joy Latham, Gwinn Matthews, J. D. Morgan, Hal J. Pennington, Gene Robson, Gene Sadler, Clifford Sweat, and Leon Williams.

The victor will succeed Willard Norvell, incumbent retiring after the limit of three two-year terms. Newt C. Utley, county court clerk, is opposed for re-election by B. B. Douglas and Hobson Wakefield.

C. Lyle Durham, incumbent register, is opposed for re-election by Nolan Criner.

Paul Dew is unopposed for re-election as clerk of the Circuit and

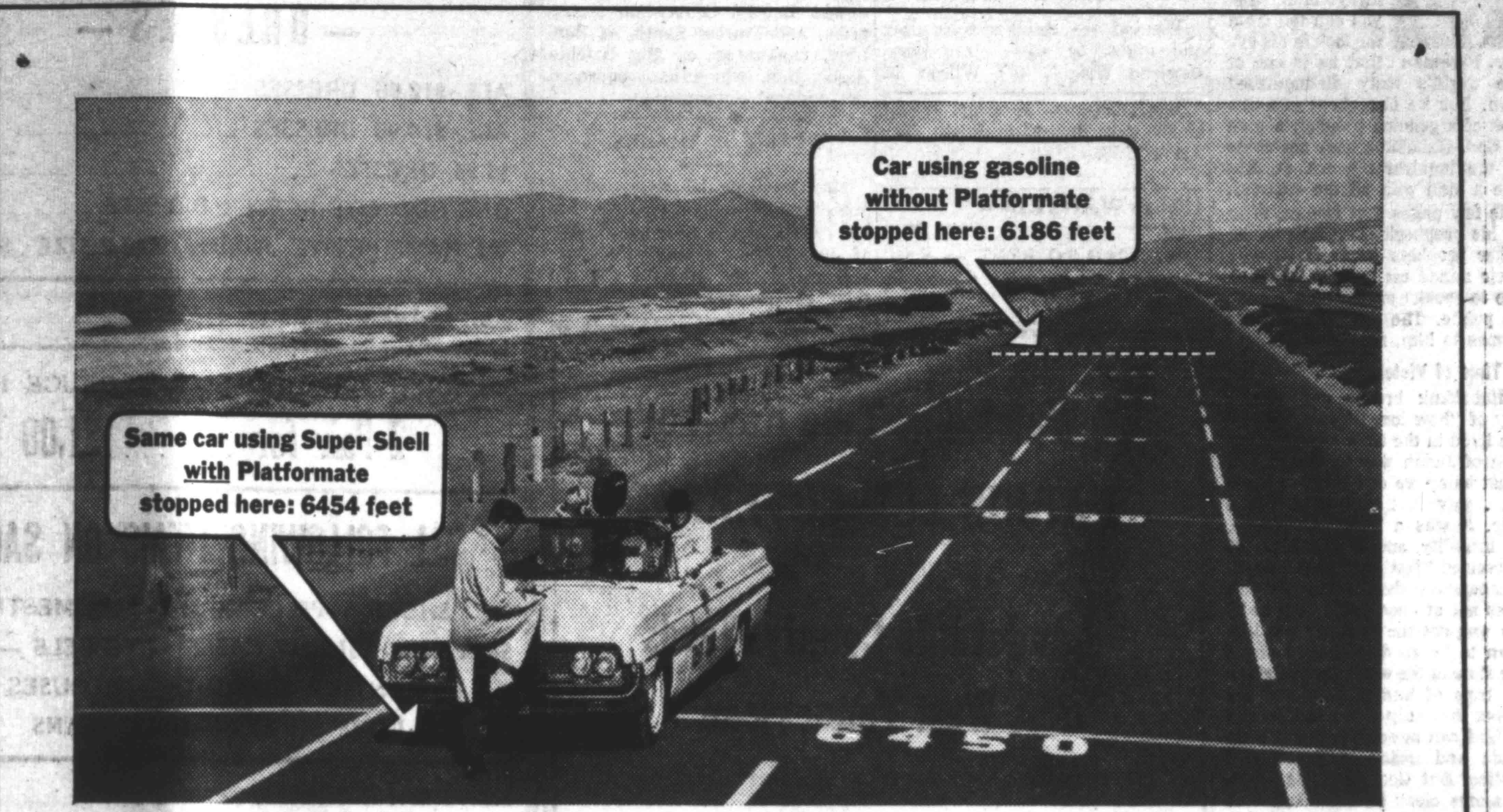

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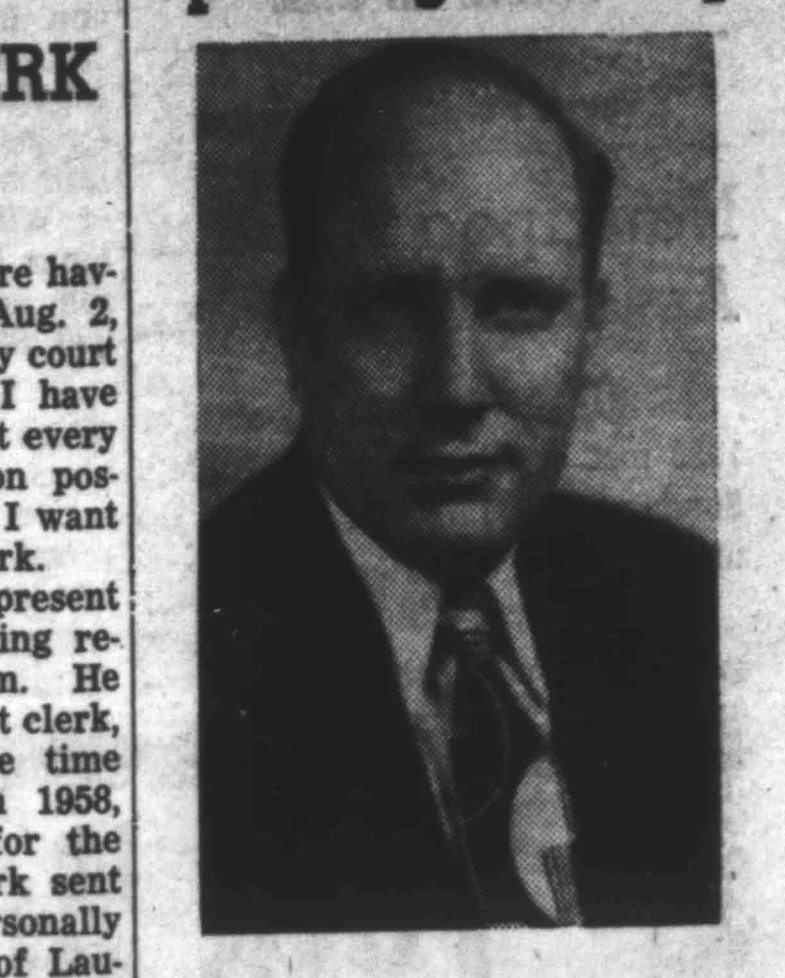

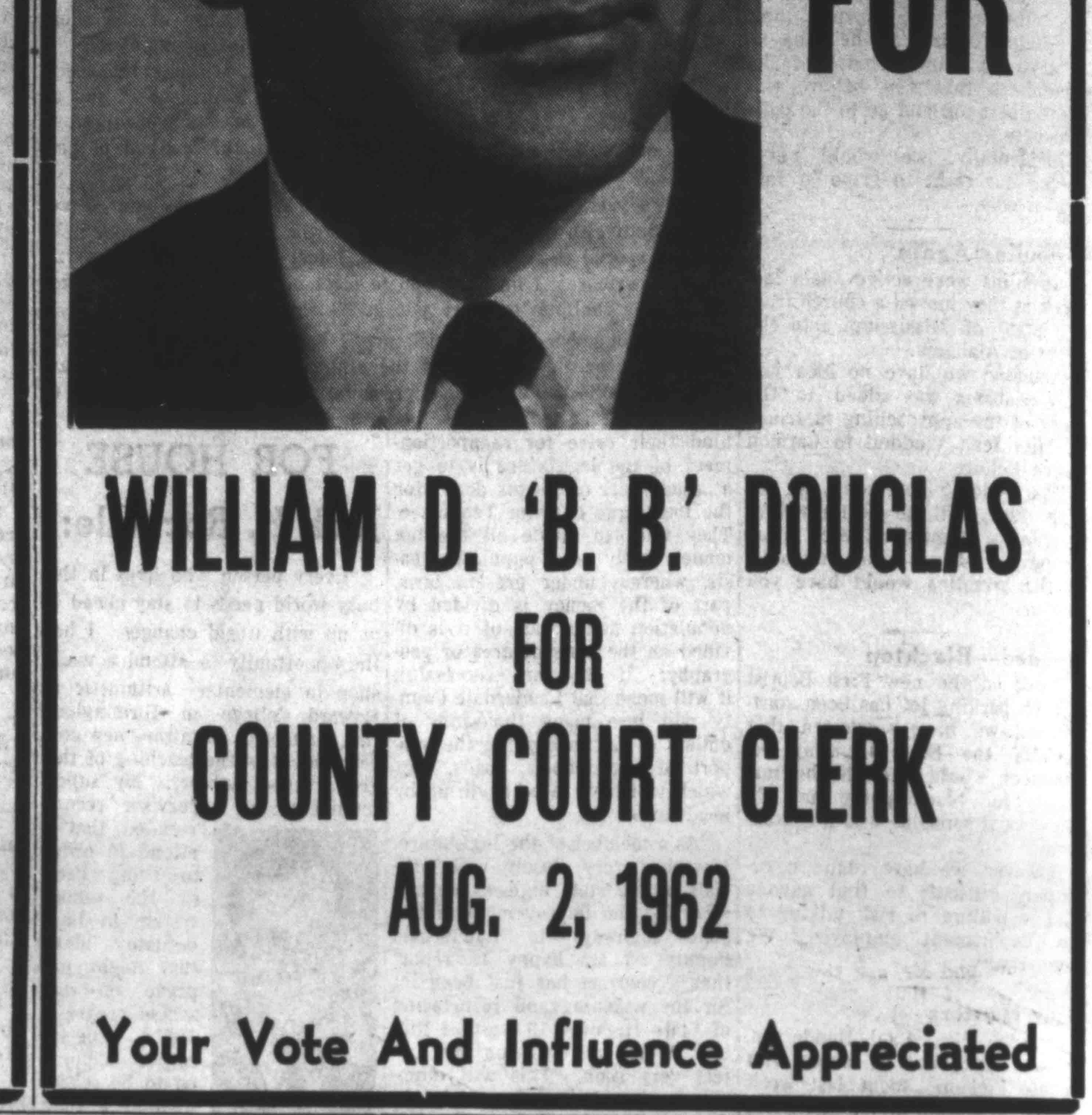

by the administrations of this state, for ten long and costly years, and we seek your vote and support next Thursday to put it back in the picture of state government in Tennessee.
