HOW CAN WE HELP THE CAUSE OF MENTAL HEALTH?

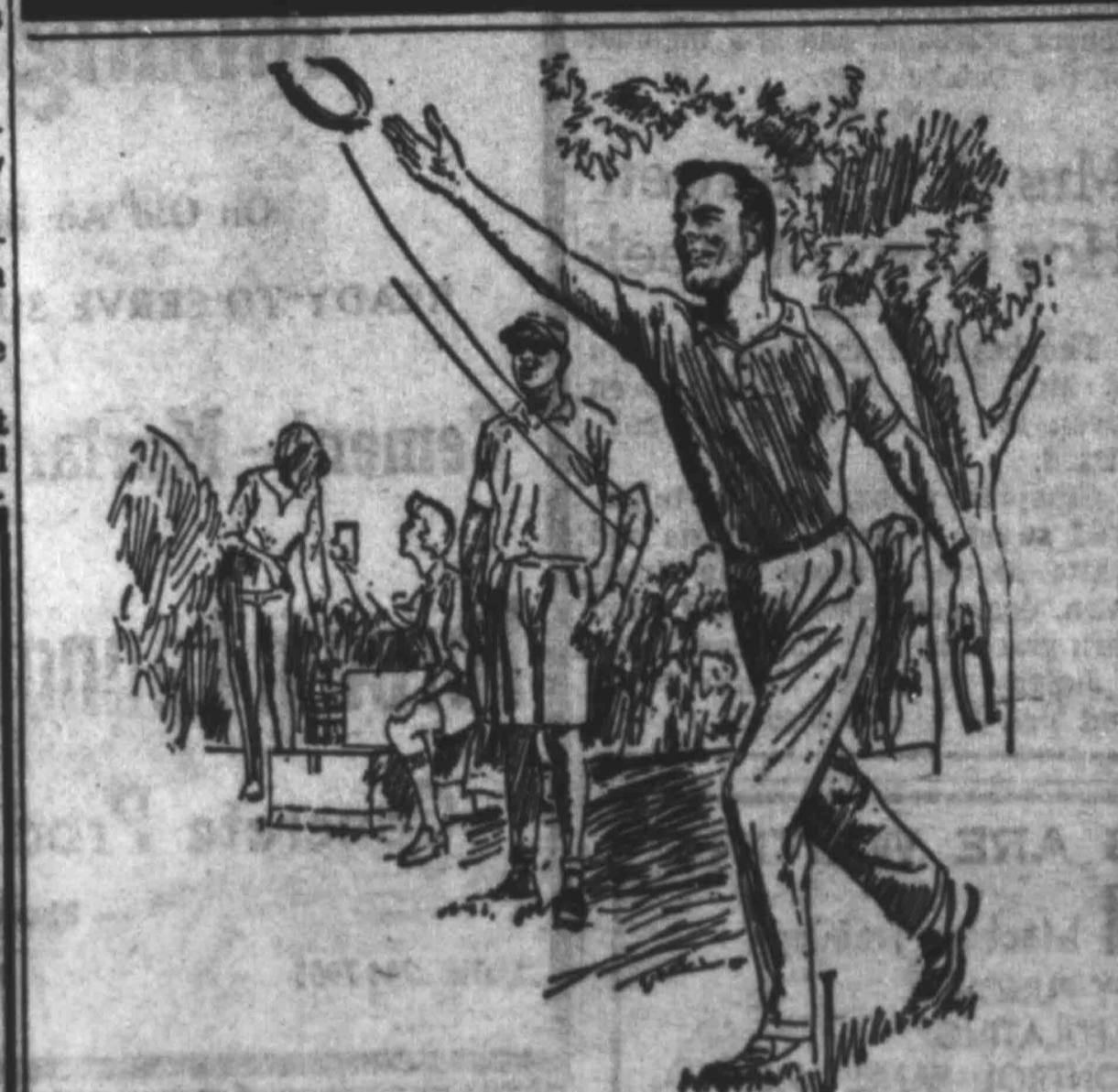

Tennessee will need \$126,000 to do an adequate job in 1964. One-fifth of our income will go to the National program, where one-quarter goes to research. The remaining four-fifths will underwrite our State program.
