Extension Agents Saluting Service's 50th Anniversary

Lauderdale County Program Dates From Corn Canner Clubs Founded In 1912

As the Agricultural Extension Service observes its 50th anniversary, it is appropriate to review a little of the basic philosophy on which it was founded.

Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, the acknowledged "father" of Extension work, believed strongly in the concept of learning by doing. He made this statement: "What a man hears, he may doubt; what he sees, he may possibly doubt; but what he does himself, he cannot doubt."

Dr. Knapp started Extension work on a 70-acre farm near Terrell, Tex., in 1903 as he demonstrated what he considered to be improved techniques of farming for higher yields at less cost.

Corn clubs for boys and canning clubs for girls were organized in various states beginning as early as 1906. These began in Lauderdale County in 1912.

All the counties of West Tennessee had full-time county agents by 1928, and most had home agents.

Most West Tennessee counties have three or four men and women agents, with a full-time office secretary. Shelby County has ten agents.

Some larger counties, where intensive vegetable and fruit crops are grown, have as many as 15 agents, but the total staff in the U. S. is less than 15,000 workers.

The Extension Service has been so effective in bringing about desirable changes that similar programs are now being carried out in more than 80 nations in the world.

Pig Sale June 17th
Calvin Pittman has signed up 25 pigs for a feeder pig sale to be held at Brownsville June 17th.

Other producers may sign pigs by calling the county agent's office.

Anthony Fisher, chairman of the inspection committee, will see that all pigs are checked before the sale day.

Producers who are spraying late cotton for thrips may want to try a new insecticide called bidrin, which is a systemic.

One application of two ounces per acre controls thrips and aphids for several weeks.

Should Nitrate Cotton Now
All forms of nitrogen fertilizer usually applied to cotton in this area should be put down by June 10th in order that the cotton can get full benefit of the nitrogen during its fruiting period, when it is most effective toward producing highest yields of cotton which can be picked in a favorable harvest period.

Anhydrous ammonia can still be applied to cotton with good effect, provided it is put within eight inches of the cotton rows. It is still not too late to apply ammonium nitrate, Urea, Flow 30, Big N, or nitrate of soda.

Tennessee's experiment station urges the application of 80 to 100 pounds of actual nitrogen for every acre of cotton to get the yields of the county's soils are capable of producing, but all these forms of nitrogen should be applied before June 10th.

Nitrogen Most Profitable
Relatively cheap nitrogen fertilizer increases yields more than any other fertilizing element.

Experiment stations recommend at least 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre on corn and tomatoes.

Bernard grass, Star Millet, and Sudan grass pastures need 60 pounds applied in May or June and 80 pounds of nitrogen applied after the first cutting or in August.

High yields of wheat being harvested this month were brought about by applications of 90 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre in February and March.

Fertilize Trees Anytime
Pecan trees and shade trees of all kinds will respond to applications of 15-15-15 fertilizer put down in a series of holes out from the tree trunk about as far as the limbs extend.

Make holes 18 inches deep, three to five feet apart in a circular pattern and apply to each tree about two pounds of fertilizer for each inch in the diameter of the tree or for each year of age of the tree.

This fertilizer will take effect slowly as the roots grow into it; so it does not matter when it is applied. After an application of mixed fertilizer is made, the same amount of ammonium nitrate may be applied to the tree in the following year, since nitrogen fertilizer moves downward in the soil.

No other Scouts have developed any signs of mumps.

The first night was spent at Ft. Knox, Ky.

After Washington, the Scouts will visit New York City if their time and funds permit.

Sue Ann Leeds Will Attend Martin Branch

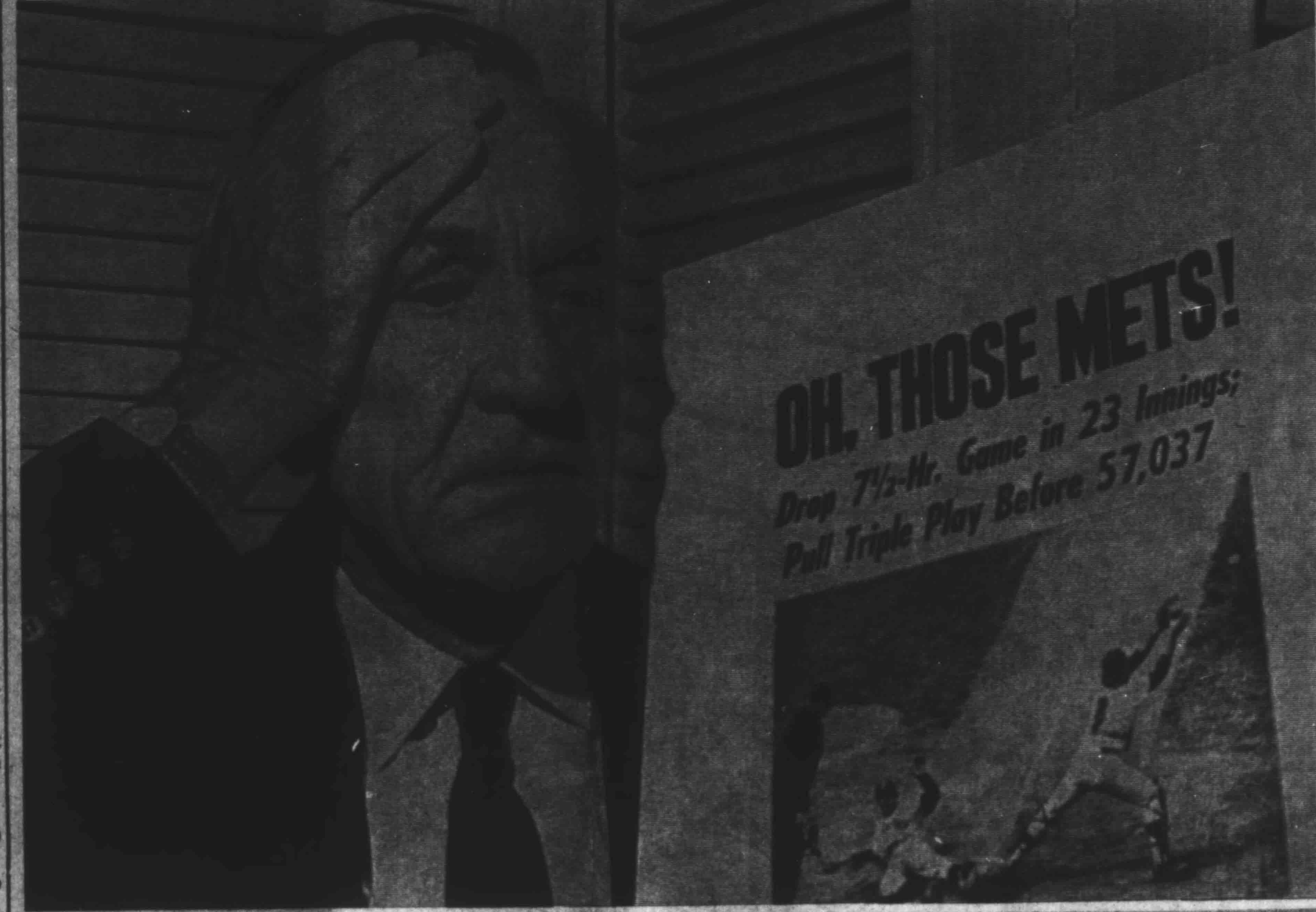

Hick Hits

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jun. 4—Jim Hickman had a big weekend.

The Mets' center fielder from Henning changed from team goat to hero with a game shattering homer; his second this year, which provided the 4-2 victory margin in the series opener with the San Francisco Giants last Friday night, after Jack Sanford had held the Shea Stadium hosts hitless six innings.

In the first of two games Sunday, Hickman provided all the Met runs, and an early 3-0 lead in the fourth inning, with a third homer into the left field stands, after Joe Christopher and Ed Kranepool had singled.

He contributed two singles in the second game, which went 23 innings before a record attendance of 57,037, in the stadium and in the league this season. The Mets lost 5-3 and 8-6.

The weekend got Hickman's batting average back above the .200 mark—.207.

This was good news for the easy going outfielder, who fanned twice and bounced into a double play in the finale of the Cub series in Chicago.

Manager Casey Stengel had turned his wrath on the quiet Tennesseean, demanding to know "Whyn't you swing?"

Hickman, relating the episode with a touch of bitterness later, advised, "He told me not to take any bad pitches, then he tells me to swing. He's got me confused."

Another sore point has been Hickman's stance at the plate, further away than any of the Met hitters. To this Hickman has replied he was standing pretty much the same way he did when he hit all those homers last year.

Friday, he seemed a bit closer, or at least his lead foot did. He caught a 3-2 pitch that was more inside than outside and smashed it against the left field foul pole, 50 feet up. Casey was the first to shake his hand and slap him on the back.

There is a special interest on Stengel's part that Hickman make good. He was an Original Met, picked in the Big League, the National League's expansion draft after the 1961 season. There are only five left.

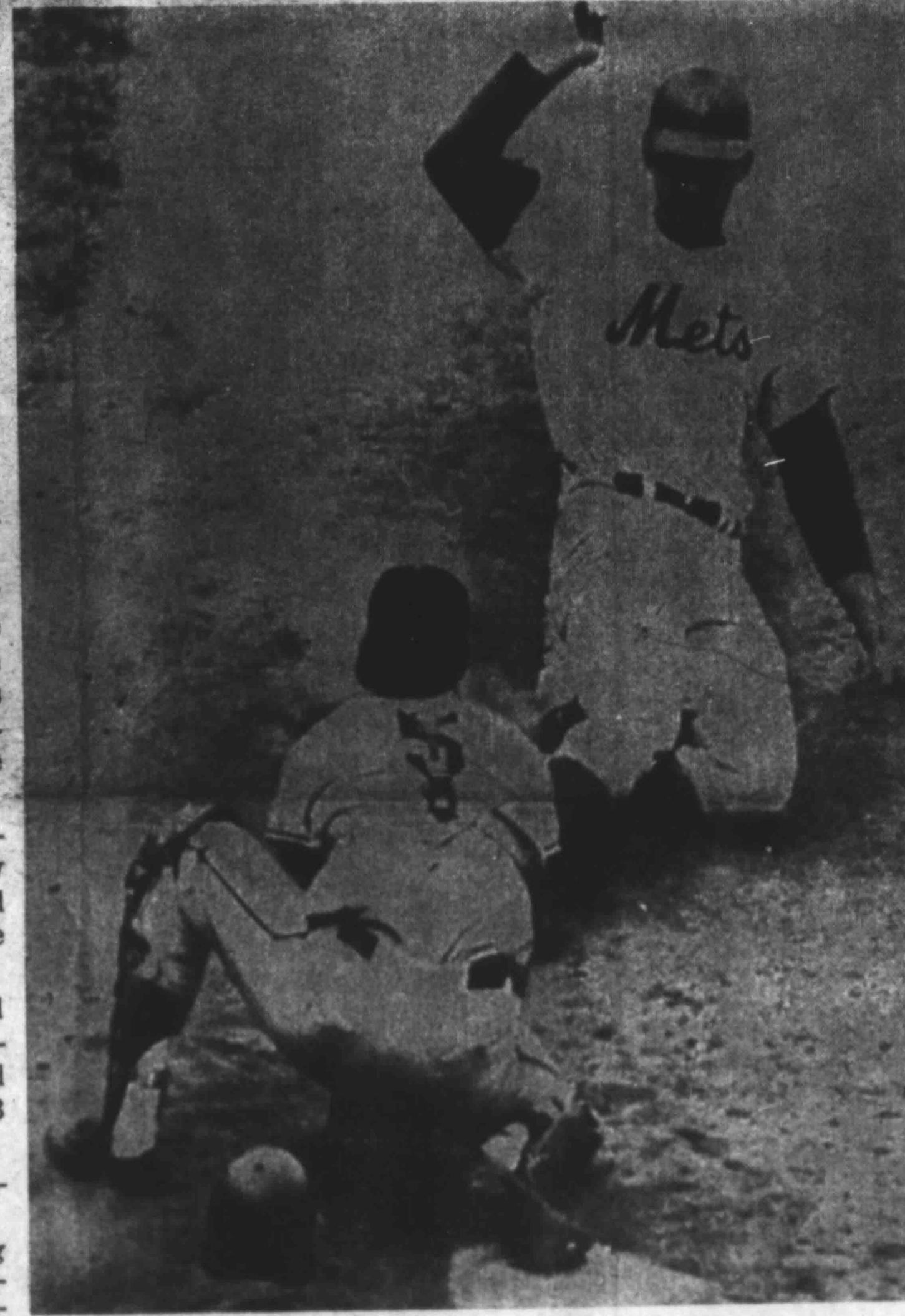
Freddie Blakley

Selective Service System registrants who became 18 years of age after Jan. 1st will begin taking physical examinations, beginning July 1st, which will not indicate that they are near induction.

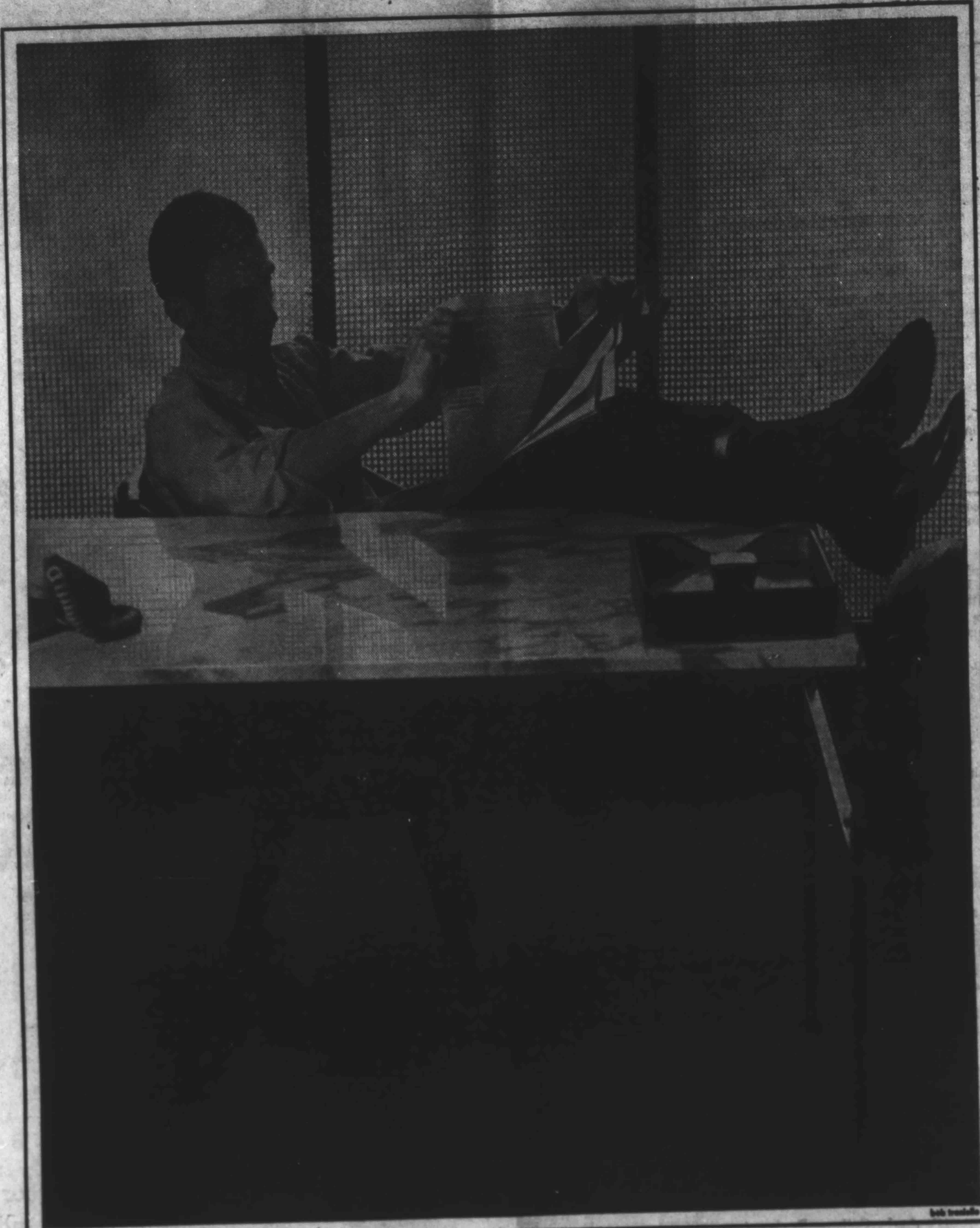
President Johnson directed earlier exams to fully advise registrants of physical defects, many of which might be corrected before the registrant reached the induction age, which is now around 21.

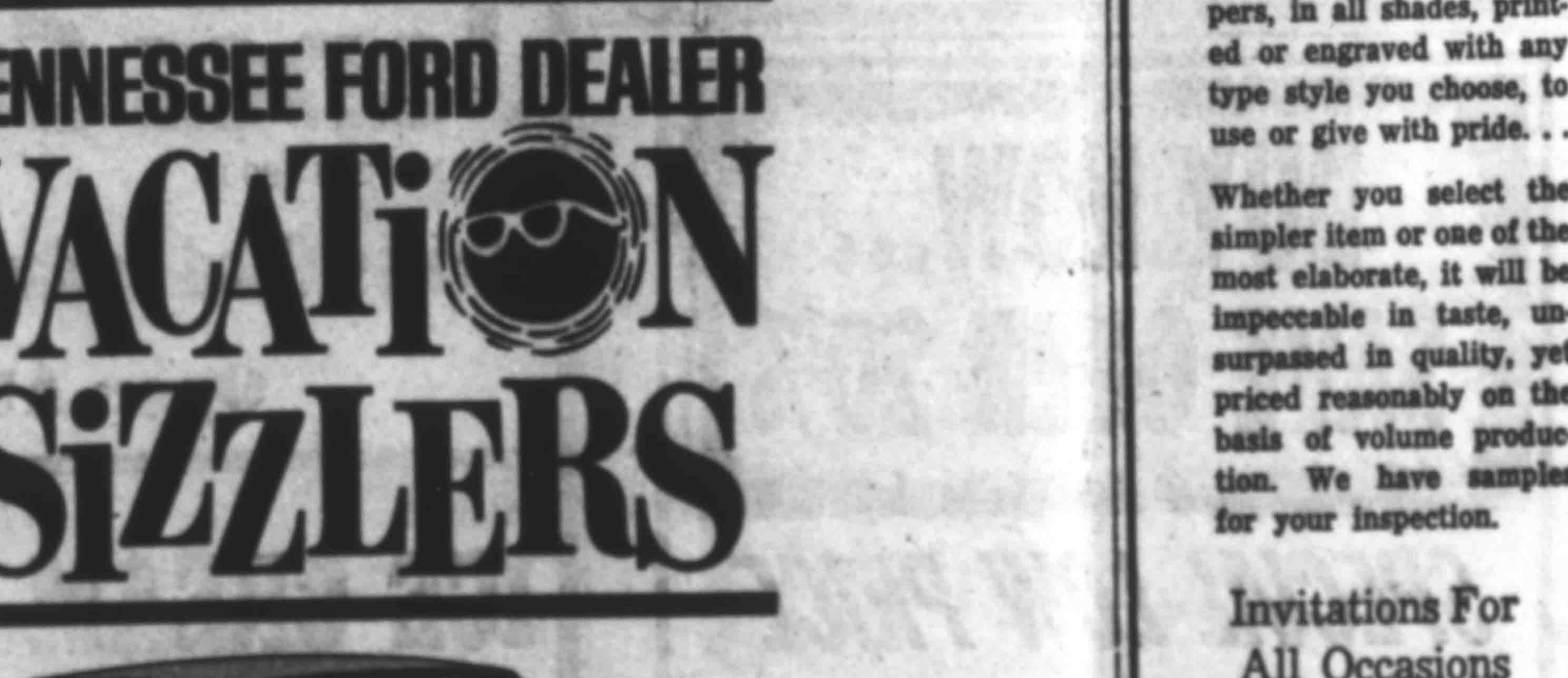

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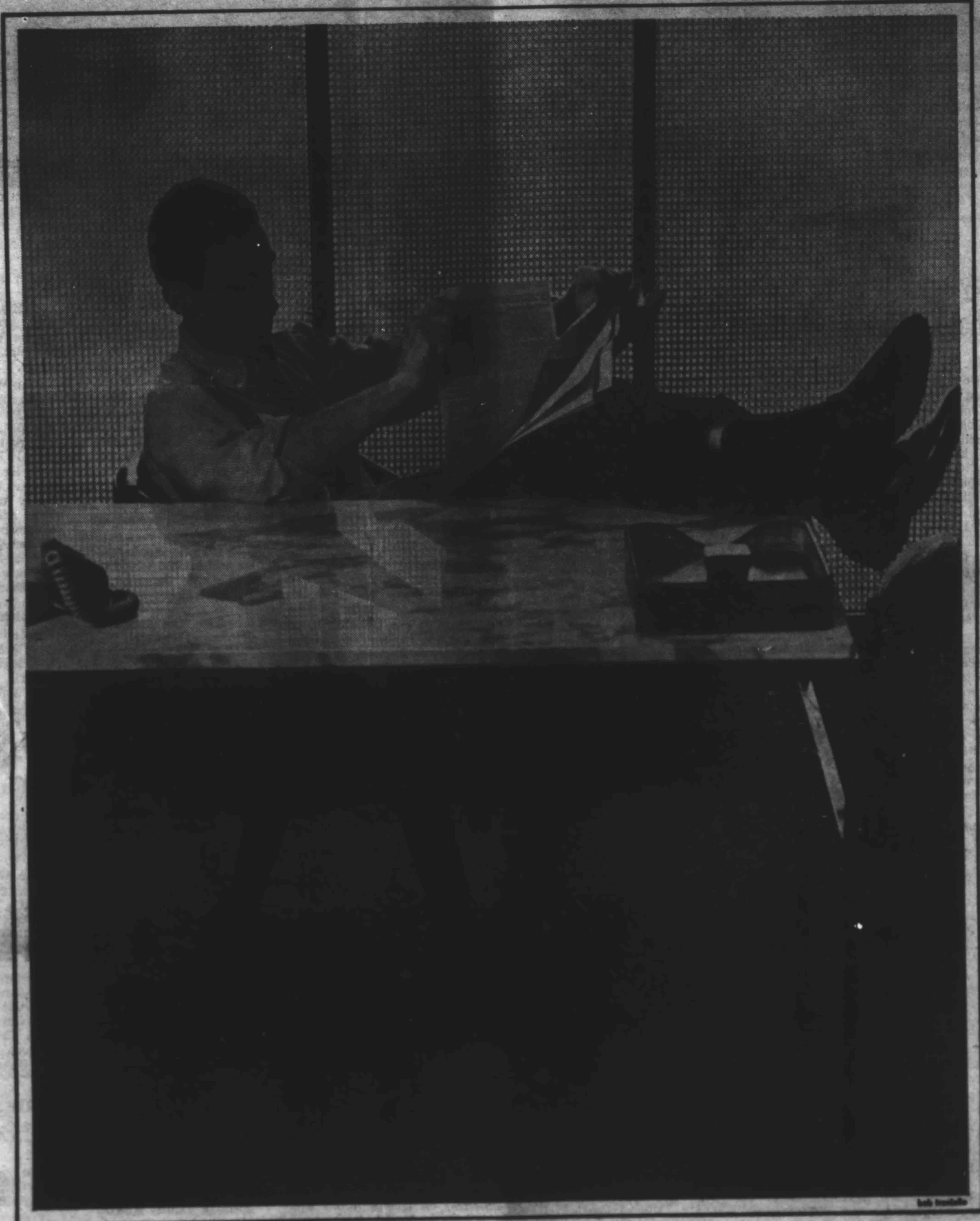

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

World Family

Lesson for June 28, 1964

Background Scripture: Ephesians 4:11-12; 4:13-16.
Devotional Reading: Ephesians 4:1-7.

THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH is one of the strangest collections of humanity that exists in the world. There is hardly another religion which has a church; it is a peculiarly Christian institution. But even its members debate endlessly among themselves as to what the church really is and what to call it. Even in the New Testament other names besides "church" are used for it. Clearly, the church did not fit its titles equally well; if any one had been quite satisfactory, there would have been no need for the other names.

One of the names used by St. Paul in referring to the church is "household of God" (Eph. 2:19). This word includes the meaning "family"; the striking point is that Paul calls it the household of God. What other organization can dare to call itself by such a high name? Paul does not mean to call the church perfect, completely holy; but he uses some of the same words to refer to the church that he uses in speaking about Christ and God. In short, we are invited by the Apostle to look at the church as both divine and human. The household—that is the everyday human word; of God—that is the word of divinity. This alone makes the church unique. This also raises problems. To bypass a long discussion, we must say that according to the New Testament, the church is not a club which has signed Christ to join them. It is the other way around: Christ invites the church to join him. "Follow me," he used to say in Galilee, and still does. What we share

Now if we are, as a church, in any sense the household or family of God, we might be expected to have something in common. To put it another way, if you traveled around the world, meeting Christians in every nation (for there are fewer than half a dozen nations without any Christians), you might expect to find these Christians to be a good deal alike. But the fact is, you would probably be struck with how different they are. Even if you look into one congregation, say your own, what a variety of temperament, dispositions, abilities, and tastes you would find! What draws these people together, what is the cement that holds these odd-shaped stones in place? It is certainly not the peas-in-a-pod likeness that you might find in a college fraternity or the lockstep likeness of prisoners shuffling to bed. All sorts and conditions of men make up the church. Why doesn't the church split a thousand ways? The fact is, it has split, too many ways. But even so, as you pass from denomination to denomination, from Protestant to Catholic, from liberal to conservative, there is still something that all these smaller groups share in common.

Let's be brief on paper here, and leave the reader free to continue thinking about this for himself. One thing you will find in every church in the world—one thing that makes us all one, is that you can't even get into a church by telling the officers how good you are. You get in, and you stay in, by admitting that you're just not right. We call this "confession of sin," confession of the most serious failure a man can commit—not coming up to what God has a right to expect of him.

If we could say no more than that, the church would not have lasted long. But we can also say, and this is more important, that this great family is made up of those who admit their weakness and perverseness, and have asked the pardon of a gracious God, and have received it; and now, in Paul's words, "have access to the Father," through him—that is, Jesus. A young Mohammedan who had been converted to Christian faith said to me when I asked him what had persuaded him to be a Christian: "My old religion had plenty of theology, but as much as you; but you have Christ, and we have nothing to match him."

40 States Shaken By Remap Decree Of Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24—Probably four out of every five Americans will be affected personally by the revolutionary Supreme Court decision June 15th that state legislative districts must be substantially equal in population.

At least 40 states are now in jeopardy. Even brand-new apportionment laws like the one passed by Michigan last year appear to be illegal under the sweeping rule set forth by the social reformers who control the highest court in the land.

Apportionment—meaning the method by which citizens are represented in state legislative bodies—is normally a matter for politicians to wrangle over, but the Supreme Court edict reduces a complicated and controversial subject to a personal issue reaching into almost every living room.

A majority of six decreed "one person, one vote." Seats in both houses of state legislatures must be apportioned by population. This means city and suburbs will monopolize most legislatures and that many people living outside major metropolitan areas will have their laws written by those who do not represent their views.

Pity The Poor Farmer
Geographical representation has allowed those elected from small towns and rural districts to exercise a strong voice in the affairs of their state. That will become a thing of the past as the Supreme Court edict is implemented. The New York State Assembly now includes a representative of 15,000 people in Schuyler County, and his vote is worth as much as that of the Assemblyman from a Brooklyn section who has 150,000 constituents.

This will mean the cities will dominate. Farmers will be faced with new taxes to pay for city sewers and other expensive projects long sought by urban interests.

Where else can a woman clip the coupons and recipes that intrigue her? Or tear out tips for future marketing, any of the colorful food ideas which strike her fancy? And where else can the circle and compare the colors and styles of clothing and furnishings that appeal to her? Where else, in fact, can any message be re-run at will by an interested audience? So make sure a good part of your advertising message gets into print. Let somebody's eyes linger over it as long as they like. Let somebody's scissors clip it free of competition. And then watch someone's pocket or purse carry it to the place of purchase. Print makes *you* because print makes *sales*.
