N. C. Utley Victim Of Blaze; County Clerk Since 1942

Suffocates in Bedroom As Smoke Chokes Residence; Court To Fill Position

Newton C. Utley, 76, Lauderdale County court clerk since 1942, suffocated about 11:15 p. m. Tuesday when fire broke out in his home on Sinclair Circle in Ripley.

Neighbors and firemen who found the living room ablaze and the house filled with smoke discovered him in a rear bedroom. He was dead on arrival at Lauderdale County Hospital.

He was alone in the residence. His sister, Miss Sadie Utley, who resided with him, was spending the night in Halls.

Services were at 2 p. m. Thursday in First Baptist Church in Ripley, where the body lay in state from 10 a. m. The Rev. Bernard Seaton officiated. Burial was in Halls Cemetery. Garner's Ripley Funeral Home had charge.

A member of First Baptist Church, he had been active in its Men's Bible Class for many years. A veteran of World War I, he was active in the American Legion and widely known among Legionaires.

He had commanded the Ripley post and had since served for many years as adjutant. Born at Double Bridges, he was a merchant in Ripley and Halls before his election. He was serving his sixth term in the office and, with county judge J. R. Lewis, had longest tenure among county officials.

An irrepressible joker and vigorous controversialist, he seldom failed to enliven meetings of the court, or the normal operations of his office, with a sharp wit which commanded affection even among his victims.

A special session of County Court set for Oct. 18th will elect a successor to complete his unexpired term, which runs through August, 1966.

In addition to his sister, he leaves a daughter, Mrs. C. Wilson Viar, of Ripley.



Martin In Reelfoot Lead After Fulton Cuts Alamo Down

West Loopers Snip Eastern Win Skein; Panthers Left Alone On Unbeaten List

Martin's Panthers defeated Gleason last Friday, 28-6, but picked up more points on the field at South Fulton, where the Western Division's Red Devils, hosts, met the Eastern Division's Red Devils from Alamo and slew their unbeaten season, 28-14.

South Fulton's victory left Martin alone on the Reelfoot Conference's unbeaten list.

And since Martin has already defeated South Fulton, 35-20, the expectation is strong that Martin will take Alamo when they clash late this season—meet South Fulton in the play-off between division leaders—and win again.

Both Alamo and South Fulton have other ideas, and either could spoil the Panther dream.

It was a Western Division weekend, with all the Western teams winning except Halls, which played another Western team at Newbern and lost 33-0.

Obion Central, playing outside the loop, won over Fulton County High, 20-7.

Lake County won from Greenfield 26-6. Lake is South Fulton's nearest rival, but still has Martin and Alamo ahead of it.

In the East, besides Martin, only Sharon won, taking winless Dresden, 19-0.

Big Ten Weekend Raised Eyebrows Tho Short Upsets

Not Who Won, But By What Spent Margins, Surprised Analysts Of Conference

Last weekend was a surprising one for students of the Big Ten Conference race, though there wasn't a single upset in all the scores.

The surprises lay in the narrow margins of victory for teams which had been whacking opponents down hard.

It may have been the year's first tippy weather, with dewy fields and slick leather promoting numerous fumbles.

Play at Knee Field was typical. One of the poorest Union City teams in years held Ripley scoreless until the first half's final minute, when the Tigers settled for an insurance field goal. And though the Tigers had a big third quarter, their 22-0 margin was less than the average of previous Golden Tornado foes this season.

Humboldt defeated Covington by one touchdown, 14-7, to move into circuit leadership, as both Jackson and Browns were encountering out-of-loop foes.

Paris, which had been posting huge scores, topped Trenton by one TD, 20-12, and only Dyersburg had a more or less expected win margin over Somerville, 20-0.

Bay Phantom Will Go Six Furlongs At Garden State

Winnings Now Over \$50,000 For Star Of Viar Stable; One Dot's Career Ended

Bay Phantom, 3-year-old race horse which has won more than \$50,000 for the C. O. Viar racing stable, has been entered in a special 6-furlong race at Garden State Park, Camden, N. J.

Bay Phantom won a \$7,500 allowance race Sept. 17th in his last outing. He has been racing at Detroit Racing Course, Detroit, Mich.

Jockey Ronnie Campbell will ride Bay Phantom in the Garden State race.

One Dot, stake-winning 5-year-old gelding in the Viar stable, was destroyed Tuesday after he failed to respond to treatment for an ankle injury on his left foreleg.

One Dot was injured during the 1964 season, running last in October at Keeneland Park in Lexington, Ky., and finishing second.

During the period in which he was raced by the Viar stable—the 1963 and 1964 seasons—One Dot won a total of \$37,480 with fourteen wins, eight seconds and five thirds.

The horse had been under treatment at Lexington much of the time but was brought to the Viar farm here in June.

He was destroyed after the insurance company agreed that his injury would not heal.

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Highway 51 Block Cleared By Court

Magistrates recorded a decision in favor of the highway. The court accepted a stipulation to maintain Old Highway 51 until the new one has been completed through the county, then to begin state and city maintenance of it. The three incorporated cities concerned had already accepted this.

Highway commissioner Oscar D. O'Connell, though skeptical that there would be any maintenance by the state under the pact, said the state would not proceed with new 51 until the question had been settled and that the county might as well proceed.

The state will continue to maintain the portion between Halls and Gates, part of State Route 88, and a road west from Gates to run into the new highway. It has also strengthened the section on 24 1/2 Road, temporary route for traffic from new 51 into Ripley pending the completion of the Ripley-Halls link, and agreed to construct an overpass for new 51 over Highway 19.

In other business, the state replaced Mr. Utley with Sheriff Gavin Mathison on the committee approving indigent hospitalization; paid \$1,462.77 left in its industrial building account; for Tennessee Electrolighting's building; to the retirement of the bonds, crediting the annual rental with which the bonds are paid; gave official approval to jail fees of \$150 per day for each 24-hour period in jail, as set by the last legislature, to clear county accounts for 1965; and approved quitclaim deeds for the Calvin C. Berlow property sold for taxes, later returned.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS
 BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Craftsman
 Lesson for October 17, 1965

Background Scripture Exodus 21:1-5, 25:30 through 30:7, 37 through 38. Devotional Readings 1 Timothy 4:1-14.

If you were about to meet a man you did not know, (all you knew about him being that his name was Bezalel) and your instructor told you, "This man has been called by God," what sort of man would you expect to see?



You'd be surprised. This man is evidently no priest nor preacher. He is an artist. From cover to cover, he is about the only artist mentioned in the Dr. Foreman Bible. He belongs to a class of people you don't expect to find in church. This particular artist had perhaps had training in Egypt where at that time (as we know from King Tutankhamen's tomb and otherwise) there flourished skilled jewelers, engravers, weavers, embroiderers, carvers of wood and of metal, whose skill has never been surpassed. At any rate this Bezalel (pronounced BEZ-ah-lee) was an artist in all these ways. He was the creative artist and craftsman in charge of the construction of the Tabernacle, a small but exquisitely beautiful shrine, center of the worship of Israel, the Tent of God Himself, as they believed.

Beauty and religion
 It was only later that the Hebrew people got it into their heads at last that God is everywhere. But it was important with them to know that God is somewhere — and for a child, or a child-people, that means you can point to him. So if you could have flown back there three thousand years or so, on a time-machine, and if you had asked almost anyone, "Where is your God?" they would all have pointed to this beautiful tent-shrine and said: "There is where God lives! Right in among us, at the center of where we live. But since God is Who He is, He does not live in an ordinary tent like the tents of men. His dwelling must be incomparably beautiful and costly."

Qualifications of artists
 This Bezalel was no picked-up journeyman jack-of-all trades. When God called him he was already a master craftsman. Look at the list of his qualifications: "ability, intelligence, knowledge, craftsmanship," versatility too. He is not a man of one craft alone. Every one of his qualifications was needed for his various masterpieces. To this day no man can be a true artist without ability first of all. No amount of inspiration and ambition can make up for clumsiness. Intelligence too; how much modern art expresses intelligence rather than confusion? Knowledge also; it may be true that the great artist "swallows" all formulas, but whether it be music or poetry or architecture or drama, there is a hard apprenticeship for every true artist. Much art today is not true art because it is clear that this "artist" has never really studied the principles of his craft.

Inspired to teach
 Of course this Bezalel did not build and adorn the Tent of God alone. Oholiab and others helped him, unnamed men who were the great artists pupils. We read that Bezalel was inspired to teach. The three great things an artist can do, this Bezalel did: Create (dream and design), produce, and teach. In the marvelously beautiful collection of glass flowers at Harvard, the visitor is saddened by being told that the artist who made these lovely things did not pass on his knowledge and skills to others. No more such miracles in glass were made after his death. Perhaps he did not teach because teaching is even more difficult than doing it yourself. Creating beauty is hard to teach, partly because one man seldom shares another's inspiration, partly because, unlike science, art has few rules. Blessed be the artists who like Bezalel can teach others what it is not only to feel but to create what is beautiful!

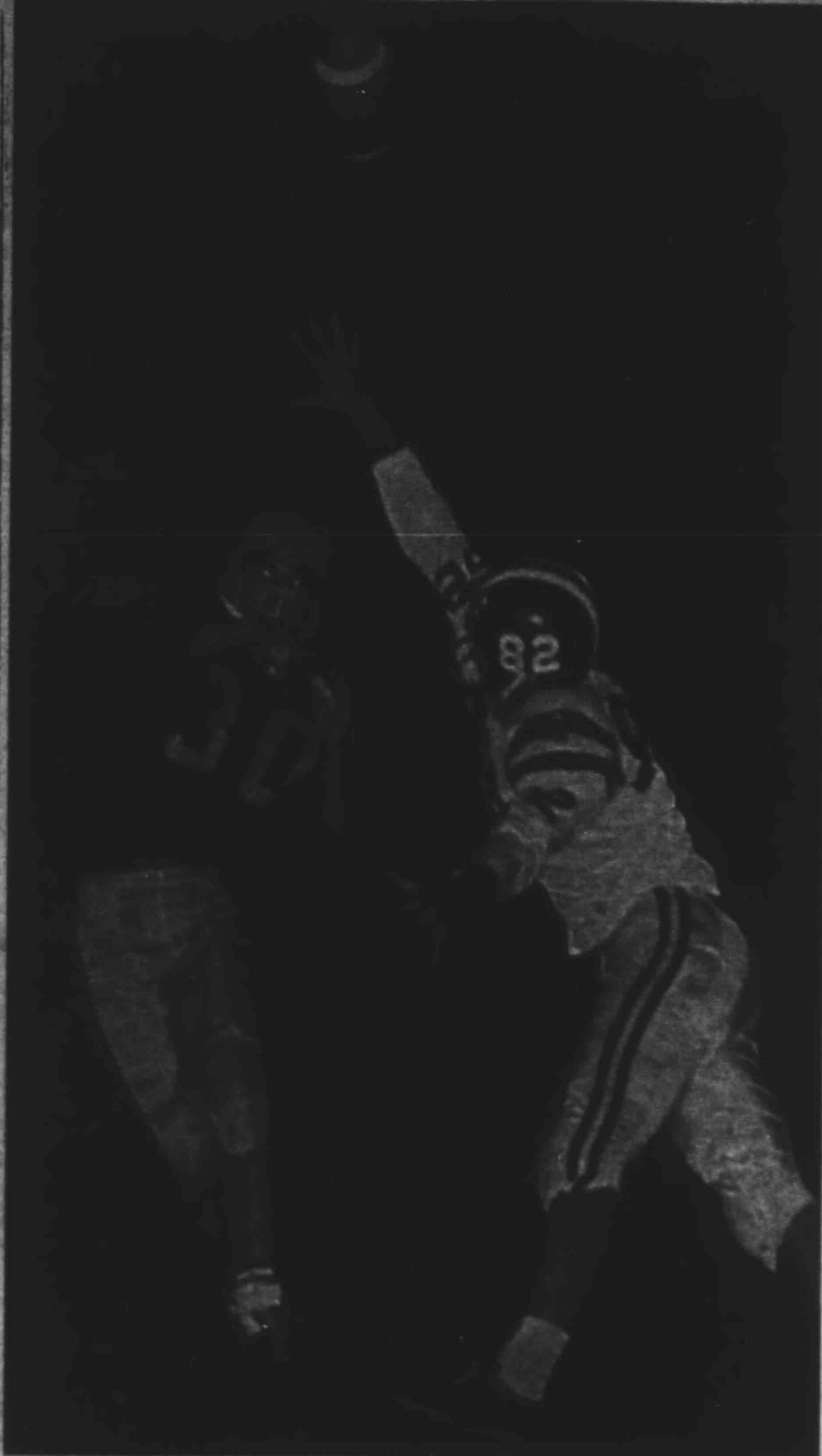
Flames Trap Willie Beard As His Truck Overtakes Brother & Sisters Here

Halls Car Theft Is Linked To 6-Day Spree Of Crimes

Pair Arrested In Arkansas After Restaurant Scuffle Held For Three States

Two 18-year-old youths from Farmington, La., were arrested in a Dumas, Ark., restaurant Monday morning to face charges resulting from a six-day crime spree.

Authorities recovered a 1957 Ford station wagon, stolen from McDearman Motors, Inc., in Halls, which they said the pair used in a service station robbery in Wheatley, Ark., Sunday night.

According to officers, the pair, Roy E. Rodgers and Cleatus Merle Echols, began their crime spree Oct. 20th when they stole a 1954 Mercury in Tiptonville and drove to Bardwell, Ky., where they robbed a service station; went to Cairo, Ill., into Missouri, and to Little Rock, Ark.; and abandoned the car in Lonoke, Ark.

Officers said they caught a bus back to Tiptonville, where they stole a 1962 Mercury belonging to Bobby L. Jones; abandoned the Mercury Saturday night at Jackie Walker's Service Station, one mile west of Halls; and stole the 1957 Ford station wagon after having failed to start a 1959 Ford on the McDearman Motors lot.

The Wheatley, Ark., service station robbery netted \$123 plus \$1 from a negro couple in the station. The pair's arrest came after officers had sought the occupants of the station wagon, abandoned near Dewitt, Ark., for more than 12 hours throughout southeast Arkansas.

Early Monday morning, two men had forced a Dewitt taxi driver at gunpoint to drive them to Dumas. After his release, the taxi driver contacted the Arkansas Highway Patrol, and State Trooper Henry Tong accosted the pair in Halls' Cafe in Dumas.

Rodgers pulled a pistol on Tong and Echols ran, the officer said. Tong managed to knock the pistol from Rodgers' hand and Mrs. Maude Hall, owner of the restaurant, grabbed it from the floor, Tong said. Tong said he subdued Rodgers and took him to the Dumas jail. A short time later, Dumas Chief of Police Jesse Willis cornered Echols in a Dumas alley, he said.

Dumas is about 100 miles southwest of Memphis.

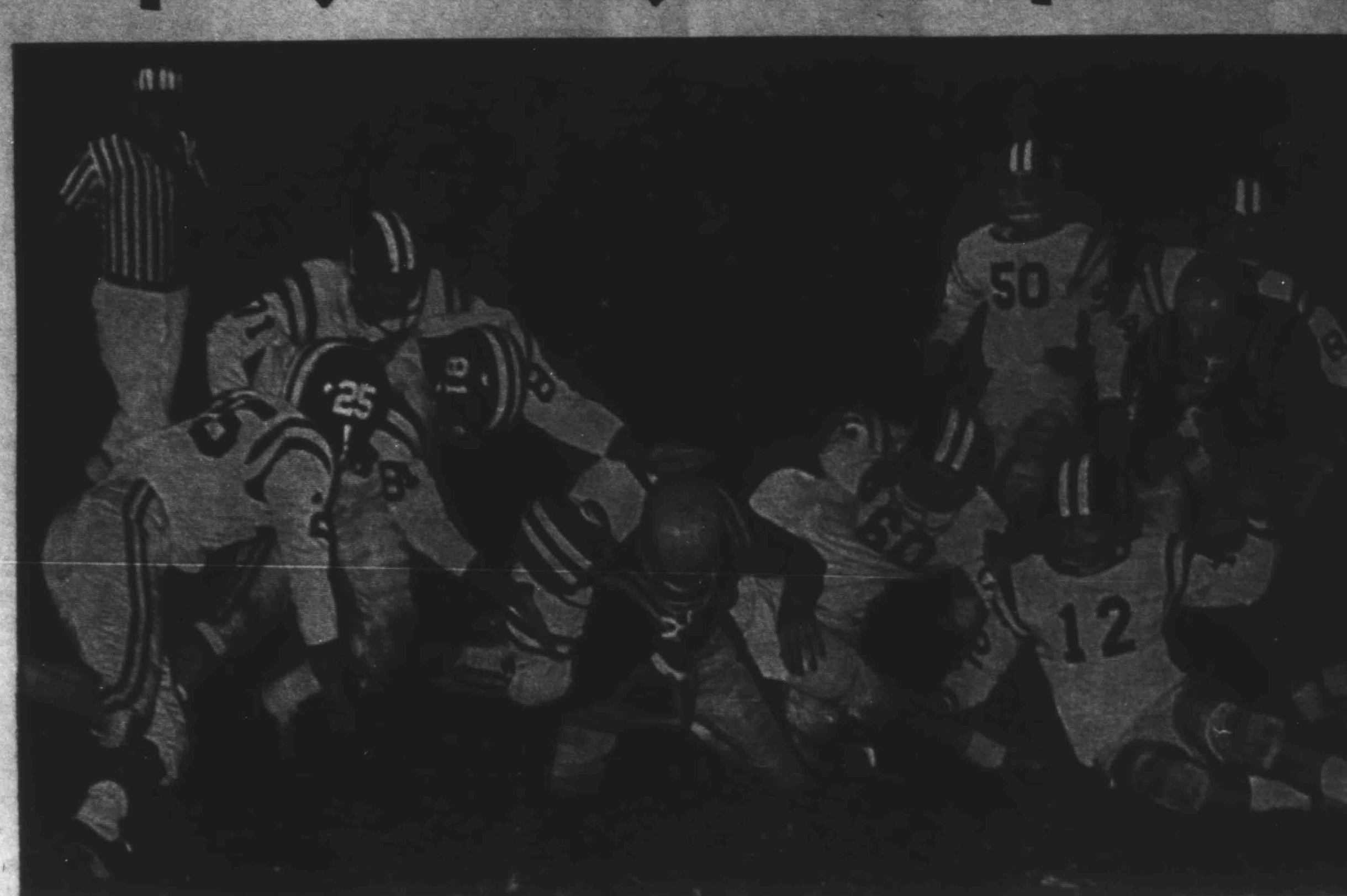

Being A Fool
Lesson for October 31, 1965

Background Scripture: Judges 13:2 through 16:31
Devotional Readings: Psalm 1.

How to be a fool in six easy lessons. This might well be the title for the story of the life and adventures of Samson. In rough times, he was more than a match for the roughest men. An angel had foretold his birth, he had religious parents who loved him. God had intended him for a deliverer of Israel. Israel needed deliverance; their hostile neighbors the Philistines were a year-round menace. The Israelites could never be free unless they could solve the Philistine problem. Samson was to be the man; but instead, he turned out to be what a modern writer calls a "negative religious hero," the opposite at every point of what God's chosen leader ought to be. Born to be a hero, he ended by being a stunt-man, a clown.

One for one

A trio of adventures (creatures of their author) lived by the motto, All for One and One for All. If Samson had had a motto it might have been One for One. He never worked with a team, he was strictly Samson for Samson. He killed Philistines by the thousands, but always for personal revenge. He could kill a lion with his bare hands, ("He was a young lion and didn't know who he was roaring at"), he could kill a small regiment of Philistines all by himself, he could pick up a city gate at midnight and walk with it forty miles uphill before sunrise. His strength was fabulous. To this day if a manufacturer wants to name a product with a name suggesting strength, he is likely to give Samson's name to it. But none of these exploits delivered the Israelites. Even though in his spectacular death he killed two thousand of his enemies, Israel was still years and years from freedom. Revenge Samson knew. Showing off his strength was his great pleasure but it was always a loner who was in action. He never built up a following. He did not have the organizing gifts of David or even of Saul. He was without the patriotism that helped to make Samuel great. It was always Samson for Samson.

Destiny to despise

If you could imagine a person who owns a beautiful, perhaps unique crystal vase, knocking out that vase on purpose or out of sheer stupidity and not bothering to look at it, taking some one to sweep it up, "This is the dustpan with it," — that would be utterly foolish but very much like Samson, and too much like ourselves to be funny. He was born to a high destiny, a Deliverer in the line of Moses and Joseph and Joshua; and he ended a blind slave, by his own fault. It wasn't that he tried valiently to achieve his destiny and found the way too rough. He never tried. Even in his crashing last moments, when Philistines were carried down screaming under the rubble, he thought of what he was doing not as a victory for Israel, but strictly as vengeance for his lost eyesight.

They never learn

One of Samson's ailments was that he could not learn from experience. Delilah wormed out of him his fateful secret, with the tearful plaint, "You don't love me any more... if you did, you wouldn't keep a secret from me." If the big clown had had any sense, he would have thought, Where have I heard that before? This was not the first time that time had been played. But no, a man like Samson never learns until too late... Well, there you are. How to become a fool, in six easy lessons. But why did we say six? These three are enough. Live for yourself alone; throw into the dustpan your best possibilities and live like the animals for pleasure alone; and never learn from anything that happens to you. Listen to what you want and not what God wants — and you can become a fool without ever trying.
