

Blood Donors Fall 35 Pints Short Of Red Cross Quota

43 People Who Promised To Donate In Ripley Tuesday Failed To Keep Date

Only 90 pints of blood were donated Tuesday when the bloodmobile visited Ripley. The quota was 125 pints.

Forty-three people who said they would donate a pint of blood never showed up.

One of the donors Tuesday handed this letter to a Ripley bloodmobile worker after the visit here:

"Here I am lying down giving the Red Cross my one pint of blood and it doesn't cost a thing, yet the rewards are unbelievable. Did you know that just a pin picking your finger was the only annoying sensation."

"As I lay here, I hear ringing in my ears such excuses as 'Give blood? I need some' or 'my doctor said I can't give' or 'I know they won't take my blood, plus many more empty excuses . . . then I ask myself what excuses does the Red Cross have in this Nam, or after Hurricane Betsy, or after disastrous floods, earthquakes and you name it, leaving no blood for the wounded, injured and disaster stricken people? None—they must be ready to serve—and how do they do it?"

"If people like you and I will give of our time and only one pint of blood just twice a year not only would the Red Cross benefit, but so would you! While I'm lying here on the table giving my pint of blood I look around and see gray ladies giving of their time, Red Cross volunteers doing their bit, a doctor, and a nurse remembering the ladies of the Easter Star who called their names to our appointments can be arranged. It takes real teamwork! All they ask of me is a little of my time, and a pint of my blood . . . What do I get in return? Another payment on my freedom, a real good feeling and to know my fellow man and pride to know they asked, and I was able to help—Thank God for our American Red Cross!"

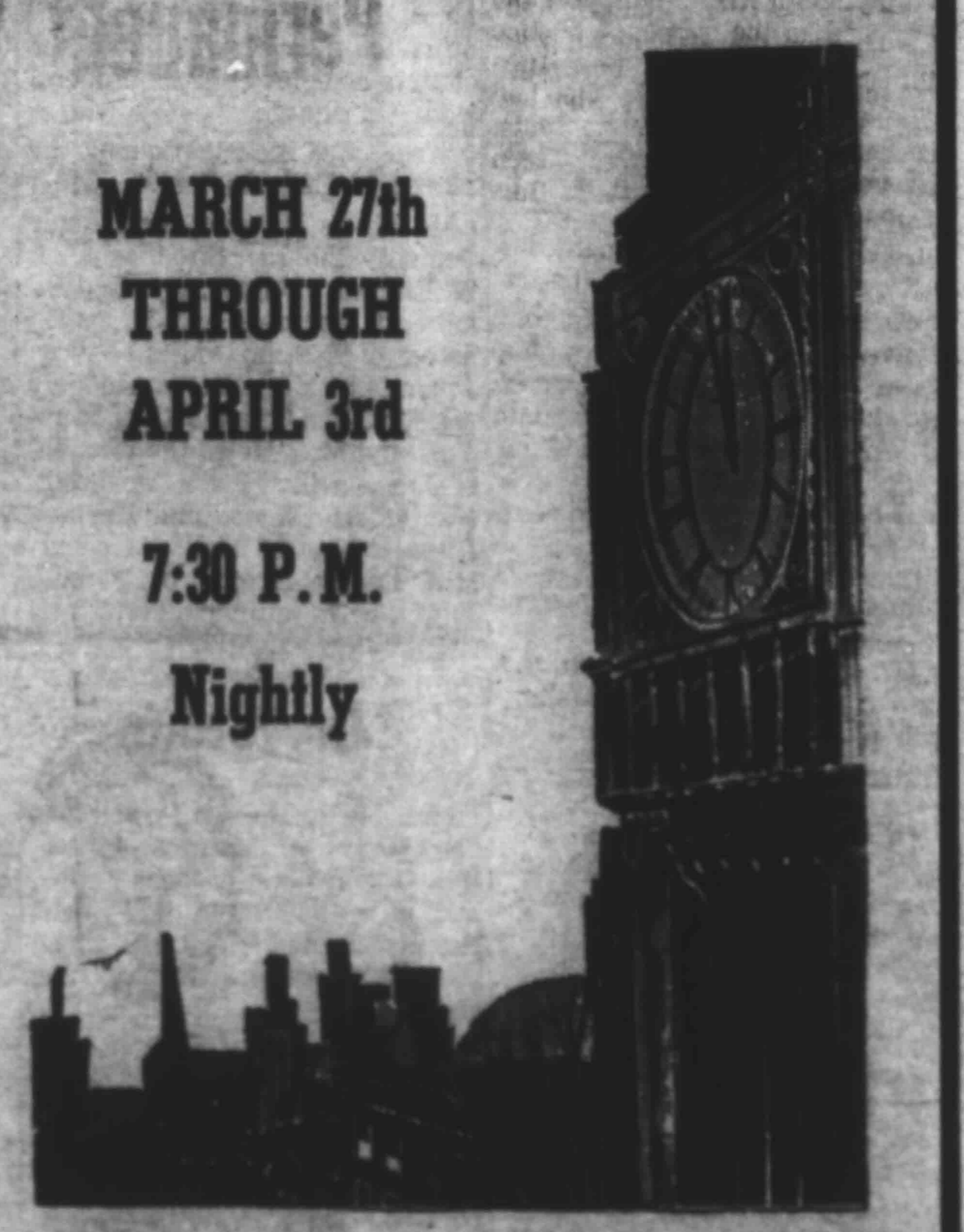
