

What was it he saw so clearly that upset them? You are living like people who believe that God is either dead or away! Their enemies claimed that their God was dead, unable to help them. But you people, he said, are living that way. Their atheism of deads is inverse. deeds is just as blasphemous as some people's atheism of words

If we could overcome our fastimes and listen to the prophets of our own day, we might find that they are saying much the same thing to us. Perhaps it is true that we too, like the people to whom Isaiah was sent, speak like com-mitted Christians and live like convinced atheists.

Many of us today find ourselves upset because a small "God is dead." We find it shocking that some should brazenly proclaim that there no longer is a God. Yet maybe all of us ought to ask ourselve whether our lives don't make the proclamation to those around us. marked that the "Death of God" theologians are only saying what many Christians have been indicating for a long time.

We don't like to hear that kind of analysis of our present, do we? The thundering prophet looks attractive in retrospect, but not in the present. It is one thing for Isaiah to tell his people that they are insincere and superficial, that they have traded their mono-theism for moneytheism, but for a contemporary prophet to tell us that about our society, well, we feel as threatened as the



With a record of two wins, two losses, and a tie, the Halls Tigers have an open date this week before they host Fulton County High next Friday.

In a major change, Halls High Principal Dale Overton announces that starting time for home games has been advanced to 7:30

Monday's session of Lauderdale County Quarterly Court, which installed 18 new magistrates, unanimously instructed County Court Clerk Vernon McBride, Jr., to collect ad valorem taxes from merchants on the same basis as county real estate taxes. Questioned by magistrates, McBride said that he had not made any change in ad valorem tax procedures followed under former county clerk N. C. Utley. He said most privilege licenses were being sold at minimum ad valorem and said that there were obvious "injustices" in the ad valorem taxation.

One of our most common misconceptions is the notion that being a spokesman for God (what the Old Testament calls a prophet) is a romantic or enjoyable vocation. That isn't the way Jeremiah looked at it when God's call came to him. Told by God that he had a prophetic message for him to deliver, Jeremiah protested: "Ah, Lord God! Behold, I do not know how to speak, for I am only a youth", (Jeremiah 1:6 RSV) You've got the wrong man, Lord, that's not up my line.

Jeremiah wasn't the first spokesman for God to react that way, nor the last. Moses, when confronted with the great message he was to take to the people of Israel, had said virtually the same thing: "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the sons of Israel out of Egypt?" There are few of us today who don't respond in a similar fashion: Who am I, Lord, that I should attempt to do that One of our most common mis-

ion: Who am I, Lord, that I should attempt to do that!

I Am With You

In one sense, we are quite correct when we ask, "Who am I that I should attempt to do that?", for the tasks to which God calls us are always those that ask more than we can supply by our own native resources. There was no denying that Jeremiah was only a youth and Moses did notknow how to talk for God. And you and I are constantly over-whelmed by the demands he makes upon us.

The key, however, is not in our adequacy, but in his. "Be not afraid of them", he assured Jeremiah, "for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord". (Jeremiah 1:8 RSV) Our inade-quacy is more than compensated for by him power which he gives to those who faithfully respond to his call. He will supply the power if we will undertake to do what he wants.

Have you given thought to what he wants of you? Have you honestly faced what he wants you to say, to do, or to be? True, it may not win friends or even influence people, but there is a higher satisfaction in doing what


