Atheism Of Doods

Lesson For October 9, 1966

Background Scripture: Isaiah 5:20-22.

Devotional Reading: Colossians 4:1-25.

Jesus said it and history proves it: "A prophet is not without honor except in his own country and in his own house." (Matthew 13:57-58) He might well have added: "... and in his own age!"

Prophets are usually greatly admired... after they are dead. The dead prophets are revered while the live prophets are ignored or condemned. Today it costs us nothing to ignore the living prophets...

To Interpret Present

We too often think of the prophet as a man who sees grand visions and hears heavenly voices. Prophets often have experiences such as this, to be sure, but their eyes were fixed not only upon the future, but also upon the present. God gives them the gift of insight and understanding of the meaning of present conditions and diagnose their implications for the future.

Isaiah discovered this in his own ministry. He had a God-given gift for seeing things clearly and when he spoke to his contemporaries they would scarcely contain their wrath. They much rather would have had him speculate on the future than to see so clearly and openly the mess of the present.

As Though Dead Or Away

What was it he saw so clearly that upset them? You are living like people who believe that God is either dead or away! Their enemies claimed that their God was dead, unable to help them. But you, people, be silent, are living that way. Their atheism of deeds is just as blasphemous as some people's atheism of words and ideas.

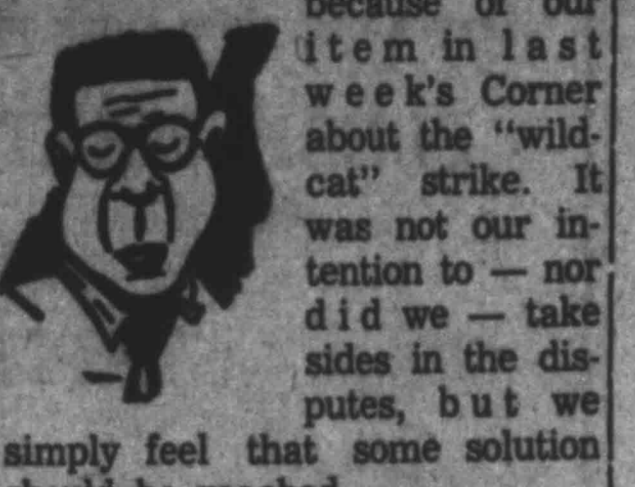

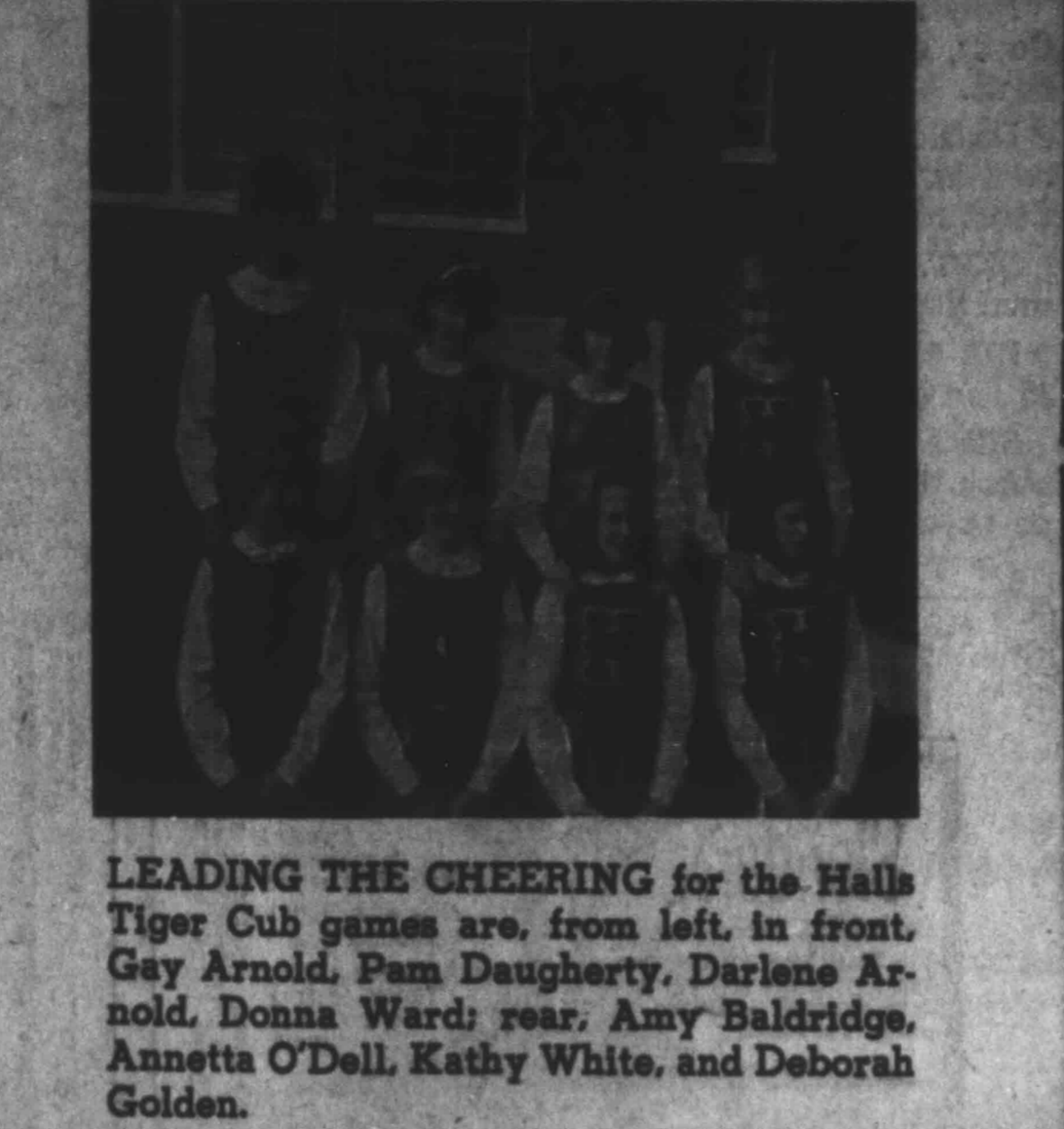

NOTICE OF ELECTION ON PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

An election for the purpose of submitting the following proposed AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION to the voters of the State for RATIFICATION OR REJECTION will be held in every county of the State on **TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1966**

which said election will be conducted according to the general election laws of the State and at which election all persons qualified to vote as required in elections for representatives to the General Assembly shall be entitled to vote.

Proposals (1) through (15) are detailed below, covering amendments to the Tennessee Constitution regarding representation, voting rights, legislative pay, and other constitutional matters.

PROPOSAL (1): SETS REPRESENTATIVES' TERMS FOR TWO YEARS, SENATORS' FOR FOUR YEARS, AND SPEAKERS' FOR TWO YEARS.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 3, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives, both dependent on the people. Representatives shall hold office for two years and Senators for four years from the day of the general election, except that the Speaker of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, each shall hold his office as Speaker for two years or until his successor is elected and qualified, provided however, that in the first general election after adoption of this amendment Senators elected in districts designated by even numbers shall be elected for four years and those elected in districts designated by odd numbers shall be elected for two years. In a county having more than one senatorial district, the districts shall be numbered consecutively."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (2): REQUIRES APPOINTMENT ACCORDING TO POPULATION AND THE U. S. CONSTITUTION EVERY TEN YEARS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The apportionment of Senators and Representatives shall be substantially according to population. After each decennial census made by the Bureau of Census of the United States is available the General Assembly shall establish senatorial and representative districts. Nothing in this Section nor in this Article II shall deny to the General Assembly the right at any time to apportion one House of the General Assembly using geography, political subdivisions, substantially equal population and other criteria as factors; provided such apportionment when effective shall comply with the Constitution of the United States as then amended or authoritatively interpreted. If the Constitution of the United States shall require that Legislative apportionment not based entirely on population be approved by vote of the electorate, the General Assembly shall provide for such vote in the apportionment act."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (3): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVES TO BE APPOINTED INTO DISTRICTS AS PROVIDED BY LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The number of Representatives shall be twenty-nine and shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts as shall be provided by law. Counties having two or more Representatives shall be divided into separate districts, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (4): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVE TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended by adding thereto the following additional subsection:

"Section 5a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

ADOPTED: December 10, 1965

PROPOSAL (5): REQUIRES SENATORS TO BE APPOINTED ACCORDING TO POPULATION.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. The number of Senators shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts substantially according to population, and shall not exceed one-third the number of Representatives. Counties having two or more Senators shall be divided into separate districts. In a district composed of two or more counties, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (6): REQUIRES SENATOR TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended by adding thereto the following additional subsection:

"Section 6a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

ADOPTED: December 10, 1965

PROPOSAL (7): PRESCRIBES TIME FOR LEGISLATIVE MEETINGS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 8, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 8. The General Assembly shall meet in organizational session on the first Tuesday in January next succeeding the election of the members of the House of Representatives, at which session, if in order, the Governor shall be inaugurated, and it shall remain in session for not longer than fifteen consecutive calendar days during which session no legislation shall be passed on third and final reading. Thereafter, the General Assembly shall meet on the fourth Tuesday in February next, and may by joint resolution recess or adjourn until such time or times as it shall determine. It shall be convened at other times

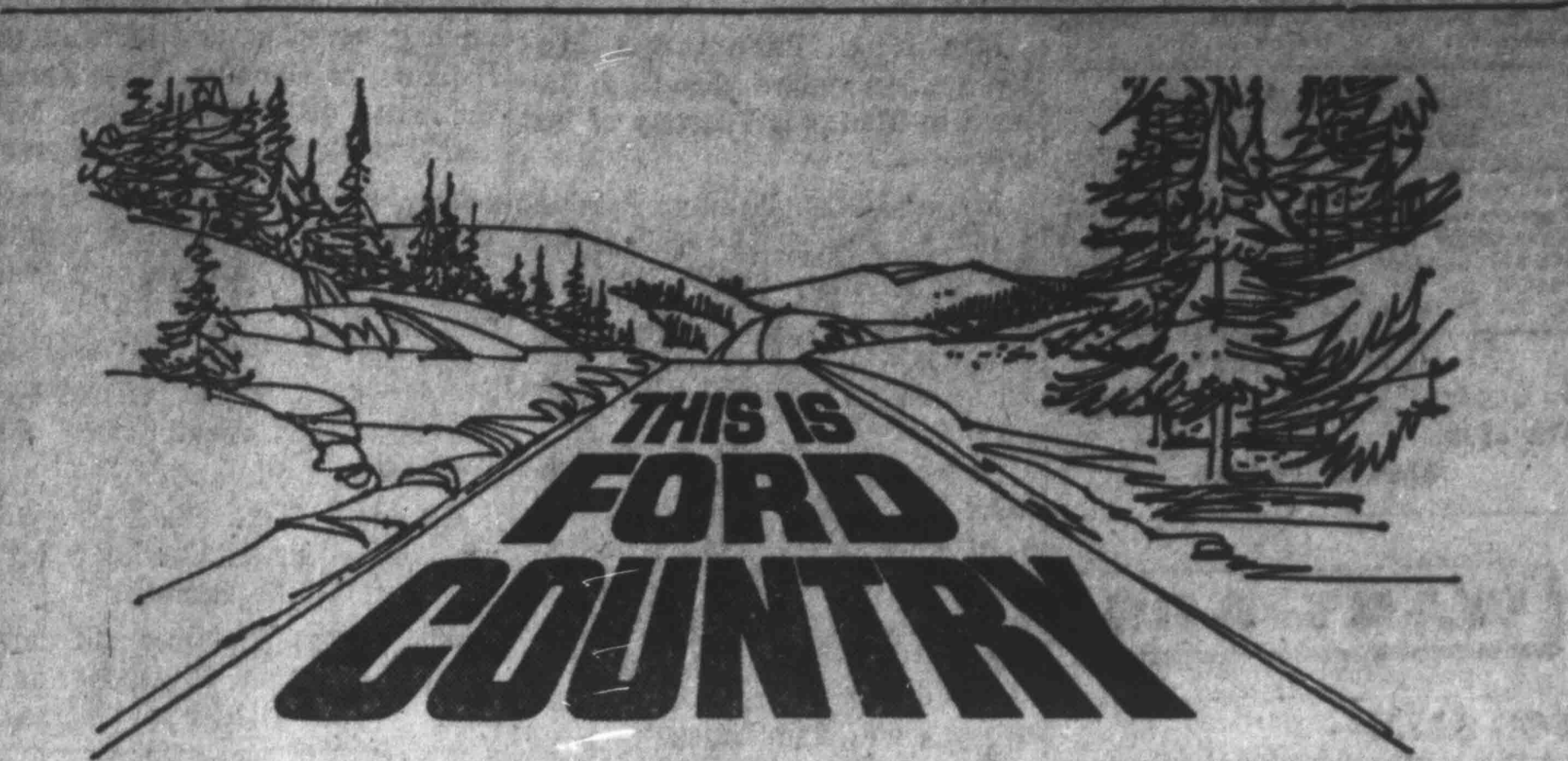

NOTICE OF ELECTION ON PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

An election for the purpose of submitting the following proposed AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION to the voters of the State for RATIFICATION OR REJECTION will be held in every County of the State on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1966

which said election will be conducted according to the general election laws of the State and at which election all persons qualified to vote as required in elections for representatives to the General Assembly shall be entitled to vote.

PROPOSAL (1): SETS REPRESENTATIVES' TERMS FOR TWO YEARS, SENATORS' FOR FOUR YEARS, AND SPEAKERS' FOR TWO YEARS.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 3, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 3. The Legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives, both dependent on the people. Representatives shall hold office for two years and Senators for four years from the day of the general election, except that the Speaker of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, each shall hold his office as Speaker for two years or until his successor is elected and qualified, provided however, that in the first general election after adoption of this amendment Senators elected in districts designated by even numbers shall be elected for four years and those elected in districts designated by odd numbers shall be elected for two years. In a county having more than one senatorial district, the districts shall be numbered consecutively."

PROPOSAL (2): REQUIRES APPOINTMENT ACCORDING TO POPULATION AND THE U. S. CONSTITUTION EVERY TEN YEARS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The apportionment of Senators and Representatives shall be substantially according to population. After each decennial census made by the Bureau of Census of the United States is available the General Assembly shall establish senatorial and representative districts. Nothing in this Section nor in this Article II shall deny to the General Assembly the right at any time to apportion one House of the General Assembly using geography, political subdivisions, substantially equal population and other criteria as factors; provided such apportionment when effective shall comply with the Constitution of the United States as then amended or authoritatively interpreted. If the Constitution of the United States shall require that Legislative apportionment not based entirely on population be approved by vote of the electorate, the General Assembly shall provide for such vote in the apportionment act."

PROPOSAL (3): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVES TO BE APPOINTED UNDER DISTRICTS AS PROVIDED BY LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The number of Representatives shall be ninety-nine and shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts as shall be provided by law. Counties having two or more Representatives shall be divided into separate districts. In a district composed of two or more counties, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

PROPOSAL (4): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVES TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended by adding thereto the following additional subsection: "Section 5a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

PROPOSAL (5): REQUIRES SENATORS TO BE APPOINTED ACCORDING TO POPULATION.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 6. The number of Senators shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts, and shall not exceed one-third the number of Representatives. Counties having two or more Senators shall be divided into separate districts. In a district composed of two or more counties, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

PROPOSAL (6): REQUIRES SENATOR TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended by adding thereto the following additional subsection: "Section 6a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

PROPOSAL (7): PRESCRIBES TIME FOR LEGISLATIVE MEETINGS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 8, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 8. The General Assembly shall meet in organizational session on the first Tuesday in January next succeeding the election of the members of the House of Representatives, at which session, if in order, the Governor shall be inaugurated, and it shall remain in session for not longer than fifteen consecutive calendar days during which session no legislation shall be passed on third and final reading. Thereafter, the General Assembly shall meet on the fourth Tuesday in February next, and may by joint resolution, recess or adjourn until such time or times as it shall determine. It shall be convened at other times

NOTICE OF ELECTION ON PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
An election for the purpose of submitting the following proposed AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION to the voters of the State for RATIFICATION OR REJECTION will be held in every County of the State on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 1966
which said election will be conducted according to the general election laws of the State and at which election all persons qualified to vote as required in elections for representatives to the General Assembly shall be entitled to vote.

PROPOSAL (1): SETS REPRESENTATIVES' TERMS FOR TWO YEARS, SENATORS' FOR FOUR YEARS, AND SPEAKERS' FOR TWO YEARS.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 3, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 3. The Legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives, both dependent on the people. Representatives shall hold office for two years and Senators for four years from the day of the general election, except that the Speaker of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, each shall hold his office as Speaker for two years or until his successor is elected and qualified, provided however, that in the first general election after adoption of this amendment Senators elected in districts designated by even numbers shall be elected for four years and those elected in districts designated by odd numbers shall be elected for two years. In a county having more than one senatorial district, the districts shall be numbered consecutively."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (2): REQUIRES APPOINTMENT ACCORDING TO POPULATION AND THE U. S. CONSTITUTION EVERY TEN YEARS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 4. The apportionment of Senators and Representatives shall be substantially according to population. After each decennial census made by the Bureau of Census of the United States is available the General Assembly shall establish senatorial and representative districts. Nothing in this Section nor in this Article II shall deny to the General Assembly the right at any time to apportion one House of the General Assembly using geography, political subdivisions, substantially equal population and other criteria as factors; provided such apportionment when effective shall comply with the Constitution of the United States as then amended or authoritatively interpreted. If the Constitution of the United States shall require that Legislative apportionment not based entirely on population be approved by vote of the electorate, the General Assembly shall provide for such vote in the apportionment act."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (3): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVES TO BE APPOINTED TO DISTRICTS AS PROVIDED BY LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 5. The number of Representatives shall be ninety-nine and shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts as shall be provided by law. Counties having two or more Representatives shall be divided into separate districts. In a district composed of two or more counties, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (4): REQUIRES REPRESENTATIVE TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended by adding thereto the following additional subsection:
"Section 5a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

ADOPTED: December 10, 1965

PROPOSAL (5): REQUIRES SENATORS TO BE APPOINTED ACCORDING TO POPULATION.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 6. The number of Senators shall be apportioned by the General Assembly among the several counties or districts substantially according to population, and shall not exceed one-third the number of Representatives. Counties having two or more Senators shall be divided into separate districts. In a district composed of two or more counties, each county shall adjoin at least one other county of such district; and no county shall be divided in forming such a district."

ADOPTED: December 9, 1965

PROPOSAL (6): REQUIRES SENATOR TO BE A QUALIFIED VOTER IN HIS DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 6, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 6a. Each district shall be represented by a qualified voter of that district."

ADOPTED: December 10, 1965

PROPOSAL (7): PRESCRIBES TIME FOR LEGISLATIVE MEETINGS, ETC.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article II, Section 8, of the Constitution of Tennessee is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 8. The General Assembly shall meet in organizational session on the first Tuesday in January next succeeding the election of the members of the House of Representatives, at which session, if in order, the Governor shall be inaugurated, and it shall remain in session for not longer than fifteen consecutive calendar days during which session no legislation shall be passed on third and final reading. Thereafter, the General Assembly shall meet on the fourth Tuesday in February next, and may by joint resolution recess or adjourn until such time or times as it shall determine. It shall be convened at other times

ADOPTED: December 10, 1965

What He Wants
 Lesson For October 30, 1966

Background Scripture: Jeremiah 1:1-10.
 Devotional: Deuteronomy 10:1-19.

When Dale Carnegie conceived his "How to Win Friends and Influence People," he struck a commercial gold mine, for everyone wants to know how to get along. There are few of us who don't care about being accepted and admired by others. We all know how pleasant it is to please people and how unpleasant it may be to displease them.

This is no less true of clergymen than it is of lay people. Perhaps you've heard the little limerick:

There was a clergyman out in Dumont,
 Who kept fish in his baptismal font.
 Although it surprises
 The babes he baptizes,
 It seems to be just what they want!

We all like to give people what they want, enjoy, and expect. That is why it is so often difficult to do what God wants us to do: what he wants is in conflict with what people want. Unfortunately, we often find it more unpleasant in the short run to displease people than to say "No" to God.

When God Commands
 Thus, we are constantly in the middle of the conflict between what God wants of us and what others expect of us. John Milton, the English poet, put it so well: "To every good and peaceable man it must in nature be a hateful thing to be a displeaser and molester of those around; much better would it like him to be a messenger of gladness and contentment. But when God commands to take the trumpet and blow a dolorous and jarring blast, it lies not in man's will what he shall say or what he shall conceal."

One of our most common misconceptions is the notion that being a spokesman for God (what the Old Testament calls a prophet) is a romantic or enjoyable vocation. That isn't the way Jeremiah looked at it when God's call came to him. Told by God that he had a prophetic message for him to deliver, Jeremiah protested: "Ah, Lord God! Behold, I do not know how to speak, for I am only a youth." (Jeremiah 1:6 RSV) You've got the wrong man, Lord, that's not up my line. Jeremiah wasn't the first spokesman for God to resist that way, nor the last. Moses, when confronted with the great message he was to take to the people of Israel, had said virtually the same thing: "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the sons of Israel out of Egypt?" There are few of us today who don't respond in a similar fashion: Who am I, Lord, that I should attempt to do that!

I Am With You
 In one sense, we are quite correct when we ask, "Who am I that I should attempt to do that?" for the tasks to which God calls us are always those that ask more than we can supply by our own native resources. There was no denying that Jeremiah was only a youth and Moses did not know how to talk for God. And you and I are constantly overwhelmed by the demands he makes upon us.

The key, however, is not to our adequacy, but in his. "Be not afraid of them," he assured Jeremiah, "for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord." (Jeremiah 1:8 RSV) Our inadequacy is more than compensated for by his power which he gives to those who faithfully respond to his call. He will supply the power if we will undertake to do what he wants.

Have you given thought to what he wants of you? Have you honestly faced what he wants you to say, to do, or to be? True, it may not win friends or even influence people, but there is a higher satisfaction in doing what he wants.

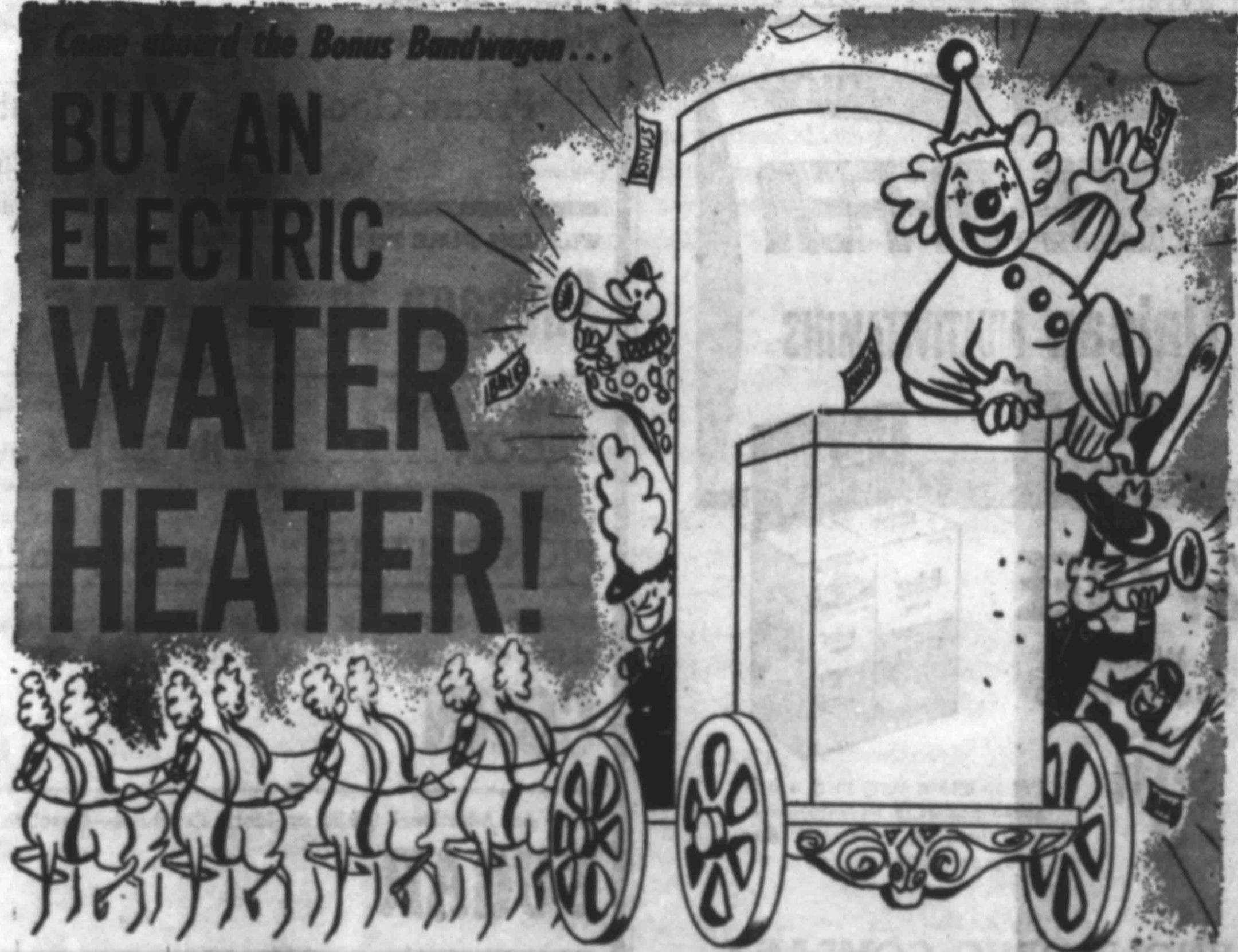
