

Whereas Luke's gospel brings us up to the resurrection, Acts is the story of how the resurrection victory continued to affect the lives of people and bring into being the Church of Jesus Christ.

Without this "second book," hen, we might very well conclude that the resurrection was a vic-tory for Jesus alone. God vin-dicated him, by freeing him from the power of death. But what does that have to do with the disciples apart from indicating that they had thrown their lot with the right man?

The answer that comes to us in Acts is quite clear. The power by which Jesus was raised from the tomb and scored his great victory was to be the very same power that would be given them for their God-given mission. His victory would also be their
