"I hate, I despise your feasts, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies" (Amos 5:

21 RSV).

God hates the time-honored worthip practices of his people! There can be no mistaking this:

"Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and cereal offerings, I will not accept them, and the peace offerings of your fated beasts I will not look upon. Take away from me the noise of your songs; to the melody of your harps I will not listen" (Amos 5:22-23 RSV)

Noise Of Our Hymns

Can you imagine how stunned were the people of Israel when Amos delivered this prophecy? The feasts, the solemn assemblies, the various offerings, the joyous songs, the melody of harps, all these they had assumed were pleasing to the Lord, the right way to worship. It is as if today God were to say to us: "I hate your holy seasons, and I take no delight in your Sunday services. Even though you offer crisp dollar bills and make three-year pledges, I will not accept them. Take away the noise of your hymns, to the melody of your pipe organs and robed choirs I will not listen!"

"But God," we cry, "that's the way we've learned to worship. If that isn't what you want, what do you want?" Surely the people of Israel must have responded in somewhat the same way. What

did God want?

Amos had a ready answer:
"But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an everflowing stream" (Amos 5:24 RSV). There we are: what God wants from us above all else is justice and righteousness.

For Those Less Fortunate

But what do you mean by justice and righteousness"? Well, "justice and righteousness"? Well, says Amos, for example: stop trampling the needy, stop oppressing the poor, stop making money your chief goal in life, stop cheating in your business and work, stop exploiting the weak, stop fattening yourself at the expense of your fellowmen (Amos 8:4-7). In other words, seek justice and practice righteousness for those less fortunate than

Amos also mentions those perchants who are so eager to sume their trade, that they can ardly wait for the end of the holy days (for commerce was forbidden then). Today they would no longer have to wait. Not only are many stores open on Sundays and holidays, but we have also found ways of exploiting holy seasons for personal profit. The world could not afford to lose the Christian Church: Christmas and Easter are much too profitable

**Forgotten By Monday**

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
