



The Tuberculosis Association Christmas Seal campaign this week had received a total of \$866 since the opening of the campaign

in mid-November. F. H. Paschal, chairman, said this amount was received through the mail in 338 letters.

This lags behind contributions last year at this time. There were more than 2,300 other Christmas Seal letters sent and Paschal said he was hopeful that with the Thanksgiving rush past, many others would find time this week

to reply to their letters. "The Christmas season is for children, and we all want to make it a happy season for them." Mr. Paschal said. "But tuberculosis is attacking our children. Last year in Tennessee, tuberculosis was discovered in 68 children five years of age or younger. We need more education and more effort to prevent a recurrence of that.
