but we were impressed with some of his statements and also in disagreement with some. His assertion that no group has any right to invade private or public property for demonstration purposes is in line with the belief that we have held all the time. We do not feel that student demonstrators, only a small percentage of the whole, should be permitted to interfere with the education of others, nor do we feel that demonstrators should be permitted to interfere with others on private or public property.

Concerning his statement about pornography—which we did not hear—we cannot agree that there is no such thing as pornography or obscene literature, and it seems to us that there should be some means of controlling distribution of material unfit for public consumption. However, censorship as it has existed in the past, seems to us to be completely ridiculous.

Interest Rates Rise

Chase National Bank, of New York City, has announced an increase of interest rates from 6 1/4% to 6 1/2%.

At first glance, one would wonder just what that has to do with Halls and Lauderdale County, since local banks fix our interest rates, but it did have a direct effect on Halls in halting the sale of the water and sewer bonds slated for Tuesday. Bond buyers uncertain of the future market, failed to offer any bids.

This does not mean that the bonds won't sell, but it may mean they will draw a higher interest rate.

Tucker Hipp Says Dare Beans Stand Better Than Lees

Grows 50 Bushels Per Acre On 17 Acres With Use Of Lorox And Then Dintiro

Tucker Hipp, pace-setting farmer of Ashport, has completed harvesting 17 acres of Dare soybeans which averaged 50 bushels per acre.

Dare is a new variety which usually stands up better under high yields than the Lee variety, although it is more likely to drop some beans which pop out.

Mr. Hipp says that when beans stand up well, this speeds combining, saves shattering, and makes for higher yields actually harvested.

Tucker used Lorox as a pre-emergence herbicide in bands. When the beans were up about 16 days, he applied Dintiro as a post-emergence spray and repeated this seven days later.

This burned some leaves off the lower parts of the beans, but there was no permanent injury, and the Dintiro did an excellent job of killing all the weeds that were there at the time.

Soil Testing Basic

Jack Crutcher this week began taking soil samples of all the more than 70 fields in his farm. He intends to get the best possible information from the soil testing laboratory of the University of Tennessee on the lime, phosphate, and potash he should use next year for the best yields of various crops at the lowest possible cost for fertilizer.

Jack has been repeating this process every two or three years. He firmly believes it is one of the most profitable practices he uses for higher profits on his farm. He refines the process by putting a large aerial photograph of the farm on the wall at a convenient location and then marking the soil test results in code on this map.

The County Agents' office furnishes recommendations so that he will know at any time what to use for any particular crop he wants to grow on any special field.

W. M. Glenn, Thomas Gause, and R. E. Fullen have taken soil samples on their crops for next year. Johnny Roberts is waiting for drier ground.

If farmers did not have a method of testing the soil to determine its needs on a practical basis for the various crops we normally grow, they would probably be rather critical of their experiment stations for not having developed such a process.

When a proven method, carried out by impartial trained personnel of the state university, is available at a total cost of 50¢ per field, a high proportion of farmers should use the service at least every three years.

\$700,000 Released For Cane Creek Channel Project

Everett Announces Signing Of Agreement To Proceed With Massive Watershed

U. S. Rep. Robert A. Everett has announced that \$700,000 has been released by the Soil Conservation Service for channel improvement work on the Cane Creek Watershed Project in Lauderdale County.

Watershed directors, headed by President Lynwood Grammer, of Ripley, signed the project agreement with the Soil Conservation Service Nov. 28th definitely allocating the federal funds for the project. An invitation for the channel rehabilitation bid is expected to be issued soon.

The 57,000 acre watershed, a tributary of the Hatchie River, was authorized for operations in August, 1961, under Public Law 566, The Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act.

To date, more than 1,500 acres of gullies and sediment producing areas and about 12 miles of roadbanks have been stabilized, and six flood water retarding dams have been completed.

The work to be performed will consist of more than 31 miles of stream channel, excavating, and improvement on the main channel of Cane Creek and its tributaries and inlets.

Directors are Mr. Grammer; Austin Winn, vice-president; Bernice Crain, secretary-treasurer; Tom M. Scott; Leslie Lightfoot; S. L. Ferguson; and Nevel Henderson.

Tennessee Farm Bureau have worked together to develop a bookkeeping and business analysis service for farmers which can be computerized and made available to several thousand farmers at reasonable cost.

Such a service is now available, and interested farmers are invited to come to the Farm Bureau Building in Jackson at 9:30 a. m. Dec. 11th to learn more about it.

Interest Tremors Delay Bond Sale

Sale of Halls water and sewer bonds was postponed Tuesday until Jan. 14th.

Upset by fluctuating interest rates, trending upward, bidders withdrew until a further determination of rates can be made.

Halls Mayor James Chesnier said construction of the water and sewer lines probably would not be delayed materially, since weather conditions prohibit work at this time.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen has passed on third reading an ordinance renewing the Ripley Power & Light Co. franchise in Halls.

ON YULE CARDS

Halls Postmaster M. G. Pierce, Jr. today advised persons sending Christmas cards that all cards weighing one ounce or less must carry six cents postage.

In previous years, unsealed cards without a written message (only the signature of the sender) could be sent one-cent less than first class postage. These would be delivered as third-class mail, without the provision of forwarding or return if undeliverable.

The postage rate legislation which went into effect last January raised the single rate-third class postage to six cents for the first two ounces.

Since virtually all greeting cards weigh less than an ounce, the first class and third-class rates are, in effect, the same.

Rep. Everett Back At Union City Post For The Weekend

Weight Down To 240 Pounds As He Resumes Activity; Diabetes Has Improved

U. S. Rep. Robert A. 'Fats' Everett, weakened by illness but nevertheless still jovial and enthusiastic, was back in harness in his Union City office last weekend after having arrived there about 5:30 p. m. Friday.

"My heart is sound, my mind clear and I feel better than I have in five years," the congressman asserted. "My legs are still weak and I have to have a little help getting from place to place, but otherwise I feel just fine."

Mr. Everett said the rigid diet he has been on since he became seriously ill in mid-October has brought his weight down to 240 pounds, the lightest he has weighed in many years. About 60 pounds of the weight loss, he explained, was due to body fluids drawn off by doctors in treating his kidney ailment.

Physicians had additional cheerful news for the veteran legislator.

"They told me that my diabetic condition has cleared up for the time being and I'm not having to take any medicine for it," Mr. Everett said.

The congressman's schedule for the next few weeks will include two trips weekly to Nashville's Veterans Hospital for treatments with the artificial kidney the hospital maintains.

He returned to Nashville Sunday, underwent a kidney treatment, and flew to New Orleans to accept the presidency of the Lower Mississippi Valley Flood Control Association.

"After that, I'll come back home, rest up some more and try to regain some strength in my legs," Mr. Everett said. He also hopes to do a little visiting in his Eighth Congressional District before returning to Washington to attend to his duties in Congress.

"We have worked out arrangements for me to have access to a kidney machine in Washington while Congress is in session," the congressman explained. "Right now, there is every reason to believe that the machine can be attached at night and function while I'm asleep. That way I can work during the day."

The congressman's booming voice softened as he talked about the reaction of his friends and constituents to his illness.

"I just don't know how to express the appreciation I feel for the interest my friends have shown in my recovery. I am sincerely grateful for the prayers in my behalf, for the cards, the flowers, the telephone calls and other inquiries.

"In the political area," Mr. Everett continued, "you sometimes feel a little disheartened at some of the requests you get. But the way my friends have rallied to me in my hour of need can make a man forget the rare moments of unpleasantness and remember only the satisfaction that comes from serving such wonderful people as those who live in my district.

"I'll never forget them."

2,300 Seal Letters Given No Answer

The Tuberculosis Association Christmas Seal campaign this week had received a total of \$966 since the opening of the campaign in mid-November.

F. H. Paschal, chairman, said this amount was received through the mail in 338 letters.

This lags behind contributions last year at this time. There were more than 2,300 other Christmas Seal letters sent and Paschal said he was hopeful that with the Thanksgiving rush past, many others would find time this week to reply to their letters.

"The Christmas season is for children, and we all want to make it a happy season for them," Mr. Paschal said. "But tuberculosis is attacking our children. Last year in Tennessee, tuberculosis was discovered in 88 children five years of age or younger. We need more education and more effort to prevent a recurrence of that and other new cases this year."

"The Lauderdale County Tuberculosis Association pledges itself to use its resources to meet these needs in Lauderdale County. Of the \$3,200 needed to meet the more urgent of the needs, and to obtain funds for the whole year's work, more than \$2,300 is needed from Lauderdale counties who want to see tuberculosis stopped here."

What makes popcorn pop?

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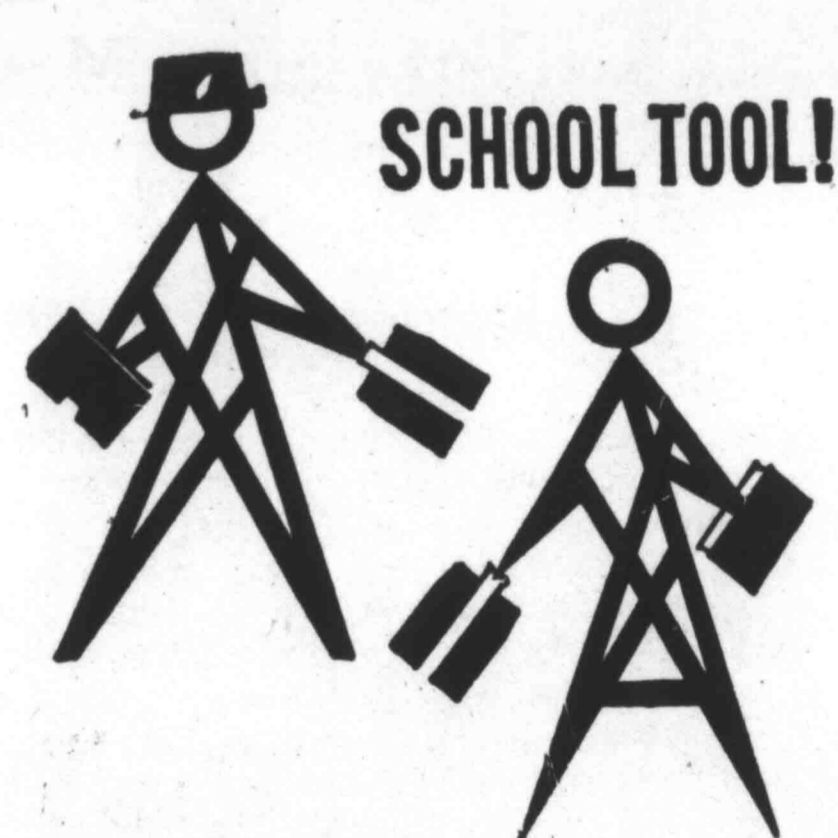

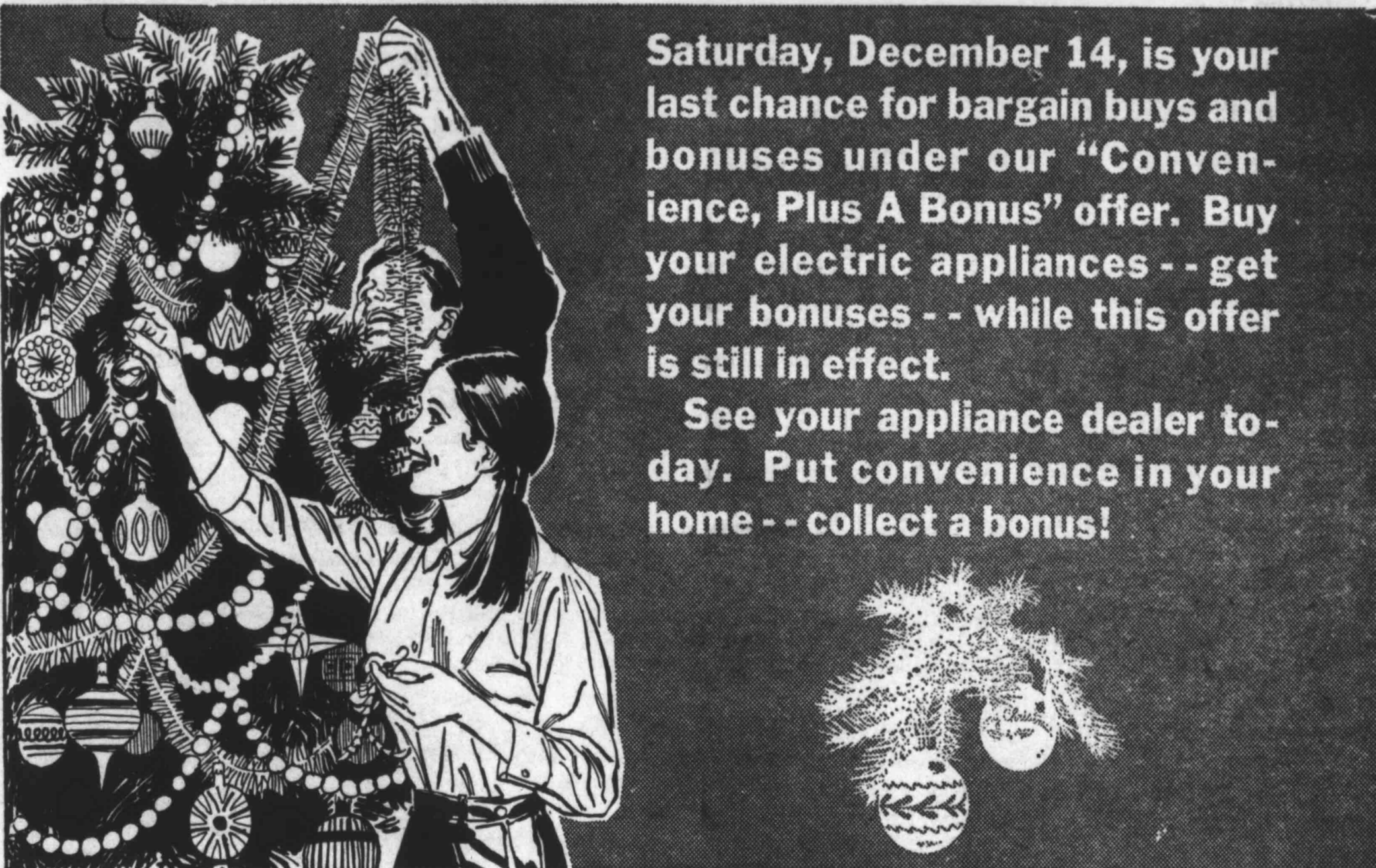

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS
BY LAWRENCE W. ALTHOUSE

THAT DAY!
Lesson for December 15, 1968
Background Scripture: Revelation 4 through 7.

An American soldier who spent two and a half years as a prisoner of war in North Korea was asked how he kept going and what gave him the will to live when so many of his comrades were giving up of despair. He replied that it was the thought of home which became difficult...

Rev. Althouse says: "When I got hungry," he said, "I dreamed of the morning I would have with my family again." When he was cold in his cell, he looked ahead to the warmth of the home he planned to build. When he felt particularly lonely, he tried to envision both his wife and the child he hadn't seen since his son's first birthday. When there were long periods without any mail from home...

There is one important difference between his experience and that of the American soldier referred to above: the writer of Revelation saw the future through a symbolic imagery rather than the realistic daydreams of the soldier. Secondly, the soldier believed these visions were given to him by God or Revelation. When we read Revelation, therefore, we must not get bogged down in the literal details of the visions, but must constantly seek to understand the vision of the messages they bear.

Multitudes!
After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude, and I was not able to count them because they were so many, but they stood before the throne and in front of the Lamb. He sees, not the churches bending under the weight of persecution, but the great gathering in heaven of those who have been redeemed by Christ. It is not the present that occupies him, but the "last days" when God will fulfill his plan for his creation. He sees multitudes, people so numerous that they cannot be counted.

Promises of victory
There is another reason for encouragement. His world... like ours, is a divided world. Yet, that day which his vision sees, there will be no more barriers between men and men. All nations and races will be there. Different cultures, languages, and customs may separate us today, but these barriers will not survive that day.

In addition to the mail campaign, contributions are personally solicited from business firms and the professions. Partial reports from this source, including Mrs. Paschal's, show an additional \$333 received—Halls reporting \$191.50, and Henning \$18.50. "I appreciate all the gifts to the anti-tuberculosis and respiratory disease work," Mr. Paschal said, "and am grateful to people who, by their confidence and support, keep the work going. We cannot afford to falter now," he said. "Tuberculosis is an infectious disease. The TB Association is constantly at work to further the understanding that this is so. Last year in Tennessee, there were 209 deaths from tuberculosis, and sixty-one of these had never been known to health authorities as tuberculosis cases. Who can say how many they had infected before their disease came to light by death certificate?"

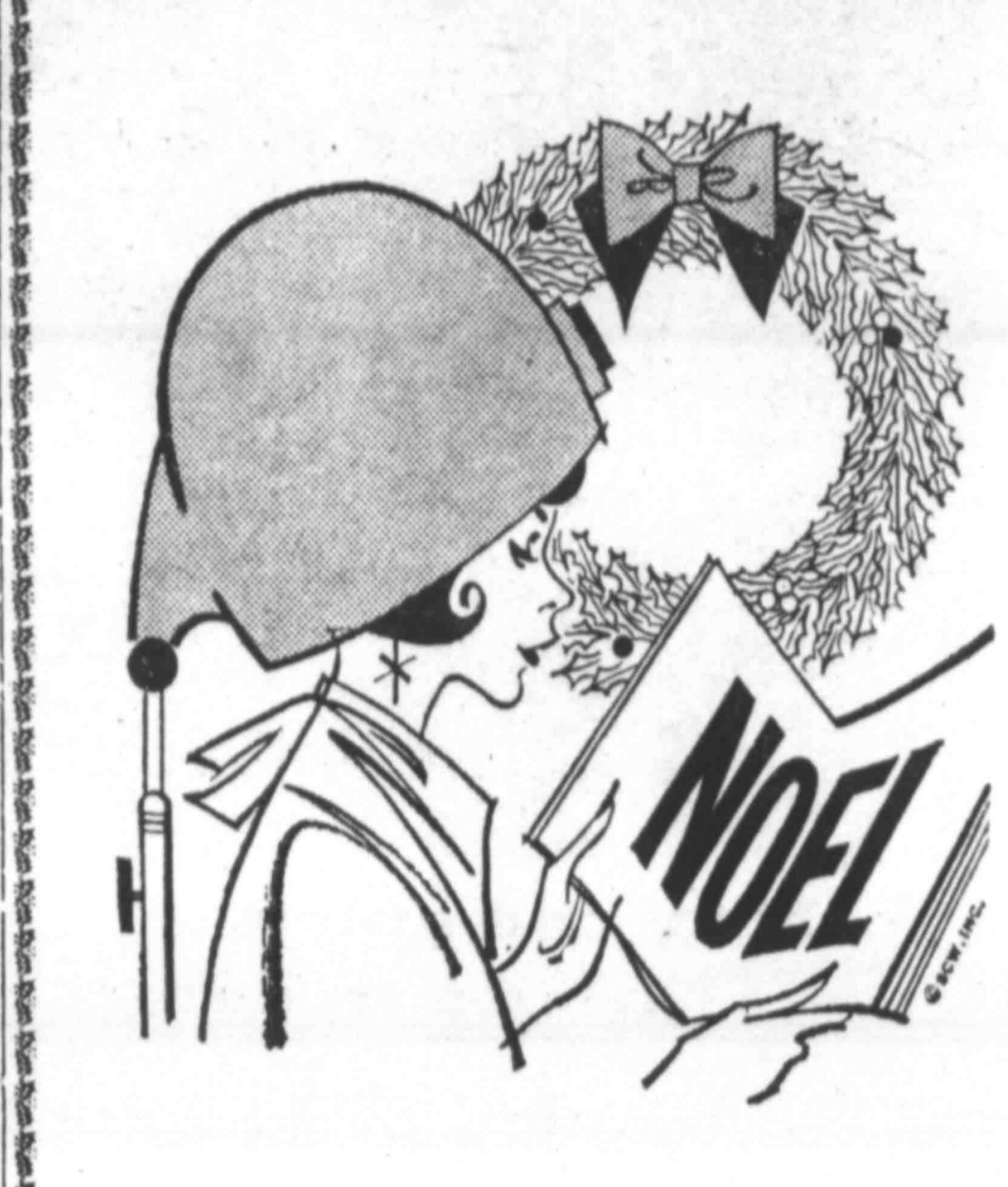

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Nation's Toughest Gun Control Law Goes Into Effect

Blocks Interstate Sales Of Firearms And Ammunition Except Between Dealers

The most restrictive gun control act ever passed by Congress took effect at midnight Dec. 15th barring all interstate sales of firearms and ammunition except between licensed manufacturers, dealers and collectors.

The final regulations for enforcing the controversial law, the job of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), were published over the weekend in the Federal Register.

The main provisions prevent interstate sales of rifles, shotguns and their ammunition, either by mail order or over-the-counter, except where a state passes enabling legislation to permit its residents to purchase these items in adjacent states.

Interstate sales of handguns, rifles, pistols and revolvers, are not included in the law, because such sales were barred in the 1968 Antitrust Bill.

The new law was signed by President Johnson Oct. 22nd after five years of heated gun control debate in Congress.

The new law also:

- Stipulates that a person be 21 to buy a handgun or handgun ammunition, even in his own state.
- Makes it unlawful for a dealer to sell arms or ammunition to anyone he "has reasonable cause to believe" is a convicted criminal, fugitive, mental defective, or drug addict.
- Exempts from its provisions antique guns and ammunition, curies, pellet guns operated by air or gas, and all handling equipment except ammunition components.
- Sets license fees at \$25 a year for pawnbrokers, and \$10 a year for dealers and collectors.
- Does not require national registration or licensing of guns as gun owners nor prohibits hunters and target shooters from carrying their firearms across state lines.
- Permits individuals to ship their guns out of state for repairs or customizing and to receive inherited guns in interstate commerce.
- Permits a person who loses or damages his gun while hunting or target shooting in another state to buy another one on the spot, with notice of the sale sent to the chief law enforcement officer of his home community.
- Permits an out-of-state resident to borrow or rent a gun.
- Permits intrastate mail order sales, with the seller notifying the chief law enforcement officer of the buyer's community, then waiting seven days to make deliveries.

Presumably, states will now begin passing enabling legislation to permit their residents, under the 1968 law, to buy shotguns, rifles and ammunition—but not handguns—in adjacent states. Such purchases would be made under conditions virtually identical to intrastate mail order sales.

The law forbids imports of all surplus military weapons, but permits imports of commercially made firearms and ammunition deemed suitable for sporting purpose.

Since even a bare rifle or shotgun receiver is defined as a weapon under the act, separate stocks, barrels and breechlocks are not—the highly popular Mauser military receivers used for custom rifles will no longer be imported.

Any component of rifle or pistol ammunition—either the case, primer, bullet or powder—is also considered "ammunition" and is thus barred from interstate purchase.

This means a handloader in California cannot buy cartridge cases or bullets at discount prices from a large mail order business in Pennsylvania.

But the IRS, heeding appeals from trap and steel shooting clubs which engage in large-scale reloading, exempted shotgun shot and empty, unprimed nonmetallic shotgun shell cases from the "ammunition" label, thus permitting them to be bought and sold across state lines.

A complete shotgun shell, containing primer, powder and shot, is still classed as ammunition.

The IRS, acting within the framework of the language used in the law, made some concessions to shooting clubs which sell or hand out free rifle or shotgun ammunition to members for use on the premises.

Under the enforcement regulations, clubs will be able to do this without qualifying for dealers' licenses and the ammunition may be transferred to persons under 18.

The new measure also exempts handloaders from having to buy a \$10 manufacturer's license unless they sell their ammunition commercially.

But the enforcement regulations call for stricter definition of a dealer, making it illegal for an

Individual to obtain a dealer's license just to enable him to buy at wholesale prices, a common practice among serious hobbyists in the past when a license cost only \$1, with no questions asked.

Now a dealer must be "engaged" in the business of selling firearms or ammunition at wholesale or retail, any person engaged in the business of repairing or making or fitting barrels, stocks or trigger mechanisms to firearms or any person who is a pawnbroker.

The same provisions which prevent a New Yorker from buying a gun in New Jersey also prevent a Canadian or a Mexican from purchasing a firearm in the United States, according to an IRS interpretation. This means gun dealers along the Rio Grande Valley will lose considerable Mexican business.

Aliens may purchase firearms in their respective states after they have been in the United States 90 days. Foreign embassy employees may buy guns with the endorsement of their ambassadors.

The law exempts antiques and curios. Antiques were defined in the law as firearms made before 1886 or a replica of such, but Congress left the perplexing task of defining curios to the IRS.

After listening to collectors, most of whom also dodged the definition, the tax agency said a curio was a gun or ammunition "made 50 years from current date (or certified by the curator of a municipal or state museum as being of museum interest (or any gun or ammunition which derives a substantial part of its value from the fact that it is novel, rare, bizarre, or associated with some historical figure or period).

This broad definition presumably means that some relatively modern firearms, including handguns, could be classed curios and thus be exempted from the law. However, the IRS has the right to rule on each item.
