

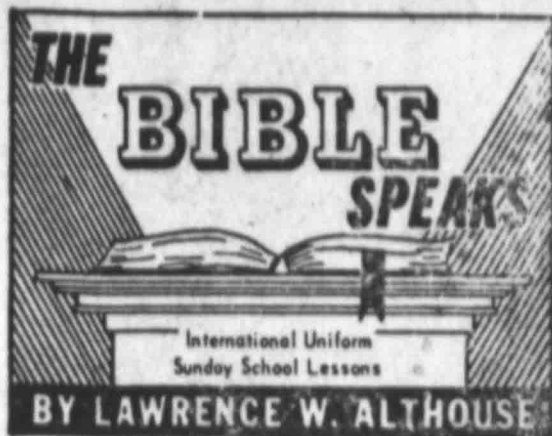

THE CHASE

Lesson for June 9, 1968

Background Scripture: Job 28 through 41. Devotional Reading: Psalm 148.

Someone has warned that we must be careful what we make our heart's desire, for we just might get it!

We have all seen dogs who delight in chasing after automobiles. But have you ever considered what a dog would do if he caught one? It is one thing to chase after something, but something else to know what to do if your chase is successful.

This is what happened to Job. Suffering, confused, frustrated, even angry, Job has challenged God to give him an explanation for the sorry plight in which he finds himself. He has pleaded for an opportunity to "have his day in court," to reason together with God. After all, Job is a reasonable man. He will gladly understand if only God will give him a reasonable explanation.

An Unexpected Response

Last week we saw Job's reasonable approach (Job 31). With great clarity and logic he had set forth his case. If he has sinned in any way, then let God show him and he would understand. How could the Lord withstand the logic of his evidence? How could he fail to see that Job was a righteous man suffering the affliction that should be reserved for the ungodly?

The Lord has been silent for a long time, allowing Job to catalogue his reasonable complaints. Like a defendant in a court of law, he has allowed his accuser to continue uninterrupted. Now, however, he speaks at last: WHO IS THIS THAT DARKENS COUNSEL BY WORDS WITHOUT KNOWLEDGE? (Job 38:2 RSV)

This is not the kind of response Job had expected. God's reply is not that of a defendant, struggling to explain his unreasonable actions, but as the Lord of the Universe! Who is this, asks God, who casts doubt upon my wisdom and goodness? Who is this, he demands, who speaks in such ignorance?

Cross-examination

Like a dog chasing automobiles, Job had demanded reasonable answers to his questions. Then suddenly the chase is over and God confronts him: If I give you your reasonable answers, Job, will you be able to understand them? You want to reason together, but are you capable of reasoning with your Creator? Job had intended to do the cross-examining, but it is now clear that it will be God asking the questions and Job who will need to come up with the reasonable answers. If you are really so wise, Job, where were you when the world was created? Can your mind comprehend the dimensions of the universe and understand how it was fashioned? Can you with your wisdom control the planets and stars?

The answer to all of these questions is obvious to this reasonable man: the human mind is finite, too limited to understand the intelligence of God's creative will and purpose. How often, like Job, I have found my lot unreasonable and demanded of God a logical explanation. Yet I might just as well have asked Einstein for a simple explanation of Relativity or challenged an astronomer's computations of the universe.

The Mind's Limits

It is natural that man wants to understand, to use the mind that God gave him, to ask his Job-like questions. Still, we must remember that often, like Job, we are asking to understand what our poor finite minds cannot grasp, to grapple with problems that are intelligible only to the mind of the Creator Himself. It is then that, having discovered the limitations of our intellect, we respond to God with humble awe and wonder. "I know that thou canst do all things and that no purpose of thine can be thwarted," says Job at last.

He still does not know why he is suffering, but now he takes courage and hope in the knowledge that, even while he suffers, God still reigns. The chase is over. The pursuer is secure in the hands of the Pursued.

Reaping What We Sow

The Murder of Sen. Robert Kennedy is one more act of violence that can be laid at the feet of politicians who are more interested in a vote than they are in law and order.

The continued encouragement of disobedience to any law of which an individual does not approve has had the effect of making violence, rioting, etc., a way of life with many people.

We had no intention of voting for Robert Kennedy for President because we felt that his way of thinking was not best for our country; but certainly, the man had every right to be a candidate, to walk free and unmolested over this nation, and to convert citizens to his candidacy if he could.

It would seem that this horrible murder, which follows the assassinations of President John Kennedy, Dr. Martin Luther King, and a number of others, but bring sharply into focus the need for law enforcement now, not at some distant future date.

Although he presently has not resigned, it seems certain that Dale Overton, principal of Halls High School for the past four years, has accepted a position in administration with The University of Tennessee at Martin and will resign when he returns from vacation in California.

Grand Jury Skips Carl Yochum Case

The grand jury adjourned Monday until September without returning an indictment in the shotgun slaying of Carl Yochum, 45-year-old night spot operator near Ripley whose body had been taken from the Old Forked Deer River a week earlier.

Sheriff Gwinn Matthews has turned over evidence gathered in the case to Attorney General Will Terry Abernathy, of Selmer, who met with the jury Monday. The case, however, was not presented to the jury. The sheriff says there is a definite suspect in the case and that the investigation will continue.

Halls' city officials were notified Monday that the Economic Development Administration has approved a grant of \$29,500 to help construct a railroad track to the Tupperware plant.

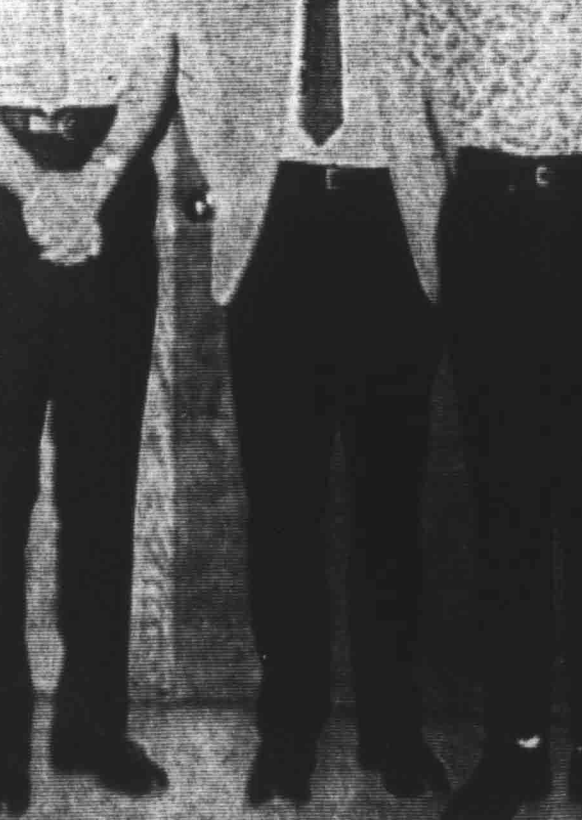
