### THE SIN OF SILENCE Lesson for September 15, 196/

Background Scripture: Esther 1 through 8. Devotional Reading: Psalms 46.

\* For the Christian there are few books in the Bible more troubling than Esther. It is an teresting story, but the follower Christ can hardly help but e appalled at the bloody con-



usion in which 75,000 of the Jews' enemies are slain in a single day's vengeance. Still, Maimonides, the medieval Jewish ph" osopher, said that if all the rest

of the scriptures Rev. Althouse passed away, the Torah and Esther would remain. Today it re-mains one of the favorite books in the synagogue and is read at every celebration of the Feast of Purim. Even an important Jewish women's society is named in honor of Esther (Hadassah).

An epic of survival To the non-Jew it may r seem at all a religious bookthe name of God is not even mentioned in it. Martin Luther was quite outspoken in his derogatory opinion: "I am so hos-tile to this book that I wish it did not exist. . ." Why, then, is it so important to our Jew-

The answer should be of is a stirring story of deliverance rom the evil of anti-Semitism. Its story helps to remind the Jew atically exterminated by the Nazis, they have nevertheless survived and it is a celebration of that triumphant survival!

It is also appeal for self-sacrificing courage and persever-ance. Esther's uncle, Mordecai, does not assure her that everything will come out all right as often it does not-but instead "And who knows whether you have not come to the kingom for such a time as this? er response is still an inspiraon for the Jew today: perish, I perish". (Esther 4:

Roots of preiudice

There is, however, something else in Esther for the non-Jew None of us should be able to read this book without some stabbing of conscience and the haunting realization that the greatest of evils in this book, anti-Semitism, s still with us today, an evil fo which we cannot quite escape some collective if not individual Haman's route to ejudice is not unlike our own. le begins by hating an individual Jew, Mordecai, and goes on to espising all Jews. He hates the lew because his culture refuses to e swallowed up by his own. he Jews are different and that difference becomes both a cause Red And White and a symbol of his hatred. Instead of Haman, perhaps we dentify with the king. He has no particular dislike for the Jews. e allows Haman to persecute hem simply because he is too reoccupied with other things! Though he has the power to do something about it, he manages regard it as none of his afair. How many Jews have suffered, not only because of the Haman's, but because of men like the king who are too preoccupied with other Guilty bystanders

There are others in the story. ninor characters who merely carry out the orders of the Haman's. olds (or ovens) for someone else's victims. They are soldiers obeyng their superiors and guilty byanders who go blithely abou heir "business as usual."

That is how monstrous crimes not only because of the Haman's, the very visible illians, but also because of the others who let it happen by their Esther could have nese. Her own postion was secure. No wonder our Jewish brothers admire this woman who risked everything rather than commit the sin of

### God's mistake

Third. Jonah found it impossible to believe that God would have any concern for these people. Israel was his chosen nation. If he was going to love anyone it would be the Jews. Besides, how could God love or be concerned about people who were so evil and pagan? It was almost an insult to think that God would show some of the same concern for Nineveh that he demonstrated for Jerusalem.

We can almost hear Jonah protesting, "It's all wrong, I tell you, it's all wrong!" Yet the persistance of God made something else evident too: "But evidently it is the will of God." Pursued by God until at last he gave in, Jonah accepted the task and went to the Assyrian city. It was not to the Assyrian city. It was not something he desired to do, but evidently it is the will of God and he has no choice, though he is quite sure that God is making a big mistake. It is then that, from Jonah's

point of view, the very worst thing happens: the people of Nineveh, these hopeless, god-less Assyrians, take seriously his reluctant warning and repent! And how does he respond to this marvelous turn of events? Is he overjoyed at his unexpected suc-cess? HE IS NOT! It may be the will of God for these heathens to share with Israel the mercy of God, but it is still all wrong! Angry, the petulant prophet sulks under a vine that God has graciously provided to protect him from the Sun.

Not just one man

What was the writer of Jonah trying to say to his people with about all men, not just a few. He is attempting to help his readers to see that, though Jonah was a Jew and a prophet, the sailors on the ship, though heathens, were more humane and compassionate. The people of Nineveh, Assyrians though they were, nevertheless were more responsive to the word of God and more obedient to his will than Onan. Thus, Jonah is not just one PICNICS

man. He is all Israelites who man. He is all israelites who would rather defeat their enemies than live with them in peace. He is all men who find it imposs-ible to fit the will of God into their little minds and lives. He is all of us who are convinced that God's plan for universal brotherhood in one world must be "all wrong". Thus, he who laughs disdain-fully at Jonah may, in reality.
