

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THE COVENANT

Lesson for August 3, 1969

Background Scriptures Exodus 19-24. Devotional Reading: Deuteronomy 4:1-10.

What is a covenant? The term is frequently used in both the Old and New Testaments, but what is it?

Perhaps the simplest explanation is that it is an agreement between two or more parties. If your neighbor were to say to you, "I'll sell you my powermower for twenty-five dollars, and you were to respond with "O.K.," that would be a covenant. Yet we

Rev. Althouse seldom use that term for elementary agreements. You would hardly say, "I covenanted with Mr. Jones to buy his powermower." We usually reserve the term for the more important agreements that we make.

A promise Many of you made a covenant when you united with a certain congregation. You were probably asked, "Do you promise... Will you faithfully endeavor to... Will you be...?" This was an agreement between three parties: God, yourself, and the congregation. In one denomination's ritual of membership, the minister asks the congregation: "Will you enter into a covenant with him to cherish him in brotherly love and kindness...?" God has already done something, I promise to do something, and the congregation accepts my promise to do and extends to me their promise in return.

Or consider matrimony. This too is a covenant. The bride and groom in the presence of the congregation make certain promises to each other and to God. They take upon themselves very solemn vows. Yet, there is more than vows involved; there is a relationship that precedes and follows the vows. The minister says, "Into this beautiful and holy relationship these two persons desire now to enter... Thus a marriage is defined, not only by the promises which people make to each other, but by the new relationship they will share.

Privileges and responsibilities This is also true when a person unites with a church. He begins with the realization that by his own sinfulness he has broken his relationship with God. He comes to understand that it is God's desire to heal this broken relationship, and so he turns to God and accepts the mercy already extended toward him by God. Thus, a new relationship between a man and his God is established. Entering this new relationship with God, he perceives a new relationship with other Christians and he thus joins a congregation, voluntarily taking upon himself new responsibilities.

God acts, then offers a new relationship that carries both privileges and responsibilities and up to man, then responds. God acts, man reacts. God always takes the initiative, but the covenant is still dependent upon man's response.

Therefore... If we can understand this, then we can appreciate better the covenant between God and the Hebrews. In Exodus 19 we find them in the desert of Sinai. Behind them is their miraculous escape from the Pharaoh. God tells Moses to remind the people: "You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself." God had acted! Having acted on their behalf, he now offers the Israelites a new relationship of privilege and responsibility. "Now therefore, if you will obey my voice and keep my covenant you shall be my own possession among all the peoples... I am the Lord your God." They will be his people and he will be their God.

Now that he has acted and offered a new relationship, he spells out their responsibilities under this covenant: "You shall... You shall not... Thus, remembering what he has done for us and is doing and has promised to do, we do as he requests, not out of slavish submission, but loving obedience. Because we accept his Fatherhood, we accept also his Lordship.



State Board Sets Disaster Aid For County In Drouth

Washington Approval Will Permit Grazing Diverted Acreage In Lauderdale

A. O. Chambers, chairman of the county disaster committee, was notified this week that the state disaster committee has approved Lauderdale County for special drouth relief measures under the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service program.

When these are approved by the Washington office, it will be possible for individual farmers to get permission from the county ASCS office to pasture or cut hay from the diverted acres which have been taken out of cotton production.

The charge for this privilege will be made by the County ASCS Committee, but farmers believe that it can be of real help toward providing feed for cattle which might otherwise have to be sold.

Individual letters of notification will go out from the county office if and when this approval is given.

Individual farmers are required to apply at the county office for permission to use these diverted acres.

Classing Service Ready

Col. Tom M. Scott has signed an application for the Lauderdale County Cotton Improvement Association, requesting free cotton classing service provided by the federal government under the Smith-Doxey Act to organized groups of cotton growers.

Participating cotton gins are getting their samplers bonded in order that the service will be set up and ready to go when cotton is harvested.

All cotton growers in the county are eligible to use this service for all the cotton they produce.

Producers may have the "green cards" mailed to their own addresses or returned to their gins, as they choose.

Fig Sale Soon

A Feeder Fig Sale will be held at the Mid-South Livestock Center, near Brownsville, Wednesday, Aug. 6th.

Interested producers are required to put special numbered tags in the ears of all pigs, which must also pass inspection by the feeder pig committee of the county livestock association.

Cotton Insect Alert

J. F. Chipman, Jr., found enough bollworms in one field of his cotton this week to justify the application of insecticides to bring them under control.

Hot, dry weather favors build-ups of spider mite infestations, which are being found all over West Tennessee.

Farmers are advised to check their own fields and poison only when necessary in order to control infestations in certain fields.

Soybean Disease Shows

Curt Rhoads, of the Fort Pillow area, and Roy M. Cook, Jr., of Halls, have found outbreaks of Southern blight on soybeans.

This blight is a white fungus which looks somewhat like cotton hung around the roots of the plants and going on down with the roots in the soil. The plants are gradually killed, but usually just in small spots in fields.

There is no cure for the disease, but rotating crops will help to some degree.

The disease also attacks tomatoes, bell peppers, egg plants, and some other crops.



THE BIBLE SPEAKS
BY LAWRENCE W. ALTHOUSE
THE CHOICE
Lesson for August 24, 1969
Background Scripture: Deuteronomy 9:3-5, Joshua 8:1-2, 12:1-24, 24:1-28
Devotional Reading: Deuteronomy 9:3-5
Can the church survive? There are many who are asking that question today. Some have already decided that the church is lost. Others are not certain, but are heartily wondering. Headlines like these add to the uncertainty.
THE CHURCH MEMBERSHIP IS AT A CRISIS POINT. IT IS CLINGING AGAIN TO SHORTAGE OF MEMBERS AND IS BEING CALLED "CRISIS CLOSE POINTS".
Yet, there has never been a time in the history of the church when there has not been a discouraging report of overwhelming obstacles. The march of Christianity has always been across difficult terrain and under the most trying circumstances. The key has never been in the obstacles that have confronted the church, but in the response of Christians to the will and power which God extends to us for the overcoming of the obstacles.
We remember the dismal report brought back from the land of Canaan by the spies Moses had sent. Only two men had disagreed with that report: Caleb and Joshua. The people spent forty additional years in the wilderness because of their lack of faith. Now, four decades later, Joshua stands before the people once more and speaks of the promised land. As he did so, he probably remembers the day when this people's fathers had rejected his recommendation. "Prepare your provisions!"
This time, however, there were no protests about dangers and difficulties. He gave order and they responded: "Prepare your provisions for within three days you are to pass over this Jordan to go to take possession of this land which the Lord your God gives you to possess (Joshua 1:11). The situation had not changed in forty years. The Canaanites were still better equipped for war, still larger, stronger, more numerous than the Jews, still occupying their strongly-fortified cities. The difference was to be found in the hearts of Joshua's people: they trusted God's promise.
The final victory was not achieved overnight. In fact, it was to take the rest of Joshua's life and many years beyond that. Many battles would still be fought, much land occupied, before the people of Israel would be in full control.
Near the end of the book of Joshua we come to another account. The great leader has summoned the people to say farewell and prepare them for the task still ahead. He was about to step down. At times such as these it is customary to make a testimonial to a man's leadership. Yet, it is read out to be a record, not for Joshua, but for God. Joshua reminded them of all that God had done. He promised that the Lord would continue to fulfill his promise. Lastly, he warned them that the promise would be fulfilled only if they would remain faithful and loving to God.
As for me...
"Now therefore fear the Lord and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness. Put away the gods which your fathers served beyond the River," and serve the Lord. And if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve (Joshua 24:14-15). Thus, he challenged the people. He cannot make their commitment for them. He can make it for only himself and his own family "but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord. The rest will have to decide for themselves. So much of us."

44 Farmers Study 72 Cotton Patches On Ashport Farm
Clifford Sweat Plays Host For Rewarding Field Day As Experts Offer Tips
By F. H. Paschal
Clifford Sweat welcomed 44 farmers to his farm at Ashport Monday to see 72 cotton plots, showing twelve varieties and six replications.
Clifford, owner of the West Tennessee Experiment Station, pointed out special characteristics of each variety and explained how they had performed in other areas. He said there was no one variety which is best under all types of soil and in all areas.
Al Swearing, Extension entomologist, explained the most important practices in the operation of mechanical cotton pickers which can result in a high percentage of the cotton being harvested so that it will result in highest quality samples at the gin.
Picker operators listened carefully as he explained the importance of maintaining a correct speed of the picker all the way to the ends of the rows and then getting this speed up before entering other rows. He emphasized the need to water on picker spindles to keep them clean and correct adjustments of doffers so that they do not quit twice the spindle.
He reported on fields checked last week which showed that operators were able to get 80% of the cotton into the basket, while some fell as low as 75%, especially near the ends of the rows.
H. W. Luck, Extension cotton specialist, strongly recommended that turn-rows be kept smooth and firm by the use of pasture clippers rather than disking. He reported on results of the whole farm cotton demonstrations in 24 counties last year which showed that some producers were able to grow cotton for 18¢ a pound, while it costs the majority more than 22¢.
W. C. Johnson, Extension entomologist, warned of possible continued outbreaks of boll weevil and boll worms till Sept. 15th and explained procedures for control.
Roy Sweat provided cold drinks and chairs for the crowd and




