Lesson for June 8, 1969

Background Scripture: Genesis 12:1-7; Deuteronomy 26:5-9; Joshua 24:2-14; Luke 24:25-27; Acts 13:16-33.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 96.

Pope Pius XII was once quoted as saying, "Spiritually, we are all Semites." The Semites, of course, are one of the great divisions of races and languages to which Hebrew, Phoenician, and Arabic belong. The Pope was thus indicating that Christians are spiritually akin to the Jews.

There is a family relationship between us. Yet, it is a relationship that is not often recognized by Christians. We tend to forget that the Church began among the Jews, and that the early Christians, even those who were Gentiles, regarded Christianity as the true successor to the Hebrew faith.

One central theme The early Church thus saw no break between the Hebrew faith and the gospel of Jesus Christ. There was a continuity between the old Israel and the new.

Creation and redemption Yet, through all this diversity we find certain ideas or themes that hold together all the many parts and pieces.

Shameful, If True
A recent release by The National Council on Hunger and Malnutrition covering West Tennessee counties classes 45.6% of the families of Lauderdale County below the poverty level with 18.85% of the families receiving federal food assistance.

We have always been very dubious of such figures, since the poverty level could be placed at \$2,000, \$3,000, or even \$10,000, if a group so decides. It seems to us that the poverty level has been placed at the \$3,000 level by several government agencies, and while we agree that this is little enough, it is considerably more than many of us made during the 1930's and even the early 1940's.

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Nation's Largest Battery Company Courts Universal

ESB Maps Merger Course: Would Run Motor Making Firm As Free Subsidiary

ESB, Inc., of Philadelphia, Pa., the nation's largest battery company, and Universal Electric Co., of Owosso, Mich., which has a plant in Ripley, have agreed in principle to merge Universal into ESB as an independent subsidiary, with no change in management or operating personnel.

Edward J. Dwyer, ESB president, and George W. Hoddy, Universal president, said Tuesday the merger is contingent upon a favorable ruling by the Internal Revenue Service and audit and approval by Universal stockholders. Universal motors are used as original equipment in such devices as household appliances, business machines, record players, machine tools, medical equipment, computers, toys, pumps and heating, ventilation, refrigeration, and air conditioning units.

BODIES MAY BE WILLED

U-T Medical Units Seeking Them To Train Doctors

Though increasing numbers of heart and other organ transplants are bringing inquiries from possible donors, the University of Tennessee Medical Units in Memphis say such transplants, other than from "eye banks," require close timing and careful coordination, with every minute important.

U-T's College of Medicine, which needs at least 100 bodies per year to train doctors in anatomy, urges that donors consider willing their entire bodies for this purpose.

While prosperity has decreased the number of indigents or unclaimed bodies at the same time that the population in general, as well as medical student enrollments, have increased throughout the country, more and more people—sometimes entire families—are beginning to will their bodies

to medical science. The anatomy department has on file a number of such bequests to the University of Tennessee, made by simply signing a form, available from the university. If, in the course of years, a person changes his mind, the University will honor the change and void the agreement.

A pamphlet which the Department of Anatomy circulates covers many considerations, including personal, religious and economic factors. Memorial and burial services and interment in veterans' cemeteries or private lots are of importance to both the donor and his family, and are recognized as such.

Leaders In Ripley Studying Possible Meat Curing Plant
County industrial, business, and agricultural leaders met this week to hear a proposal for a packing house for Ripley to eventually house 150 top hogs a day to be used in a ham curing plant which would cure hams to taste like top quality country hams. The rest of the animals would be made into sausage and other products. The plant would employ about 50 people and would provide a market for more than 30,000 head of hogs per year. The proposer wanted to capitalize the plant at \$400,000, selling \$15,000 of the stock to other people. The plant would cost \$500,000, of which the backers would contribute \$100,000. Local banks and individuals or the federal government. Susan Grass Risky Dr. A. J. Butler recently questioned the county agent and Dr. Jim Wilson, veterinarian, about pasturing horses on hybrid Sudan grass under drought conditions. He did that because he knew that Sudan grass sometimes produces prussic acid when under drought stress or partially killed by herbicides. Dr. Wilson informed Dr. Butler that recent research has shown that hybrid Sudan grass so that they cannot be cured, and he warned against pasturing horses on hybrid Sudan grass. He said prussic acid and even regular Sudan grass can be pastured without injury to horses. Pearl millet of Gahli and Starr varieties does not produce prussic acid under drought conditions. It can be seeded now at the rate of 20 pounds per acre with 60 pounds of nitrogen, 30 pounds of phosphate, and 30 pounds of potash per acre to make excellent pasture within one month. This millet does not "wake good quality" hay but can be pastured later than Sudan grass. Blackleg Reported Several cattle producers over the county have lost young cattle recently because of a disease which has been diagnosed as blackleg. There is no cure for the disease, but there is a vaccine which can prevent cattle from being affected by the disease. All cattle producers who plan to sell feeder calves should have cooperative sales at Brownsville veterinary vaccination against blackleg. Mole Traps and Poison Bait can help in situations of this kind, but Fish and Wildlife Service personnel applying 20% Aldrin granules at the rate of 15 pounds per acre or spraying with Dieldrin or Chlordane solutions to get 30 pounds of actual chemical per acre will kill the insects, which are the reason for the tunnels being made by the moles. After a month or two, the moles leave the treated areas and may not give any more trouble for two or three years.

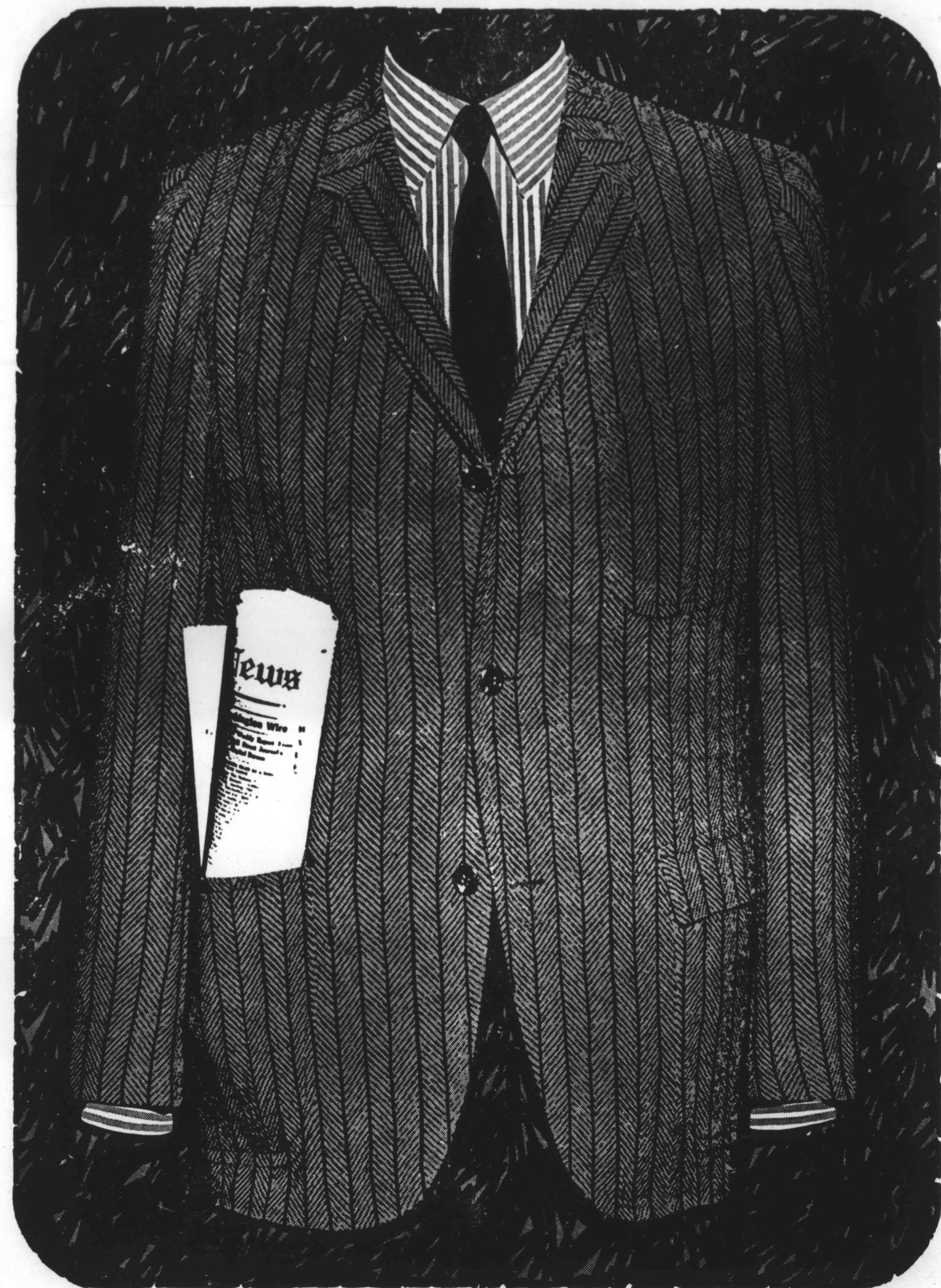
