

Cotton ginners in Lauderdale County were getting mostly good quality cotton last week, which was being graded at Memphis Cotton Classing Office to determine its loan value as a basis for sale or loan.

Marcus P. Talbot, Jr., head of the Cotton Classing Office, said. Tennessee grades last week were 6% strict middling, 37% middling, and 45% strict low middling.
