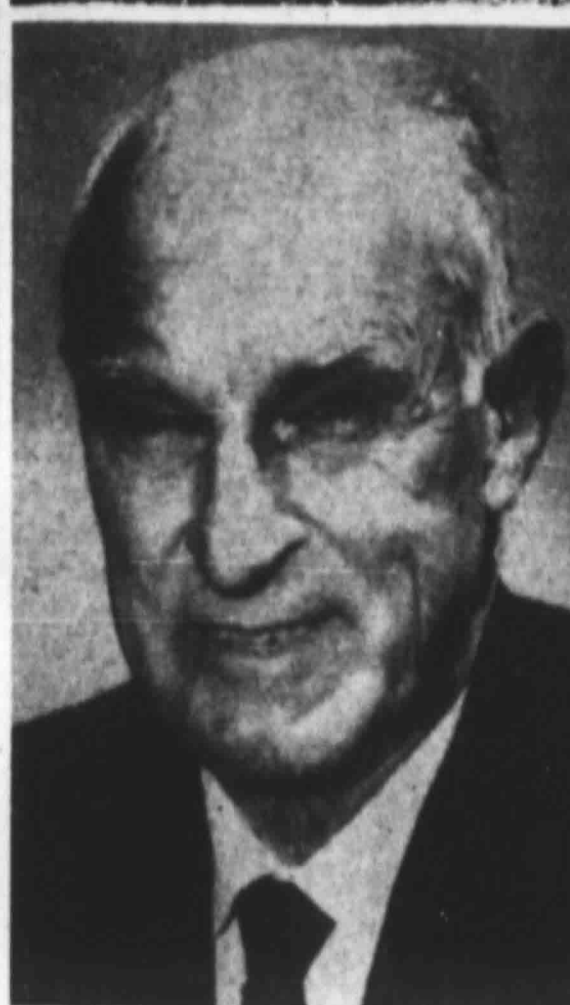

JESS NEELY, athletic director of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, will address the Ripley High School Booster Club banquet at 7 p. m. Oct. 30th.

A native of Smyrna, he earned his law degree from Vanderbilt in 1924 after leading Coach Dan McGugin's 1922 team to an 8-0-1 record.

In 1924, Neely entered the coaching profession at Southwestern of Memphis, where he coached all sports for four years.

In 1928, Neely joined Coach Wallace Wade at the University of Alabama for three years, a stint that ended with the 1931 trip to the Rose Bowl with the Crimson Tide.

Upon returning from the Bowl trip, Neely was named Athletic Director and Head Coach at Clemson College, a dual role he was to keep until 1940, when he moved to Rice Institute in the same two-hat capacity.

He has headed the National Football Coaches Association and won the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, the highest honor the Association can bestow on a fellow coach.

In the 36 years Neely served as a head coach at Clemson and Rice, his squads posted more than 200 gridiron victories.

Ripley Plays Host To Trenton After Rout By Wildcats

Cov'ton Held To 16-0 Lead For Three Quarters, But Purples Blanked, 38-0

Ripley's Tigers, who held the Wildcats of Covington to a 16-0 lead for three quarters last week before being swamped 38-0, take on the Trenton Golden Tide on the Ripley field this Friday.

Covington topped Dyersburg 28-0 the week before visiting Ripley, and Dyersburg won from Trenton 40-10 the week before, so the Tigers are looking for a less bruising contest this week.

It will be their second Big Ten Conference engagement. Their overall record is now 2-2.

Covington mounted a powerful ground attack with which the Tigers coped gamely for three quarters before caving in. Covington also had a tight defense, and though Stan Paige, substituting for an injured Donnie Tatum at quarterback, got off some good looking aerials, the Tigers couldn't net enough yardage on the ground or in the air to get on the scoreboard.

Quarterback John Williams scored three times for the Wildcats in one of his best games of the season, sharing the ground gaining honors with Sammy Duncan, who went 50 yards for one tally. Williams also passed to Darrell Blakeman for 26 yards and the other touchdown for Covington.

Trenton's Golden Tide comes to Ripley off a 12-7 win last week from Union City, after losses to Dyersburg, 42-14, and Jackson, 52-0.

The team has shown steady improvement during the season and seemed to hit its stride during the second half last Friday.

Union City led after the first quarter, 7-0, and held the lead at the half after the Tide had threatened twice. In both instances, fourth down passes failed to connect.

The second half was all Trenton, with Abernathy going around end for six points and Steve Hay scoring through the middle after Union City fumbled a kick-off and Trenton recovered. The Tide defense held off a final minute threat by Union City.

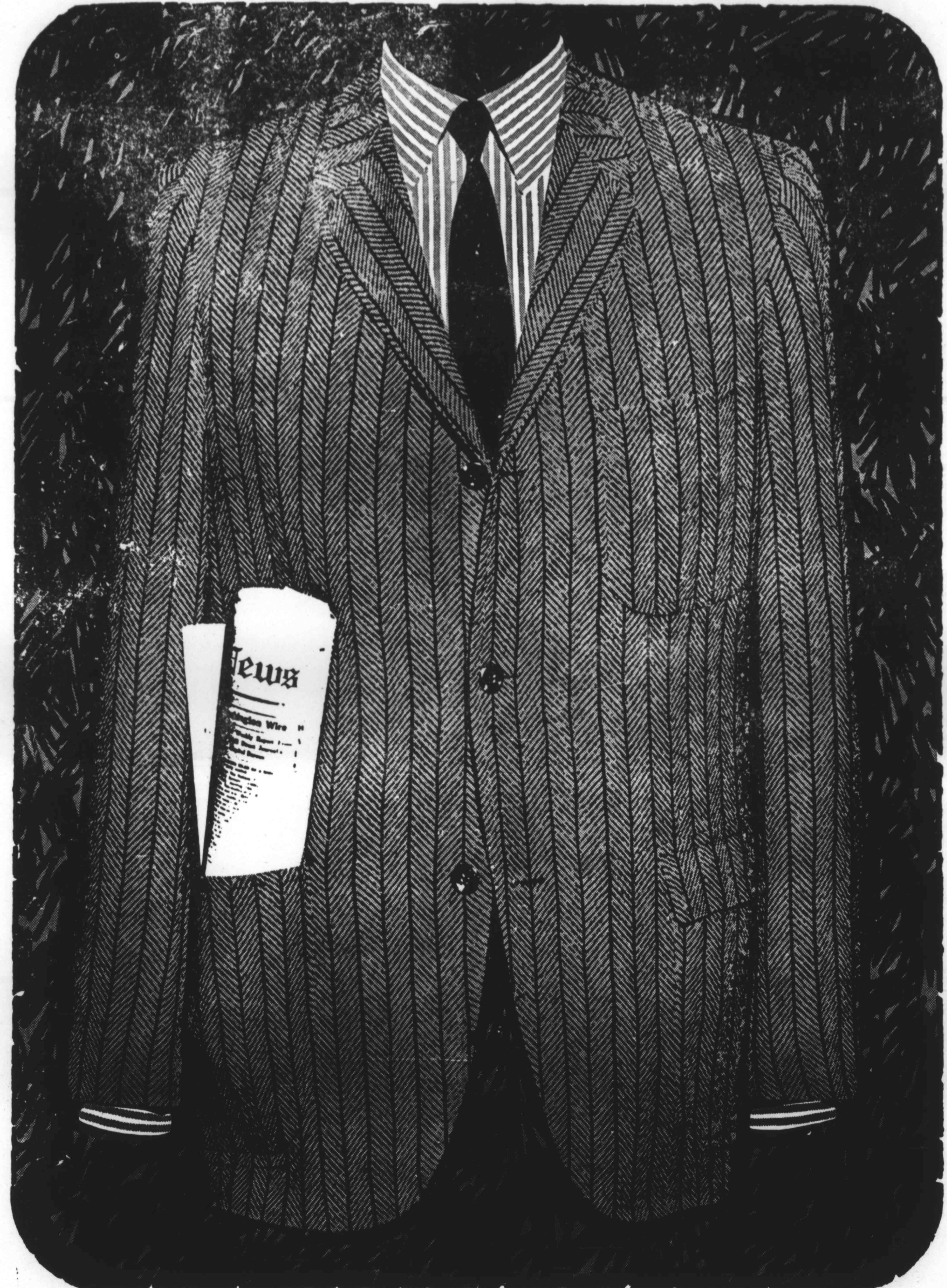

Station rates for Tennessee intrastate long distance calls will be changed by advancing the night rate from 8 p.m. to 7 p.m. and extending it from 4:30 a.m. to 7 a.m.; by extending the day rates from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.; and by making night rates apply on Saturday and five holidays. Some initial period rates for long distance calls between points in Tennessee less than 25 miles apart will be increased by 1¢ on station calls and up to 1¢ on person calls. Also, the per minute overtime rate on person calls between points in Tennessee will be changed to 40% of the two minute initial period rate; such rates now ranging from 5¢ per minute under the proposal would range from 14¢-68¢. All changes are proposed to modernize the rate schedule and to compensate for increased costs of doing business.

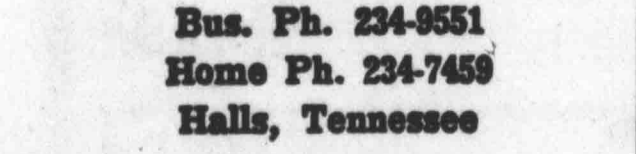

**Chicago Reads Of Halls Youth Who Did Not Protest**

While many young people have been rallying for a Viet Nam moratorium, the late Pvt. Donald Eugene Moore, of Halls, has been the subject of a half page in "Chicago Today" in an article by Dorothy Stork.

"Donald Eugene Moore never would have known what a moratorium was," she wrote in telling about his life from the time "he did some of his growing up in Halls, which is a town ten miles from Dyersburg, where the folks tell you if you want to see a place, go to Memphis."

She tells of his living in Chicago where the family moved, where he met the girl he married, the birth of his seven months old daughter, and how he spent his time on automobiles and machinery, the drawing he did that impressed the writer when she talked to his dad.

And then death in Viet Nam during the not long ago three day truce, a full military funeral in Halls, with a 21-gun salute, and the flag-draped casket and the hearse.

He would not have reached his twenty-first birthday until next December. "The good-looking blond kid with the soft Tennessee accent," the writer calls him, and adds, "He didn't have deferred status. He wouldn't have known about that. He had cars and he liked to draw. He wouldn't have known what a moratorium was. He was a dropout. He never protested anything, except maybe a bad sprinkling."

**Halls Victors Over Sharon Will Clash At Fulton County**

Tigers 4-2 For The Season After Taking Homecoming Game With Late Vigor

The Halls Tigers, 4-2 for the season after a 2-6 homecoming victory over Sharon last Friday evening, will travel to Hickman, Ky., Friday evening to play Fulton County High School.

Favored on the basis of results against common foes, the Tigers are still facing one of their toughest games of the year. Last Friday evening Fulton County took its first victory, 2-0, over favored South Fulton. The team is reported much improved.

The Tigers won last week only after having spluttered badly for much of the first three quarters.

They got on the scoreboard as time ran out in the first quarter by driving the ball into the end zone. Johny Wright kicked the field goal which covered 30 yards. Halls led 6-0 at halftime.

Sharon came back strong in the second quarter with a field goal. David Earls got 38 yards for the tying touchdown with 3:31 remaining. The try for points failed.

For the first time, the Tigers seemed to come alive as they drove the go ahead touchdown over the quarter. Jennings drove over from the two for the TD, and a pass to Carl Blackwood was good for two to make the score 14-6.

With four minutes gone in the final quarter, Jennings picked off a Duff Crowder pass and, with a fine block by Richard Baker, raced 40 yards for Halls' third TD. Try for points was good.

The Tigers scored their final touchdown when Blackwood took a pass from Jennings from the 4-yard line and ran for the score to bring the score to 20-6.

Highlight of the Tiger attack was the running of Jimmy Patton, with 190 yards in 21 carries as the Tigers netted 236 yards of offense.

Jennings completed 17 of 28 passes, with Blackwood receiving seven for 110 yards, and the value of all the funds spent, which exceeded the budget by \$40,553.43. 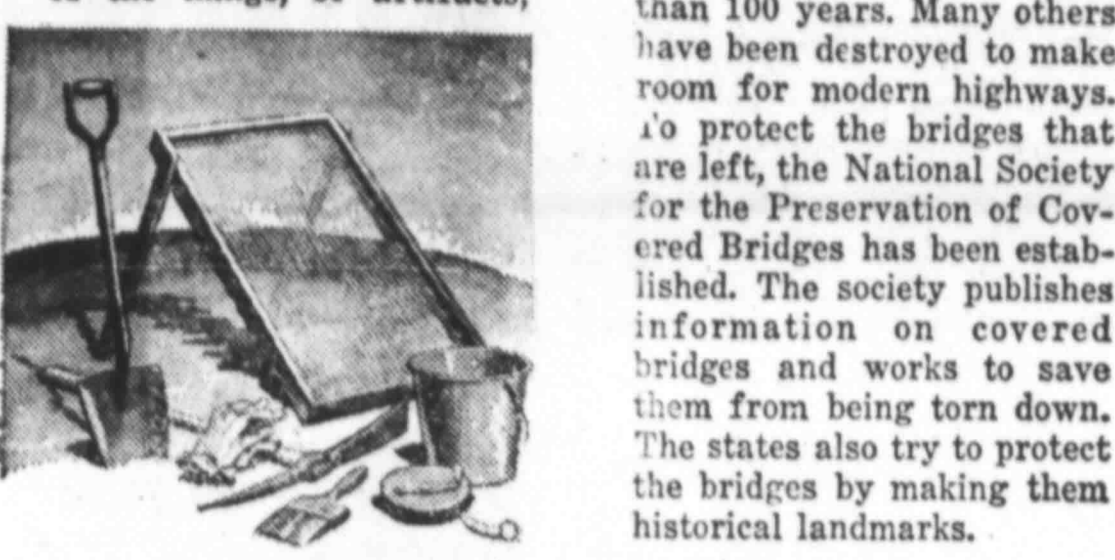

Archie, after many unheeded warnings, that which the Lord most ardently prophesied came to pass: Assyria defied the face of Israel and carried her people into captivity, the Ten Lost Tribes of Israel never to be seen or heard of again.

What were the reasons for this tragedy? This historian will discuss the following: (1) She was ruled by a long line of unbelievably incompetent and evil kings; (2) She had placed her dependence upon military alliances with other nations of which proved, in one way or another, to have been the wrong ones; (3) Although Israel had been relatively weak in military forces, the nation had often summed pretensions of great military power and become involved in disputes too big for her to win.

The decay within  
All of these are quite accurate enough. Yet, when we read the Old Testament, we find that writers look upon the cause of the tragedy, not as military or political weakness, but as spiritual and moral decay. This the weak within, was the real cause of Israel's tragic ending. And they did wicked things, provoking the Lord to anger... (17:11).

What was it that provoked that anger? For one thing, they worshiped pagan gods and idols. They set up for themselves pillars and altars on every high hill and under every green tree... And they served idols... (17:12).

Secondly, they followed the ways of their neighbor nations, even though these practices conflicted with their Hebrew heritage. For example: "And they burned their sons and daughters as offerings" (17:17). God had never taught them that.

Thirdly, they were infected with materialism. For the sake of material gain, they sold themselves to do evil in the sight of the Lord... (17:18).

Could it happen here?  
Worst of all, they ignored the prophets who came to warn them. Prophets had tried to stir them to repentance. "But they would not listen." Is there any danger that what happened to Israel could happen to our own nation? This is difficult for us to see, for though we have no trouble in ascribing Israel's fall in 722 B.C. as the judgment of God on her evil and infidelity, we are not at all disposed to listen to today's prophets or see the operation of God's judgment in this year of 1969.

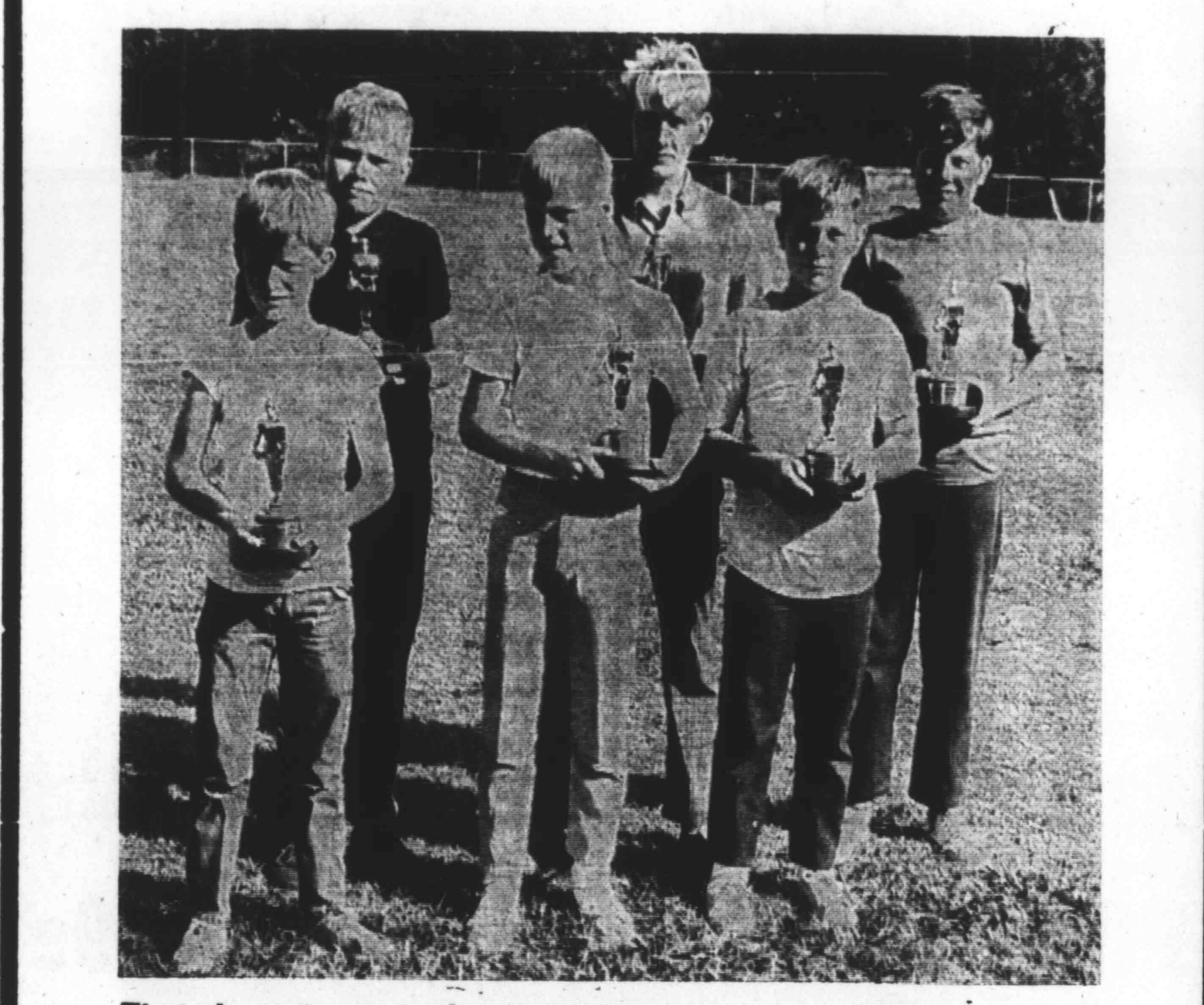
