



THE FLOOD

Lesson for August 9, 1970

The story of the great flood that covered the earth because of the sin of mankind is not limited to the saga of Noah in Genesis, but is found in the ancient literatures and oral traditions of peoples throughout the world.

In 1873 George Smith of the British Museum discovered and published a "Chaldean Account of the Deluge" which had been translated from twelve tablets that had been found in the library of the Babylonian ruler, Ashurbanipal (688-626 B.C.).

The legend is the story of Gilgamesh, who, mourning the death of his friend, Enkidu, makes a long, hazardous journey to his ancestor, Utnapishtim, to learn the secret of eternal life. He tells Gilgamesh that long ago when the gods decided to destroy the earth, one of them, Ea, commanded Utnapishtim to build a ship in order to survive the great flood to come.

For six days and nights, Utnapishtim, his family, and all the other living beings he could find, rode out the terrible storm. On the seventh day it ceased and eventually the boat came to rest upon a mountain top. Disembarking at last, Utnapishtim, to show his gratitude, offered a sacrifice which pleased the gods.

The story is remarkably like that of Noah, yet there are the important differences that make the Genesis saga greatly superior. For one thing, there is a sense of purpose in the Noah story; the earth is to be destroyed, not at the whim of the gods as in the "G" epic, but because of the sinfulness of men. This is a truth which men must not ignore even today.

A banquet of consequences If a man defies the law of gravity (unless he invokes some counter law), he will pay some consequences. There is nothing capricious or arbitrary about the direction in which he falls. And so it is when men defy God's moral order. There is eventually a price to pay. As Robert Louis Stevenson once said, "Sooner or later every man sits down to a banquet of consequences."

We also see a purposefulness in the selection of Noah. In the Babylonian epic, Utnapishtim was chosen simply because he was favored by Ea. In the story of Noah, however, the patriarch is chosen because God sees him as a righteous man, that there is in him something worth salvaging. So life is not capricious. Things do not "just happen." Often they are the results of living either in harmony with or in rebellion against God's order.

Turn and be saved Secondly, we see in the God of Noah a compassionate desire to save, rather than to destroy. Ea forbids Utnapishtim to warn his neighbors, but no such restriction was laid upon Noah. Even in the face of the retribution that is to come, there is a redemptive possibility. This was often true when God sent his prophets to tell Israel of the terrible times ahead; if the people, even in the last moment, were to turn and repent, God would have been happy to receive them. God desired, not destruction, but the repentance of his people. It was their wickedness, not the vengeance of God, that caused their destruction.

The real truth of the story of Noah is not in that it agrees with so many flood epics throughout the world, but that it tells us so much about God, man, and the world in which we live.

There's A Difference

Recently, on a few instances, we have noticed that newswriters and television commentators have used the words "riot" and "demonstrations" as though they were interchangeable in describing activities of certain groups in various cities.

The dictionary says that one of the meanings of demonstration is "a public meeting of welcome, approval, or condemnation, as by a mass meeting or procession" and at no time indicates that violence is a demonstration. The same dictionary defines a riot as "a disturbance consisting of wild and turbulent conduct of a large number of persons, as a mob."

It seems to us that much of the action on city streets and college campuses should and must be classed as riots and not as demonstrations. Riots are a threat to the welfare of everyone, while demonstrations can be used to correct inequities, although we may not agree that this is the best means of accomplishing the desired changes.

Perhaps we should be more tolerant of demonstrations, but even less tolerant of riots, making the proper distinction between them. The danger is that demonstrations often become riots, because of conditions beyond the control of the majority of the demonstrators.

Ripley Authorizes Utility Borrowing

Ripley's city board Monday set Aug. 24th as sale date for \$268,000 in water and sewer improvement bonds and authorized the gas and water board to borrow another \$50,000 to extend a high pressure line from the new industrial park on Highway 51 North to Asbury to improve pressure to Fort Fallow State Prison Farm.

The city has commitments for a 4 3/4% rate on \$242,000 of the bonds and 5 3/4% on the other \$26,000.

The board placed Nail Paris in charge of its dump at Asbury in return for salvage privileges. Disorderly dumping has produced complaints from nearby residents.

Mayor Rozelle Criner said the Illinois Central Railroad has agreed to inspect the overhead bridge, strengthen it as necessary, raise curbs on it to protect automobiles from jumping them, and install high chain wire fencing where low fencing now offers hazards.

The mayor said it is hoped the work will be completed before school starts.

The board ordered a public hearing on re-zoning of the Hill property on Highway 19 West which Anderson Bentley has purchased and wishes to convert into a 3-unit trailer park.

The city tax rate has been set at \$2.50 again, but on the new H. L. Yoh Co. appraisals. Residential assessments will be 30% of the Yoh figures and commercial assessments 33 1/3%.

The new basis is expected to net the city \$30,000 to \$40,000 additional revenue from real estate.

The Yoh firm valued all property in the city at \$15,541,088, excluding utility assessments which in 1969 were \$493,026.

It's Ill Wind Which Blows Air Sprays

Chemicals used in farming for control of weeds, insects, and diseases have been much in the news lately as pollution of air, water, and soils are being evaluated for their effects on health and our community life in general.

A farmer at Hales Point in June faced the problem of trying to get land which had been flooded dried and planted when it was covered with vegetation three feet tall. He hired a man with an airplane to spray it with chemicals to kill the weeds.

The chemicals used were of hormonal type, which can spread all over the community when applied by airplane. The chemical was effective in killing the weeds, and the land is now planted in soybeans, which looks promising, but much of the cotton in the community definitely shows the effects of the chemicals which moved with the currents of air generated by the plane in making the application on 200 acres.

The same chemical could have been applied with ground equipment without endangering crops over such a wide area.

Recently 2, 4, 5-T has been removed from sale for householders because it vaporizes after being applied and can travel as much as a mile to damage other sensitive plants in the area.

Ester 2, 4-D can do the same thing. It can be applied to a pasture or other area and then can vaporize and go quite a distance to injure cotton and other sensitive crops.

Butoxone SB and Butyraz 175 contain the chemical 2, 4-DB, which changes slowly to 2, 4-D after it is applied. It can definitely injure young soybeans or cotton if the spray mist drifts onto these crops as it is being applied.

Several farmers have reported severe damage when this happened, but it usually happened when an airplane was used to apply material to soybeans in mid-bloom for control of cockleburrs. When ground equipment is used, there is rarely any damage at all.

Thousands of acres of corn have been sprayed with Amine 2, 4-D to kill broadleaf weeds with little or no injury to cotton in nearby areas, when it was applied with ground equipment, using weed type nozzles on the sprayers of water per acre under pressure of 20 to 30 pounds.

Safe use of farm chemicals includes the protection of the interests of neighboring farmers.

Field Day Well Attended

Clyde Johnston, W. L. Partain, Jack Crutcher, Elmer Rossiger, Charles Anthony, Jr., Forrest Brewster, and Ronnie Floyd attended the field day at Milan week before last to study experiments having to do with the production of soybeans, cotton, and other crops.

Results of these and other experiments will be published this winter and will be available for study by interested farmers.

Announcement was made at the field day that Dr. D. M. Gossett will succeed Ben Hazlewood as director of the West Tennessee Experiment Station in September.

Dr. Gossett was reared in Benton County and has been highly regarded by farmers as he served as associate agronomist over the last few years in helping provide answers on chemical weed problems.

Mosquito Control Tried

G. W. Odell, of Poplar Grove, is applying a residue spray to tree trunks, shrubs, foundation walls, and other places where mosquitoes are most likely to come to rest to try to bring them under control in areas around his home.

He is using ten tablepoons of 25% Lindane per gallon of water in the spray. Malathion 50% can also be used in the same manner with the same mixture. These residue sprays should be repeated about every week for best results.

Cotton Service Available

Col. Tom M. Scott, president of the Lauderdale County Cotton Improvement Assn., and F. H. Paschal and T. L. Criffield, group representatives, have been notified by the Memphis Cotton Classing Office that free cotton classing service will be available to Lauderdale County farmers this year. This will include milk reading service.

Lauderdale farmers had 37,492 samples of cotton classed under this program last year.
