

What is space dust?


+ The most traveled dust on earth comes from outside the atmosphere. It is the remains of meteors that burned up in the earth's atmosphere. Meteors crash into the atmosphere at tremendous speeds. Friction with the air makes them heat up and turn into vapor. These tiny droplets of vapor spread through the air and are slowed down by the drag of the atmosphere. They cool off and become hollow balls of burned metal or rock. Some are so tiny that they float in the air for a long time before they settle to earth as
