Nixon OKs Income Tax Revisions But Mulls New Imposit

President Nixon Tuesday signed the widest revision of income tax provisions since the original legislation in 1913 but warned the effect of the changes would be inflationary and said his administration would propose other revenue measures or cut expenditures in order to reduce this effect.

One revenue raising measure under active consideration, The New York Times reported, is a tax not hitherto used in this country—value added tax, which is widely used in Europe.

This is an excise tax imposed at every point of manufacture and distribution but not on the full value of products, only on the value added to the product by the current seller.

Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, of Arkansas, House Ways and Means Committee chairman, calls it "national sales tax, and I'm against that."

State Capital Readied Tennessee's General Assembly, convening this month, will find new mahogany desks, new curtains bearing the state seal, and new carpets installed in its chambers.

Leather chairs have replaced the old wooden captain's chairs in both chambers. Each desk has an individual speaker and electronic voting.

Governor's Race Eyed State Court of Appeals Judge Robert M. Taylor, of Memphis, Trenton native, who is a grandson of Tennessee's late Gov. Robert L. Taylor, is being urged to run for the Democratic nomination for governor next August.

State revenue agents claim one of their largest hauls yet in seizing a 1968 van truck and about 500 cartons of Kentucky tax paid cigarettes near Clarksville.

Police said she was traveling nearly 70 miles an hour in a 45 m.p.h. zone when taken into custody.

Path Of Farm Aid Rocky, Ed Jones Tells Ripley Club

Rural Areas Lose Strength In Congress, He Reports; Vote Trade Need Voiced

U. S. Representative Ed Jones, of Yorkville, warned Ripley Rotarians Tuesday that the nation's 42 Congressmen who still represent predominantly rural districts will have trouble getting new farm legislation through Congress.

"When you see me voting for something you might not approve of," the first term Congressman told Rotarians, "consider that I might be doing a little trading with somebody who will help us when new farm legislation comes up."

He told Rotarians not to be surprised if the food stamp program, which cost \$240,000,000 in fiscal 1969, came out of Congress with a billion dollar authorization for fiscal 1970 and with provisions to feed not only the poor but strikers and other groups not previously provided for, in all the nation's 1,500 counties.

He said he believed that such a bill could pass without a single vote from the Agriculture Committee, on which he and 34 other Congressmen are serving.

"Many of these men are from urban areas and know and care little about agriculture," Rep. Jones said. "It isn't a particularly popular assignment."

He said members of his committee are meeting each Monday night with the Secretary of Agriculture to discuss new farm programs, but he said that any new ones will not be as helpful to farmers as the present ones.

He said one proposal, involving retirement of 50,000,000 acres at the rate of 10,000,000 acres per year for five years, with a maximum payment of \$24 per acre, had been virtually dead since the executive secretary of the American Cattleman's Association testified against it if it would permit grazing.

He said the association feared a cattle glut which would bring surpluses such as plague other farm products.

"The only ray of hope I see," he said, "is the possibility of expanding exports."

He recently attended a European conference exploring ways of getting this done.

Rep. Jones, Democratic nominee who won a special election for the unexpired term of the late Rep. Robert A. (Fats) Everett, will return to Washington Jan. 20th.

Strangler - Slayer Caught After Car Left Near Ripley

75-100 Year Sentence Given After Kenneth P. Rogers Enters Pleas Of Guilty

Kenneth Paul Rogers, 26, of Carbondale, Ill., arrested last Friday near Mason after he abandoned a car owned by one of his murder victims in a roadside park on Highway 51 between Ripley and Henning, pleaded guilty Monday in two slayings and was sentenced to 75 to 100 years in prison.

The car was the property of Miss Barbara Case, 24, bride-to-be in her wedding to Wilma Rogers, 22. Both the women were strangled with appliance cords Christmas Eve in the Rogers trailer in Cartersville, Ill. Rogers still faces charges in the death of Lisa Levering, Carbondale high school freshman, strangled with her blue jeans after she left a teen center Nov. 25th. Her body was found Dec. 1st along a country road four miles southwest of Carbondale.

Miss Case and the Levering girl had been sexually assaulted.

Rogers readily admitted his identity when picked up by a highway patrolman as he limped along Highway 14 near the Tipton-Fayette County line. Officers said Rogers had spent Christmas night in a Methodist Church in Covington, where he tried to hang himself with a microphone cord in the boiler room. The cord broke. He had also cut himself deeply on one wrist in another suicide attempt.

He had left a four page unsigned note in the blood-stained interior of Miss Case's car, saying in part, "I killed Lisa Levering. I killed Barb and my wife. Stop living. She wanted to go with me. I love her very much. Why—because I am sick—very sick. Willie (Mrs. Rogers) knew I was going to. She was the only decent thing that ever happened to me."

Carbondale Police Chief Hazel said Rogers had served a prison term in Cook County on a rape charge and had been released from parole last September.

Dyer Freed From Cholera Embargo

State - federal quarantine of Dyer County swine after an outbreak of hog cholera, first in Tennessee since Sept. 3rd, was lifted last week after inspectors checked 10,537 swine at 237 locations within a 5-mile radius of the outbreak.

No additional hog cholera was found. The outbreak was determined to have come from exposure to another infected herd in the first week of June, 1969. Officials said a recently discovered phenomenon, known as the pregnant sow syndrome, accounted for the long incubation period.

Dyer County's last previous outbreak of hog cholera had come on Aug. 23rd.

One Lauderdale County farmer this week found sickness among his hogs which he suspected as being cholera, and one of the hogs has been autopsied with parts of the animal sent to the state diagnostic laboratory to determine what disease is present.

Hog producers are urged to "suspect cholera first" and call a veterinarian at the first sign of sickness in their hogs.

Indemnities will be paid to help compensate farmers whose hogs must be destroyed because of cholera.

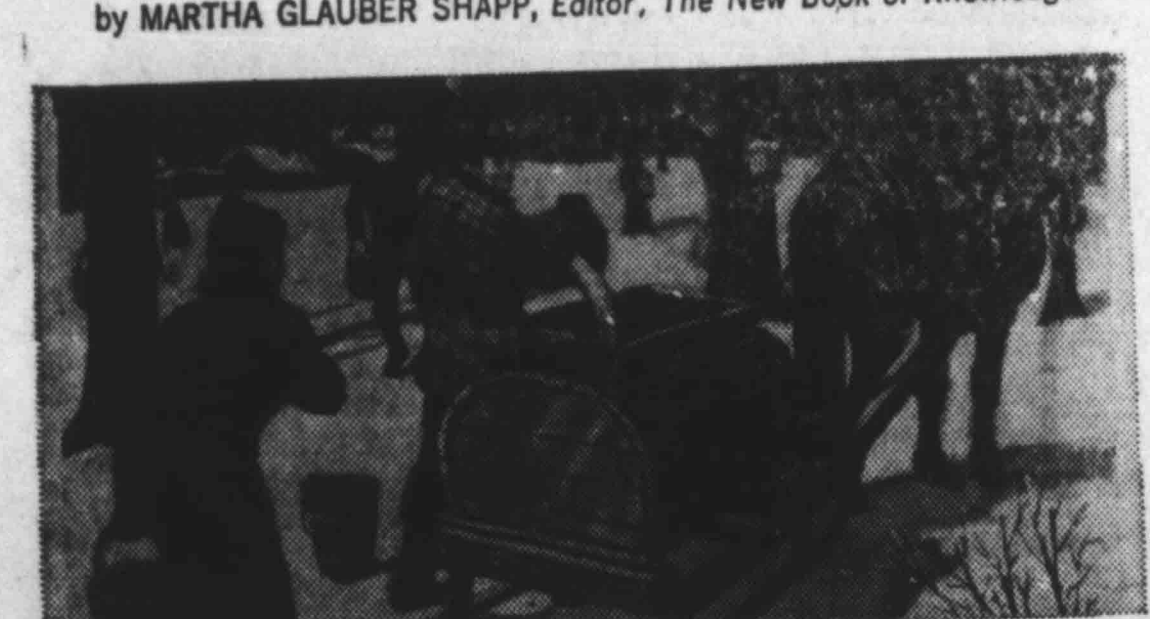

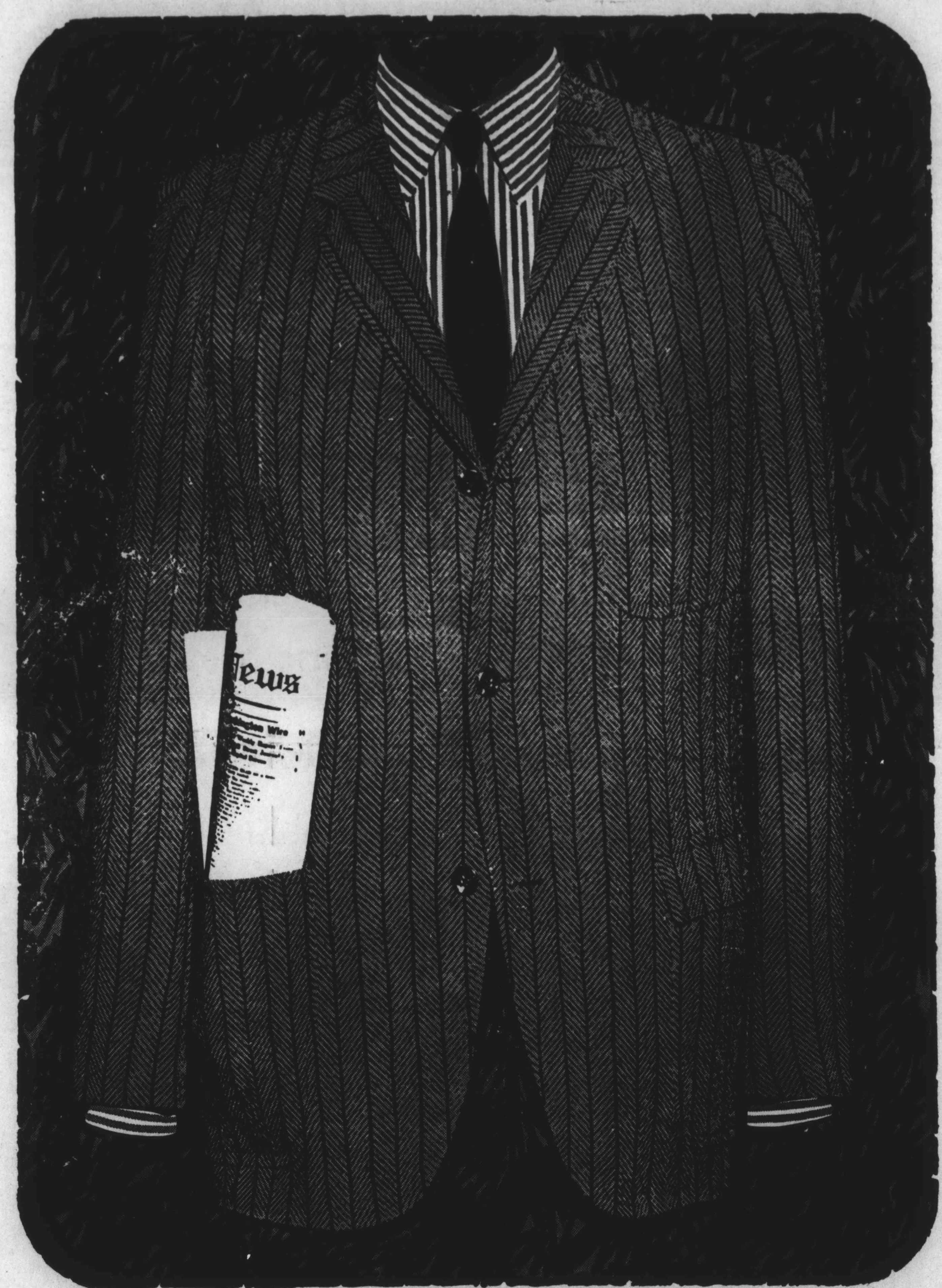
