

Census Report Declines 2,000

Preliminary Figure of 19,846 Reported. Down 9% From 1960; Slide Slower Than During Previous Decade

The last ten years have seen Lauderdale County lose almost 2,000 residents, the 1970 Census indicates.

The census this week reported a preliminary figure of 19,846 residents for Lauderdale County—9% below the 1960 figure of 21,844.

The figure indicated a slowing rate of population decline during the last decade. From 1950's figure of 25,047, the decline to 1960's was 13%.

The previous decade had seen a slight increase in reported population, from 24,461 in 1940.

Weakley County led even Madison in growth to push 20 West Tennessee counties besides Shelby to a population figure of 459,404, a gain of 3,365 from 1960. Weakley grew from 24,227 to 28,115. Madison grew from 60,655 to 63,927, with Jackson gaining most to 39,262.

Worst declines came in Haywood County, from 23,393 to 19,168, and Fayette County, from 24,577 to 22,086. Other counties besides Lauderdale showing declines were Tipton, 28,564 to 27,536; Crockett, 14,594 to 13,670; and Lake, 9,572 to 8,169.

Dyer remained almost stationary, gaining from 29,537 to 29,628. Obion also showed little gain, 26,957 to 27,142.

Weedy Bean Crop Posing Problems; New Attack Tried

Eugene Pugh Uses Dinoseb. Halls Pennington Sprays Tenoran Against Weeds

Eugene Pugh, of Halls, last week tried a new practice designed to control hard-to-kill weeds in soybeans.

He applied three pints per acre of Dinoseb on soybeans just as they were emerging from the ground. He applied this in ten to 13 gallons of water per acre, with some surfactant.

Since this is a new practice, he plans to use this on just 25 acres to see how it does.

Other producers have injured beans, but some have praised the practice as being most effective on some weeds.

Dinoseb is the same as the old original "Premerge" which farmers started using on cotton as early as 1951.

Halls Pennington, of Gates, last week made his first application of Tenoran with a post-emergence spray to control tiny weeds growing along the rows of soybeans.

This chemical is most effective when applied from the sides of the beans in such a way that it does not get in the buds of the beans but does get in the buds of the weeds, which are not killed if they are more than two inches tall.

Mr. Pennington used a post-emergence rig last year and got such good results on cotton that he is using it on soybeans also this year. A different chemical is required on cotton.

Trustee, Sheriff Races Enliven August Ballot

Five Trustee Candidates Qualify, Two Oppose Gitchell; Gaines Contesting Three Counties' Convention Seat; School Board Races Set; Squires Qualify Till 27th

Thursday noon's qualifying deadline for all county offices except magistrates, who have until June 27th to file, found five candidates for trustee and three for sheriff claiming principal interest in the Aug. 6th balloting.

Hubert Criner, Mrs. Joe Turner Escue, Jerry Heathcott, and Paul Meadows had qualified and announced for trustee. Charles Shoaf had qualified but had not announced.

Qualified to oppose Lewis Gitchell for re-election as sheriff were Clarence Holcomb and Julius Kimble, with Kimble an announced candidate.

Unopposed for re-election were Vernon McBride, Jr., county court clerk, Nolan Criner, register, and Don Connell, circuit court clerk.

Two School Board Races

Contests loomed for two of three Board of Education seats, with Halls' William Spence unopposed for re-election.

H. J. Pennington, E. Wallace Stanley, and Ocie Trosper seek the florial seat being resigned by Bill Poston, of Ripley.

Jack Crutcher, James Thomas Halliburton, Jimmy (Hut) Summar, and Parnell Webb have filed for the Second Civil District seat to which Joe H. Walker, Jr., declined to seek re-election.

Halliburton seeks to be the second Negro ever to serve on the Board. Albert Lockard, the first, was defeated for re-election in 1968 by Maurice Gaines.

Gaines, of Henning, has filed to oppose John S. Marshall, of Mason, for the 37th

District constitutional convention seat. M. Watkins Ewell, Jr., of Dyersburg, is unopposed for the 38th District seat in the convention.

Legislative Race, Round Two

Two Ripley aldermen, Frank Garner and Dr. J. S. Scott, are repeating their contest of two years ago for the Democratic nomination for the 37th District House seat which Garner won by 141 votes. Scott carried Lauderdale County 3,001-2,554, but lost in Tipton 2,281-2,544, and Dyer, 1,400-1,089.

A new factor this year, however, is an American Party primary in which A. D. Walker is unopposed for the 37th District House nomination. He would oppose the Democratic nominee on the November ballot.

Also in the American Party primary, unopposed, is William J. (Bill Jim) Davis, of Covington, who would oppose George Gracey, of Covington, unopposed Democratic incumbent, in the November election.

The Republican party also plans a primary in the county this year but did not file for legislative seats.

Jim Lanier, of Dyersburg, is challenging incumbent John Palmer, of Dyersburg, for the 38th District House seat.

The federal court ordered election of 28 magistrates for a new County Court has been ruled a special election for which the qualifying deadline is 40 days before the election instead of the first Thursday in June as for a regular August election.

FBI Makes Arrest In Bank Shortage

Mrs. Broadstreet Held For Grand Jury; \$55,000 Loss Replaced By Insurance

Mrs. Richard Broadstreet, of Highway 19 East in Ripley, will face embezzlement charges before a federal grand jury which will convene in Memphis Monday.

After investigation covering several weeks the Federal Bureau of Investigation took Mrs. Broadstreet into custody on Wednesday of last week and arraigned her before a federal commissioner in Memphis.

She was freed on bond pending action of the grand jury. Farmers Union Bank in Ripley, which had employed Mrs. Broadstreet for several years, said that about \$55,000 is missing.

The bank said the shortage was entirely in bank funds and that no accounts of individual depositors were involved.

The bank said the loss had been fully replaced by insurance.

DOWN WITH WALLS

Lessons for June 7, 1970

Several years ago an African student who was studying in an American college told me of an experience that happened to him shortly after he arrived in this country.

He had never been more than fifty miles from his own home. He was so strange and different and the city in which he was attending college was so large that he felt very lonely and homesick.

Rev. Althouse (he had been born into a Christian family) he looked forward to his first Sunday day in this country as an opportunity to meet some new Christian friends.

Sunday arrived and he set out for a nearby church he had noted earlier in the week. "One welcome!" a sign had proclaimed. "The Friendly Church," promised another. With a sense of happy expectation he ascended the steps in front of the church.

His church, he had heard, was "good morning," he said cheerfully to the usher at the front door. Instead of a similar response, however, the usher's heavy hand on his arm, a restraining hand, and a cool, "Where do you think you're going?"

The man was smiling so the student assumed he had made a mistake. "Isn't there going to be a service at 11 o'clock?" He wanted to know. "Nigger," said the man with a humorless grin. "There's no service for you here at any time! Your church is down near the railroad station."

"Four church," the man had said as if some churches belonged to some people and other churches belonged to other people. For the first time since he had joined the Christian Church, he felt a strange sense of being divided from some of his fellow Christians. The churchdoor had become a wall.

The wall of alienation. The writer of Romans calls this divisiveness "alienation." In addressing Christians in Ephesus who were regarded as Gentiles before their conversion, the writer reminds them that until the coming of Christ they had been a wall dividing them from the "people of God" (the commonwealth of Israel, Romans 9:30-33). The promises that had been made to the Jews (the covenant) had been made to the Gentiles (the church) because of this wall.

It was true that there had been a strong barrier between the Gentile and the Jew. The Hebrews were called upon to keep themselves at a distance from all unnecessary contact with Gentiles. Such contact was not just a legal wall, but a wall of distrust, suspicion and hostility.

An eternity of space. The wall, however had been broken down now and things could never be the same. Actually, several walls had been destroyed by Christ.

Down came the wall which had separated them from Christ. Down came the wall that separated them from the people of God. Down came the wall that made them strangers to the promises which God had made with the people of Israel. Down came the wall that had shut them off from God and hope.

Once an eternity of space had separated the Greek and Jew; now that eternity had been bridged because a man named Jesus had laid down his life. There are still so many walls today, walls between races, walls between regions, walls between classes, walls between generations. To all of us who stand on either side of these walls Christ commands us to do as he did to the Jew and the Gentile, "Down with walls!"
