

Lesson for April 4, 1971

Sometimes the parables of Jesus required some deep thinking he tells in Matthew 21:33-His audience surely recog-

nized the meaning Isaiah had spoken of Israel as God's My beloved had vineyard on a very fertile hill. He digged it and cleared it of stones, and plant-ed it with choice

Rev. Althouse vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a vine vat in it; and he looked for it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes (Isaiah 5:1a, 2).

The rebellious tenants

So it was not a flattering refernce to Israel for the prophet was saying that, despite the tender care God gave his vineyard, it was unfruitful, failing to yield the results he had intended. Once gain, then, Jesus is comparing srael to a vineyard. This time the inference is not that the land s unfruitful, but that the tenants who tend it are rebellious against the owner, refusing to give him the fruits which are rightly his.

This parable came as a terrible ondemnation to the religious eaders in Jesus' day for Jesus is ring them as wilfully rebelagainst God. The problem i not that they don't know any bet-ter, not that they are simply mak-ing a mistake, but that they are illfully choosing to rebel against God. It was bad enough for Jesus to suggest that they were wrong but for him to say that they were knowingly rebelling against God must have been a bitter slap in the face.

As Bishop Gerald Kennedy has aid, "One of the hardest things to understand about Jesus is his constant attack on classes of people we admire most." These men were zealous advocates of the Jewish faith; they were almost fanatical in their observance of the law: surely he should not have found fault with them!

But he did. And the fault he found was the fault of arrogant pride. They were not humble tenants on God's vineyard, but proud on having their own way. It was pride in their supposed moral righteousness that caused them to turn a deaf ear to the prophets.

This is not ancient history but lso a description of our own contemporary situation today. God has the greatest difficulty in getting through to those of us who should be easiest to reach, yet, because of our self-righteousness are most likely to turn a deaf ear to his messengers. Like Israel, the Church is often tempted to take the vineyard into our own hands, to enjoy its fruits and ignore the one who owns it.

In the parable and in Jesus' ife, the son also was rejected and, in fact, put to death. This, lesus points out clearly, is a reellious, defiant act against the Father himself. So it was not just Jesus whom Israel rejected, but

Jesus, who should have been he cornerstone of a renewed udaism, was utterly rejected by the very people who most should have accepted him. One cannot help but wonder whether we today might stand where they did Of all people, we should receive the Christ at work in the world oday. All that we do should be built upon this cornerstone, yet are we not in danger of rejecting him even as they did?

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies

Law" as passed by the 1957 legislaure and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1971, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rables vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dogs owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$1.50 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs with-
