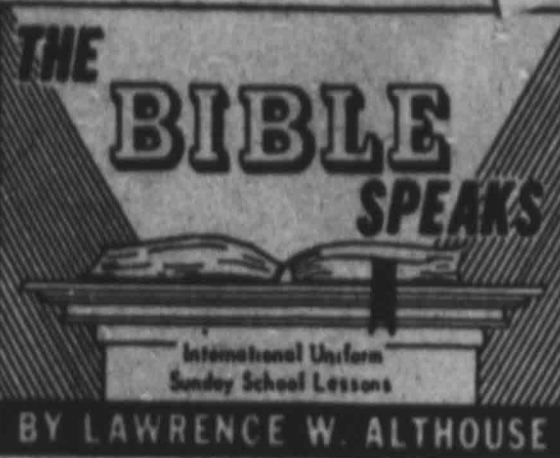

"HURRYING THE CHICKEN"

Lesson for February 7, 1971

Background Scriptures: Luke 11:6-15, 18:1-9

The late Emmett Fox used to tell a story about a city boy who was spending his summer on the farm. His hosts had a fine time showing him around the farm, pointing out the sights he had never seen in the city where he lived.

One of the sights they showed him was a hen sitting on a nest of eggs. They told him that some day soon a little chick would come out of each egg. The little boy was delighted with this prospect and every morning he would race to the chicken coop to see whether the great miracle had yet occurred.

No signs of change

Days went by and the little boy became disappointed as nothing happened in the chicken coop. The eggs looked exactly as they had when he had first seen them. They bore no signs of change whatsoever. So his faith in the expected miracle began to wane. Finally, after many fruitless days of watching, he gave up altogether, deciding that he had been deceived.

The next day, by sheer habit and no longer in anticipation, he went to the coop and was amazed to find that the miracle had taken place: the nest was alive with little chicks. How amazing it seemed that all this had taken place overnight. Yesterday the eggs had looked the same as always, but today the eggs were replaced by fully-developed baby chicks!

Appearances, of course, had been deceiving to the boy. The eggs appeared to be the same every day, yet all the while wonderful changes were taking place inside them. The miracle was growing right before his eyes, but he couldn't see it.

Is God punctual?

In "My Fair Lady," Professor Higgins sings, "Why Can't a Woman Be Like a Man?" There's a sense in which our prayers must often sound as if we're saying, "Why can't God be like a man?" Why can't he pace himself according to our schedule? Why isn't he more punctual?

This may sound presumptuous, yet isn't this what many of us feel deep down? "God, I asked you to help me last week, and I still am in the same situation." "Lord, I've been asking for three years for you to change my husband, and he's still the same."

The two parables in Luke 11 and 18 are not meant to compare God to an indifferent neighbor or reluctant judge. Rather, with these two stories, Jesus is saying that if these two all-too-human men will respond to a man's patient persistence, how much more are we assured of the eventual response of a loving God!

How long? How long?

Many of us are like the unhappy army draftee who was being drilled under a hot, scorching sun on a sultry day. The rookie and his comrades were neither enthusiastic or adept at what they were doing. A passing officer was startled to see the rookie drop his rifle. "How long have you been in the army?" he demanded of the rookie. The man looked wearily at the officer and replied, "All day, sir."

We all know of time when "all day" seems to be an eternity, but we must remember that it is not. Let us not "hurry the chicken," but patiently and persistently await the answer which God will give in his own good time.

New License Plates

New 1971 motor vehicle license plates will go on sale Feb. 15th, with a new look.

Tennessee is returning to the numerical prefix rather than the letters used since 1966.

Lauderdale County plates will have "46" as their prefix, replacing the "42" used for so many years and the "1F" prefix presently in use.

In another change, Shelby County will now have the prefix "1" instead of Davidson County, as was true in prior years. All prefixes are based on the 1960 census and may possibly be changed again when new license plates are issued in future years.

The \$18.50 cost will remain the same, plus \$10 wheel tax in Lauderdale County. Color schemes will be black on white.

The New Budget

President Nixon, reversing from his previous efforts to cool the inflation spiral and cut government spending, has announced a 1971-72 budget which will call for a \$11.2 billion dollar deficit but will at the same time call for drastic cuts in areas where it seems least logical.

According to information given your editor, spending at St. Jude Hospital in Memphis, which is working so hard on leukemia, has been drastically reduced because of curbs in government monies.

Despite rumors, we are not to believe that St. Jude is in any danger of being closed, but it will be unable to do as much for as many patients as has been true in the past.

It seems to us that any program showing progress in the fight against any form of cancer should be strengthened rather than weakened.

He further calls for a \$45 million cut in so-called public relations. If this means a reduction in the number of government handouts which reach our desk, then we are all for it, since the great majority of them go into the waste basket.

At the same time, we read that the cost to senior citizens for Medicare is to be increased. We have felt from the beginning that the costs of Medicare and Medicaid will be much greater than estimated, but increasing costs to senior citizens could quite possibly reach the prohibitive stage.

Incidentally, we find it difficult to understand why a privately-owned institution such as Blue Cross should be employed to handle the Medicare program.

Suspect Is Quizzed In Holdup Slaying Of Grady Crumley

Ex-Countain Slain Tuesday By Gas Station's Robber Interred Here Thursday

Memphis police are holding an unidentified young male suspect in Tuesday night's hold-up slaying of Grady Allen Crumley, Jr., 38, of 3302 Macon, whose parents reside on William Switch Road near Ripley.

Crumley was shot once in the stomach with a large calibre pistol during the 10:30 p.m. robbery of Jim Walton Esso Service Center at 4286 Macon. He died at 12:40 a.m. Wednesday in Methodist Hospital.

According to C. W. Featherstone, of Somerville, a cousin of Crumley's who operated the station, the gunman, masked with a woman's stocking, slipped under a partially opened garage door while he and Crumley were working on Featherstone's car after the station had closed.

The man fired into the car to scare them, he said, and shot Crumley before leaving with \$80 to \$90.

Services for the victim were at 2 p.m. Thursday in Ripley Funeral Home, with burial in Memorial Gardens.

He also leaves his wife, Mrs. Mary Frances Stockdale Crumley; four step-sons, James S. Thomas Marise, Robert Glenn Stockdale, and Jerry Wayne Stockdale, all of Memphis, and Bobby Ray Marise, of Pensacola, Fla.; a step-daughter, Mrs. Ruth Ann Staggs, of Memphis; and two sisters, Mrs. Rilladean Jacobs and Mrs. Maple Ferguson, both of Fayetteville; and six grandchildren.

Dr. Bell I. Wiley, formerly of Halls, Candler professor of history in Emory University at Atlanta, Ga., has been selected to appear in the 1970 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America."

He has won wide recognition as author of studies of the common soldier of the Civil War. He examined over 30,000 letters and 1,000 diaries to write "The Life of Johnny Reb" and "The Life of Billy Yank."

A past president of the Southern Historical Association, he was Harmsworth Professor of American History in Oxford University in England during 1965-66.

Last summer, he lectured in the 19th Annual Kyoto, Japan, Summer American Studies Seminars. As a State Department American specialist, he lectured at American studies conferences in Melbourne, Australia, and Wellington, New Zealand.

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Bloodmobile Visit Is Slated May 6th

R. T. "Freck" Pollard, Red Cross blood chairman, reports a Bloodmobile visit scheduled May 6th, with a need for 132 donors.

The county has been meeting an annual quota of 396 blood gifts, at expense of \$400, and has thus qualified for blanket coverage, under which blood is provided at no cost to patients. Hospitals reimburse the Red Cross for part of the cost, and patients are charged a nominal fee for making the blood transfusion. Persons using blood are asked to phone the Red Cross and report this so proper records may be kept.

If the quota is not met, the county will go on a credit plan, under which only donors will be entitled to blood needs for one year for themselves and certain relatives and dependents. Others must find donors for each pint of blood needed, before it is supplied.

Gallon Club members, however, are protected for the duration of the regional blood program.

Red Cross leaders are hopeful enough donors will respond to maintain the current blanket coverage.

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The first four finishers will advance to the regional 14 tournament in Humboldt. Winners and runners-up of each region will advance to the sub-state in Jackson and winners there will advance to the central tournament in Memphis.

Fans will find it most convenient to park in the Ripley High School parking lots and enter through the east rear door of the gym, Kelly advises. The street going down the hill between the two school buildings will be reserved for buses, he says.

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Growers Of Cotton Urged To Attend County Meetings

Halls And Ripley Sessions Planned At Critical Time For A Traditional Crop

H. W. Luck will be with the Extension Leader, F. H. Paschal, in a meeting on cotton production practices in the Farm Bureau Building in Ripley at 1:30 p.m. next Thursday, Feb. 11th.

A similar meeting will be held at Halls High School at 7 p.m. Feb. 11th.

Cotton producers have made lower than average yields of cotton for the last three years, and they are discouraged for the future of the crop. At the same time, they can now see that unless yields are kept up and good practices followed, the government payments will keep getting lower, along with profits from the crop itself. Practices that will be recommended at these meetings have proven to be helpful toward keeping yields high, costs as low as possible, and profits good.

Stoneville 213 made 917 pounds of lint average on 11 state tests last year, and it rated second, to make a yield of 816 pounds of lint, on the plots at the farm of Clifford Sweat. Deltapine 16 made 988 pounds of lint average on state tests and 772 pounds in the variety test near Ashport.

Hancock averaged 946 pounds of lint in the state test, Auburn M made 838, Deltapine 45A made 810, and Dixie King 793.

Dixie King was the leading variety in the tests on the farm of Clifford Sweat, making 863 pounds of lint per acre.

All cotton farmers are urged to attend one of these meetings next Thursday.

Read Corn Labels

Labels on bags of hybrid seed corn now being delivered to dealers, please deserve careful reading on the part of farmers who want to grow corn this year.

Agronomists say that if there is 70% or more normal seed in the blend of corn that good performance can result, even if the 30% of susceptible corn fails to produce. On the other hand, if the blend contains 50% or more of susceptible corn from male sterile cytoplasm, yields can be very disappointing, if the blight hits this area.

Joe Burns told Extension agents in Jackson last week that blight was likely to hit earlier this year and be more severe.

Russell Evans, president of the Lauderdale County Livestock Association, will lead a group which may include Vernon McBride, Jr., and Johnny Roberts to the state livestock association meeting in Nashville Feb. 9 and 10th.

Mr. Evans wrote a letter this week to cattle producers in the county, inviting them to join the county and state livestock associations to help the more than 6,000 members in the association have more voice in matters of interest to cattle producers in the years ahead.

Mr. Evans called attention to the fact that Tennessee ranks third in cattle production in the Southeastern states and that livestock production is now the leading farm enterprise.

He urged that local producers support the organization, which has already been of real help in providing better markets.

Soil Tests Timely

Sidney, Jr., and Randy Talley this week sent soil samples to the laboratory for testing, and Freeman Middgett is planning to test the soil in his garden to find out just what he needs.

Joe Matthews, head of the soil testing laboratory in Nashville, points out that 90% of the crop acreage in Tennessee is in West Tennessee, but that only 19% of the soil samples tested have come from West Tennessee.

The Tennessee Filled Hereford Association will sell 17 bulls and 26 females at the Ellington Center in Nashville, beginning at 1 p.m. Feb. 6th.

Foundation Seed available

Foundation soybean seed of all the common varieties, plus Dave, Bragg, Davis, Lee 46, and York, are available to producers who want to produce certified seed in 1971 at \$7.50 a bushel from the Tenn. Crop Improvement Association.

Pickett 71 foundation seed is available at \$7. This seed is resistant to cyst nematode and also to phytophthora root rot.

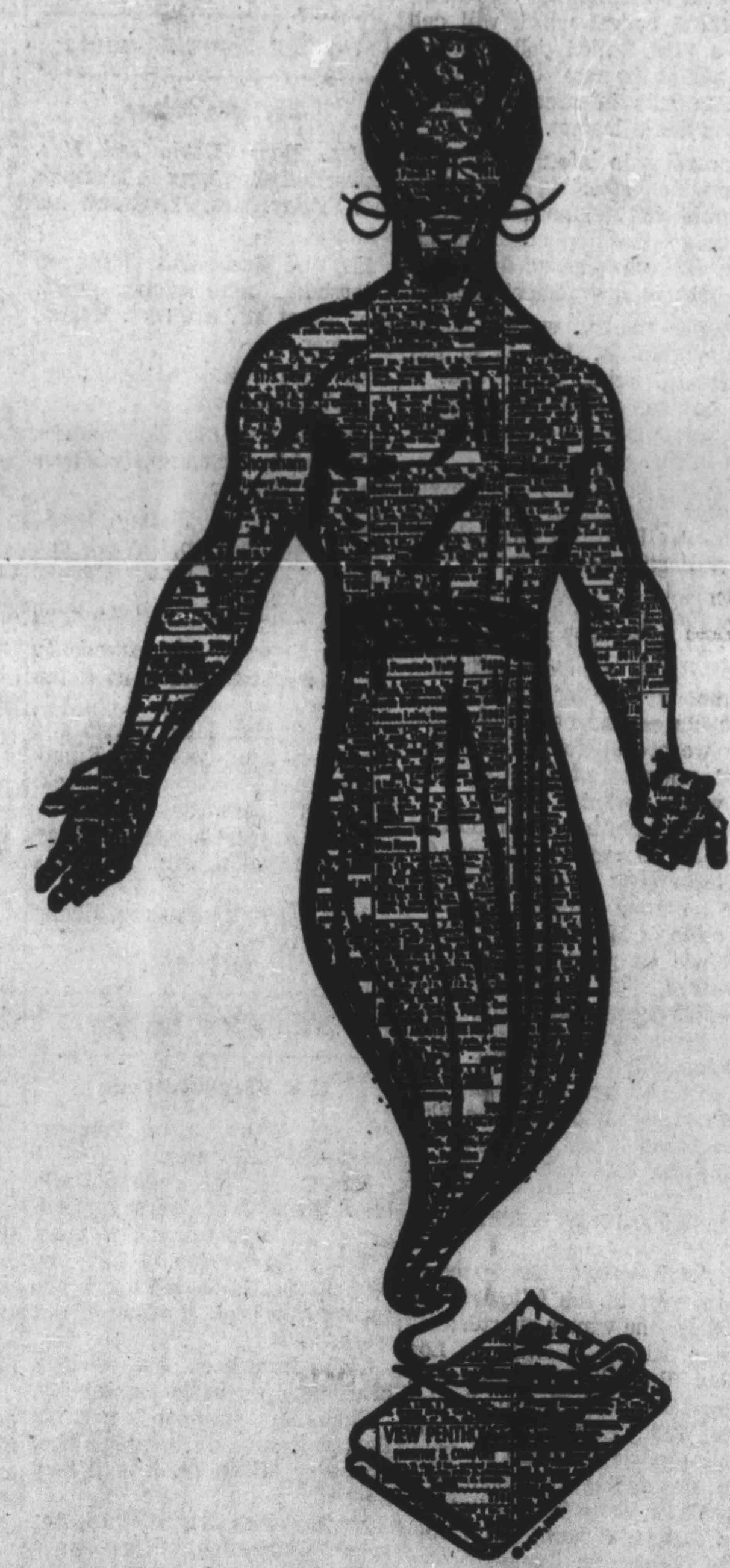

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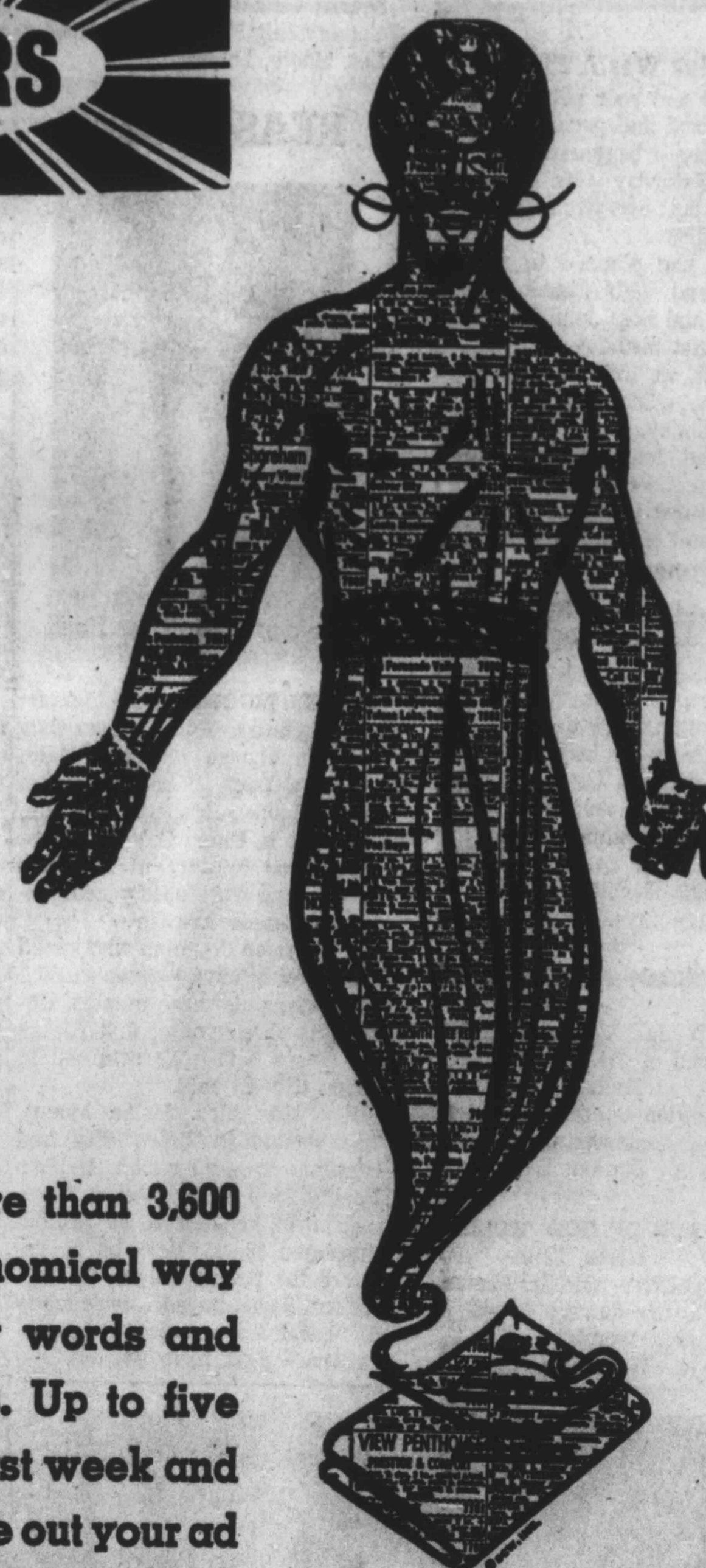

To Dog Owners Of Lauderdale County

This is another year 1971, and it is time again to start having your dogs vaccinated and registered. This must be done before May 31, 1971. There will be no five day notices sent. After this date you will receive a summons to appear in Lauderdale County Court and be fined instead.

State and County rabies control law requires that all dogs wear tags. The owner, of any dog not wearing tags, will have to appear in court and be fined.

All female dogs must be confined, while in heat, for a period of 24 days, or the owner will be fined.

Farm Bureau Expands Its Programs

The expansion of two farm Bureau programs has been announced for Lauderdale County. Farm Bureau members by Clifford H. Sweet, president. These are an expanded property protection service and a broader accidental death policy, which become effective on March 1.

Last spring, Tenn. Farm Bureau announced a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons stealing or slaughtering livestock, poultry, or fish from any member of Farm Bureau.

This program has now been broadened to include any theft, vandalism, or arson of a Farm Bureau member's personal property. The reward will be paid to the person who furnishes information that leads to the arrest and conviction of a felony of persons committing these crimes.

Reward signs will be made available to members to post on their property. The first one will be given to the member, and the member may purchase as many others as he wants for posting. The signs have been ordered, and members will be notified when the signs are available, sometime in the next six weeks.

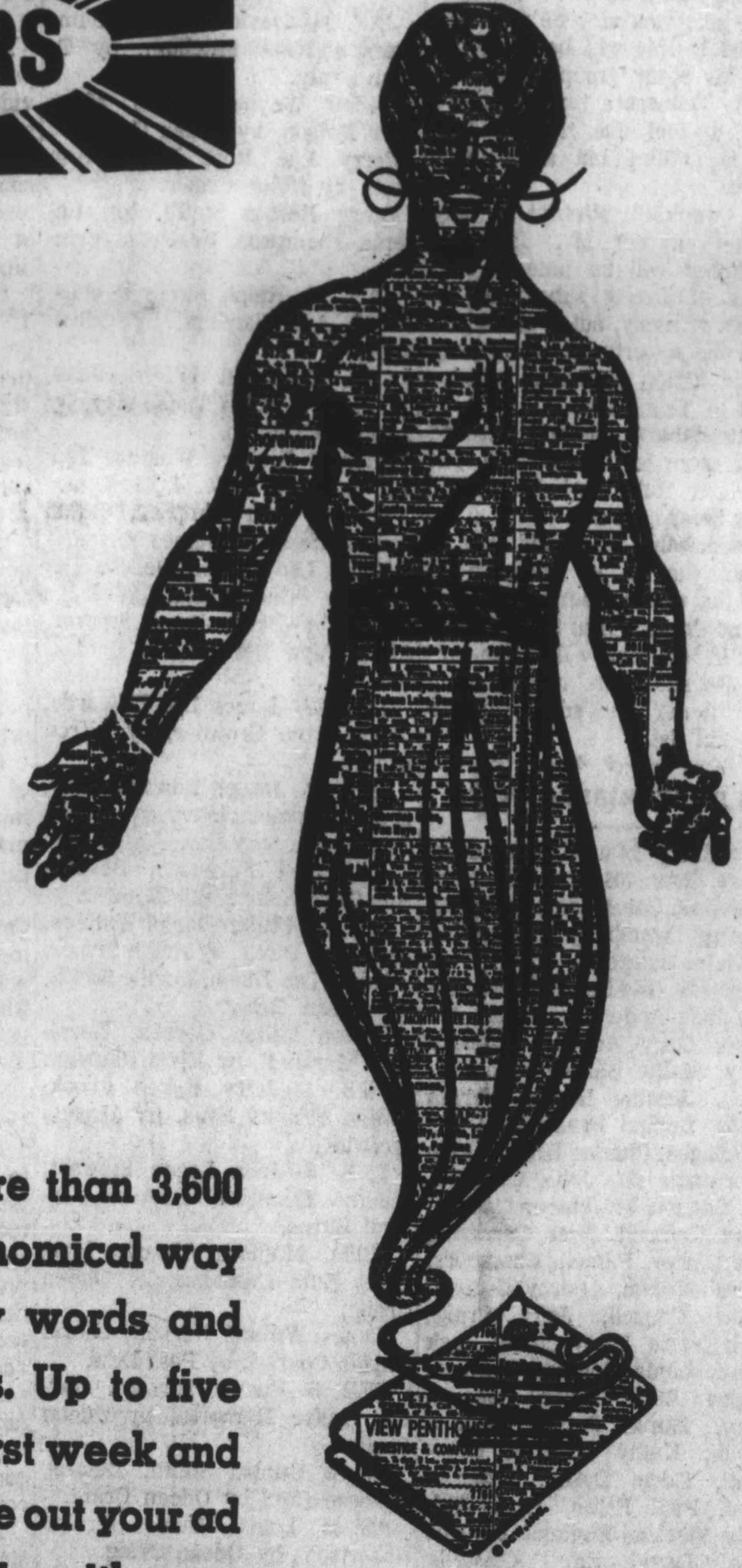
In another program area, members in the county have been covered for the past five years under a farm machinery and farm premises accidental death policy. The policy has paid \$1,000 in the case of a machinery death, or \$500 where an accidental death occurred on the farm premises by other than farm machinery. Those covered under the terms of the policy are the member, his spouse, and all unmarried, dependent children under 19.

Our County Farm Bureau board has voted to broaden this program so that any accidental death, whether caused by machinery or not. For unmarried, dependent children under 19, a benefit of \$1,000 will be paid for death from machinery accidents, and \$500 from accidents by other means.

All Farm Bureau members in Lauderdale County will be automatically covered under the terms of this policy. The only exceptions to the accidental death benefits would be death caused by licensed motor vehicles, war, airplanes, suicide, drugs, narcotics, alcohol, or while committing a felony.

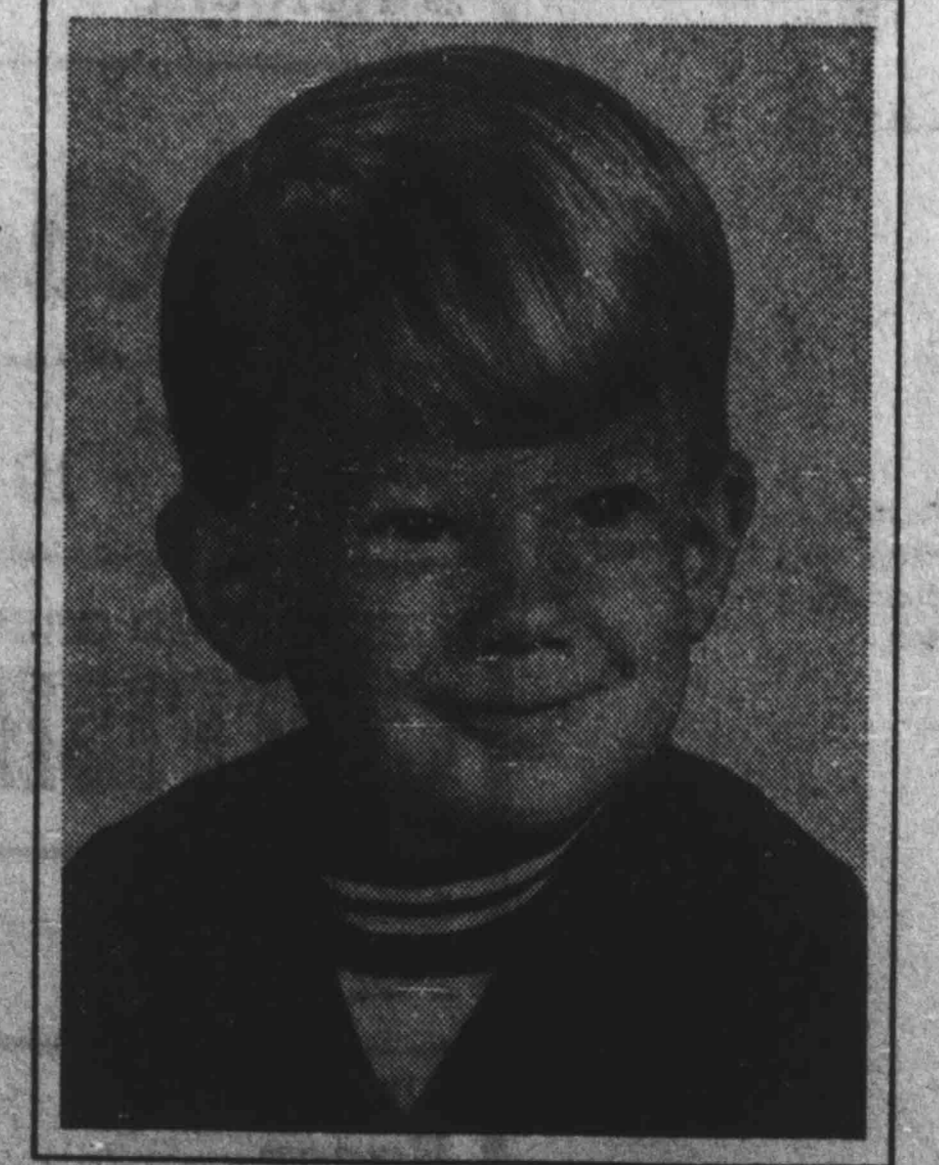
