Some Strange Reasoning

The Supreme Court decision on the printing of the "Pentagon Papers" was much as we had expected and predicted, but after reading some of the statements, we're glad that we only have to live with them, not understand them.

Statements of Justice Hugo Black, who voted to permit printing, and Chief Justice Warren Burger, who opposed, were perfectly clear, as were some of the others, but the statements of Justices White and Marshall seemed to us to have no bearing on their vote.

For instance, Justice White said, "Can I deny that revelation of these documents will do substantial damage to the public interest? Indeed, I am confident that their disclosures will have that result." Yet, he voted to permit publication.

Justice Marshall said: "The issue is whether this court or the Congress has the power to make law." We think that is a true issue, but we fail to see the connection with the question before the Court.

It is still our firm belief that more good than harm will come from publication of the papers, but the ethics of the newspapers involved could be questioned concerning their means of securing the papers.

More Supreme Court

Other decisions of the Supreme Court this week would seem to be against the public interest, as it voted to set aside the sentences of the killer of eight nurses in Chicago, five negroes convicted of assault in Memphis, and in all 35 criminals under sentence of death.

It seems to us that Court is evading a decision on the death penalty and coming dangerously close to completely demoralizing law enforcement agencies.

New Trial Sought By Man Convicted Of Razor Slaying

Denial In Court Which Gave 12 Years Sentences Would Open Way For An Appeal

Russell X. Thompson, attorney for the Californian convicted Thursday of last week of second degree murder in the razor slaying of Mrs. Nina Minor, 59, of Ripley, told Circuit Judge Herman L. Reviere he plans to seek a new trial.

He has 30 days in which to file the motion for new trial. If it is denied by Judge Reviere, he can then appeal to a higher court.

The defendant, Donald Brooks, was found guilty after a Tipton County jury had deliberated five hours.

The jury recommended ten years in prison. Had it recommended the maximum, 20 years, the indeterminate sentence law would have limited the judge to sentencing Brooks to ten years minimum and 20 years maximum, and Brooks would have been eligible for parole in the same length of time, presuming good behavior in confinement.

A longer sentence could have been imposed for first degree murder, but this requires premeditated intent to kill. Brooks knew none of the persons he attacked.

Brooks was also sentenced to one year each on two counts of assault to murder, and these sentences were imposed to run consecutively with the ten years for a total of twelve years.

Mrs. Minor, Mrs. Raymond Allmon, and their husbands were slashed Sept. 4th in Stanley's Kitchen in Ripley after the Negro had become involved in an argument with other persons in the cafe.

Brooks' defense contended head blows had left him a victim of temporary amnesia when he returned to the cafe and attacked the two couples.

Four psychiatrists, including Dr. Parks Walker, of Memphis, formerly of Ripley, were defense witnesses in support of the amnesia claim.

County Soybean Loan Rates Set

County loan rates for 1971 crop soybeans have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, almost unchanged from the 1970 rates.

The premium and discount schedule is unchanged from that used in the 1970 crop program.

The national average loan level of \$2.25 per bushel is for soybeans containing 12.8 to 13 per cent moisture and grading not lower than No. 2 on the factors of test weight, splits, and heat damage and No. 1 on all other factors.

For the 1971 crop, support will be at the rates for the counties where soybeans are stored. This represents a change from preceding years when support was at the rates for the counties where the soybeans were produced.

Jury Gives \$17,000 Damage Verdicts In Case Thursday

McBroom, Monday Awarded Recompense For Collision Claims Against Cotham

A Circuit Court jury Thursday morning awarded John W. McBroom \$10,000 for injuries and \$2,000 for property damage and Larry Monday \$5,000 for injuries in a damage suit against James R. Cotham arising from an automobile collision.

Lawn And Garden Open House Near

Nine Interest Areas Slated At Family Event Planned By Experiment Station

A lawn and garden open house will be held from 1 to 8 p.m. next Friday at West Tennessee Experiment Station at Jackson.

This open house is planned for the entire family. It features nine different points of interest.

One of these is a diagnostic clinic to which people are invited to take insects and sick plants to find out what to do.

There will be a soil testing laboratory. Take soil samples to a depth of three inches from your lawn to be tested free for lime and fertilizer.

There will be a lawn equipment display, a lecture on landscaping, a demonstration on flower and vegetable varieties, plots of nine different varieties of Bermuda grass, four varieties of bluegrass, and other grasses.

There will be a tour of the calf barn and a cotton ginning demonstration.

Glume Blotch In Wheat

Joe A. Johnston, C. J. McFarlin, and Russell Evans have reported severe reductions in yields of wheat in some fields from what has been identified as glume blotch.

This disease causes the heads of wheat to turn dark brown in color and produce much less grain and grain of smaller size than would be normal. It comes in on the wind and it is not possible to treat seed to protect against it.

It appears to reduce yields more where high amounts of nitrogen fertilizer are used.

Tomatoes Ripening Fast

Joe Bizzell harvested more than 100 half bushels of ripe tomatoes June 21st, and Jimmy Summar, Cleve Hill, and others are marketing a substantial volume every day.

Prices for earliest ripe tomatoes were very good, and growers are hoping that good prices will hold for the next few weeks.

Cotton Weeds Battled

Geon Jenkins, of Ripley, is applying a mixture of MSMA and Karmex to try to hold down or kill tough weeds which keep coming up in the cotton.

The addition of one-third pint of liquid Karmex per acre on a band basis is about the right amount to make a stronger mixture with MSMA which can be applied to cotton when it is six inches tall or more.

Teaweed is becoming a problem in some fields, and this can be controlled with a mixture of Caparol and MSMA.

These chemicals are available already mixed and ready for adding to water. They can be applied by directed spray after the cotton is six inches tall. This mixture cannot be applied over the top of cotton without severely injuring it.

Love Vine Is Tough

Mrs. Oressa Walker and Mrs. Lola Hill have dodder or "love vine" growing vigorously in flowers.

No chemical has been found which will kill this vine without killing everything else with it. The vine comes up from seed which can be carried in dirt or mulch. The plant becomes parasitic as soon as it can reach up to some desirable plant, and then it just has to be pulled off by hand to be controlled.

If it can be repeatedly cut off at the ground before it gets up to any other plant, that can help.

Organic Gardening

H. O. Davis, of Halls, is an excellent gardener who is able to grow large volumes of quality vegetables in small places with not too much labor, since he uses four inch mulches of sawdust and chips and other materials to control weeds and conserve moisture.

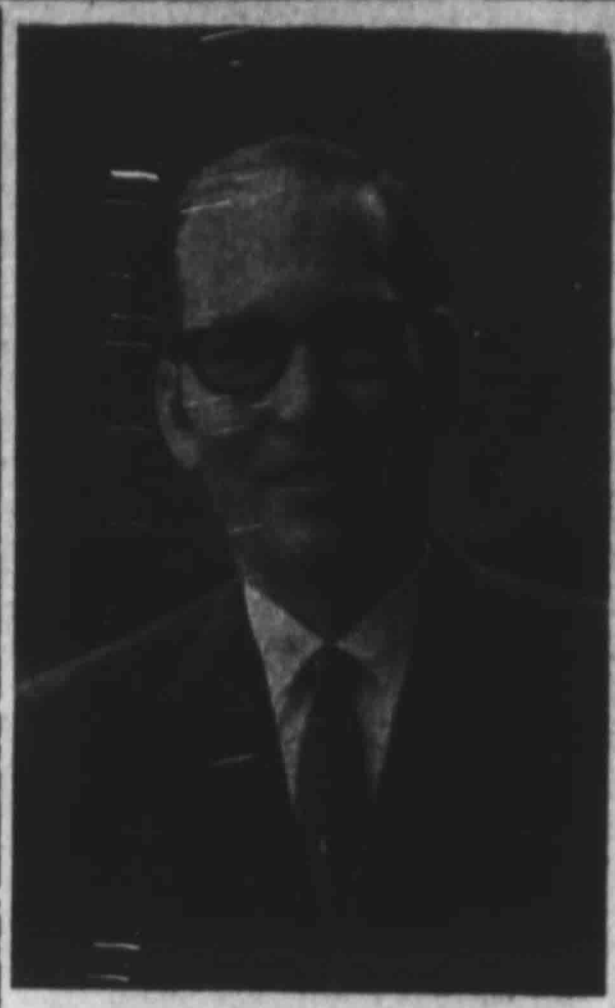
Mr. Davis uses Rotenone and Sabadilla dusts to control some insects in his garden without using Sevin, which can kill bees.

He is trying the growing of Mexican marigold among cucumbers, squash, and watermelons to see whether it will protect against insects, as some claim it will.

Pig Prices Encouraging

A total of 1,803 pigs were sold in the Brownsville co-operative sale June 9th. Nos. 1 and 2 weighed 35 to 36 pounds and brought 21¢ to 22¢ a pound; No. 3 pigs weighed 39 to 43 pounds and brought 21¢ to 22¢; and No. 4 pigs weighed 35 to 36 pounds and brought 20¢ to 21¢.

Top hogs in Memphis this week sold for 29¢ a pound, and with a new wheat crop to provide grain, more farmers will be encouraged to feed hogs to top weights.

HOW FREE ARE YOU?

Lesson for July 4, 1971

There is a lot of confusion about this word "freedom." Take, for example, the confusion of a college freshman whom we shall call "Jim." Upon arriving at college, Jim fell like shooting "free at last!" No more would his parents be there to tell him what he could and couldn't do. From now on he would be governing himself.

Called to freedom

Rev. Altheuse Jim found himself doing a lot of before and after this exercise of his freedom had a delicious taste to him. In a month, he was spending five or six other students from his dormitory at a little bar just next to the campus. As time went on, less and less time was spent in study. By the end of the semester, Jim had been placed on "academic probation" in the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs. He reflected upon the price he had paid to get his freedom. He asked himself, "Can I break out of this pattern? I've slipped into it. Has it become a habit to his own undoing?"

This was precisely the problem that prompted Paul to write his epistle to the congregation at Galatia. He felt it important to remind them of what they had been called to. "For you were called to freedom, brethren" (3:12). They needed to be reminded that the spirit of Jesus Christ had set them free of exterior control, that they were not intended to remain in bondage to anything or anyone—least of all themselves.

This is the ironic thing about freedom: when we are made free to make our own choice, some of us choose slavery in some other form. So Paul tells the Galatians that God didn't free them from their old pagan lives so that they could live in bondage to either passion or Jewish law. He set them free so that they would really be free.

Through love he serves them. Look at the catalogue of sins he found among these so-called "liberated" people: immorality, impurity, idolatry, jealousy, anger, selfishness, disension, party spirit, envy, drunkenness, carousing, etc. If any of the Galatians were subject to any of these, Paul said, then you had traded their freedom for slavery. Paul does not end with condemning slavery. He shows how ever, how a man can use his Christian freedom. Motivated by the power of love, he chooses to set free to choose to serve others. A servant is in bondage to a master. The servant does not serve him because he wishes to, but because he is in bondage.

Not so, however, with the Christian, Paul says. Because he doesn't have to serve anyone, he may choose to put his life in the service of someone who needs it, and if he freely makes the choice himself, even though he serves he retains his freedom. This is what was unique and compelling about Jesus' servanthood: he was not forced to serve, but willingly chose to do so. Because the choice was his, his dignity could not be taken away.

Freedom wisely used

Martin Luther has said: "A Christian man is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." This is the meaning of Christian freedom: to be able to choose to follow willingly the best that is within us.

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Squires Reject 8% Tax Hike
Lauderdale County Quarterly Court balked Monday at an 8% increase in real estate taxes to increase the county's share of the Board of Education budget by \$60,000.
It almost unanimously rejected the budget and adjourned for a week to give Judge Paul Dew time to try to cut the \$60,000 out of the money allotted to all departments of county government.
Judge Dew called a meeting of the budget committee, certain other magistrates, and Board of Education and Highway Commission representatives for 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the General Sessions courtroom, with an invitation for others interested to attend.
O. R. (Jack) Taylor, superintendent of schools, said \$26,000 of the additional money would replace \$14,500 of state transportation money and \$12,800 from sale of old school buildings, received last year but not available again this year.
The other \$34,000 would be needed, he said, to meet higher Social Security taxes, trustee's commissions, utility rate increases, state provisions for substitute teachers, and other costs over which his department had no control, with only a few hundred dollars involved for salary adjustments. He said none of the additional money would go into teachers' salaries.
If the \$60,000 is cut out, the tax rate could be fixed at \$1.72 per \$100 assessed valuation, instead of the \$1.86 proposed Monday, and taxes would about equal those collected this year, despite an increase in assessments from 30% of appraised value to 35%, as required by state law.
In other business, the court increased the Youth Council appropriation from \$1,500 to \$2,000; approved a 25x40 foot addition to the welfare building, now 40x60, for \$125 additional, or \$275 total, rent per month, of which the county pays half; and elected Sidney Lunn, of Henning, without opposition to the Board of Education seat being vacated Aug. 1st by the resignation of Maurice Gaines, of Henning.
It also placed in effect the new gross receipts tax replacing the merchants' ad valorem tax.

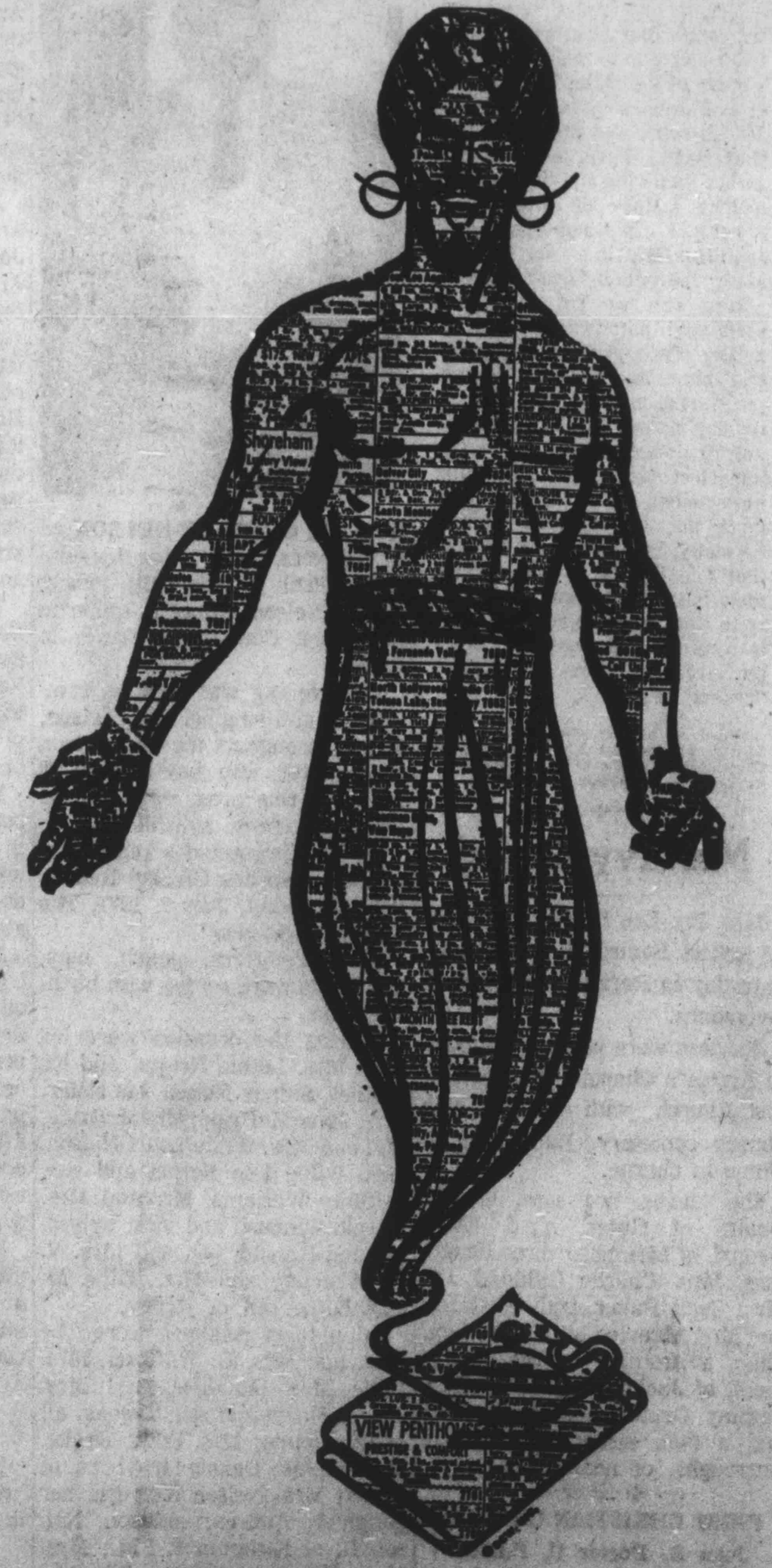

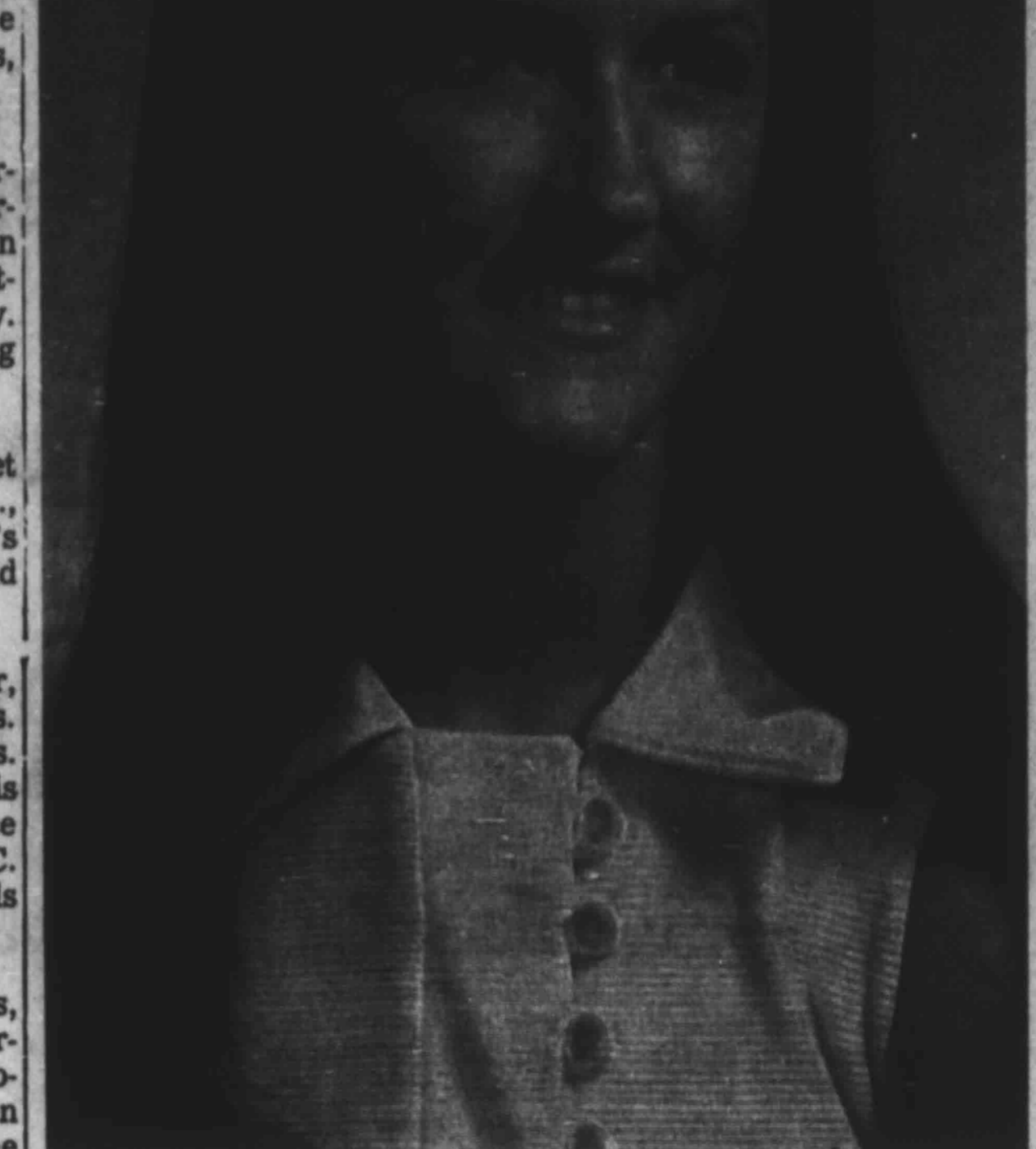

Set \$1.72 Rate For Same Tax

Monday's adjourned session of Lauderdale County Quarterly Court fixed the tax rate at \$1.72 per \$100 assessed valuation, which will cost taxpayers about the same amount on the same property as for the year previous, despite an increase in assessments from 30% to 35% of appraised value.

From the proposed total rate of \$1.86, which would have boosted taxes about 8%, the adopted rate of \$1.02 for school cuts \$20,000 of the \$60,000 additional local money the Board of Education requested; the 3% rate for the general fund cuts about \$17,000 from its budget; and 16% for the Highway Commission cuts about \$8,000 from its funds. The other 18% goes for debt service.

James Jones, of Halls, made the motion setting the tax rate. Douglas Collins, of Nankipoo, moved the rate breakdown by departments which were authorized to adjust their budget items to fit the total funds provided.

Magistrate Robert S. Thomas cast the only dissenting votes against the new tax rate and budget.

The court voted after former magistrate Clifford Sweat, county Farm Bureau president, addressed it, saying farm property had all the taxation it could stand.

Questioned by Sweat, tax assessor Bill Smith said the county Board of Equalization had cut assessments a million dollars below the H. L. Yoh Co.'s "professional" appraisals. Smith said he saw nothing wrong with the reductions, as the company's work in this county, which cost \$120,700, included numerous glaring errors.

In other business, the court instructed Judge Paul Dew, on the motion of Sam Johnston, to list insurance on county buildings with a view to considering self-insurance, and on the motion of Roland Henderson, to get a written title opinion on the residence northwest of Ripley High School which the court authorized the Board of Education to re-purchase from Bob Mason. The court Monday unanimously revoked that authorization.

School Supt. O. R. (Jack) Taylor said Mason, who had resigned from RRS to coach in Humboldt, has altered his plans and has been elected Henning principal for the new school year. He said he did not know whether Mason would continue to occupy the residence in Ripley.

Corn Leaf Blight's Found On Haynes Soil At Whitefield

Southern corn leaf blight has been found on the farm of J. S. Haynes, at Whitefield, in a little garden plot planted by his grandson with hybrid corn grown last year from Texas sterile cytoplasm.

Blight did not show up last year in this area till about this time or later and did not seriously reduce yields of corn that was planted in April, although most of the corn grown last year was produced with male sterile cytoplasm.

Most of the corn planted this year contains normal cytoplasm, which is not very susceptible to Southern leaf blight.

The corn crop over the county looks very promising right now. Plenty of fertilizer was used, and rains have been frequent enough in most sections to keep the corn growing vigorously.

Sam and Roland Henderson sprayed some of their cotton last week with Dylax to control plant bugs.

This Dylax does not seem to kill friendly insects as much as some insecticides. Cygon is another material which works in a similar manner.

Sprayers organized to apply the insecticides are equipped with cone pattern nozzle tips ranging from 32 to 42 in size. When the cotton is small, only one nozzle is used, right above each row, but after it is more than knee high, three nozzles are used to spread the insecticide more evenly over the whole upper half of the tender part of the plants.

Sprayers being used to apply insecticides are operated at 60 pound pressure to break the liquid up into the finest possible droplets, so that they will coat the plants, rather than rolling off on the ground.

Sprayers using applying weed chemicals are operated at pressures of 25 to 35 lbs., and they use fan pattern nozzle tips which maintain a more definite pattern.

Levi Shoffner, of Glimp, this week prepared a boom sprayer he had originally used to apply insecticides so that he could use it to apply Tenaron over the top on small soybeans to kill weeds less than two inches tall.

He also used this sprayer to good advantage in large soybeans, within two weeks of blooming, to kill cockleburbs which are showing above the tops of the beans. In this case, he will use Butonate at the rate of one gallon to 20 acres on a band basis or twice that amount in a broadcast spray.

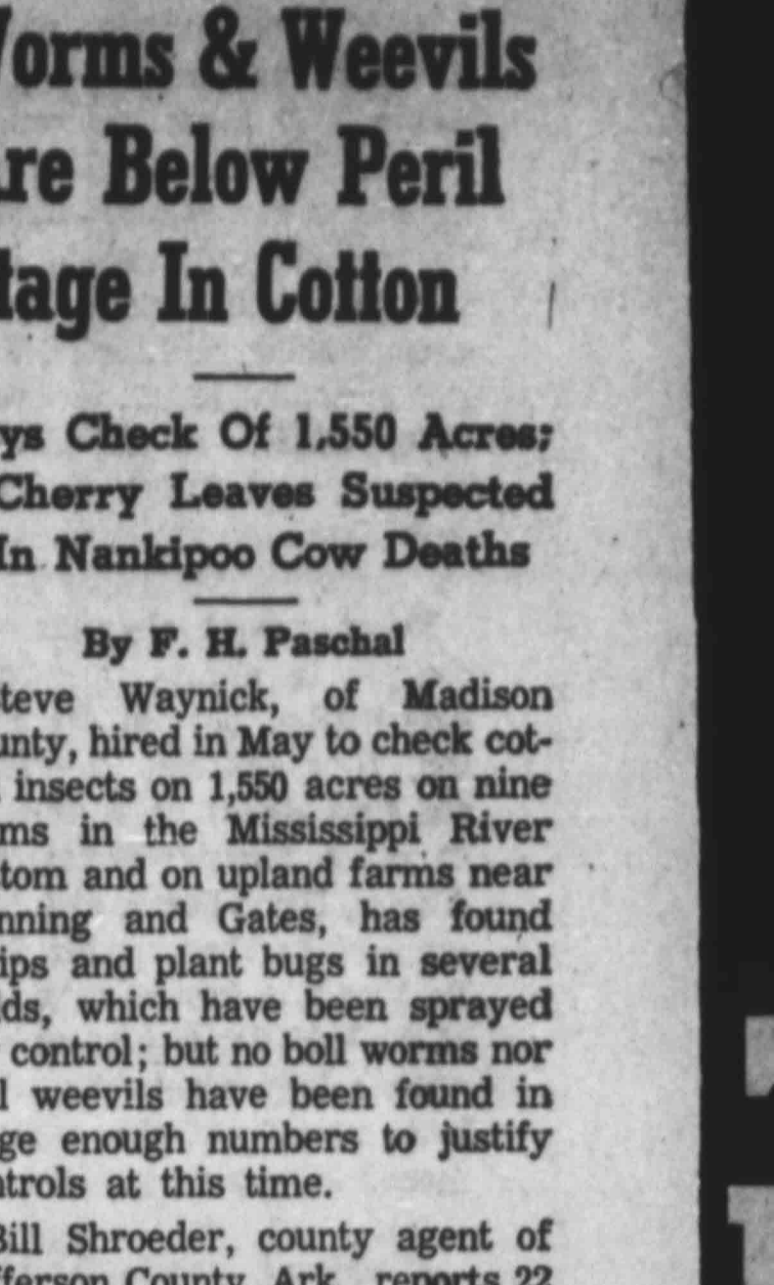

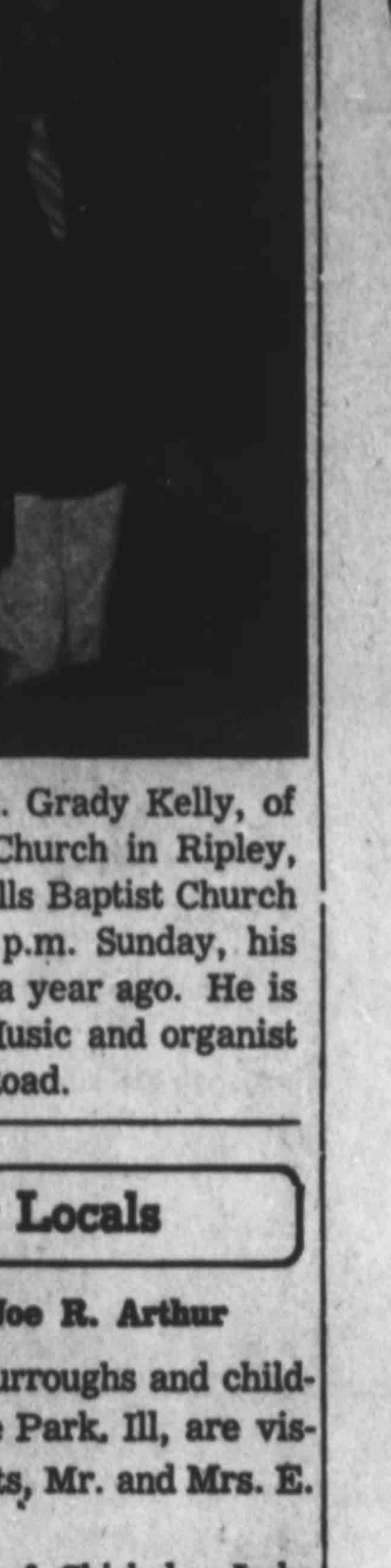
