

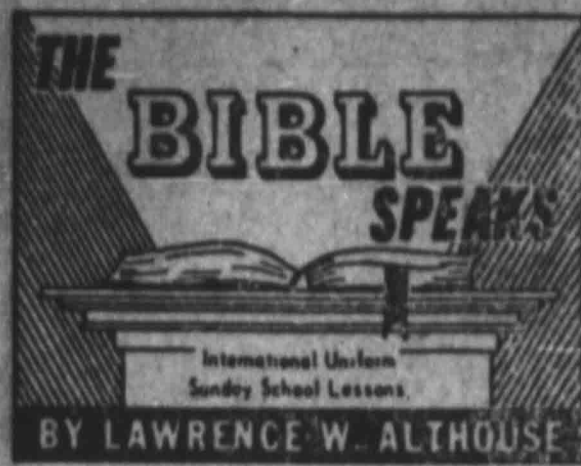

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TOO LATE?

Lesson for June 6, 1971

Background Scriptures: Isaiah 30: 31; 22:15-22; Devotional Reading: Psalms 46

A teenage girl is afraid to face her parents. Last evening she had come home from a party a whole hour late. She thought she could sneak in without anyone hearing, but as she got to the top of the steps, she saw her father and

heard him say, "We'll talk about it in the morning." She knew what that meant. "Please, God," she prayed, "don't let them be mad."

The infrequent prayer Rev. Althouse A young adult is faced with a written examination that will either qualify him or disqualify him as an accountant. Though he wants the job, he has been "gooding-off" in preparing for the examination. Now at last the day of examination is here and he is afraid he's going to fail. He hasn't prayed in years, but now he asks God to get him through successfully.

A middle-aged woman's eyes are getting very heavy and her thoughts become fuzzy. In a few moments there would be complete unconsciousness and then the operation would commence. It was a serious operation and she was afraid. With her last few moments of consciousness she prayed: "Our Father who art... in heaven... hallowed be thy name... Thy kingdom... come... Thy will... be done..."

King Hezekiah of Judah, knowing that he and his people had drifted away from their dependence upon God, prayed: "So now, O Lord our God, save us from his hand (an enemy), that all the kingdoms of the earth may know that thou alone art God." I can't help being a bit amused with his prayer. Instead of coming right out and saying, "Lord, help us, we're in a terrible mess," he tries to give the impression that it is really God's reputation among non-believers about which he is concerned. This would be like the teenage girl asking God to keep her father from becoming angry because it would be bad on her mother's nerves, or the young man asking to pass the exam so that he could continue paying on his church pledge, or the woman asking for a successful operation so that she won't be a bother to the hospital nurses. Certainly God isn't fooled by these clever deceptions.

What do we mean: "too late?" What about Hezekiah and the people of Judah? Wasn't it too late for them to return to God? Wasn't this prayer the last resort of desperate sinners?

Much depends upon what we mean by "too late." If we mean "too late" to re-establish their relationship with God, the answer is that it is never too late for that. Remember the one thief who hung on a cross next to Jesus? In a few hours he would be dead, but it was not "too late" for Jesus to assure him, "Today you will be with me in paradise."

If we mean "too late" to ask God for help, the answer must again be "No."

If, however, we mean "too late" to turn back the clock and undo what we have done, the answer may be "Yes, it is too late for that." For the teenage girl it was "too late" to change the fact that she had been careless with her time. For the young adult it was "too late" to make-up for the lost opportunities to study. For the woman in the hospital there was no turning back the clock as if the illness had never happened.

With Hezekiah and his people there could be no magic that suddenly would wipe clean the slate and instantly transform this stricken land into a nation of God-fearing people.

Yet, it was not "too late" for any of these people. There was still time to turn to God and receive his help in meeting and seeing through the troubles they had brought upon themselves. It is never "too late" for that.

Beyond Belief
Nell and your editor arrived home Monday afternoon after one of the most enjoyable weeks that either of us can remember.

Morrey and Florable Smith did everything possible to show us as much of Colorado as the brief time would permit. However, any attempt to do justice to Colorado and the Rocky Mountains would take weeks rather than the few days we had.

The Smith had every minute planned so that we covered a lot of territory in a minimum of time; although, of necessity, we could only hit the high spots.

We left Halls Sunday morning and arrived at Fort Collins about 5:30 p.m. Monday, after having driven more than 1,350 miles.

Tuesday we visited Cheyenne and Laramie, Wyo., and then returned to go up Poudre River canyon; Wednesday we went to Estes Park on Trail Ridge Road, to Rainbow Curve, where snow blocked the continental divide at just under 11,000 feet.

Thursday, we drove 150 miles south to Colorado Springs, then to Canon City and the Royal Gorge, and returned to Colorado Springs, where we toured the Garden of the Gods and the Air Force Academy Chapel.

Friday we rested some, met several of the Fort Collins people, and late that afternoon drove to Boulder, Colo., to spend a few hours with the Smiths' son and his family. We were joined in the trip to Boulder by another son, Jimmy, who resides in Loveland.

Saturday, we started the long trip home. We turned south at Lawrence, Kans., Sunday and visited with friends, Everett and Emily Burns, of Harrison, Ark., and Monday visited Nell's sister, Eunice Perry and Billy Perry, in Little Rock, arriving home about 4 p.m. Monday.

We won't attempt to describe the beauty and grandeur of the Rocky Mountains, with their snow covered peaks towering more than 14,000 feet into the sky, nor the 20-foot snowdrifts which we passed, but we will say that we were not prepared in any way for the sights.

We have been told many times of the beauty of Colorado Springs and its attractions, but we were far more impressed with nature in the wild in Rocky Mountain National Park above the city of Estes Park.

We saw antelope, deer, chipmunks, beaver, many new species of birds, and lots of other wildlife in their native habitat. Although we have visited the Smoky Mountains many times and the Ozarks on several occasions, we were in no way prepared for the ruggedness and wildness of the Rockies.

Tennessee Rates Well

One thing we discovered in our trip across Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, and Colorado is that Tennessee has planned well on its interstate highways, its rest areas, and the marking of routes, although this is in no way a reflection on the states we visited. Also, Tennessee has much to offer the tourist as compared to other states.

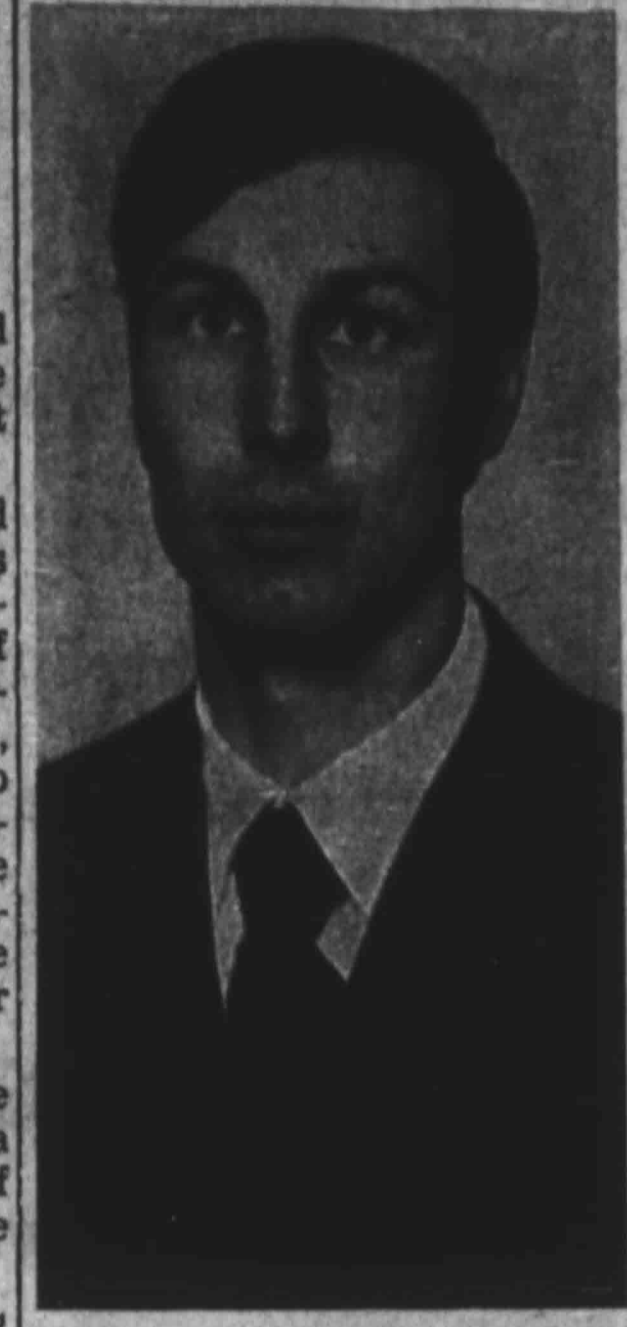
DSCC Graduates Local Students

Propose County's Joining In Mental Health Program

Annual Cost Around \$2,000; 30 Patients Now Served; OEO Looking For Funds

Dr. Charles Glasgow, director of the Northwest Tennessee Mental Health Center in Union City, serving Obion, Weakley, Lake, and Dyer Counties, told a luncheon of 35 Lauderdale Countyans in Town Creek Restaurant last Friday that the center has about 35 out-patients from Lauderdale County who are seen on Fridays when a center representative visits the Dyer County public health department.

Welfare and economic opportunity workers, Judge Paul Dew and several County Court magistrates, and Dr. A. J. Butler were told the center would welcome the county's participation in its work on a suggested budget of 10¢ per resident, or \$2,000 a year.

This amount, with state and federal matching funds, would finance a psychiatric social worker in the county, Dr. Glasgow believes.

Al Jones, head of the Lauderdale-Crockett Economic Opportunity Corp., said he thought some OEO funds might be available to finance the county's participation. He agreed to explore this pending the next meeting of the center's board later this month.

Westate Industrial Investment Paced State During 1970

Led Other Grand Divisions; Nunn Tells State Bankers Payrolls Prop Economy

David R. Nunn, president of Bank of Halls and of the Tennessee Bankers Association, told the TBA convention in Memphis last week that West Tennessee's economy is improving because of industrial development.

In 1970, West Tennessee's investment in new plants far out-ranked that of Middle and East Tennessee, according to the Research Department of the Tennessee Division of Industrial Development.

However, new jobs in West Tennessee trailed totals for the other grand divisions.

Industry invested over \$7,000 per employee in new plants over the state during 1970.

Almost 70 per cent of the total number of projects were outside the four metropolitan counties. Over 60 per cent of the investment occurred in rural areas, while over 85 per cent of the new jobs created were outside the four largest counties.

Over the past six years, in Tennessee, electrical machinery manufactures ranked first in employment and second in investment, while producers of non-electrical machinery ranked third in employment and first in investment.

For 1970, apparel ranked first in employment gain, with 5,575 (32.4% of the 1970 state total) new jobs, while it maintained only 3.7% of the total investment. Fabricated metals led all other manufacturing groupings in 1970 in investment, while it tied in number of projects (16) with both non-electrical machinery and apparel.

Primary metals, a highly capital intensive industry, was down substantially in Tennessee as well as the nation in 1970.

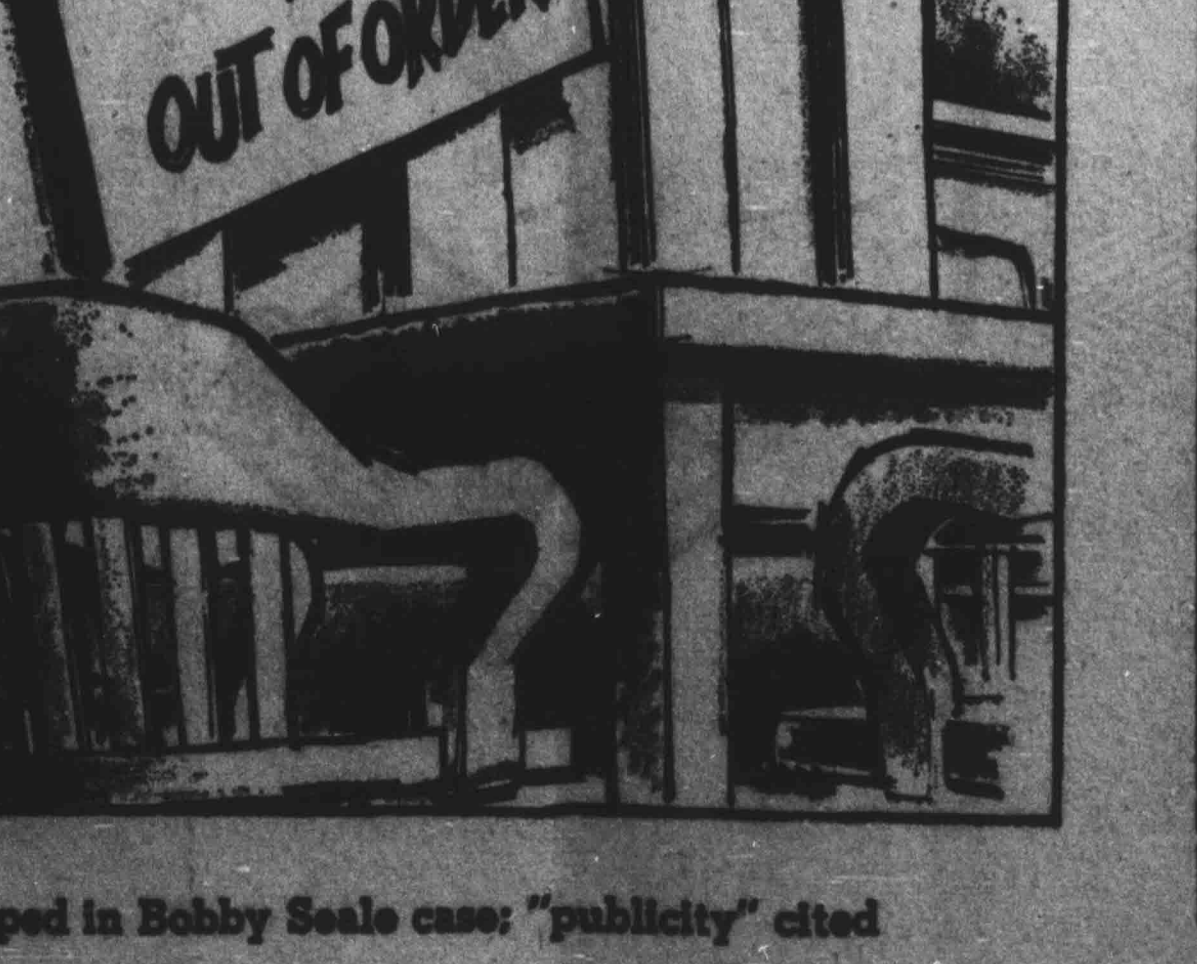
Golf Tournament Invites Amateurs

State Quarantines County Vs. White Fringed Beetles

Require Permits To Remove Soil Spuds From County Outside Miss. Bottom

H. L. Bruer, State Director of entomology and plant pathology, has recently notified truckers and others interested that soil, compost, plants with roots, grass sod, freshly harvested potatoes, and other products likely to carry soil with them can only be moved out of Lauderdale County areas outside the Mississippi bottom by permit.

The purpose of this regulation is to prevent the spread of the white-fringed beetle.

This same type of quarantine applies over the whole of Lauderdale County against the movement of soil because of presence of soybean cyst nematodes.

Cotton Producers Harmful
Cotton producers at this time of year are tempted to take their pre-emergence sprayers and apply MSMA over the top of cotton to control weeds and grass, hoping not to injure the cotton.

MSMA at the rate of two pounds active per acre applied over the top reduced lint yields by 181 pounds per acre, as compared to the directed sprays applied at Stoneville Mississippi Experiment Station. This reduction in yield was the average for the three years 1968-70.

In the same test, Cotaran at 3 pounds actual applied over the top reduced yields by 136 pounds of lint cotton average for the three years.

Directed post-emergence sprays which apply these materials under the leaves of the crop while making good coverage of the weeds underneath have proven to be the most effective and profitable methods ever invented.

No Corn Blight Yet
Charles Hadden, Extension pathologist, this week reported that no Southern corn leaf blight has been found in the 1971 crop in Tennessee to date.

The disease has already been found in Florida, Mississippi, and Texas.

Soybean Market Seen
M. C. Bevis, of Orissa, is now president of the American Soybean Institute, the working branch of the American Soybean Association.

Mr. Bevis recently reported on the situation in Germany, France, Belgium, and Italy with reference to the growing usage of soybeans for livestock feed and human food.

He was complimentary of the work being done by his organization in these countries to increase consumption of soybeans and continue to build these markets which are so important to American farmers.

Mr. Bevis told of attending the fair at Verona, Italy, which is the biggest trade or farm fair in Europe. There he saw the most modern equipment from almost every country in Europe and from Russia. He said the machines looked pretty good.

He was interested to find that John Deere, International, and Massey Ferguson Companies had machinery in the exhibits, just as they would have here.

Mr. Bevis concluded his report by saying, "The market for soybeans is there, they have the money to pay, and the potential is unlimited if we do a good job of marketing."

Agents Taking Training
F. H. Paschal, Extension leader, met with leaders and agents from other counties in West Tennessee for three days this week to study hog production under the leadership of Extension specialists from the University of Tennessee.

Hog production continues to be an important farm enterprise in Lauderdale County. More than 9,000 hogs were produced last year on 100 farms to add \$400,000 to farm income.

The enterprise can be just as profitable on a small farm as on a large farm, in proportion to the number of animals kept and the skill of the operator.

Pig Sale Planned
J. H. Ungerecht has signed up 20 pigs and J. W. Williams 21 pigs for the co-operative pig sale to be held at Brownsville June 24.

Recovery of hog prices is beginning. The outlook is that prices will rise into August. Feeder pig prices should begin to improve within the next two months and remain fairly stable through the fall and winter.
