#### WHICH WAY ARE WE HEADED?

Lesson for May 9, 1971

It took Leonardo Da Vinci two years to paint his great masterpiece, "The Last Supper." One of the reasons it took him so long was his painstaking attention to detail. This was particularly true in his selection of men to serve as models for Christ and the twelve apostles. Sometimes he searched for many days before he found precisely the face he wanted.

After a long search, he found a young man who seemed quite suitable to sit for the character of Jesus. The faces of each of the twelve were painted in turn. For a while he searched without success in finding the face he wanted. He was looking for a man who would look the part of a cheat and betrayer. These character flaws had to be evident in his face.

After a time, he found a man who seemed to be precisely what he wanted. Evil was etched in the man's face. Disposition showed in his eyes. So the artist hired the man.

When the face of Judas was completed and the sittings were over, the man broke down and sobbed. Turning to the astonished artist, he said: "Two years ago I was the young man who sat for the face of our Lord Jesus. Since that time I have lived a life of sin and corruption and it has brought me now to the place where I can be the Judas in this picture."

The prophet Hosea had seen this kind of decay, first in his own wife and, then, in his nation. Presumably, she had left him to live in adultery with another man. In time, it seems, she probably became a prostitute, going from man to man. As her moral life corroded from within, her physical body withered and her whole life began to show the results. It appears that she finally fell so low that she was no longer attractive enough to ply her trade and when Hosea comes to bring her home, he must first buy her out of slavery. It must have seemed to him that she was no longer the same woman. Sin had done its work with her, too.

This, Hosea observed, was also the case with the nation of Israel. Her moral decay began in allurement to the idolatrous practices of Israel's neighbors. Just as Gomer had been united in marriage to Hosea, so the people of Israel had a similar bond, a covenant. And, just as Gomer had broken her marriage relationship to Hosea by infidelity, so Israel was unfaithful, having broken her covenant with the Lord and turned to other gods. Like Gomer, she had sold her priceless heritage for the pleasures of self-indulgence.

Hosea pointed to some of the obvious signs of Israel's moral decay: there is swearing, lying, killing, stealing, and committing adultery; they break all bonds and murder follows murder. Are there those signs as evident today? Are we not plagued with violence, profanity, dishonesty, and sexual decay?

The prophet ridiculed the practice of worshipping idols; imagine worshipping something you've made with your own hands! No wonder the moral level is so low when worship is like crude. Today we do not practice that kind of idolry. Yet, do we not make things with our hands and then worship them? Don't we let man-made things take-over and dominate our lives?

### Not Necessarily Progress

Elsewhere in this issue of The Graphic may be found a letter to the editor taking us to task for opposing double trucking rigs on interstate highways, and also stating that we are opposed to anything that would improve our state.

In the first place, so far as we know, we are not acquainted with the writer, so we can't judge his qualifications to determine just what is and isn't progress and whether or not he is qualified to determine the good and bad points of double rigs.

He states strongly that he doesn't believe that we have been held up by trucks on the interstate highways. The writer should have been with Neil and your editor on I-40 en route to Nashville on March 17th, the day our grandson was born. We followed two trucks for more than 50 miles, which were spending their time passing each other or running side by side, making it impossible for other traffic to pass them.

We did have the name of the companies operating the trucks and other information, which we had planned to turn over to the Highway Patrol, but we were never able to see a state patrol car.

No further back than last Sunday, two trucks came up the long incline on the west side of the Tennessee River bridge side by side, slowing traffic to a crawl. However, all that is beside the point. The point is that, according to all authorities, the longer trucks will further damage highways, are much more likely to jack-knife, and are harder to stop.

It is our intention to continue, along with all highway officials, safety department officials, and most of the motoring public, to oppose longer and wider trucks on our highways.

The writer also takes us to task for not writing about the operation of mini-bikes and reckless driving. As we remember, in the same issue we called attention to the reckless and possible illegal operation of mini-bikes, and we doubt that there are many writers in the state that have written more about reckless driving.

Truly, it seems to us that the writer is so blinded by his own personal interests that he is unable to see that change is not necessarily progress.

## Lanier Poll Finds 49% Support Dunn

State Rep. James O. Lanier says Lauderdale Countians contributed more than half of all replies received to a questionnaire he sent businessmen, with about 40% of those queried replying.

"The most surprising result," he says, "was in regard to questions concerning the sales tax. In answer to the question, 'Do you favor broadening the sales tax base to cover more services?', an amazing 55% were in favor, 42% were opposed, and 4% had no opinion.

"Equally surprising, 46% of those responding favored increasing the present sales tax by some amount, 50% were opposed, and 4% had no opinion.

"A total of 60% of those responding favored Gov. Dunn's program, 25% opposed it, and 15% had no opinion. Of these, 49% favored giving the governor the necessary funds to finance his program, 44% opposed, and 7% expressed no opinion.

"It appears a majority of those replying favor Governor Dunn's program and the necessary tax increase to fund it. However, as you know, the Governor was not provided with the necessary taxes to fund his program, and as a result, certain proposed services must be scrapped, including his tax-supported kindergarten program. This is apparently in accord with the wishes of the people, since 65% indicated opposition to the kindergarten program, 22% favored it, and 13% had no opinion.

"On other matters, an overwhelming majority of 78% favor capital punishment, 19% are opposed, and 3% expressed no opinion.

"A total of 75% favor the welfare sterilization bill, 22% opposed it, and 3% had no opinion.

"The results of this poll were very gratifying to me and were most persuasive in determining my vote."

## Cotton Producers Employ Inspector

1,550 Acres Under Program Assure Full-Time Checker Three Summer Months

W. C. Johnson, of Jackson, Extension entomologist, has worked out a plan for cotton producers to hire a man to check their cotton fields every week from June 1st to Aug. 31st and recommend necessary insect control.

Jack Crutcher, Jim Fuller & Sons, Clifford Sweat, Bob Reviere, Alfred Kidd, Joe A. Johnson, Roland & Sam Henderson, Odell Williams, and Clyde Younger have signed up 1,550 acres of cotton in such a program, which is enough to justify hiring a man on a full-time basis.

These men will meet at 1:30 p.m. next Thursday in the Farm Bureau Building in Ripley to work out details of the program.

C. C. Shoaf, Jr., planted grain sorghum this week at the recommended rate of 6 to 8 pounds of seed per acre, or 8 to 10 seeds per foot of row, which will normally result in 4 to 5 stalks per foot.

Milgard is the only pre-emergence weed control chemical recommended for grain sorghum. It is not too effective on controlling broadleaf weeds.

H. W. Luck, Extension agronomist, recommends banding the Milgard and plowing the grain sorghum early and shallow. If broadleaf weeds appear in numbers, apply one pint of Ester 2,4-D per acre.

C. J. McFarland and Jack Crutcher this week studied with K. E. DeBusk, Extension engineer, the problems involved in drying grain sorghum immediately after harvest and storing it in good condition over a period of months.

Homeowners who like to grow apples, pears, peaches, plums, grapes, or cherries need to spray trees and vines every two weeks from now until the middle of July to control insects and diseases.

## Schools Register Autumn Entrants

Children who will enter school for the first time in September should register at their schools Friday, May 14th, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Children must have a birth certificate. Those with legal proof that they will be six years old by Oct. 31st will be accepted.

Also, any child who has attended a state approved kindergarten and will be six by Dec. 31st is eligible to enter the first grade.

Children must have a physical examination and proof of immunization against polio, small pox, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus. Parents should bring this health record.

No child will be allowed to start school in the fall without a birth certificate and complete health record. This information can be entered on his record during pre-registration.

## Beetles Attack Wood

Powder post beetles bore shot size holes in wood in houses and barns.

Lynnwood Grammer this week mixed nine parts diesel fuel and one part Pentachlorophenol and used this to spray rafters of a barn on his farm which were being weakened by the holes made by these beetles.

Homeowners sometimes find these insects in dry, well-ventilated places where termites do not give any trouble.

Oil solutions of this Pentachlorophenol are recommended for control. The solutions can be thoroughly sprayed on the wood or painted or mopped on for maximum absorption.

Ford Algae Shows

Mrs. R. J. Nunn, of Halls, is planning to control algae or green scum on her pond by the use of granulated bluestone.

This material, at the rate of three pounds per 1,000 square feet, applied with a cyclone seeder, is effective in killing this algae without injuring the fish in the pond.

Anthony Fisher, of Durhamville, has weeds in the edge of his pond which he plans to control by applications of 2,4-D at the rate of about two tablespoons per gallon of water. He will apply this with a pressure sprayer.

### Notice

**\$300,000 WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT BONDS OF THE TOWN OF HALLS, TENNESSEE**

WHEREAS, the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Halls, Tennessee, have determined that the best interest of the citizens of Halls will be served by expanding and improving the Town's water and sewer system; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Halls, Tennessee, is authorized by Sections 6-1601 to 6-1632, inclusive, of the Tennessee Code Annotated to issue bonds for such purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Halls, Lauderdale County, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1. That it is necessary and desirable and in the best interest of the citizens of the Town of Halls, Tennessee, to expand and improve the Town's water and sewer system by issuing water and sewer bonds in an amount not to exceed \$300,000 for said purposes.

Section 2. That the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Halls, Tennessee, hereby determine, pursuant to the authority of Sections 6-1601 to 6-1632, inclusive, of the Tennessee Code Annotated, to issue water and sewer bonds in an amount not to exceed \$300,000; that said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed five percent (5%) per annum and shall be payable, both principal and interest, from the net revenues of the system subject to the prior lien of the Town's outstanding \$450,000 Waterworks and Sewer Revenue Refunding and Improvement Bonds dated December 1, 1968, and in the event of a deficiency thereof, from ad valorem taxes to be levied upon all taxable property within the Town of Halls without limitation as to rate or amount.

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Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that "The Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law" as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court will be enforced throughout the county.

All Dogs 3 Months of Age Must Be Vaccinated by A Veterinarian

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's office on or before the 1st day of June 1971, and of each year thereafter, paying a county license fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

The law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$1.50 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.
