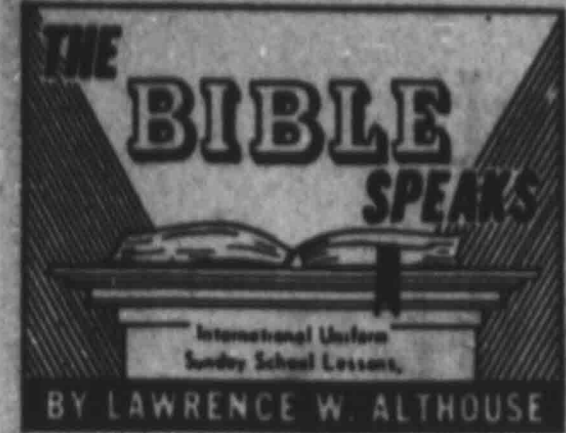

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WRONG NUMBER?

Lesson for October 3, 1971

Background Scriptures Exodus 3:1-20; 2 Timothy 1:8-9; Devotional Reading: Mark 2:13-17.

Have you ever noticed how often it seems that God makes some poor choices in the people whom he calls for leadership? Frequently he selects precisely the kind of persons that you and I would ignore or reject if the decision were ours.

Sometimes we can't understand how God could exercise such poor judgment. A case in point was the man named Moses. He seemed the least likely candidate to become the leader who would successfully lead the people of Israel out of Egypt.

Many years later this tragic failure is confronted by God in a mythical experience and in his awe, asks: "Whom am I . . . ? There were a number of answers that might have occurred to us:—the murderer of an Egyptian slave-master—

—a fugitive from Egyptian justice—
—a simple Midianite shepherd—
—an eighty-year-old "has-been"—
—a descendant of Abraham who knows little, if anything, of Abraham's God.

Surely this is not the man for the job! Perhaps God has gotten a wrong number!

This same thought occurred to Moses too. He too could not believe that God wasn't giving the message to the wrong man. "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the sons of Israel out of Egypt?" (Exodus 3:11). It was a good question, but Moses would find that God could always match a good question with a good answer.

I will be with you. Actually, Moses had asked the wrong question. Instead of asking, "Who am I?" the real question was "Who are you?" It is not because of who Moses is, but who God is that the task can be performed. "I will send you" and "I will be with you" he is assured. The success of this mission will not rest upon the power of Moses, but upon the power of God. All that Moses will have to do is to hear the call and respond to it.

But why Moses? For one thing, Moses had "turned aside to see this great sight." If he had ignored the burning bush, if he had refused to listen to God's voice, he would not have received the call. Furthermore, Moses not only "turned aside," but he accepted the challenge and thus God was vindicated in his choice of this man whom we would likely have regarded as a "wrong number."

The Detroit Decision

We are going to watch with interest future developments in the ruling by a federal judge that segregation in the Detroit school system is the result of efforts to maintain segregation by law and not because of housing known in the courts as "de jure" and "de facto" segregation.

The judge in question ruled that Detroit must integrate its school system and moved to unite three Michigan counties in order to achieve the required integration quotas. At the present it appears likely he will order the Detroit school board to begin busing school children to reach the goals. Preliminary figures estimate that some 133,000 black children must be bused to white areas and the same number of white children bused to areas where schools are predominantly black.

We are just cynical enough to believe that many previously loud-mouthed politicians and bureaucrats are going to change their stand as busing hits their own districts and states. Any hope that President Nixon had for a second term is likely to go out the window if busing in northern and eastern states becomes a major issue, although Mr. Nixon will not really be at fault.

As we recall, the Supreme Court ruling indicated that busing did not apply to the northern and eastern states because of housing conditions, but apparently some of the judges are not reading the ruling in that way.

County Producers Shape Defoliation Plans For Cotton

J. H. Brown, Others Weigh Best Ways: Pest Control Study Course Suggested

J. H. Brown, of Halls, and many other cotton producers over the county are considering the application of chemicals to hasten defoliation of cotton, for higher grade and earlier harvest.

Mr. Brown was interested in the danger to pastures from drift in the application of chemicals. This is an important question. The chemicals affect a pasture very little, but it certainly is not advisable to allow animals to pasture on it until after dews and rains have removed the vast majority of the chemicals.

The purpose of defoliation is to help mechanical pickers do a better job, because leaves are not present to clog spindles. Leaf stain is kept to a minimum. Less trash is added to picked cotton. Dew dries from cotton more rapidly in the morning, allowing picking to begin earlier. Defoliants may be applied without reducing cotton yields when bolls are mature and at least one-third of the cotton is open. Bolls on the fourth and fifth limbs down from the tops of the plants should be firm to thumb pressure.

Most defoliants are applied in water solution, and it is recommended that five to ten gallons of solution be applied by airplane per acre or that 15-30 gallons be applied by ground machines. Earl Moore has applied chemicals in a solution of diesel fuels at three gallons per acre the last two years and has been pleased with the results he got.

W. C. Johnson, Extension entomologist, suggests to those who are applying defoliants to add one-half pound of Parathion per acre to kill boll weevils in the diapause stage to reduce infestations for next year. He also suggests destroying cotton stalks as soon as possible after final picking of cotton is completed.

C. A. Anthony, Jr., of Henning, has suggested to the County Extension Leader that a study course be held some time this winter to provide cotton producers full information on cotton insects in order that they might do a better job of controlling them next year. Boll weevils have not been important in Lauderdale County in a high proportion of the years, but the last two have convinced many people that farmers need to be a little better prepared for whatever might happen next year.

Vernon McBride said this week that he was fully convinced that spraying to control boll weevils was profitable this year.

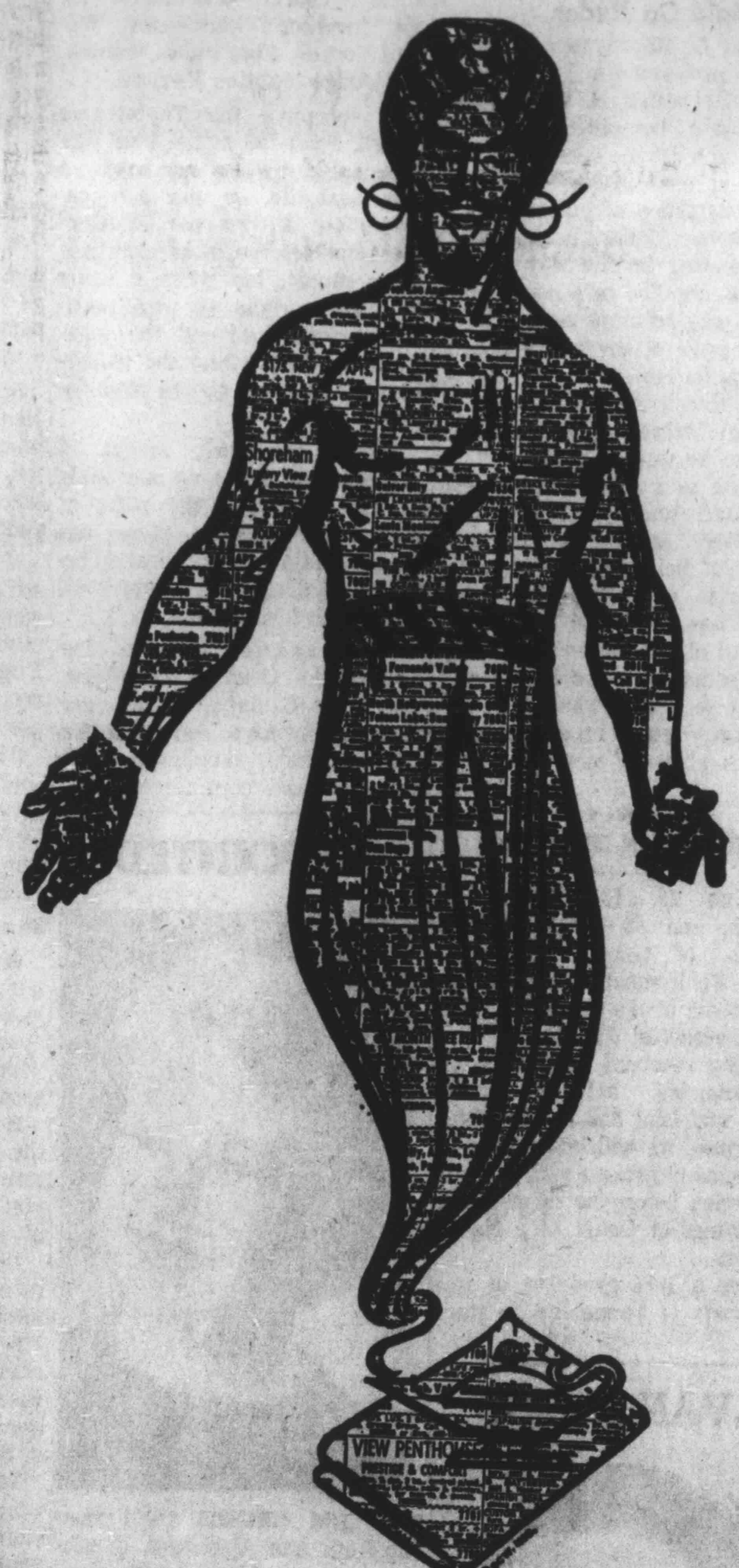

Phys-Ed Building Accident

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Farmers Doubling
Other Workmen's
Productivity Gain

The day of reckoning which caused President Nixon to freeze prices on Aug. 15th has been coming for at least a decade.

Inflation had been gaining speed since 1960. The U.S. had run a balance-of-payments deficit every year but one since 1958.

One thing certain to bring inflation continuing increases in wages without corresponding increases in production per man-hour.

U.S. farmers have increased production per man-hour since 1957 by 71%. Their labor has increased production per man-hour only 35%.

Japanese workers increased their output per man-hour since 1957 by 18%. French workers by 7%, and German workers by 74%.

All U.S. labor has practically doubled in wages since 1960, while farmers have been getting less per hour for their labor.

Farmers have also been getting a smaller return on their investments. All this has greatly reduced the number of farmers.

These facts indicate that instead of the federal government subsidizing the farmers, the farmers have been subsidizing the government.

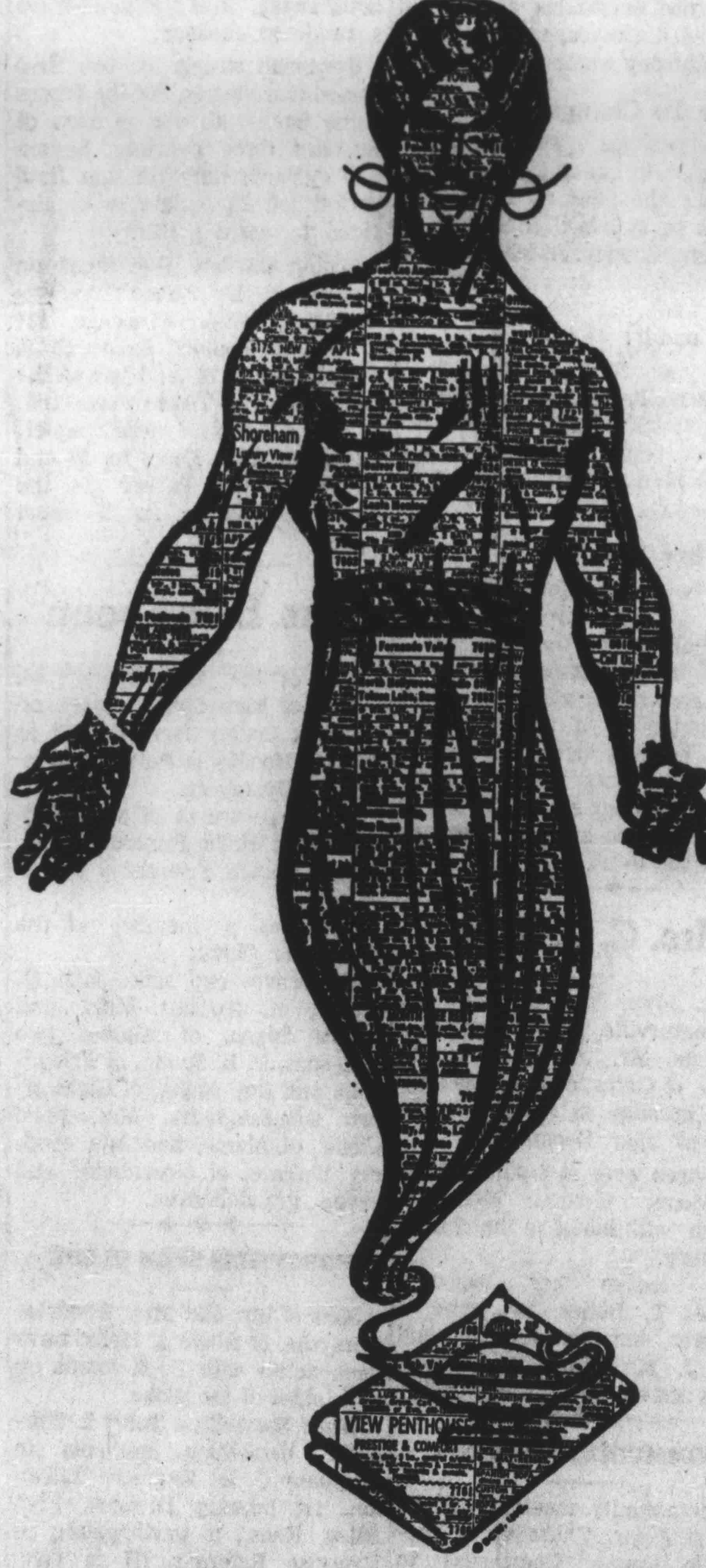
