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Buy Tested Boars For County Herds

Prison Farm & E. M. Voss Purchase Animals Backed With Excellent Records

Robert Rickard, farm manager of Fort Pillow State Farm, and Ernie Petree, livestock manager, paid \$545 in Lawrenceburg for two performance tested Hampshire boars out of the herd which produced the grand champion of the show there.

E. M. Voss, of Gates, paid \$175 for a tested Duroc boar from one of the best herds in West Tennessee in a sale in Trenton.

Alfalfa Weevils Showing
Alfalfa is the queen of all hay crops in this area, but it is now subject to infestations of alfalfa weevils which eat the leaves off the plants when just ready for cutting as hay.

Producers are advised to wait until that the plants show they are being eaten in the tops and then spray with one quart of 5% malathion, one quart of 2% DDT, or one quart of Ag000 (Lorsban) per acre to control these worms and guarantee a good yield of hay. One spray material must be applied to days before harvest.

Ouel Williams, Robert Revere, Roy Rose, and other growers are this week applying chemicals to alfalfa to control weevils.

Berry Weevils, Too
Charles Hilliard, of Ripley, and Otis Cates, of Halls, last week dusted strawberry plants with 20% Toxaphene to control strawberry weevils which cut the stems just below the berries and ruin the crop unless they are controlled. Dusting must be repeated in ten days.

Escapee Retaken After Wild Chase
Former Shelby County deputy sheriff James Coleman, 33, serving 1 to 2 years for forgery in Fort Pillow State Prison Farm, escaped about 1 p.m. Tuesday by hiding in laundry bound for the Somerville Youth Center, jumped from the truck at 60 m.p.h. on Highway 59 near Braden, and was picked up by Tennessee Bureau of Identification agent Jack Blackwell, 36, of Somerville, on Highway 61.

Blackwell said he had one handcuffed on Coleman when Coleman grabbed Blackwell's .38 pistol and held it to Blackwell's head to force Blackwell to drive him to Memphis. Going 65 m.p.h. on Mullins Station Road, the agent jumped from the car, suffering only deep cuts and bruises, but Coleman, in the back seat, managed to control the vehicle. He wrecked it when he ran into an embankment at the dead end of a gravel road off Macon Road, near Charles Bryan. Prison bloodhounds flushed him from a field in which he hid.

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BIBLE
A MINISTER IN THE HOUSE?
Lesson for April 16, 1972

Who is a minister in the house? asked a slightly flustered Master of Ceremonies. The dinner was ready to begin but the clergyman who had been asked to give the invocation had just called to say he had had car trouble and couldn't get there on time. Since prayers are the kind of thing you invite clergyman to do for you, the Master of Ceremonies was anxious to get the banquet underway.

Everyone a minister

It didn't seem to occur to the Master of Ceremonies that it would be just as appropriate to have the prayer given by a layman present — even himself! When he rose to the front of the room, stepped to the microphone and said, "I'll give the invocation; I'm not a clergyman, but I am a minister!"

What this layman meant was that one doesn't have to be a clergyman to be a minister in the Word Treatment sense of the word. The word we translate "minister in English is diakonos in Greek. It means "one who serves." When Jesus washed the feet of the disciples, he performed a service. He was not a servant, but in the act of a servant. So, too in Acts 8 the minister who has chosen to wait on tables at the meals of the disciples.

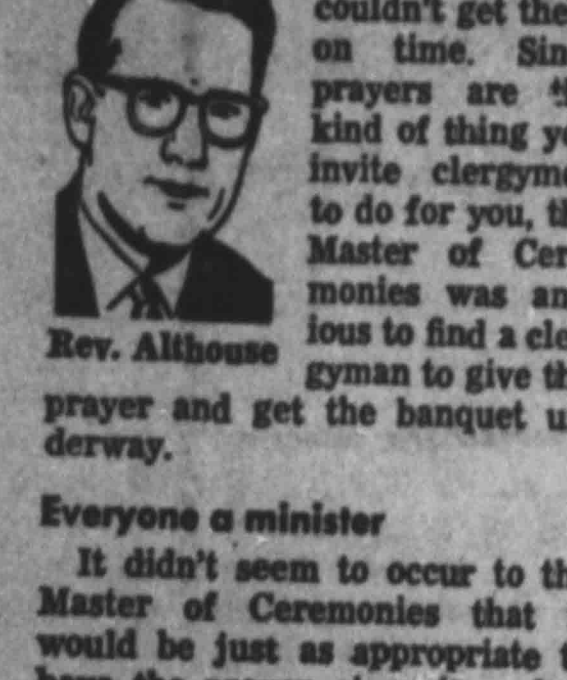
In the New Testament the word diakonos does not refer to the work of the professional clergy. All Christians are called to be ministers, humble servants. The purpose of every follower of Jesus Christ—not just an elite few—to respond readily to serve the needs of others. The association of the word "ministry" with the professional clergy came much later.

The work of ministry

In Ephesians 4 the writer speaks of the purposes of spiritual gifts as "for the equipping of the saints, for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (4:12). The word "ministry" here does not refer to the clergy, but the mission or task which all Christians are called to perform. Today's English Version of the Bible (American Bible Society) expresses this meaning when it translates the sentence as: "He did this to prepare all God's people for the work of Christian service."

It is a minister in the house? There ought to be—in every house!

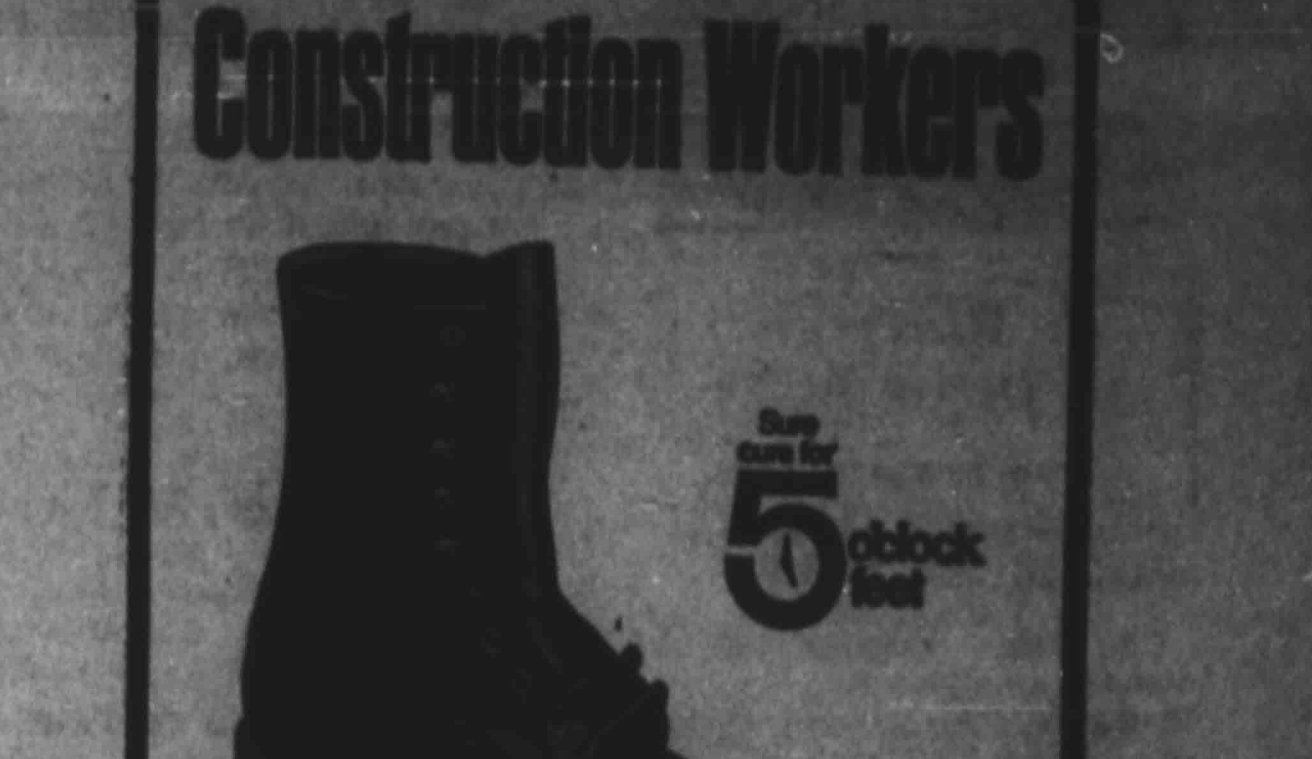
