## Crain, Garner Seen Victors

With only the 1,967-vote Ripley box out, unofficial returns at 9 p. m. Thursday indicated election of Bernice Crain as tax assessor and re-election of Lewis Gitchell for a third 2-year term as sheriff. Halls and county-wide (excluding Ripley) returns:

Bishop	193

Early returns from the portions of Crockett and Haywood Counties voting in this race made it doubtful Garner's lead could be overcome. With only Crockett Mills out, Crockett County gave Bishop 310, Garner 148, Burke 106, and Johnston 23.

Four of twelve Haywood County precincts gave Bishop 267, Johnston 72, Burke 58, and Johnston 43.

The county went with Fayette County General Sessions Judge Paul Summers for chancellor in the Ninth District, with Halls contributing 394 votes to a county

total of 1,981, against 200 in Halls, and 1,111 in the county for incumbent Gayle Malone.

Bob Clement, son of the late governor, ran 3-1 in the county over incumbent Hammond Fowler for the Public Service Commission. Halls gave him 439 votes to 93 for Fowler. The county vote was 2,264 to 1,035.

Halls went for the constitutional amendment 313-163 and the county 1,914-776.

With the Ripley box out, Parrell Webb led H. J. Pennington for the Board of Education, 793 to 733.

Halls magistrates Elvis Cannon, Roy Cook, Sr., James Jones, and Eugene Fugh were unopposed for re-election. So were Douglas Collins and Hal J. Pennington in the 16th and 17th Districts, and P. B. Bridges in the 8th.

In the 5th, 11th, and 15th Districts, Vernon McBride, Sr., with 449, Clifford R. Sweet, with 377, and Roland Henderson, with 322, were elected from a field of six.

In the 6th and 7th, Billy Powell, with 479, "Red" Thompson, with 452, and Oneal Ashworth, with 408 won seats. Harvey Newman lost with 342.

In the 4th, 10th, and 13th, John L. Peyton, with 193, and Emmett Young, with 181, led Montelle Bates, Jr., with 173, with absentee votes unreported.

In the 1st, Edgar Queen, with 97, defeated Anthony Fisher, with 79.

In the 9th and 14th, Talmadge L. Criffield, with 222, led Jim Voss, with 127.

J. K. Goodson was elected 12th District constable, with 318 votes. Ralph V. Perry had 209, Earnest K. Jackson 144, and James W. Baker 92.

In the 17th District, Vester L. Shepherd, with 144, defeated H. W. Walpole, with 66.

In the 8th, Gordon Gooch, with 77, led Aubrey Smith, with 74, and Holford Swanner, with 48, with absentee votes unreported.

Lauderdale County Sheriff Lewis Gitchell will bring to Ripley Friday a second man arrested on charges of rape and armed robbery of two sisters-in-law near Henning June 21st.

Clarence Edward Parker, 35, who served a sentence in Fort Pillow State Prison Farm in 1967 for armed robbery in Shelby County, was arrested in Furtis, Miss., and waived extradition.

H. M. Smith is being held in Vincennes, Ind., on nine charges of armed robbery but is fighting extradition.

Smith was found with a 1963 Chevrolet 4-door sedan bearing Alabama plates which answered the description given by the Henning women, the sheriff says.

## Schools' Opening Schedule Listed

Lauderdale County students for grades 1-8 will register Friday, Aug. 18th, for the 1972-73 school term. Parents of children selected for kindergarten will be contacted before Aug. 28th.

High School seniors will register Aug. 18th, juniors Aug. 28th, sophomores Aug. 28th, and freshmen Aug. 30th. Classes for all high school students will begin Aug. 31st.

Children entering first grade or kindergarten for the first time must have a birth certificate, physical examination, and proof of immunization against polio, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus in order to register. Those who pre-registered these requirements at that time will not need to present these proofs at this time.

Children entering first grade must be six years old on or before Oct. 31, 1972.

## Weevils Are Near A Critical Period

Boll weevil numbers are reaching a critical stage, especially in fields in the upland area with woods or trashy areas surrounding them.

The hatch-out of the first generation of weevils is at its peak, slightly ahead of last year.

Many fields have reached 15% to 20% infestation, while others remain at 2% to 8%.

Mississippi River bottom area counts are remaining the same as two weeks ago.

Farmers are advised to carefully make square counts by collecting 100 squares from a field, selecting them alternately from the bottom, middle, and top of the plants, and then checking for either a feeding puncture or an egg-laying puncture.

Squares picked up off the ground will not give an accurate count.

This method will help keep tab on the boll weevil build-up so that money can be saved by not having to spray certain fields.

When 10% or more punctured squares are found, start applications at 5-day intervals, using a 4-2 (Toxaphene-DDT) mixture at the rate of one-half gallon per acre. If the build-up continues very rapidly, then a 4-2-1, which is the addition of Methyl Parathion, should be applied.

Steve Waynick, who is scouting 1,500 acres of cotton in Lauderdale County, found one field Tuesday in the south end of the county with four bollworm larvae per 100 terminals. Spraying is recommended when five or more are found. The 4-2-1 mixture of one-half gallon per acre is the rate to use.

Farmers are advised not to spray boll weevils until infestations are more than 10%, because it is thought that beneficial insects will be of more help than the application of insecticides.

Prompt action is necessary, however, inasmuch as boll weevils can run a crop quickly.

## Pasture Land Tested

Talmadge Heathcott, J. W. Holcomb, S. O. Maxwell, J. W. Vaden, B. V. Hutchinson, and T. G. Langley are sending soil to the University of Tennessee testing laboratory to determine the amount and kinds of soil elements to be added to their land to produce quality forage.

This important practice can result in more pounds of beef cattle produced per acre, just as it would for producing more pounds of lint cotton per acre.

### Eagleton Affair

Removal of Sen. Eagleton from the Democratic ticket as candidate for vice-president came as no surprise to anyone, as far as we could tell, but the Eagleton foul-up did serve to highlight just how poorly prepared the Democratic Party under its present set-up is to elect a president, and also, in our opinion, just how poor a candidate Sen. McGovern is for president.

## MUTUAL STIRRING

Lesson for August 6, 1972  
Background Scripture: Psalm 122, 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, Hebrews 10:23-25  
Devotional Reading: Psalm 141:1-5

"I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'" (Psalm 122:1), says the psalmist.

There are many people today who do not share his gladness. They do not "enjoy" congregational worship. "I don't get anything out of it," they sometimes say.

Actually, many of these people miss the point: a good deal of worship has to do with what you give, rather than what you get. The psalmist, for example, prays for the needs of others: "For my brethren and companions' sake, I will say, 'Peace be within you'" (122:5). His focus is not upon "getting" something: "For the sake of the house of the Lord our God, I will seek your good" (122:9).

### The by-product

In his book, SURPRISED BY JOY, C. S. Lewis tells us that after many years of fruitless searching, he found that joy is a by-product. In seeking something of a less self-centered nature, he was often "surprised by joy."

When he sought it, it eluded him. Perhaps one of the reasons some people don't get "anything out of worship" is that they are not putting anything into it. They are seeking peace, but not giving it. They want to find inspiration, but perhaps, like joy, inspiration is a by-product of self-giving. Perhaps it was because he was willing to pray for the peace of others, that the psalmist found so much joy in going up to Jerusalem to worship in the temple.

Maybe the next time we come home from church we ought to ask, not what we got out of it, but what we put into it. The writer of Hebrews puts his finger on this same idea: "let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works... encouraging one another... (Hebrews 10:24, 25). Actually the church ought to be a kind of mutual-stirring society. If we worship, we will focus on encouraging others, inspiring them. If we do, we will probably find that we ourselves have been inspired as well.

### The great neglect

A pastor once called on a man who, though still professing to be a Christian, had absented himself from worship in the church for a number of years. "I don't want to offend you, Pastor," he said, "but I feel I can be a Christian just as easily by sitting here by my fire and listening to a church on the radio."

The minister said nothing for a few minutes, staring into the fireplace and its cozy fire. Suddenly he leaned forward and grasping the fire tongs, he lifted a burning coal out of the fire and placed it by itself on the stone sill. In a few minutes the coal stopped glowing and went out. The parishioner watched all this and then said: "I get the point; I'll be in church on Sunday."

Without each other and our mutual stirring, the fire of faith grows dim and goes out.

Visiting her mother, Mrs. Shirley Rowe, of Highland St., Ripley, the former Sylvia Ross, of Denver, Colo., said she has spoken personally with President Nixon on several occasions and believes "he is doing everything that is possible to end the war and to have an accounting for our missing men."

Her husband, flying a reconnaissance plane near Phan Rang, was shot down April 9, 1969, and is listed as missing in action.

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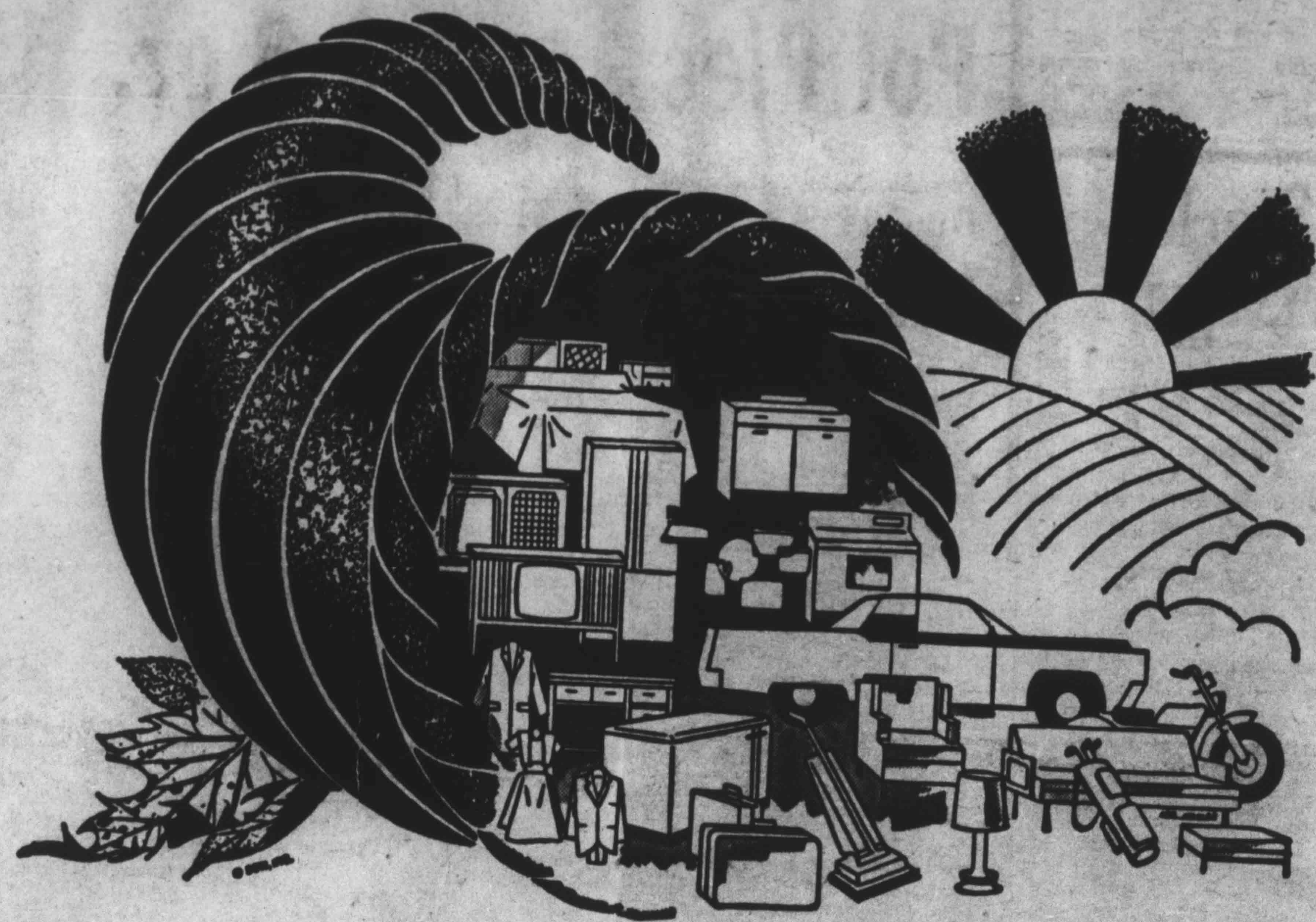

STATES ECONOMIC GAINS

Tennessee has experienced faster economic growth and a slower population growth than 49 other states of the nation, according to a report from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville.

"The rate of growth of Tennessee per capita income exceeded both regional and national rates in three of the last four years," the report says. "In 1970, the Tennessee 7% increase was slightly below the national rate of 8.5%."

The total employment level in Tennessee for early 1972 was 9% above the year-ago level, the report says. The national estimate was up 3.9%.

Employment in durable goods manufacturing in Tennessee was up 3.7% from a year ago, while the national level was up 1.1%.

Controlled construction employment in Tennessee was 2% above that of a year ago, while nationally, the estimate was 0.5% lower than a year ago.

**THE BIBLE AND THE THEORY OF EVOLUTION (No. 2)**

The word evolution means to unroll, unfold, unwind, to develop gradually. These definitions do not contradict the teachings of the Bible. For example, the works of creation (Gen. 1) did not come into existence in a moment, but over a period of six days. Jesus said that the kingdom of heaven was like a mustard seed, which was very small, but it grew into a tree. (Matt. 13:31, 32) Further, Jesus said, "For the earth bringeth forth fruit of herself; first the blade, then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear." (Mark 4:28) Life itself is a developing and an unfolding. The individual passes through the stages of infancy, childhood, youth, and manhood. But all of this does not mean that life evolved from non-living matter.

Dr. Julian Huxley, contemporary of Charles Darwin, has boldly affirmed that the earth and all animals and plants on the earth including humans, their minds, souls, brains and bodies have evolved and were not created by God in any sense. (1st Nature After Darwin, Vol. III, p. 246). Darwin wrote "that man is descended from some lower form, notwithstanding that connecting links have not hitherto been discovered." (Descent of Man, p. 321). Later he declared, "The early progenitors of man must have been once covered with hair, both sexes having beards; their ears were probably pointed, and capable of movement, and their bodies were provided with a tail, having the proper muscles." (Ibid., pp. 328-329).

The Bible reveals that "God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." (Gen. 1:26) David declared, "For I am fearfully and wonderfully made." (Psa. 139:14) Moses wrote, "Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God." (Psa. 90:2) The Hebrew writer declares, "For every house is builded by some man; but he that built all things is God." (Heb. 3:4).

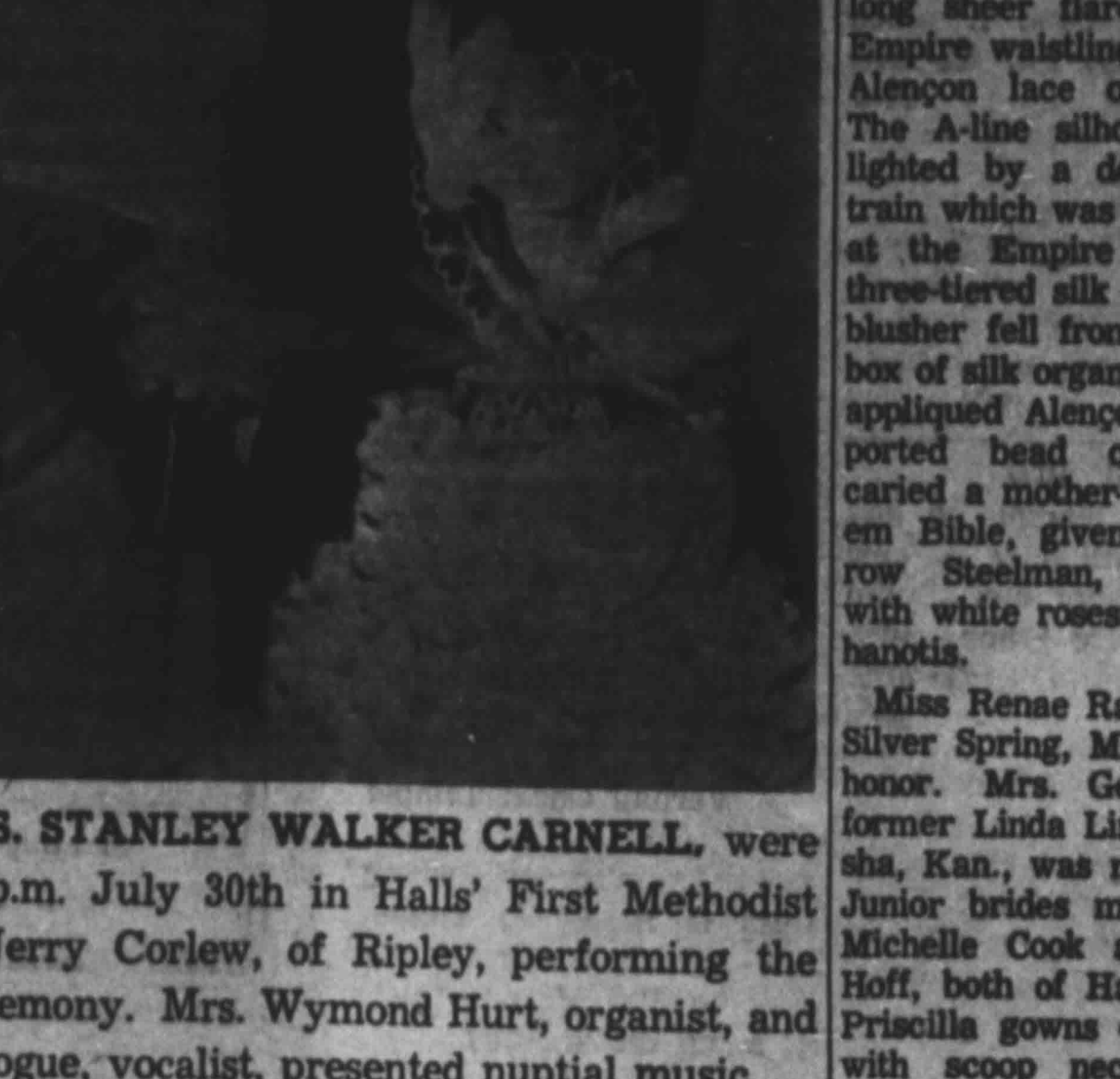

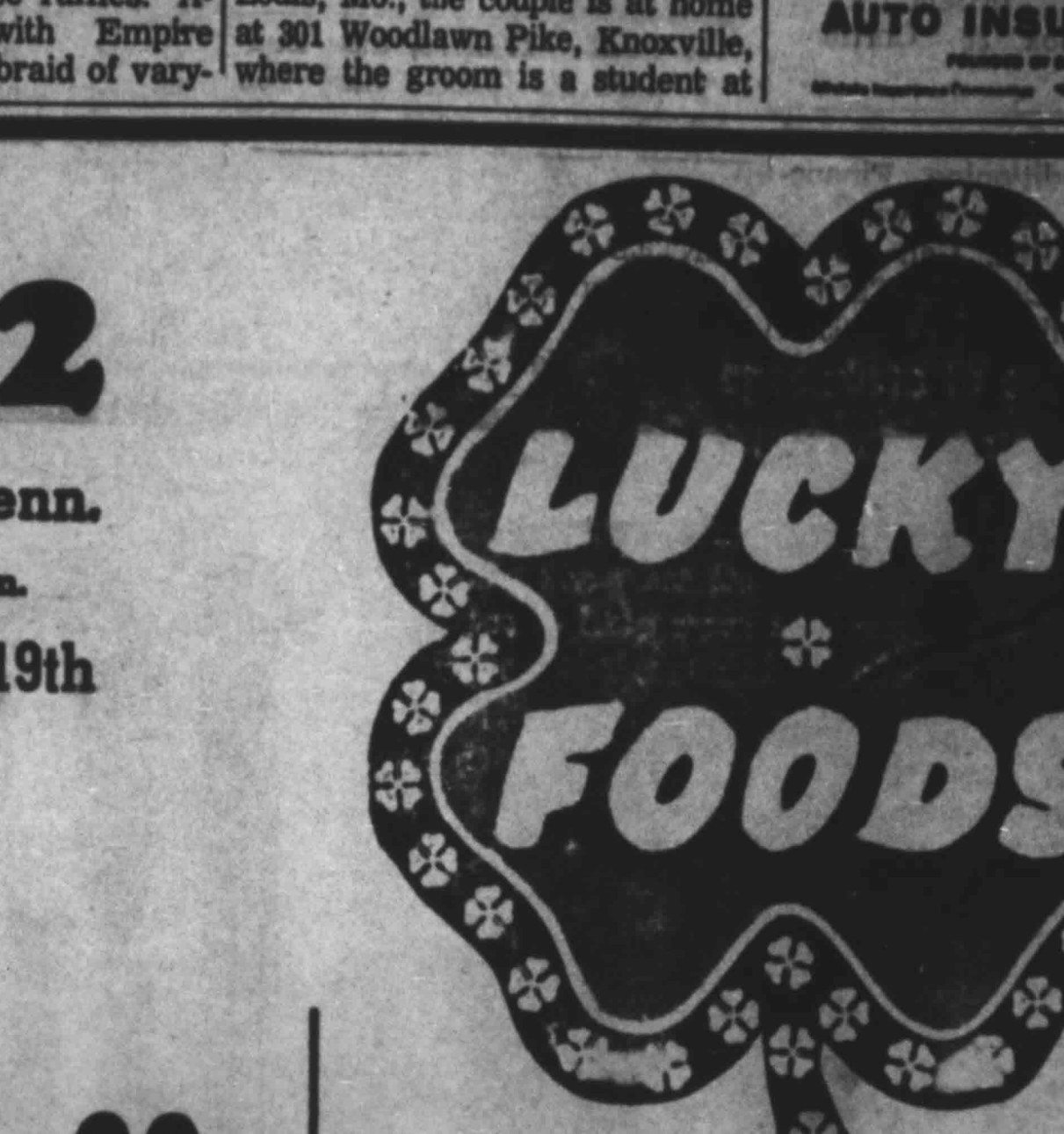

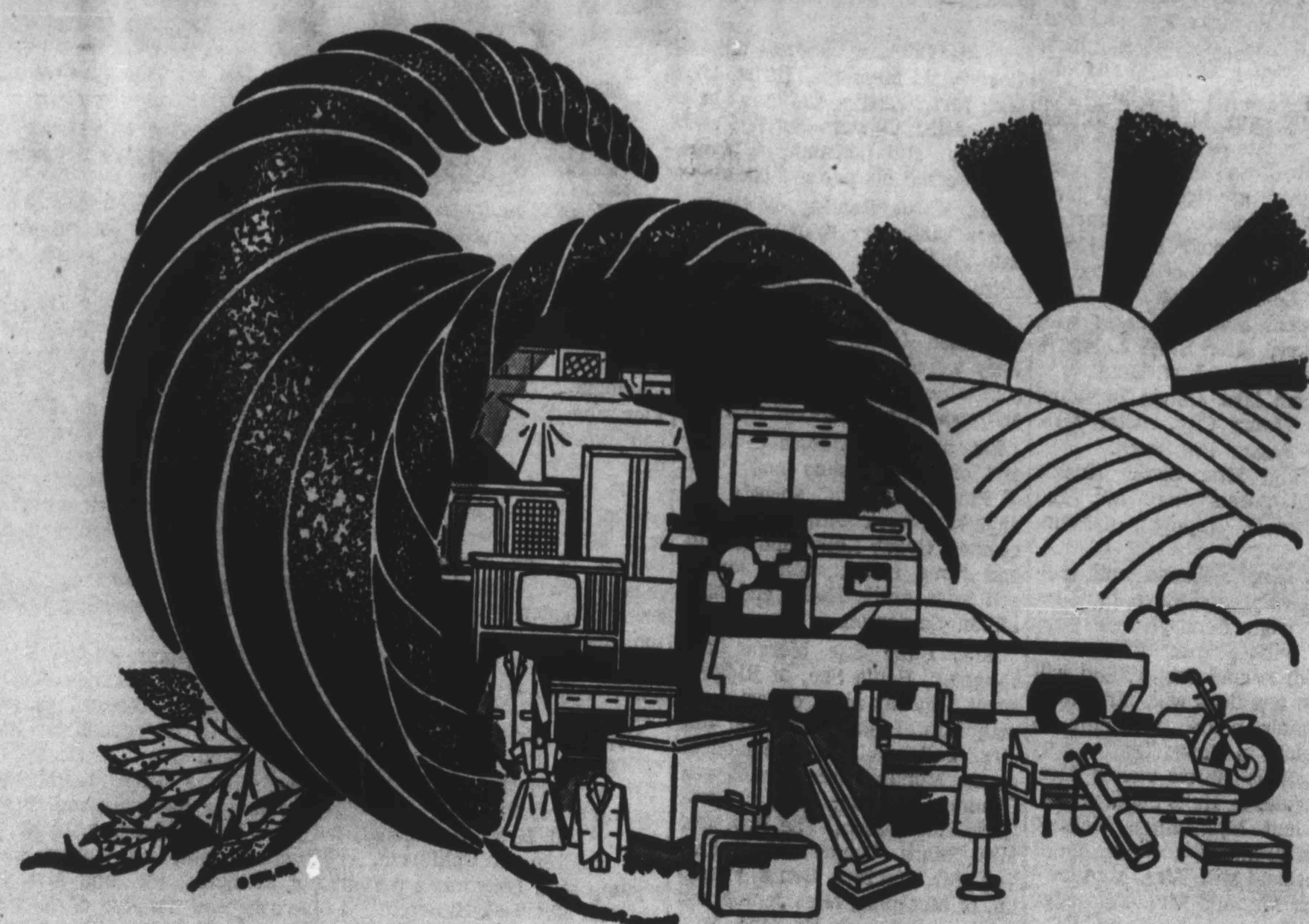
