


THE PROBLEM OF 'ONLY'

Lesson for December 3, 1972

chground Scripture: 2 Chronicles 36: Jeremiah 1:26. rvotional Reading: Jeremiah 4:14-22.

We sometimes forget that the reat men of the faith have often een reluctant heroes. Moses, called to lead the people of Israel as a speaker. Saul, elected by lots to be Israel's king, was found



"Only a youth" Rey, Althouse one of Israel's was no less hesitant than some of

his predecessors. Informed by God that he had been chosen to be his prophet, Jeremiah replies in fright: "Ah, Lord God! Behold, I do not know how to speak, for I am only a youth" (Jeremiah 1:6).

Most of us, when we are con-fronted by something that God wants us to do, also manage to be "only" something. We are "only" a layman," or "only a minister." We are "only a youth" or "only senior citizen." In short, we feel inadequate for the task.

Actually, we may be right! It may be that we are too young or too old, too lacking in skills and talents. Some of the tasks to which God calls us may well be too difficult for us. Perhaps Jeremiah was not being falsely modest when he said "I do not know how to speak."

A woman went to the psychia-trist complaining of an inferiority complex. After examining the woman, he said gravely: "Madam, you do not have an inferiority complex-you are inferior!" So it may be that we may not only feel inadequate for what God gives us, but that we are, in fact,

"... For I am with you ... The key to Jeremiah's call-as well as our own-was not in his personal adequacy, but in God's sufficiency. Even if Jeremiah was a poor speaker, God said:

"Do not say, 'I am only ; youth; for to all to whom I shall send you, you shall go, and whatever I command you you shall speak . . . Behold, I have put my words in your mouth" (1:6,9)

Even if we are not skilled enough or talented enough for a particular field of service. God provides whatever we need in order to do what he wants. One of the great miracles of the world is the great number of people who, with his help, have achieved great things for him. Yet, often, these people seemed quite inadequate for the tasks they were

Thus, the problem of being "only" something when God calls us cuse to a God who not only challenges us with a task, but also supplies and equips us with what-ever we need to perform it.

ARE WE AS WISE AS THEY? (NO. 2) (Matt. 2:1-12)

We trust that you will review last week's article on this topic. We have noticed that there are several marks of wisdom which are exemplified in the wise men. These men were (1) interested in Christ; (2) they were ready to search for the Lord; (3) they did not have to be begged to search for Christ; and (4) they didn't let someone else do their searching. It is our purpose in this article to notice other marks of wisdom in these men.

These men were not too proud to ask for guidance. When they came to Jerusalem, they asked, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews?" Should we need some help in studying the Bible, would we be wise enough to ask someone to help us? The man from Ethiopia asked Philip to help him in understanding the scriptures, and as a result, he was converted to Christ, and he became a New Testament Christian. (Acts 8:30-39).

The wise men were content with the light that God gave them. (vl10). The "light of the glorious gospel of Christ." (2 Cor. 4:4) becomes our star to guide us. (cf. Psa. 119:105). Are we as wise as they? Do we recognize God's revelation as being sufficient to meet all our needs today? (2 Tim 3:16-17; 2 Pet. 1:3).

They listened to the voice of God rather than men. Herod told these men to bring him word again. (v.8) They were warned of God in a dream that they should not return to Herod (v.12), and they obeyed God. Sometimes, as in this case, men require one thing, and God requires another. The principle that we must follow is stated by Peter, "We must obey God rather than men." (Acts

The wise men showed their devotion by worshipping the Lord and they proved their sincerity by giving to Christ. Whn one obeys the Lord's gospel today, he is to worship the Lord faithfully and regularly. Paul states that when we come forth from the burial of baptism, "we should walk in newness of life." (Rom. 6:4) This walk in the new life in Christ (2 Cor. 5:17) includes worship, and a part of our worship includes giving, which is a proof of our love and

sincerity. (2 Cr. 8:24; 8:8). We would plead with you to seek the Lord and obey him completely. (Heb. 5:8-9; Mk. 16:15-16; Jno. 3:5; Acts 2:38).
