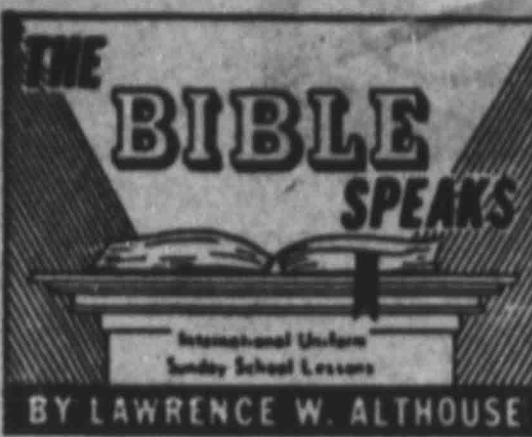

CHRIST AND THE CITY

Lesson for February 6, 1972

Readings: Luke 13:31-35, 19:28-48
Devotional Reading: Psalm 122

There is a painting by the French artist, Paul Hippolyte Flandrin, entitled "Christ Mourns over the City." It is, of course, an interpretation of Luke 13:31-35 and 19:28-48, two occasions when Christ expressed deep concern over the city of Jerusalem and its unacceptance of God's messengers. The figure of Jesus dominates the whole right side of the painting. He stands looking over the city and, although we cannot see his face clearly, it is obvious that his head is bowed in sadness.

Jesus weeps for the city

It is the left side of the painting that surprises, for we find that the sprawling expanse beneath Jesus is not Jerusalem, but one of our contemporary cities. It could be New York, Chicago, Atlanta, Los Angeles—it could be your town. There is, to be sure, a large cathedral or church in the center foreground, but it is dark; no light comes from it. The city itself is crowded, dingy, and wreathed in smoke. It is definitely a modern city.

The intent of the artist is plain. Christ still mourns over the city, he is saying, but not just Jerusalem. Christ mourns over all cities where ignorance, greed, and hatred have dimmed or extinguished the light of God. The two occasions in the gospel of Luke, then, are very relevant for today.

Today, as then, Jesus meets with the same response: "Teacher, rebuke your disciples!" (19:39). People in the cities are just as hostile and resistant to the claims of the Gospel today as they were when Jesus mourned over Jerusalem. They don't want to hear prophets; they don't want to hear God's voice; they don't want to know what he wants of them. They are still violent in their response to God's spokesmen.

Jesus acts for the city

Once again, Jesus says to the cities, open your eyes, and weep because there is so little response to his voice. The problem of the cities is the problem of man; his spiritual blindness. It is not that he cannot see, but that he will not.

Once again, the result is likely to be the same: if you will not wake up and see, you will be destroyed... "because you did not know the time of your visitation" (9:44). So Jesus was not content to weep for the city; to make the people wake up and see he did the most significant thing he could do: he gave his own life so that the city might know.

Once again this is what is required if our own cities are to escape their destruction. It will not be enough for us to weep and wring our hands over them. We must be willing, like him, to offer nothing less than ourselves.

Halls Given State Aid For Sewage

The Tennessee Division of Water Quality Control has presented a \$4,177 grant to the City of Halls for local sewage treatment facilities.

S. Leary Jones, state water quality director, said the funds are partial repayment of money spent by Halls on sewage treatment improvements consisting of pumping facilities, a force main, outfall sewers, and lagoon sewage treatment.

Halls has received \$42,082 in federal grant offers for the project and \$4,177 from the state. Total cost of the project is more than \$106,000.

County's Scouting Of Cotton Granted Coverage On TV

Service Started Last June Discussed On Television By Johnson And Paschal

W. C. Johnson, Extension entomologist, and F. H. Paschal reported this week over WBBJ-TV, Jackson, on the cotton scouting service started in the county last June.

Cotton producers in Mississippi, Arkansas, and other southern states have been using this service for several years and found it effective toward getting cotton insects controlled at least possible expense.

Arkansas tests have shown that if the infestation for boll weevils in cotton never gets above 40%, a normal yield of cotton will be made on good cotton land. Louisiana tests have emphasized the need to spray cotton just as little as necessary in June and July in order that friendly insects can be of most help in controlling bollworms.

More than 600 varieties of beneficial insects work in cotton fields.

Jack Crutcher, Jim Fullen and sons, Clifford Sweet, Bob Revere, Alfred Kidd, Joe A. Johnson, Roland and Sam Henderson, Odell Williams, and Clyde Younger last April signed up 1,550 acres of cotton for this service and agreed to pay \$1.50 per acre to a trained man to scout every field of cotton every week and give them a full report on the situation.

Steve Waynick, of Route 4, Jackson, was hired. Most of the men felt at the end of the year that the cost of the service was less than the savings on spray materials. They thought the sprays applied were more effective because of the timing and that they made higher yields than they would have otherwise.

Choice Cotton Varieties
Talmage Critchfield, Jr., was this week deciding on cottonseed to buy for April planting. He reviewed information from variety tests carried out by the University of Tennessee Experiment Stations.

Early varieties recommended included Auburn M, with an average yield of lint of 538 pounds per acre; Dixie King II, with 783; Hancock, with 846; and HY-Bee 300A, with 876.

Later varieties included Deltapine 15, 868 pounds; Deltapine 45A, 810 pounds; and Stoneville 213, 917 pounds.

Beef Performance Testing
Vernon McBride, Jr., and C. S. Carney have had their beef cattle herds under performance testing for several years. The objective is to find the breeding animals, male and female, which produce calves weighing the most at birth, making most rapid gains at least cost, and returning the most profits at the end of the year.

Identification of the breeding animals and the weighing of calves at certain intervals represent all the extra labor involved.

A meeting of cattle producers in this area interested in performance testing will be held at Dyersburg at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the County Extension office, just off Highway 104.

Fertilizing Pecans

Noah Ray, of Hales Point, Clay Lee, of Goldust, and Mrs. Minna Crutcher, of Henning, are planning to take advantage of soft, wet soil to make holes twelve inches deep in a circular pattern under pecan trees, out about as far from the trunks as the limbs extend, and then put fertilizer in these holes in amounts so that each tree will get about two pounds of 15-15-15 fertilizer for each inch in the diameter of the tree.

Pecans are deep rooted plants; the fertilizer moves downward very slowly, and roots have to hit it accidentally. For these reasons, fertilizing can be done any time; but this mixed fertilizer should be applied every other year, with ammonium nitrate applied in the alternate years on top of the ground or barely covered, using about half as much.

Stump Treatment Used

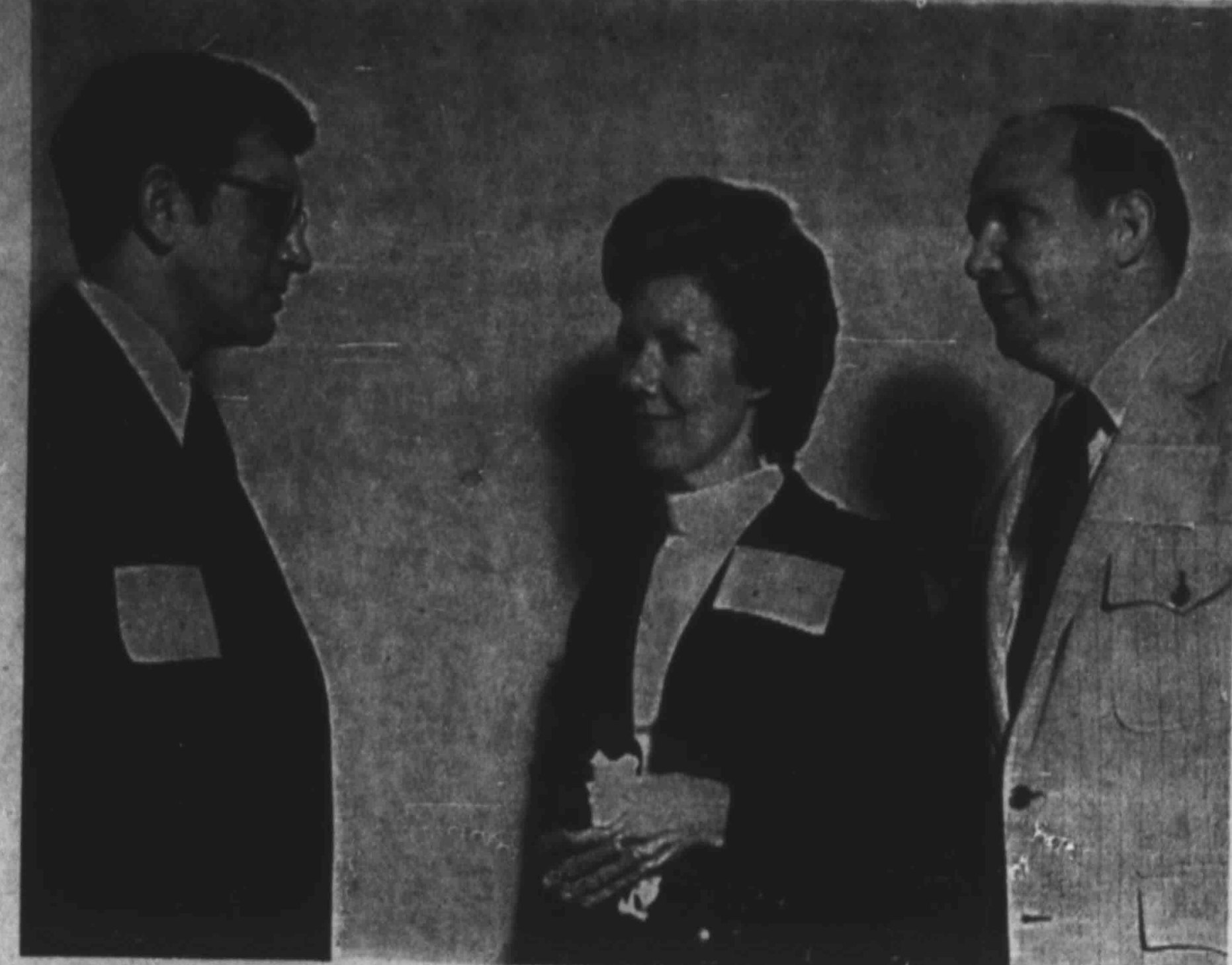
Harry Wright, Sr., of Poplar Grove, is clearing some thickets of Locust and other tree varieties while the trees are still small in size.

He is cutting the stumps off above the ground and then applying an oil solution made by mixing one pint of 2,4,5-T in three gallons of diesel fuel. This application can prevent re-growth from stumps and from roots.

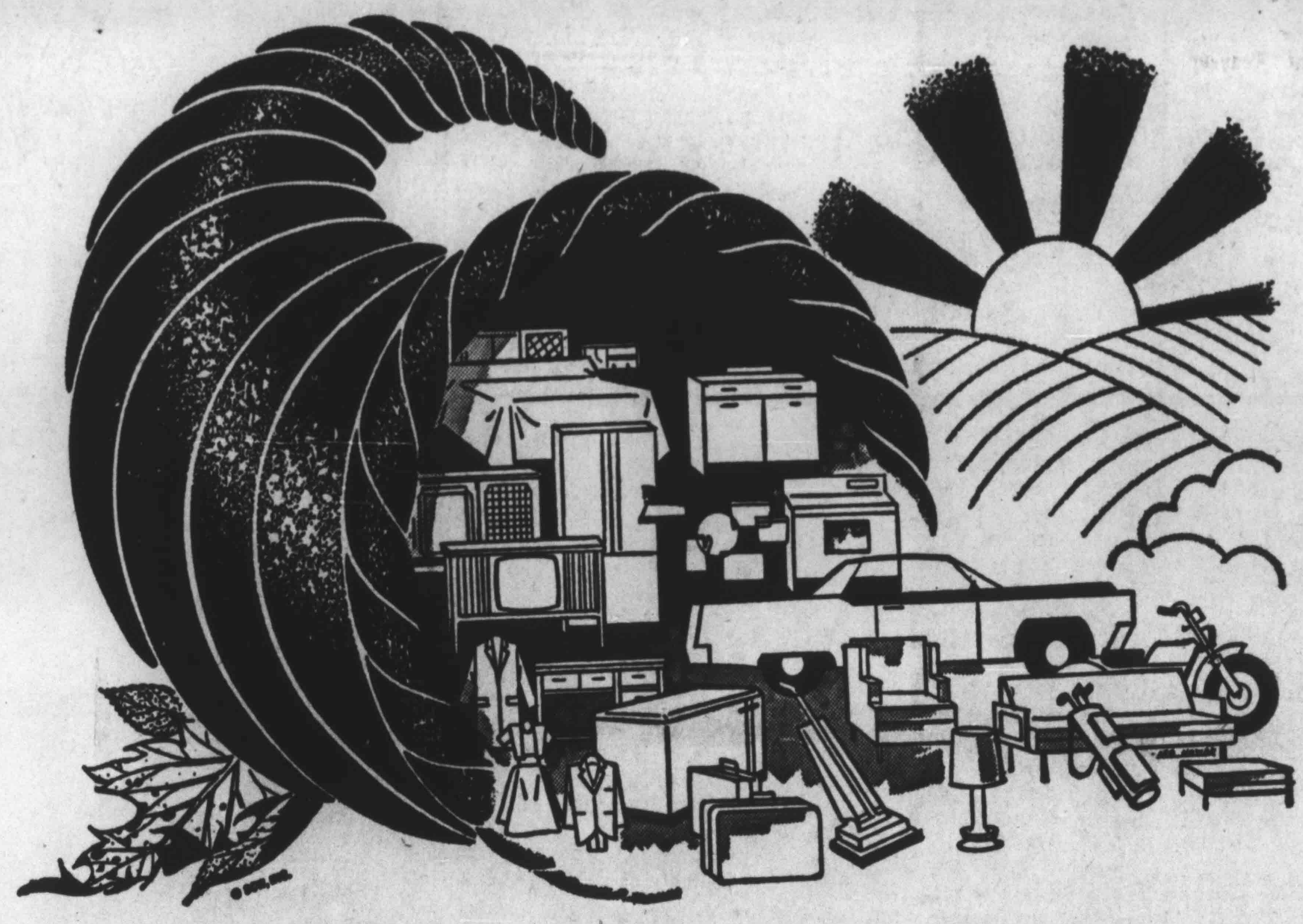
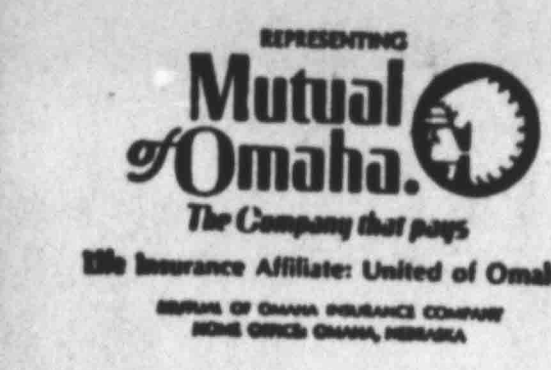

Half To Dyer, Half To Tipton District. Partition Plan Would Make Election From Lauderdale Most Unlikely. West Tennessee state representatives have agreed upon two tentative reapportionment plans, Rep. James O. Lanier, of Dyersburg, said this week.

The other plan, which Lanier says may be necessary because of federal court decisions, would divide Lauderdale between Dyer and Tipton at an east-west line about midway between Halls and Ripley, with each of the two resulting districts electing one representative.

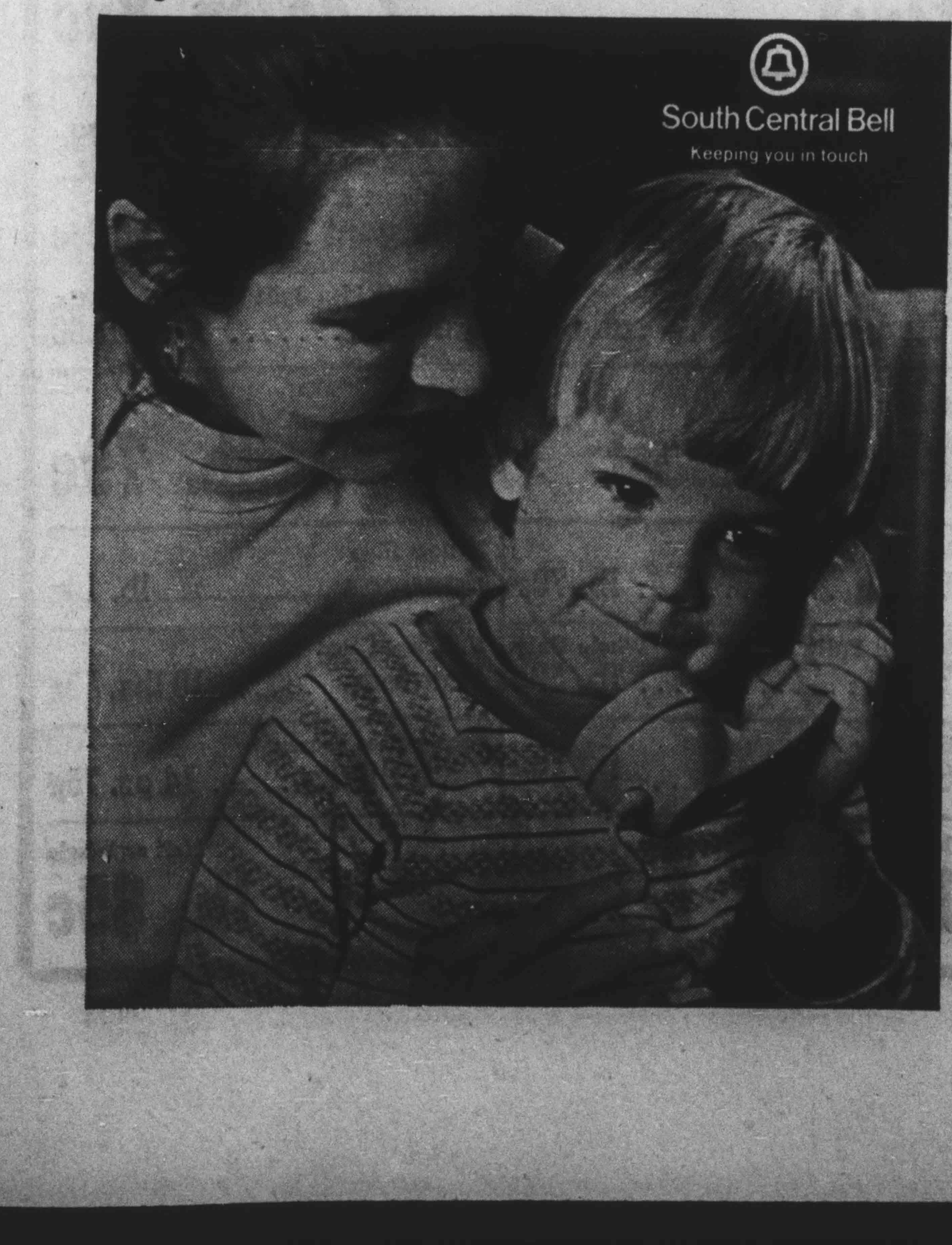

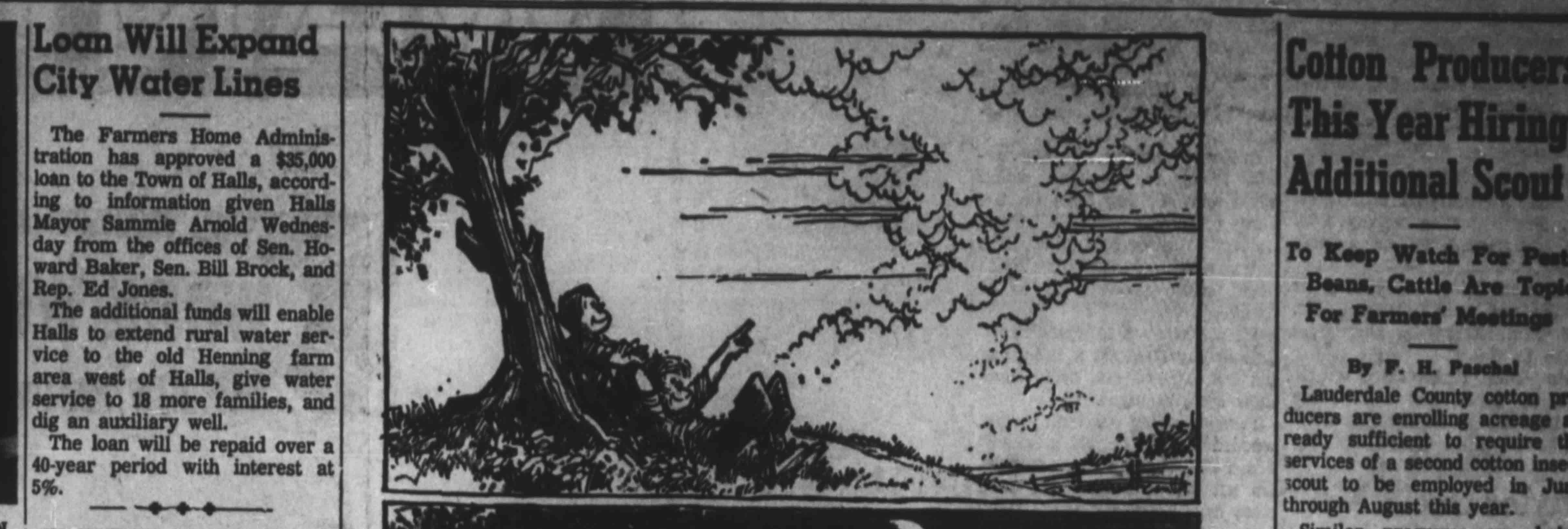

In November, my wife and myself found 17 openings which could only be fox dens in ten acres of ground near the Illinois Central Railroad tracks five miles north of Ripley.

We are allowed to hunt the red and gray fox, though it is against the law to headlight, or to shine their eyes, at night.

Persons going in high grass, wooded fields, or thick underbrush should carry a gun or pole. Do not attack a sick fox or a stray dog. Be on the alert. Have your pets vaccinated for rabies.

Just one fox with rabies, just one person bitten, just one case of hydrophobia, is something to think about.

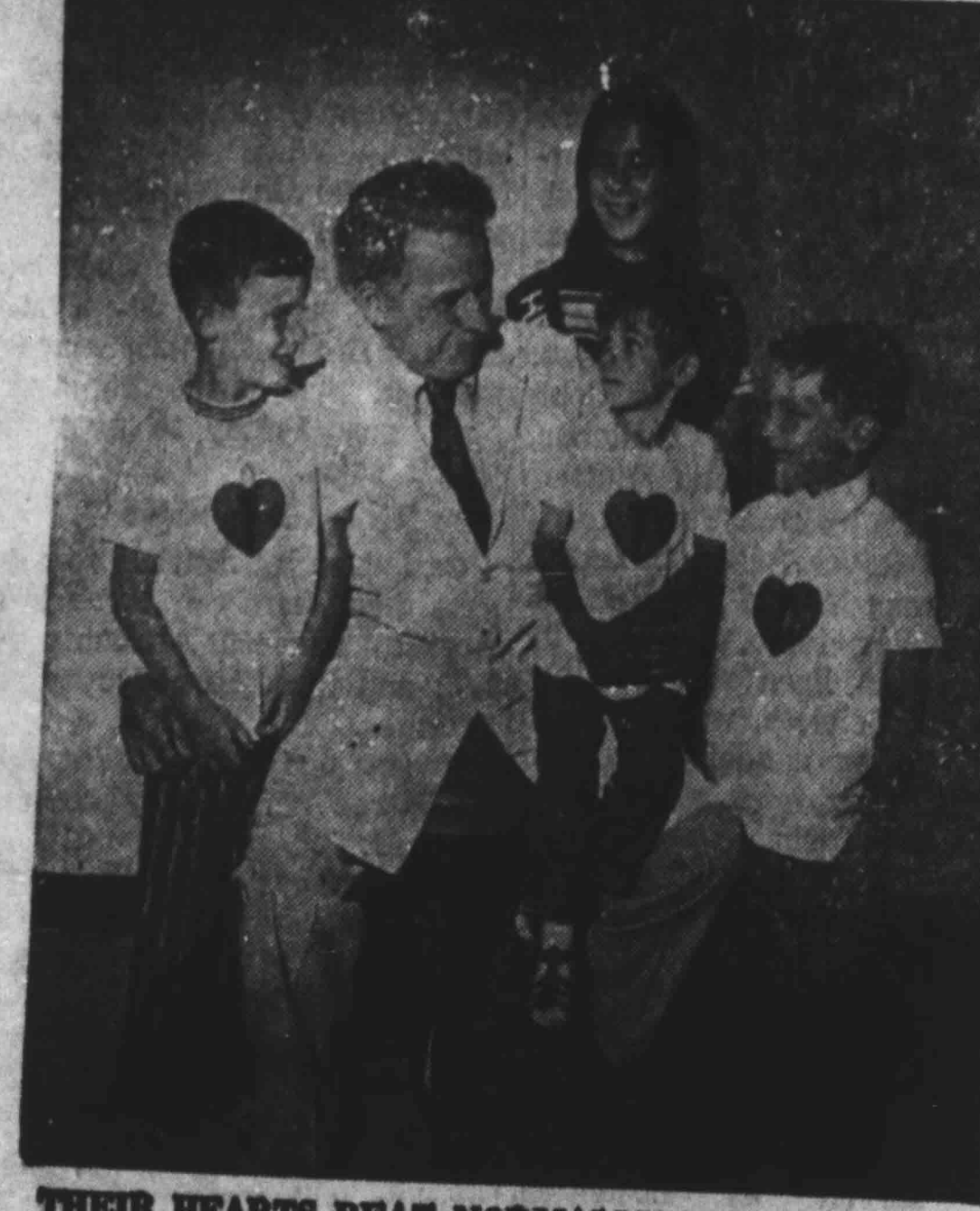
