

quickly showed up in other cations in the lower Rio Grande Valley. State and federal veterinarians

have traced the infection to several markets near the Mexican border.

They have now quarantined 55 counties and are frantically working to destroy all infected hogs.

Veterinarians say strain of cholera is capable of killing hogs over-night, and they warn hog producers to "suspect hog cholera first" and report sickness to their veterinarians.

Christ the Cornerstone

For example, many of the decisions which we make concerning the church will reflect our interests, not those of Christ. When we have to make important decisions for the church we are often likely to speak of what we "will accept" or what we "won't stand for." The question of what Christ might desire, if it is considered at all, is often dismissed as impractical, "pie-in-the-sky" idealism.

Then there's the whole question of the church's financial resources. "You're not going to spend my money like that!" we may protest when we see the church doing something to which we object. What we seem to forget is that it cannot be "my money." If the church belongs to Christ then the money we have given is his. To continue to speak of it as "my money" or "our money" is little short of blasphemy. The writer of the Epistle to the Ephesians wanted there to be no doubt as to whom the Church belonged. To be sure, the Church is like a household, but we are not the owners of the household. We are there by the grace of God. It does not belong to us, but we belong to it. Only in that sense can we call it "my church" or "our church." The foundation of that household consists of the apostles and prophets, "Christ Jesus himself being the chief cornerstone, in whom the whole structure is joined together . . ." (Ephesians 2:20, 21).

Towns Gain Population

Only 19 other towns in Tennessee have gained in population as much as Gates, which now has 523, up from 291 in 1960, a gain of 79.7%.

Henning has 605, up from 466 in 1960, a gain of 29.8%. Ripley has 4,794, up from 3,782, to gain 26.8% since 1960. Halls has 2,323, up from 1,890, to gain 22.9% between 1960 and 1970.

The four towns in the county now contain 8,245 people of the 20,271 in the county, or 40.67%. The county population has gone down from 21,844 in 1960, which is 7.2%.

Families have moved from farm areas to cities in search of better housing and more comfortable living, but better housing is rapidly being created in the whole county. This is bein helped by many jobs being mad available through industry in the county and by lending agenci which can help build houses anywhere in the county.
