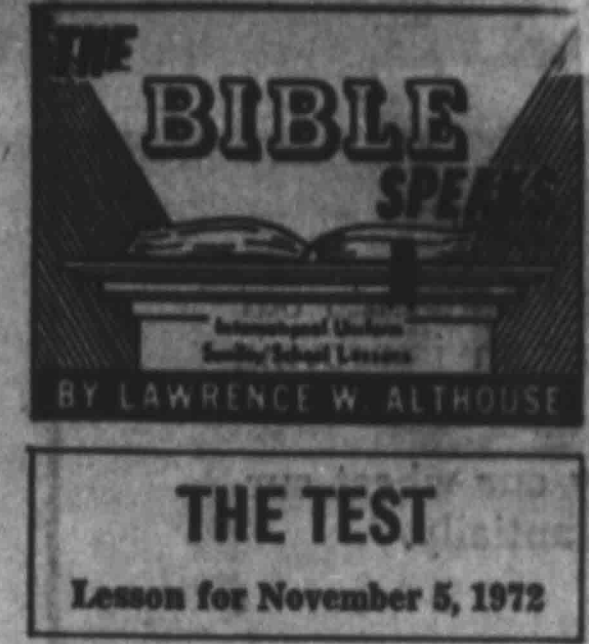

Background Scripture: Daniel 4: 1-18
Psalm 137: 1-6
Matthew 23: 1-12

Let's suppose you are a soldier in Viet Nam. Your company has been sent to clear a small village of suspected Viet Cong mortars. When you reach the village, however, there are no Viet Cong, only a few women, some old men, and children.

The handful of villagers stand in a state of shock, as if not knowing what is going on. The order is given for them to vacate their huts, but they do not move. Instead they stare blankly.

Then comes the fateful order: "Burn them out!" It is apparent that the huts are to be burned out either with or without their human occupants. Deep inside you know you ought not to kill these apparently innocent people. But you have been ordered to do so. What do you do?

Reader to Caesar

It is not an easy situation when faith and citizenship are so obviously in conflict. Does the Christian owe unquestioning obedience to the state? Must he do whatever his government tells him to do? Is this what Jesus meant when he said: "Render . . . to Caesar the things that are Caesar's . . ." (Matt. 22:21)?

What do we owe to Caesar? This is a controversial question today. It was also a controversial question in Jesus' own day. That's why the Pharisees used it in an attempt to trap him. If he favored paying the tax, he would be despised as a traitor by some. If he favored not paying the tax, he would be branded a subversive by others. No matter how he answered, he would find himself in trouble.

The things that are God's

It is sometimes said that Jesus looked on this question. But if we look closely we find that he has, in fact, given a very definite answer. The answer is not "government or God," but "government and God." We owe some things to Caesar. The government has a right to demand certain things of us. As Jesus paid the hated tax, so as Christian we have citizenship obligations.

There are, however, some things we owe to God and when these are in conflict with our obligations to the state, there is no doubt as to which must prevail. Jesus paid the tax and obeyed other laws of various kinds, but he would not give in to the government and renounce his mission for God. The state owned his taxes, but it did not own his soul.

Put to the test between conscience under God and obligation to the state, Jesus demonstrated once and for all which has the highest claim.

Politicos Expect Westate's Voters To Split Tickets

Nixon, Baker Seen Favored In State, But Democrats Strong On Lower Levels

Most observers expect a record number of West Tennesseans to split their votes between parties Tuesday, favoring a Republican candidate for president but supporting Democrats for most other offices.

John Parish, Jackson Sun political editor, expects Nixon to get 65% of the vote in Tennessee and predicts Howard Baker will be the first Republican the state has elected to the U. S. Senate, but by a much slimmer margin over U. S. Rep. Ray Blanton, who expects much of his support from West Tennessee.

But like virtually all seasoned observers, he regards Bob Clement as a Democratic shoo-in for the Public Service Commission and among U. S. House incumbents sees only Democrat William Anderson in the Sixth Congressional District in any trouble, if his vigorous opponent, Robin Beard, can get enough votes east of the Tennessee River, especially in Shelby County.

Republican national headquarters believes Beard is one of the five best prospects in the nation to pick up a Democratic House seat.

Parish feels Seventh District Rep. Ed Jones "is in no trouble. His conservative brand of Democratic politics suits the voters in this area, and his Republican opponent's campaign has been marked by mistakes and a lack of support from the party leadership. About the only county Stockton Adkins can expect to win is his home county of Obion."

The other Democratic-Republican contest for Lauderdale County is that of Frank Garner, of Ripley, incumbent state legislator, against Republican challenger M. C. Bevis, of Durhamville, Oryssa.

As in the Jones-Adkins contest, Garner has seniority, with an influential committee assignment, in a body controlled by his party, while Bevis is a political newcomer of the party which controls the executive branch rather than the one in which he seeks to serve.

Garner got almost exactly half of the Democratic primary vote against two opponents in this county but trailed in parts of Haywood and Crockett Counties recently added to his district.

Unless he can sharply improve his percentage in his home county, his race will be decided by Haywood County voters, who cast 2,719 votes in the primary—2,001 of them for a Haywood Countyman, Jimmy Bishop; 245 each for Garner and Jerry Burke, of Ripley; and 228 for Sam Johnston, of Henning. Crockett County cast 5,905.

The Coming Election

Tuesday the voters of the nation will go to the polls to elect a president for the next four years every member of the House of Representatives and about one-third of the Senate.

Never within the memory of your editor has there been an election with so many of the electorate disenchanted with the candidates of the two major parties. Many who plan to vote for President Nixon are not actually doing so to support him but because they are distrustful of the Democratic nominee, Sen. George McGovern, and the goals of the candidate and the Democratic party.

It is our belief that every voter should go to the polls and cast his or her vote for the candidate who in his judgment will do the best job, but we have heard large numbers of persons say they are going to skip voting in the presidential race because they don't want to vote for either candidate.

This is wrong, but we can muster very little argument to overcome their distaste for the two candidates although we believe very few of the accusations made against President Nixon are actually true. It seems to us that both parties have been guilty of dirt slinging, loose handling of facts, etc. The result has been that there is a complete lack of confidence in the candidates and in their parties.

The national polls continue to show President Nixon far ahead of Sen. McGovern and while there seems to be little doubt that Mr. Nixon will win in the electoral college by a huge majority, we believe that many in for a shock when the popular vote is much closer than some have predicted. It is our feeling that Sen. McGovern has made distinct gains although not nearly enough to win.

In Tennessee we find the senatorial race and the races in the 6th and 8th congressional districts very interesting. Rep. Ray Blanton, a conservative Democrat, is making a strong effort to unseat Sen. Howard Baker but we would guess that he can't quite pull it off although he is certain to regain some of the Democratic support lost by Albert Gore two years ago. In the sixth district Robin Beard, the Republican, is an attractive candidate but he is trying to win in a predominantly Democratic district although many Republicans were added when the new districts were formed. Rep. William Anderson would seem to be the likely winner. In our own seventh district, Rep. Ed Jones would not seem to be in any trouble, and in the eighth district Rep. Dan Kuykendahl would seem to have a slight edge over his black opponent, State Sen. J. O. Patterson. In the race for public service commissioner the magic of the Clement name should carry young Bob Clement into office without too great struggle.

Incidentally, these guesses are nothing to bet on but merely our observations in the past few weeks.

THE WORK AND DUTY OF DEACONS
In last week's article, the office of bishops, elders, and pastors was discussed. At this time, it shall be our purpose to study the office of deacons.

The duties of deacons are not as clear-cut as the duties of the elders, but they were undoubtedly that of helpers and servants (Acts 6:1-6). The word deacon means servant. The bishops or elders (not deacons) are the overseers of a congregation (Acts 20:28). But under them, each deacon is an honored servant who has the confidence of the membership. The deacon should regard himself and his work as being under the bishops, just as the preacher, song leader, and Bible teachers are under the bishops.

God did not intend for the office of a deacon to be merely a position of honor, but requires certain qualifications be possessed by those selected. (1 Tim. 3:8-13). This indicates that deacons have responsibilities not assigned to just any other member in the congregation. A deacon is expected to serve in ways for which the average member may not be qualified.

It has been said that the work of elders was spiritual and the work of deacons was physical, but their works cannot be limited to these spheres. We cannot say that the elders as rulers in the congregation should have nothing to do with finances, for we read in Acts 11:29, 30 of a contribution being sent to the elders in Jerusalem by the hand of Barnabas and Saul. Neither can we say that the deacons' work is limited to physical matters, for we find that Stephen and Philip, two of the seven selected at Jerusalem, later preached the gospel, with much force and persuasion.

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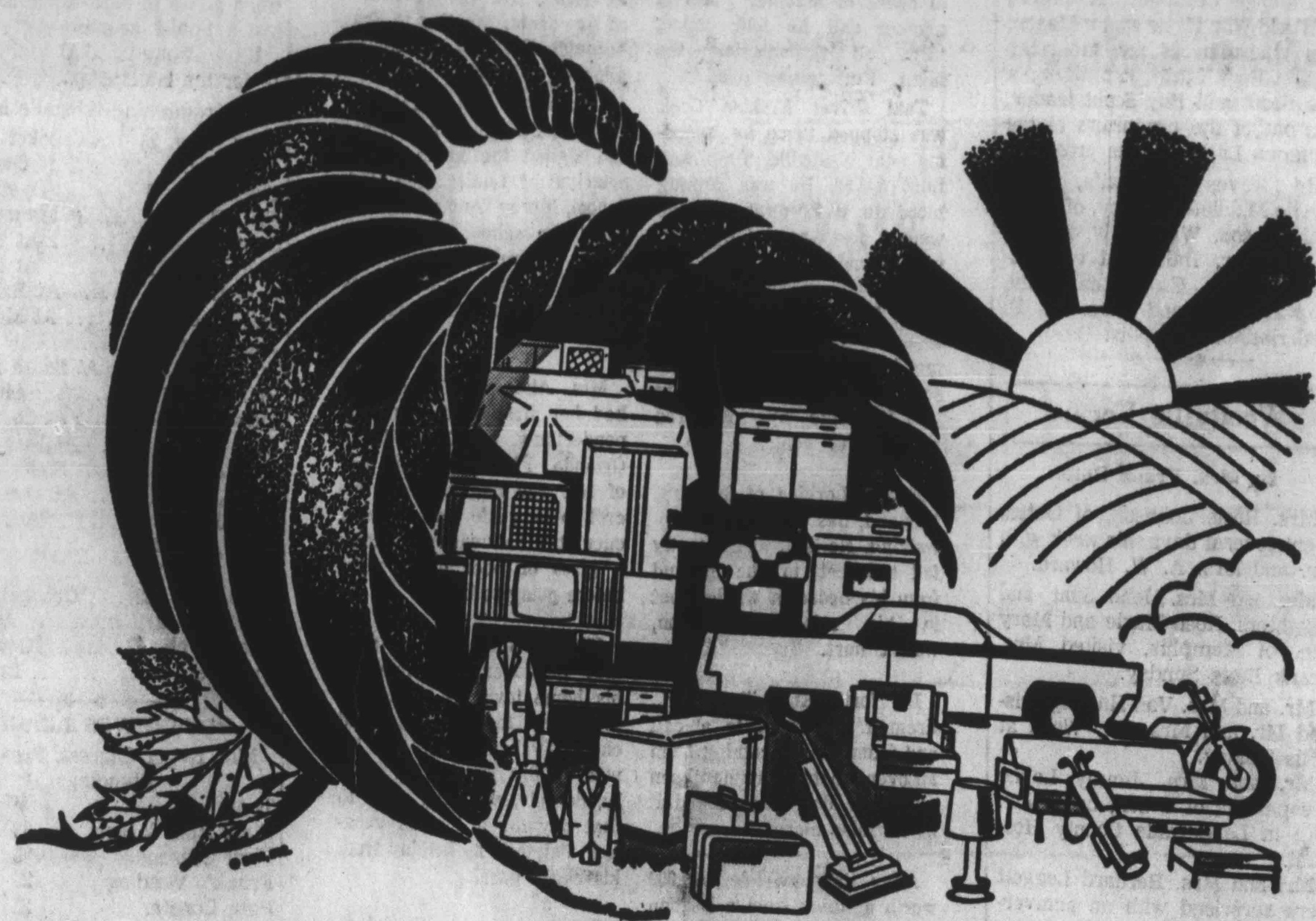
