Obion Central scored again with 33 seconds left on the clock and on the kickoff recovered the ball on the four and made the final TD on the next play.

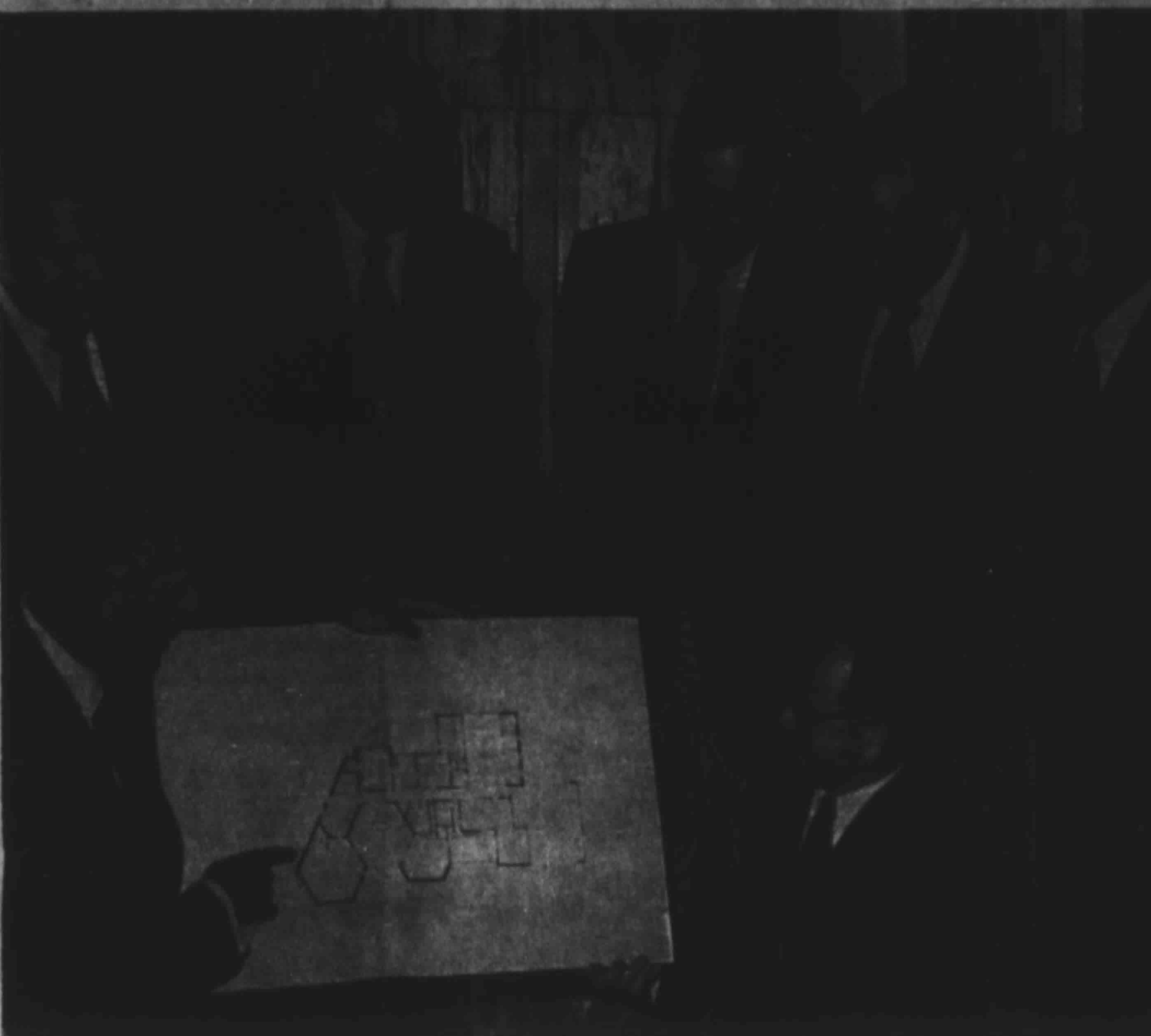
Showing up well for the Tigers were sophomore end Leo Arnold, Willie McCadney, John Noblin, Tim Brown, and Tyrus Brown.

Census Says New 7th District Drops Least Income Tag

With Only 12% Farm Folks, It's No Longer On Bottom Of Family Revenue List

The Census Bureau tells U. S. Rep. Ed Jones that the new Seventh Congressional District of Tennessee, which includes Lauderdale County, is younger, better educated, more prosperous, and predominantly urban.

The census says 48% of district residents are urban, 40% rural and 12% non-farm residents, and 12% farm people.

"I must admit that the percentage of urbanites is a little higher than I had thought," Jones says.

The district no longer has the lowest average family income of all Congressional districts, the census says, since median family income in the district rose to \$7,030 in 1969.

"There is still room for improvement in this area, but we are no longer at the bottom of the totem pole," says Jones.

The census says 38% of district residents 25 or older are high school graduates and less than 6% college graduates—"considerably higher than a few years ago, and we are continuing to improve," Jones says.

Almost 41% of residents are reported 20 or younger, with 11% 65 or older. Median age is put at 28, compared to 28.4 for Tennessee as a whole.

More than half of district residents moved between 1965 and 1970, but more than half of those who moved remained in the same county, the census says.

Propose Adding 6,500 Acres For Wild Life Along Middle Fork

Funds to purchase 6,500 acres on the Middle Fork of the Forked Deer River in Lauderdale and Dyer Counties for preservation as wetlands for wild life have been approved by the U.S. House Public Works Committee.

This acreage adjoins the present Tigrett Wildlife Management Area.

Also slated for purchase are 3,000 acres adjoining the South Fork, in Haywood County; 2,700 acres adjoining the Gooch Wildlife Management Area on the Obion River in Obion County; and 2,200 acres on the Middle Fork of the Obion River in Obion and Weakley Counties.

Funds for buying the 14,400 acres are included in a \$6,600,000 appropriation which the committee has sent to the full House. Senate passage will also be required.

The land purchases would about double the acreage set aside for wild life in the drainage projects, underway since 1954 but blocked during recent months by a suit filed in federal court in Memphis by four Nashville duck hunters, claiming the project would irreparably damage the area's game, and fish resources.

A meeting of 30 state and federal agency representatives in Nashville Monday was told that annual flood damage in the 14-county watershed is estimated at \$31,000,000 and rises yearly.

Damage from sedimentation caused by erosion from upstream land is estimated at \$4,700,000 annually, and of 27,000 acres cleared for farming since the drainage project got underway, 1,900 have already reverted to swampland, the meeting was told.

The regulations are: (1) No feeder nor breeder swine shall move into or within the state for any purpose. (2) No slaughter swine shall be sold at public auction in Tennessee markets. (3) Finished slaughter weights or top hogs may move directly to state or federally approved slaughter houses through one assembly point such as a stockyard which has a packing house nearby, provided all swine which enter this assembly point are moved to the slaughter house within 48 hours of arrival.

The restriction on top hogs should in no way affect Lauderdale producers, as there are three slaughter houses with markets within short distance.

After two weeks, the restrictions may be amended or lifted according to the situation.

Control Grubs In Cattle
Pat Parker, Jr., will "put on" Rufilex to control cattle grub larvae inside his beef cattle.

This new systemic insecticide provides nearly 100% control of this pest before it emerges from its host in January. The chemical is absorbed through the skin of the animal and circulated in its blood to all parts of the body.

Cost of treatment is based on weight. For a 400-pound calf it is about 20¢; for a mature cow, 40¢.

Co-Ral is another systemic insecticide which will not only control grubs but will give excellent control of lice.

Preventing Insect Damage
Before putting corn into the bin, clean it thoroughly. Spray all inside surfaces with Malathion two weeks before storing grain. Mix one-third pint 57% premium grade Malathion concentrate per gallon of water.

Dry, insect-free corn can be protected from most insect damage by using Malathion as a grain protectant. Use only premium grade Malathion, brand name Cythion. Apply the insecticide to the grain before or as it goes into the bin. Mix one pint of 57% premium grade Malathion with 2 to 5 gallons of water and apply this mixture to each 1,000 bushels of grain.

After binning is completed, level off the grain and "cap out" by treating all the grain surface with the protectant. This acts as a barrier preventing insects from entering the grain mass.

Plan Handling Equipment
Anthony Fisher and Jimmy Fullen came to the Agricultural Extension Office last week to get plans on beef cattle corrals, head gates, and other handling equipment which will enable them to do a much better job with beef cattle herds.

Chutes and other devices allow the producer to spray and care for individual animals as well as load in a safe manner.

Roland Henderson requested record cards on beef cattle and hogs which will enable him to keep a lifetime sow and cow record on his animals.

This is an excellent management tool, and these forms are available free on request to the County Extension Office.

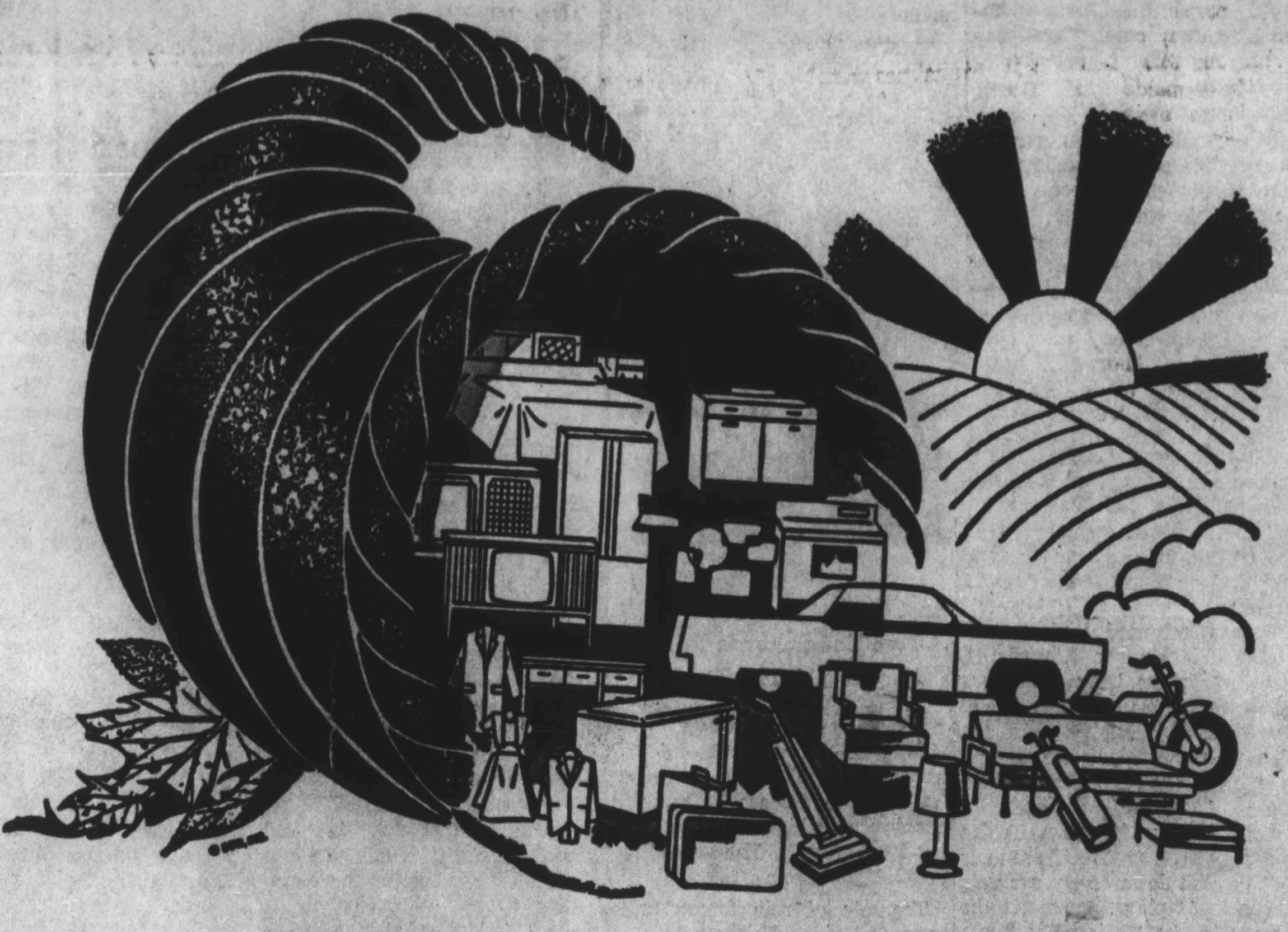

WHOSE CITIES?
Lesson for October 8, 1972

Background Information: 11th C. A.D. The Crusades. The Muslims had taken Jerusalem in 1070. The Christians were trying to retake it. The Crusades were a series of wars between Christians and Muslims for control of the Holy Land.

Judging by history the ultimate fruits of most man's civilizational efforts to be a legacy of romantic ruins. In Rome, Athens, Yunnan, Persia, we see all that remains of once-great empires. We see the pyramids of Egypt, the walls of China, and the towers of Babel seem to indicate that man is wrong in his ambition to build his cities, that his ambition is an affront to God. Yet, it is not man the builder that disturbs God, but man the egotist. The problem is not with his building of cities and monuments, but with the vain motivation behind all of this.

In the story, God does not seem disturbed when the people say: "Come, let us make bricks, and burn them thoroughly." What did disturb the Lord, however, was when they said: "Come, let us build ourselves a city, and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves..." (Genesis 11:4).

"Come, let us build..."

Whoever man try to build all by themselves and for the purpose of making a name for themselves, they are the wrong track with God. God wants us to build our cities but he also wants us to acknowledge that we cannot build enduringly without him. He wants us even to build our monuments, but not to ourselves or our own glory.

This is still a concern in today's world. We get carried away with our own grandiose schemes and forget to whom the cities belong. I don't know any of that in my town," said a certain mayor some time ago. Someone quickly reminded him that it wasn't his town, that it belonged to all the citizens.

"Who's faithful City?"

When men forget whose city it is and build to "make a name" for themselves, the seeds of disunity and confusion are sown. It is our vain ambition, our selfishness and pride that build the walls between us and lead us apart. When we usurp God's own place, we call down destruction and tragedy upon ourselves. It is then that our city, our nation, our world, instead of Babylon the golden become Babel the confused, the divided.

When our pride gets in the way we neither understand each other or hear the voice of God. Our building becomes a curse instead of a blessing. As the Psalmist put it: "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain" (127:1). So it is with the cities.

The prophet Ezekiel saw a vision of a rebuilt Jerusalem: "Old men and old women shall sit in the streets... And the streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls..." (Ezek. 48, 49). We can still have cities like that if we remember whose they are.

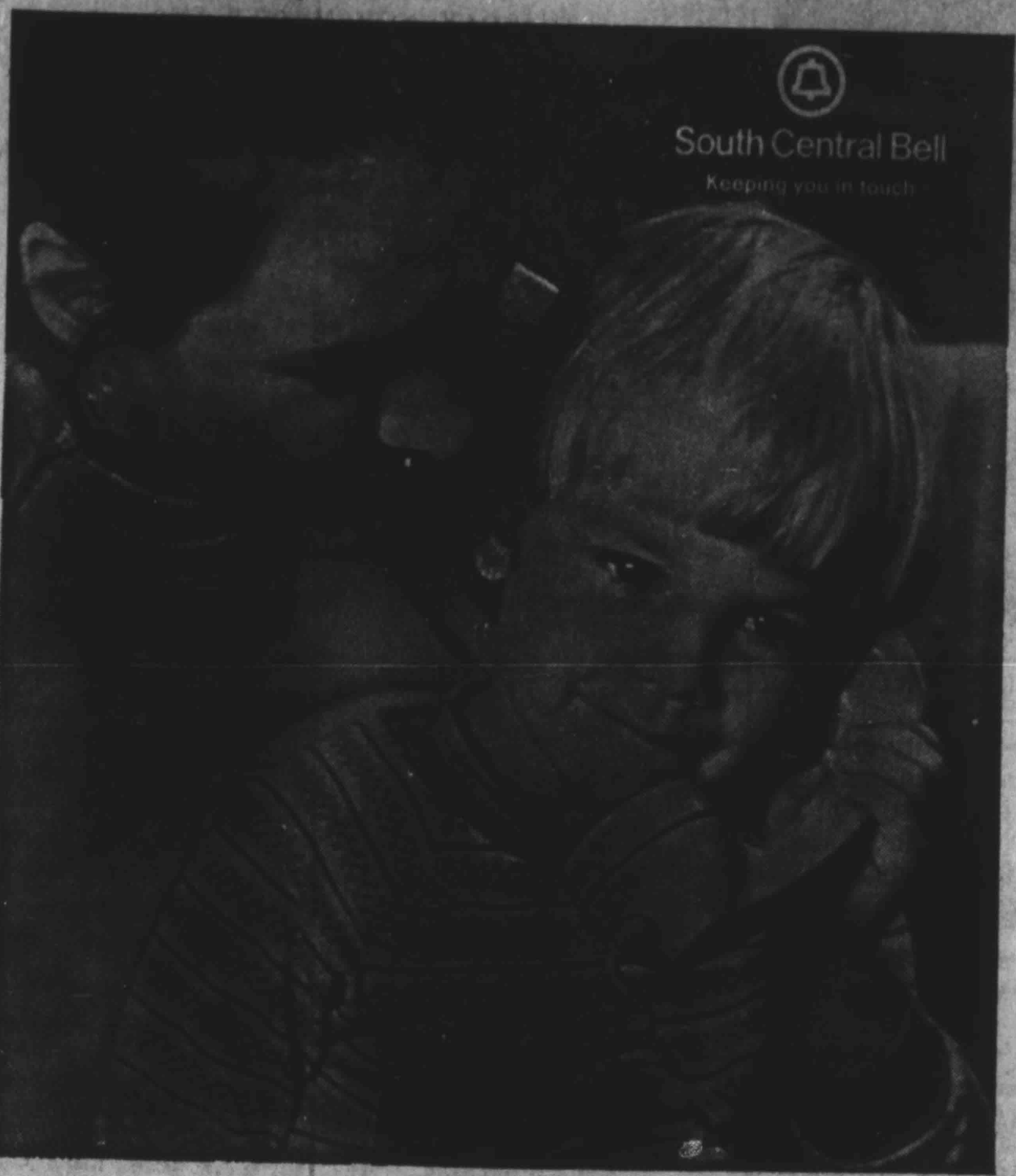

We must put our efforts into programs that make quality education available to every child, wherever he lives, instead of programs to make political pawns of our children."

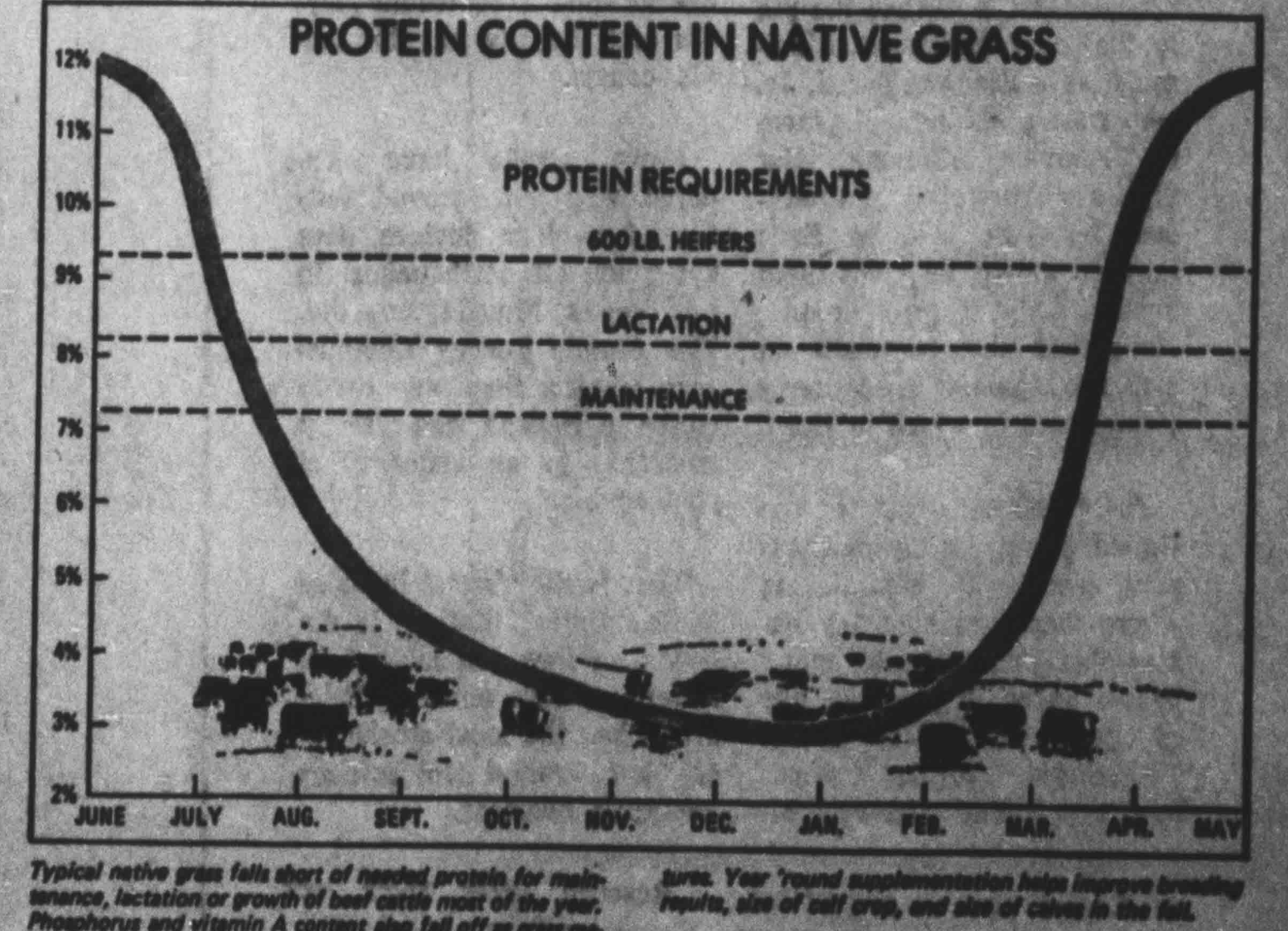
