THE BIBLE SPEAKS

THE BUM RAP
Lesson for April 6, 1973

Background Scripture: Isaiah 53:1-3
Book: Isaiah 53:1-3
Verses: 1-3
Devotional Reading: Psalm 22:1-4

A convict in the state prison was patiently listening to the Chaplain explain the story Christ's arrest, trial, and crucifixion. When the Chaplain had concluded, the convict exclaimed: "Gee, that was sure a bum rap!"

As a prisoner he was particularly sensitive to the injustices which Jesus suffered on that first Good Friday. The convict was struck by the fact that this innocent man was Rev. Althouse falsely accused, victimized, and made the scapegoat. He had seen some "bum raps" some grossly unfair verdicts in his time, but this man Jesus, it seemed, was the most tragic of victims.

Our griefs, our sorrows
The convict was quite accurate in his observation: the trial and crucifixion are glaring examples of injustice. Jesus had done nothing to deserve punishment. The charges were trumped-up and he was the victim of manipulation. In order to convict him, people had been bribed to lie about him and his teachings. In the parlance of the American underworld: "he was framed."

Yet, not only was Jesus blameless himself, but he was willing to suffer for the sake of others. The prophet Isaiah, many centuries earlier, had caught this idea: "Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; . . . But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities. . . . upon him was the chastisement that made us whole, and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. (53:4-6)

The suffering and death of Jesus "been even" more unjust when we realize that Jesus suffered for the sins of other people, not his own. And we are among those other people for whom he suffered. He had to pay what was really our debt. Most of us have a hard enough time accepting the suffering that is rightly ours, but the thought of suffering for the sake of someone else's sins and errors seems unthinkable.

Healed by His wounds
Yet, when we read Isaiah 53 and the gospels it becomes evident that Jesus was not a victim. Though he did not seek death, he did accept it for the sake of all men. When one willingly bears a cross, he cannot be a victim of it; instead he is a victor because he has been unconquered by it.

Unlike so many who had been handed a "bum rap," the convict saw that Jesus faced suffering and death without bitterness: "He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth" (53:7). There was intense admiration from the convict for this man Jesus.

Maybe, he concluded, that's what life is really all about: willingly, lovingly bearing someone else's "bum rap."

Taylor, who in the March court meeting rejected magistrates' requests for a list of supplements paid selected teachers beyond minimum state requirements—the basic salary schedule for teachers here—is mailing magistrates a complete breakdown of certification data, degree or years of college, years of experience, supplements, and salary totals for every teacher in the county.

Increases would require an additional 14¢ on the present \$1.56 property tax rate, sales tax increase (subject to referendum) from 4½% to 5%, or some other financing method.

Guilty By Accusation

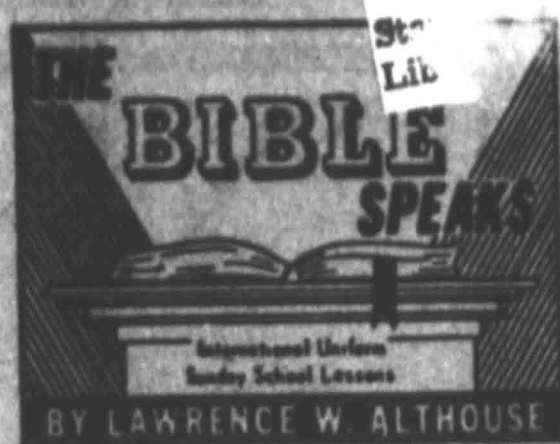

Still Illegal

Local citizens have called our attention to the fact that riding mini-bikes on streets and highways is illegal.

Since we published this fact during 1972, with several reminders, we find it puzzling to know just why so many have suddenly discovered it.

We are told by city officials that the laws forbidding mini-bikes will be enforced.

This is as it should be, but parents must co-operate, or fines must be assessed, if the law is to be enforced.

Last year, a number of parents became indignant because we published the facts about mini-bikes, and some effort was made to control them.

Apparently, it depends on whether or not your son or daughter owns a mini-bike whether you want the laws enforced.

Incidentally, we know of few things that are as potentially dangerous as mini-bikes and motorcycles.

Guilty By Accusation

We have no possible way of knowing just who is involved in the Watergate incident, and we suspect that most of the senators, columnists, etc., are in much the same dilemma.

Mr. McCord has passed out accusation after accusation, but so far we have not seen where he has come forward with any evidence to back his accusations, although he may have plenty.

It seems to us that one group is attempting to convict President Nixon and his staff without any recourse to evidence, while the president seems to be unwilling to attempt to disprove the accusations.

For the present, we are going to have to go along with a nationally known TV commentator and reporter, normally considered a liberal, who in reporting Mr. McCord's accusations affirmed that he had seen no evidence to back his statements.

Let's have an end to this mess, either by grand jury action or by bringing a halt to accusations which cannot or will not be substantiated.

Vote By People Set On Added Sales Tax For Teacher Salaries

In a courtroom crowded with more than 100 teachers, Lauderdale County Court voted almost unanimously Monday to ask the election commission to call within 60 days a referendum in which county citizens will vote on a 1/2% sales tax increase, to 5%, to raise teacher salaries for the next school year.

School Supt. O. R. Taylor said the 1/2% would produce about \$125,000 annually, half of collections in incorporated cities going to them. He said teachers would ask the cities to relinquish their proceeds to permit salary increases of \$280 to \$340 per year, matching increases scheduled from state funds.

Magistrate James Jones, noting that a month ago Taylor had sought only \$65,000 for increases of \$100 to \$250 a year for teachers, offered an amendment to divide the anticipated \$125,000 equally between the two schools amid school building needs, but did not get a second to his motion.

Magistrate Emmett Young, who voted against the referendum, said he did not oppose the salary increase but felt they should come from a property tax increase—14c on top of the present \$1.86 rate for a \$65,000 yield, or 27c to produce \$125,000.

Confidential Corner

By Henry Murohian High Cost Of Living Probably half of the conversation on the streets now has concerned the high cost of living, particularly speculative rises in meat prices and other foods. We agree that the cost of food is increasing, and, in some cases, apparently, unreasonably so, but food has still not shown the greatest climb. For instance, the cost of medical and hospital care has skyrocketed to the point where a long illness means bankruptcy for many families, even though they may have hospital insurance. Apparently, there is little that hospital administrators can do to hold down costs. Some nursing homes charge as much as \$6,000 a year or more, which few of us can afford. Since apparently it is just not a reliable, and as a result of medical care people are living in private operated nursing homes which are not licensed or supervised. We don't know the answer, but these nursing homes would be without a home if the unlicensed homes were closed. Another area in which costs have skyrocketed is services—electrical work, radio and TV repair, plumbing, etc. Any reasonably skilled serviceman has far more than he can do, with the result that costs have climbed. Clothing has shown a continued climb, with a pair of shoes some \$10 to \$12 higher than a few years ago, with the quality much poorer. All of these things are too costly, but the greatest expense of all is the taxes paid by the average family. While we do not have the exact figures available, we do know that several authorities declare that more than 40% of the average citizen's earnings are eaten up by taxes, local, state and federal, including the hidden taxes which few of us realize we pay. The farmer is entitled to charge enough for his product to earn a decent living, the serviceman definitely earns his pay, clothing manufacturers and merchants are entitled to get a decent return on their goods—but there can be little excuse for the waste, graft, etc. that create high tax rates, with very little to show for our money. There is a great deal of talk about tax reform and making the wealthy pay more. What we need is reform which makes the less wealthy pay less and get more for his money. Law Being Enforced Halls' Chief of Police Buddy Moore tells us that a number of warning tickets have been issued for the operation of minibikes on the streets and that the city police will continue to issue tickets. However, Chief Moore said that second tickets will mean that offenders will be cited before County Judge Paul Dew, county juristic judge, and parents may expect fines. Remember, no child under 14 years of age may be licensed, and no motorized vehicle may be operated on streets and highways without a licensed driver.

Frost Takes Toll Of Early Tomato Plants, Berries

By Charles T. Paul Extension Leader Frost last week killed thousands of tomato plants set by county farmers for the earliest market. W. G. (Squeaky) Jennings set seed growers will set this week. The green fruit and open blooms of strawberries were killed. The crop there will come only from blooms not open at the time, or later varieties. Peach, apple, and pear fruit appear to have come through the frost-free weather. Hill farmers are doing spring planting in fields adjoining orchards with unpicked cotton. Through in many cases too wet, nearly half of upland fields and some lowland fields have been plowed for 1973 plantings. Delta area farmers believe there may be an opportunity to plant cotton in the sandy loam areas, provided flood waters continue to fall and there is abundant sunshine. Black land normally planted to cotton will go to soybeans. Cotton Total Reported Oliver Voss, manager of Federal Compress in Ripley, reports 32,100 bales of cotton warehouse from the 1972 crop, compared with 29,594 in 1971. Estimates last fall ran as high as 40,000 bales before the rains. Grades of cotton averaged lower and staple length was down slightly from the 1972 crop, says the Cotton Classing Office in Memphis. The outlook for 1973 is for 7% less cotton, belt-wide, than in 1972. The acres will go to soybeans instead.

Elementary & Junior High Building Programs Major Elements In Proposal Lauderdale County's Board of Education has submitted a 3-point plan to eliminate the vestiges of year former dual school systems next fall, as demanded by the federal Office of Civil Rights: 1. All students in a minority in a school attendance area will attend that school in the fall of 1973. (This will bring Arp Elementary School to approximately 98% minority students.) 2. Initiate elementary building program aimed at September, 1974 or 1975, completion date, eliminating the three and one-half schools in the central portion of the county—Central Elementary, with 153 students; Curve, with 119 students; and Nantkopp, with 74 students. 3. Initiate junior high school building program pulling 7th and 8th grade students from Arp and Nantkopp to the new high school facility available for kindergarten programs in these two school areas. A letter demanding the new proposals, dated three days after the federal Court of Appeals reversed March 23 to stay a federal district court ruling in the District of Columbia presiding over desegregation, specifically cited Henning schools as "prejudicial minority schools" showing "little or no change in the racial composition." Henning Primary School, grades 1-5, is 24.5% white. Henning Elementary, grades 4-8, is 24.6% white. County-wide ratio is 57.4%.

THE VIRGIN BIRTH

"What think ye of Christ? whose son is he?" (Matt. 22:42) Was Jesus the natural son of Joseph or of some unknow man, or was he conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary? This is an important question, and basically two answers have been given. In the first century, there were those who said that Jesus was John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or one of the prophets. (Matt. 16:13f.) In other words, they thought of him only as a man. However, there were many, along with Peter, who acknowledged that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the Living God." (Matt. 16:16)

The modernists and liberals, as a rule, insist that it is really not important whether one accepts the virgin birth or not. If this doctrine is so insignificant, why do they go to such lengths in their efforts to destroy belief in it? Also, how can one explain the divinity of Christ, and yet, deny his miraculous birth?

Hundreds of years before the remarkable event occurred, Isaiah predicted the supernatural and miraculous manner of the Savior's birth in the following words: "Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (7:14) On the first page of the New Testament, the inspired writer, Matthew, quotes this prophecy and applies it to Jesus. (1:18-23) Mathew also adds that the name Immanuel means "God with us," thus, establishing his deity.

The Bible teaches that Jesus was a heavenly child with an earthly mother, and an earthly child with a heavenly Father.

"What think ye of Christ? Whose son is he?" He is the "Son of the living God."

The attitude that one takes toward the birth of Jesus determines the attitude that one takes toward his life, his example, and his teaching. If one sets aside the miracle of his birth, then why couldn't one also set aside the miracle of his resurrection?
