The menace of drug abuse remains although much has been done to try to halt it. Some experts estimate over 50% of our teenagers have an urge to try drug experimentation.


People don't like to be told that teenagers pose the most critical drug abuse problem in this country. We like to think of drug abusers as hardened criminals, veterans of the underworld who are beyond assistance. This view makes inaction more justifiable, but facts don't lie, and the truth is that at least half of the nation's drug abusers are too young to vote!

Studies have shown that the most likely type of person to use drugs are the immature or childlike! They usually have a dependent personality, probably unsure, and afraid to meet life squarely. They are reluctant to grow up and assume an adult role.

Marijuana, besides alcohol, is probably the most popular drug of teenage abusers. Marijuana has no recognized medicinal use. It is generally smoked in cigarette form. The marijuana habit can change environment to the extent that companionship becomes limited to

Drug Problem is Threat To Everyone other users and outlets to "harder" drugs open as a result. Marijuana doesn't necessarily lead to heroin and other narcotics-but it interesting to note that almost all heroin and other hard narcotic users began with marijuana. From the standpoint of criminal interests, marijuana is a good "starter" for recruiting youth. Other drugs which are widely abused besides narcotics are LSD (acid), amphetamines (pep pills), and barbiturates (goof balls). It would be easy to skip alcohol in writing about drug abuse because it has been legalized and we can't blame it on the teenagers. However the truth is alcohol is unmatched by any drug in destroying lives and bringing misery to a large percent of our population. Approximately 40% of the beds in veterans hospitals and asylums are taken up by alcoholics. Besides killing themselves, alcohol users are responsible for a large percent of the deaths on our highways.

It is too bad that people who use drugs want others to use them also. They form groups in schools and colleges and try to make it sound interesting and exciting to others so they



might become hooked also. There is no doubt that it does sound exciting at first but it isn't worth the price.

Throughout history drugs have had two functions. On one hand they have been screened and developed to help us guard our health and use our abilities to the fullest. On - the other hand they have been misused to make segments of our population incapable of preforming fully as human beings.

Drugs can help or harm. Before you try drugs take time to get the facts, take time to weigh them, and then convey the facts to others. If you do this, I don't believe you will misuse drugs.

I am very proud of our teenagers in Halls. While in many places there has been a lot of drug users and law violators we have been very fortunate here in that teenagers have acted with maturity and judgement. All of us, as adults, should be appreciative of OUR teen-

Drug Problem is Threat To

The menace of drug abuse remains although much has been done to try to halt it. Some experts estimate over 50% of our teenagers have an urge to try drug experimentation.

People don't like to be told that teenagers pose the most critical drug abuse problem in this country. We like to think of drug abusers as hardened criminals, veterans of the underworld who are beyond assistance. This view makes inaction more justifiable, but facts don't lie, and the truth is that at least half of the nation's drug abusers are too young to vote!

Studies have shown that the most likely type of person to use drugs are the immature or childlike! They usually have a dependent personality, probably unsure, and afraid to meet life squarely. They are reluctant to grow up and assume an adult role.

Marijuana, besides alcohol, is probably the most popular drug of teenage abusers. Marijuana has no recognized medicinal use. It is generally smoked in cigarette form. The marijuana habit can change environment to the extent that companionship becomes limited to

other users and outlets to "harder" drugs open as a result. Marijuana doesn't necessarily lead to heroin and other narcotics-but it interesting to note that almost all heroin and other hard narcotic users began with marijuana. From the standpoint of criminal interests, marijuana is a good "starter" for recruiting youth.

Other drugs which are widely abused besides narcotics are LSD (acid), amphetamines (pep pills), and barbiturates (goof balls). It would be easy to skip alcohol in writing about drug abuse because it has been legalized and we can't blame it on the teenagers. However the truth is alcohol is unmatched by any drug in destroying lives and bringing misery to a large percent of our population. Approximately 40% of the beds in veterans hospitals and asylums are taken up by alcoholics. Besides killing themselves, alcohol users are responsible for a large percent of the deaths on our highways.

It is too bad that people who use drugs want others to use them also. They form groups in schools and colleges and try to make it sound interesting and exciting to others so they



might become hooked also. There is no doubt that it does sound exciting at first but it isn't worth the price.

Throughout history drugs have had two functions. On one hand they have been screened and developed to help us guard our health and use our abilities to the fullest. On the other hand they have been misused to make segments of our population incapable of preforming fully as human beings.

Drugs can help or harm. Before you try drugs take time to get the facts, take time to weigh them, and then convey the facts to others. If you do this, I don't believe you will misuse drugs.

Nowhere is this more evident in the New Testament, however, than in Paul's letters to the church at Corinth. This Christian community continued to be Paul's "problem child." Like many "problem" children, it was one of those churches upon whom he had lavished the most attention. Unlike most of his missionary ef forts, Paul spent eighteen months the tremendous obstacles against which he had to strive. Corinth had a reputation for being part red to a drunken, immoral way of life. Some people had probably said to Paul. "If you can start a

Strangely enough, however, threat to this Christian commuat least four factions and Paul's ring. There were those who said they were on Paul's side, others who said they belonged to Apolsided with Peter (Cephas), Still Christ." In the name of Jesus Christ What could Paul say to these people? He might begin by asserting his authority as an Apostle. but obviously that wouldn't work because some of the people would not acknowledge his authority. He had but one basis upon which to appeal to them: "I appeal to you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree that there be no dissensions among you, but that you be united . . ." (1 Cor. 1:10). Not for his sake, then, or even their own sake, but for the sake of Christ, Paul was asking them to root out the party spirit that had infested the whole congrega-tion. Instead of siding with this member that all leaders have their contribution to make, but it is God who gives growth in the churches. There is only one foundation upon which to build a church, said Paul; therefore, let there be but one side; Jesus




